Movie Houses. Open Fight on "Give-Aways"

NEW YORK, Dec. 21 (AP)—Neighborhood theaters from the Atlantic coast to St. Louis, are fighting in weekly prizes away from the public today to lure them away from radio give-away programs.

Come Jan. 3 and some 500 motion picture houses are going to try to lure moviegoers back into empty theater seats and still steer clear of the lottery laws that put "bank out" of business about 11 years ago.

Theater owners admit hard times are on top of the small houses again, particularly on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday nights.

The "Jingle Jambores" is the gimmick to get attendance on those four dull days each week. It will work like this:

A customer will receive a certificate as he enters the theater on one of these four nights. On this certificate he will indicate which dull night of the week he will attend regularly.

He then completes the last line of the jingle of the week and leaves it at the exit. His jingle will be judged in the contest for prizes to be awarded two weeks later.

The jingles will be judged by a Chicago firm engaged by the sponsors. A Chicago corporation headed by Phil Regan.

National Prize

Prizes will include a national grand prize each week, attendance prizes and telephone prizes, Regan said.

The customers will be paid in U. S. war bonds," Regan said.

A winner must attend a participating theater the night the prizes are announced, Regan said. His signed attendance card will prove he attended and does not claim the prize when it is announced.

Prizes will be paid only when the customer proves he lost a radio give-away prize because he was in a theater at the time the prize was won. The value of the radio prize, up to a maximum of \$10,000, Regan said.

Official Says Auto Buyers Getting More

WASHINGTON, Dec. 21 (AP)—A major automobile maker said today the 1948 car buyer is getting more for his money than before the war.

M. E. Coyle, executive vice president of General Motors corporation, said the man who buys a 1948 Chevrolet list-priced at \$1,250 gets much more for his dollar than the 1929 buyer of a \$1,250 Buick.

His statement was made to a joint congressional subcommittee which is investigating business profits.

Follows GE Chief

Coyle followed Charles E. Wilson, president of General Electric company, who said that more wage increases for labor can result only in higher prices.

"Unless prices are to keep on climbing higher," Wilson said, "wages can be paid only out of the increases."

Coyle said General Motors stockholders have received only 65 percent of the company's earnings since the war ended, compared with 100 percent in the years just before the war.

Profit Margin Down

He said the company's actual margin of profit was 8.75 per cent in 1947-48, compared with 11.5 per cent in 1934-41 period. On top of that,

Idaho Potato Tests Taken In Cincinnati

MOSCOW, Dec. 21 (AP)—By the end of this month University of Idaho agricultural economists will know what size Idaho potatoes are preferred by Cincinnati housewives.

Ten retail grocery stores in Cincinnati, O., are offering three lots of uniform-size Idaho potatoes. One lot contains potatoes about two inches long and seven ounces in weight. Another includes potatoes from 7 to 10 ounces each, and the third uniform lot has the 10 to 12 ounce potatoes.

All Large Sizes

A fourth display in the 10 grocery stores includes potatoes of all sizes more than two inches in length.

The potatoes used in the study were grown at the University of Idaho's branch experiment station at Aberdeen, T. S. Vandeford, Aberdeen grower and shipper, was in charge of grading and packing.

Eberhard in Charge

Milton F. Eberhard, assistant agricultural economist for the university, is in charge of the consumer preference study.

Eberhard said the potato preference study will shift to Kansas City, Mo., next month.

Similar studies were conducted in Los Angeles. The surveys are expected to continue for the next two or three years in the middle western and eastern cities, Eberhard said.

Nine Great Pyrenees Puppies Here Descended From Royalty

Helen E. Caudle, route 2, Twin Falls, has been busy lately with nine exceptionally hungry little mouths to feed. Eight weeks out of her Great Pyrenees dogs, Basquiere de la Feuille by name, gave birth to a litter of puppies, five males and four females.

Mrs. Caudle said she values the pups at between \$50 and \$100 each because the breed is famous for its qualities as sheep and watch dogs. At present these energetic bundles of gray and white fur weigh an average of 17 pounds each. When fully grown, the dogs are pure white with gray markings being confined to the lower layer of fur.

The breed is a member of the Mastiff family, Miss Caudle explained, and was once known as the Pyrenean Mastiff and undoubtedly migrated into Europe from Asia Minor in two waves. The first was by sea with the trading Phoenicians to Spain, settling in the Spanish Pyrenees. The second came with the Aryan horde and was left in all of the prominent valleys of Europe. Fossil remains of the dogs have been found in deposits of the Bronze age which dates back to 1800 to 2000 B. C.

By 1407 the French were using these dogs as regular assistant guards of the Chateau de Lourdes. In 1675 they were adopted as the royal dog of France by Louis XIV.

The breed was first brought to America in 1824, when General Lafayette brought a pair of males from France to an American friend. The Great Pyrenees wasn't truly introduced in the United States until 1922 when Mr. and Mrs. Francis Crane, Needham, Mass., started the Basquiere kennel.

The American Kennel club accorded them official recognition in February, 1923, and since that time classes for the breed have been held at dog shows.

