## Rail Panel Urges Shorter Working Week, Pay Boost

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17 (AP)—A special presidential board recommended today that the railroads give 1,000,000 non-union employees a 40-hour work-week to begin Sept. 1, 1949, and an immediate 10 percent pay increase.

Board members estimated the shorter work week would mean a 14 per cent increase in pay and would cost the railroads \$450,000,000 a year.

One of the conditions of the 40-hour work week would be that the rail workers give up their present agreement providing time and a half pay for Sunday work.

Not Binding The board's recommendations are not binding on either the railroads or the unions.

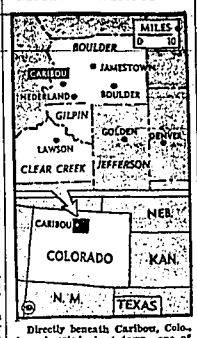

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## TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON—Bitter recriminations have been cast between the American Farm Bureau Federation and the American Farm Bureau Federation here and at their current annual convention at Atlantic City, N. J., where the leadership's support of Gov. Thomas E. Dewey has weakened their influence at the White House and on Capitol Hill for the future.

### RURAL

This particular faction of the agricultural bloc would be even more gloomy if they could read a confidential summary of the reasons for President Truman's victory, which has been given by the research division of the Republican national committee.

Although it acknowledges that many factors were responsible for the Nov. 2 upset, it puts the finger on the rural vote.

"The evidence is at hand," it says, "it is impossible to express any clear judgment as to what were the main factors in Republican defeat, and how various classes voted."

DEFEATED—The one thing which seems probable about the election is that it was a Republican ticket in sufficient numbers. Truman carried the cities and industrial centers, but he lost the rural vote.

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RESPONSIBILITY—The angry and resentful clamor among producers of wheat and cattle broadcast from the head of Allan B. Kline, Jr., president of the federation, although the membership generally agreed that the election was a result of a virtual annex of the GOP in the recent election. It went out on a political limb deliberately, albeit with a heavy heart.

The AFBP had been a Republican minded and controlled group until 1931, when it rebelled because it didn't get a penny for its name.

SWITCH—But the normally astute political farmers foresaw a new crop of lawmakers and executives who would be more than willing to be grateful for the support of the farm. They showed their switch of sympathy by choosing Kline instead of affable and popular "Ed." They figured that Alben Barkley would not find favor with "President" Dewey.

Kline protested that his organization was still non-partisan, but he was not. He held frequent conferences with Dewey and his staff. Always he was always happy to meet the press afterward. He frequently mentioned as a possible secretary of agriculture under the administration.

WASHINGTON—Both at home and abroad, the running battle over the farm bill does not detract from its importance. As Sumner Welles testified, they were secret documents that would have been used to break the state department code. To remove them was a crime and those who are guilty should be punished.

There is an orderly way to proceed to do this. It is not by Elleg lights, by inflammatory statements, by public imprecations shouted from the housetops. That is the surest way to spread the widest doubt and confusion in the public mind, and President Truman's offhand press conference remarks were in this vein. But at the same time it was the members taking part in the committee seems determined to prove that the President was right when he said this was merely the final political fireworks of a committee that is about to expire. Two of the members taking part in the committee are lame ducks defeated on Nov. 2.

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### No End Seen Soon in U.S. Steel Scarcity

SALT LAKE CITY, Dec. 17 (AP)—Two top executives of United States Steel today said there is little prospect of an alleviation of the nationwide scarcity of steel.

The executives were Allen C. Hoach, president of Columbia Steel company, and F. B. DeLong, the firm's vice president in charge of steel. They arrived in Salt Lake City to confer with Utah industrialists.

Reck Meas Steel  
The Utah men are asking for more steel to increase the rate of production in the state's rapidly increasing group of fabricating plants.

Hoach told them there was little chance they could get more steel. He explained that present allocations by producers are set by the government under a government plan of cooperation by major steel concerns.

Can't Be Changed  
The Columbia Steel president added that the Utah allocations could not be changed unless such changes were ordered by the government agency. He said that in this respect, Columbia—although a sister U.S. Steel corporation subsidiary—only gets its allotted share of production from the Geneva Steel company's production.

In with Hoach and DeLong in their meeting with the industrialists was Walter Mathews, president of Geneva Steel.

### Polio Foundation Spending in State Exceeds Receipts

BOISE, Dec. 17 (AP)—The National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis has spent nearly three times as much money in Idaho as has been donated by the state during the past 10 years.

Kennon R. Bennett, Boise, state chairman for the 1948 March of Dimes, said Idaho has sent to the national foundation a total of \$240,449.23 for polio research and emergency funds, retaining a like amount in the state's 44 county chapters.

He said during the past 10 years the national foundation has advanced a total of \$723,863.50 to fight polio, care for patients and provide expensive equipment in treating the crippling disease in Idaho.

Eighty per cent of the national foundation's expenditures have been since June 1947, when Idaho suffered its most severe polio outbreak in history. More than 350 persons contracted the disease that year and 114 polio cases have been reported this year.

Bennett pointed out the figures represent an expenditure of nearly \$2 per capita in Idaho in the last decade.

The suit was to collect Idaho income taxes for the year 1944, 1945 and 1946 from Bernstein.

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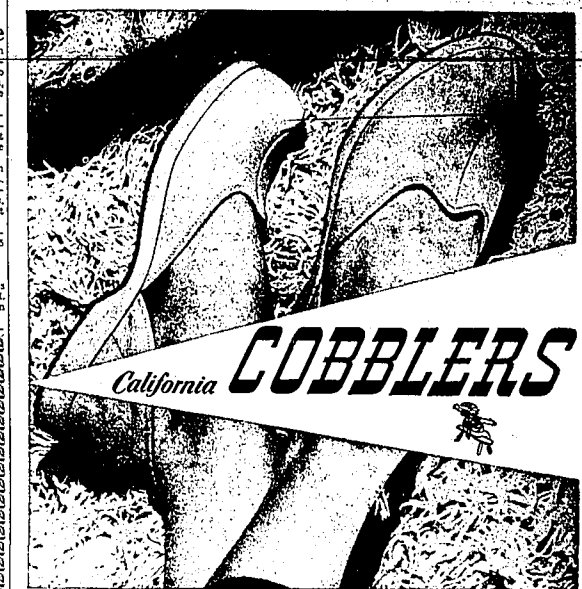

### English Scrap Export Tallies Support Claim

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17 (AP)—Consensus figures last night backed up statements by Marshall plan officials that aluminum scrap imports from the United States are increasing from Great Britain—has reached a postwar peak. There is a domestic shortage of the metal.

This developed as the economic cooperation administration stood up to a newly announced policy to curtail all non-ferrous metal shipments to Europe pending a full profit-alleged profit-taking deal on aluminum scrap.

**Census Figures**  
Census figures, based on declarations of imports made to U.S. customs officers, showed:  
Total imports of aluminum during 1947 were \$1,475,000 pounds of this, 3,401,000 pounds came from Britain.

In the first 10 months of 1948—latest period of which figures are available—imports from world-wide scrap sources hit 111,372,000 pounds. Great Britain is listed as the source of 34,618,000 pounds during the period.

**Fact Denials**  
Howard Bruce, acting ECA administrator, faced by denials from high British officials that any scrap was exported during the period from their country, said:  
"The figures would tend to indicate we are shipping too much metal over there, if a substantial percentage was coming back to this country."

Earlier this week, Bruce said that a "mounting stream" of aluminum and lead is finding its way from Europe to American markets after Marshall plan dollars have been spent to send the same metals overseas.

### Train Crowds Handed Credit In Vote Upset

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17 (AP)—The crowds that President Truman drew during his campaign "should have told the pollsters and other experts something," his press secretary says in an article on "How Truman Did It."

Charles G. Ross, writing in the current issue of Collier's magazine, said the President's own firm belief in victory never wavered from the time of his nomination until the November ballots were counted.

He said act 1, scene 1 of the campaign drama took place in the President's office in mid-July shortly after the Philadelphia convention. Experts already were predicting defeat, but Mr. Truman told his staff:

"Going to Win"

"We are going to win. I expect to hear all over the country and talk at every whistle stop. We are going to be on the road most of the time from Labor day to the end of the campaign. It's going to be tough on everybody, but that's the way it's got to be."

And Ross said: "I don't believe it stretches the truth to say that the election was won then and there."

The total distance traveled in the President's seven campaign trips was 21,228 miles. Ross said. Counting the June "non-political" junket the total was 31,473. During these trips the President made 351 speeches, one day to 16.

"Sixty Efficiencies"

Ross said Mr. Truman's staff heard little about the country and the state legislature while they returned from their honeymoon. Friends credited this stark atop their new home.