\$505,000 for '49 Forestry Funds Urged

BOISE, Dec. 21 (AP)—Roger L. Guernsey, state forester, said the state cooperative board of forestry has approved a \$505,000 budget to cover state forestry department expenses for the next biennium.

Meeting with Gov. C. A. Robba, board chairman, the group listed as budget items: \$200,000 for fire protection of state lands and for current expense; \$168,000 for salaries and wages; \$120,000 for travel, and \$33,000 for capital outlay.

Guernsey said the department's biennial appropriation for the current biennium was \$324,000.

To Add 4 Foresters

In line with the proposed budget increase, Guernsey said the board approved the addition of four more foresters to the department. He said they are urgently needed for timber surveys and to supervise timber sales.

At the same time the board approved a department legislative program.

One change requested in the present law would provide that the owners of tenants residing on state forest lands be exempted from payment of forest protection tax on not more than 100 acres within one mile of his residence. Guernsey said the change would be subject to the approval of organized farm groups. He said the present law allows tax exemption of all land within one mile of the residence.

Change Recommended

A change was recommended in the slash disposal law to provide that anyone engaged in cutting forest products would prior to actual cutting make a plan of slash arrangement for slash disposal. The operator would have the opportunity of contracting with the forester for disposal of the slash or would post a cash or surety bond to cover the cost of disposal. The present law permits slash to lie on the ground for one year before being removed.

The board also favored creation of a \$25,000 fund for buying tax delinquent lands which are primarily suited for timber growing, but have become barren through heavy logging or fire.

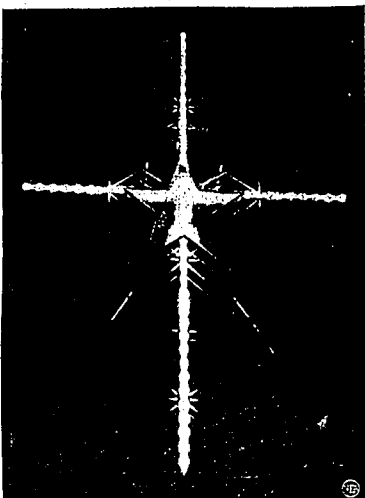

U. S. Interest Gains in Plan On Jap Police

WASHINGTON, Dec. 21 (AP)—High government officials are showing growing interest in a proposal to set up an armed constabulary force of 150,000 men in Japan to thwart communist designs.

The proposal for such a force was first offered by Lieut.-Gen. Robert L. Eichelberger, former aide to Gen. Douglas MacArthur in Tokyo. MacArthur himself is reported to have called for a strengthening of Japanese defenses to bolster the position of the democratic government.

Some government officials, looking ahead to the time occupation troops quit Japan, believe it would be a mistake to leave the country with no army at all and only with 18,000 men armed only with pistols.

The Japanese constitution, drawn up under allied supervision forbids the creation of any army and pledges the nation to international peace. An army constabulary force, to be maintained here, would not put Japan in a position to threaten world peace but would be a strong weapon to maintain internal order.

Light Arms Only

Such a force, it was pointed out, would be armed with rifles, machine guns and other light arms. But it would not have artillery or

USAF's Claim Of Top Speed Is Challenged

CHICAGO, Dec. 21 (AP)—A Chicago chemist, on the prowl for scientific inaccuracies, challenged an official air force announcement that the world's plane speed record is 670.81 miles an hour, it was announced.

The jet plane, he maintains, may have averaged any of the 67 different speed records set in several months ago.

Challenges Records
What's more, the chemist says he challenges any speed record carried out to three decimal places—power boat, airplanes or jets.

The critic of speed measurements carried out to three decimal places is Edward L. Gordy, editor of the Chemical Bulletin, official publication of the American Chemical Society. He contends timing devices used are not accurate enough to measure speeds to 1.000ths of a mile an hour.

Makes Points
Gordy, working with a department in the chemical society that is seeking to establish greater accuracy in scientific reporting, made these points in an interview:

The air force, in listing the record of the North American F-80A fighter over a three kilometer (0.9424 feet) course at Murco air force base, Murco, Calif., used an electronic trip and a high speed camera that took 500 pictures each second.

The air force and the bureau of standards said calibrated instruments made the equipment accurate to the nearest 1.000th of a second.

Nearest Time Measured
"The time was measured to the nearest 1.000th of a second," Gordy said. "The final result was the average of several runs, but let us assume that the time of one of them was reported as 10.601 seconds. This means merely that the time lay somewhere between 10.600 and 10.602 seconds. The speed for this run, calculated to the third decimal place, lay somewhere between 670.940 and 670.970 miles an hour.

We have not the faintest notion which of these 67 speeds (in 1.000ths of a mile an hour) it was. Therefore no one of them should be selected. The speed should not be reported to three decimal places at all, but should be reported to one decimal place as 671.0 miles per hour."

Makes Comparisons
Gordy also made these comparisons:

A plane traveling at 670.981 miles an hour will travel 0.941055 feet (approximately the length of the course) in 10 seconds.

A plane going 1.000th of a mile an hour faster (670.982 miles an hour) will travel 0.941059 feet in 10 seconds.

If the two planes start together, the winning plane will finish only 0.04 of a foot or less than a fifth of an inch ahead of the loser.

Chances Said Good on New Coin Minting

NEW YORK, Dec. 21 (AP)—Brother, can you spare a dime? That's what the American Institute for Intermediate Coinage hopes. The institute, organized here under a group of imposing business names as officers, will promote the coinage of a seven-and-one-half cent piece and a two-and-one-half cent piece.

Would save \$8,500,000,000 a year. Edward M. Mehren, president of a California soft drink company and board chairman of the organization, said that if the two intermediate coins were produced, they would save consumers \$8,500,000,000 a year. "Many low-cost items and services have been jumped from 10 cents for convenience when the manufacturer would have been more than willing to sell his product for 7 1/2 cents if such a coin were available," he said.

Mehren said the A.I.C. with the backing of business, labor and consumer groups, would present a bill to congress asking that the two new coins be minted.

"The bill stands an excellent chance of passage within six months," he said. Dr. Cecil Dunn, researcher for the institute and professor of economics at Occidental college, Los Angeles, said one-third of the currency handled in American business involved small coins.

"Serious Rigidity" Imposed He said the present coinage system imposed "serious rigidity on prices" which penalized buyers and sellers.

Mehren said the new coins proposed by the A.I.C. would have to be distinctive in feel. He suggested that round coins with holes in them be made.

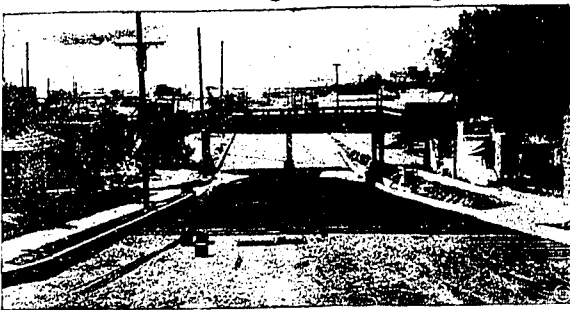
Mehren said that members of his group had proposed new names for the pieces. For instance, "Dicket" and "dime."

Solons Assert Russ Building Alaska Threat

WASHINGTON, Dec. 21 (AP)—House labor subcommittee reported that it has "good reason to suspect" that Russia has moved "many thousands of slave laborers" to the Siberian coast within 100 miles of Alaska, it announced today.

The subcommittee, headed by Representative Kersten, R. Wis., also said 17 American Eskimos, who had come to the Siberian coast to trade, were held by Russian army officers for 31 days and questioned closely about Alaska defense installations.

The report covered a two-week tour of the territory in late October by Kersten and Representative Fisher, D. Tex. The two went there to check into subversive activities in the area.

Kersten and Fisher recommended immediate steps to strengthen U.S. Alaskan defenses, to prevent information leaking to Russia and to eliminate what they termed communist influence in the territory's labor unions.

Kersten said reports received in-

dicated the Russians were doing much building on their side of the Bering sea and have many airfields in the area.

He said the Russian officers who questioned the Alaskan Eskimos asked them if they would "accept" the Russians if and when they took over Alaska.

The Russians told the Eskimos, he said, the names of officers and men stationed in Alaska, the names of newcomers and the number of planes at certain army airfields.

6 'Important' T-H Changes Are Debated

WASHINGTON, Dec. 21 (AP)—Six of the most important changes in the Taft-Hartley law—including broadening of the non-communist provisions to apply to management—will be urged by a Republican-dominated congressional committee. Senator Ball, R. Minn., chairman of the senate-house "watch dog" committee set up to study the labor law, announced here today that he will recommend a half dozen "substantive" revisions.

At the same time, Ball said "nuts" to the idea of repealing the Taft-Hartley measure and replacing it with the old Wagner act without any change in the original version.

Document Released Shortly after Ball announced plans to file the committee's report Dec. 31, four days before the Democrats take over control of congress, a Republican member of the study group denounced the document as "obviously partisan."

"I am not going along with the report," said Senator Ives, R. N. Y., "partly because it obviously is a partisan report and partly because I don't quite agree with some of the things in it."

Ball's announcement that the study committee will recommend six "major" changes came after the group had met for three hours behind closed doors.

Glves Sketch Report He gave only a sketchy report of what the committee has in mind. Another member said some of the amendments, subject to change, will be:

- 1. Broadening of the non-communist affidavit requirement to cover management and to make the term "officer" include members of all policy-making and governing bodies, as well as anyone who exercises administrative, disciplinary or negotiating authority.
- 2. Elimination of a provision requiring a majority vote to authorize a union shop. The committee finds that in 88 per cent of elections held thus far, a union shop has been authorized.

Limit NLRB Powers 3. Limitation of the national labor relations board's jurisdiction to exclude local businesses whose operations only remotely affect interstate commerce.

4. Revision of the machinery set up to try to avert "national emergency" strikes.

5. Authorizing the NLRB in the case of mass and coercive picketing, to require the union to reimburse workers who have been denied access to their jobs. This amendment would amount to a clarification.

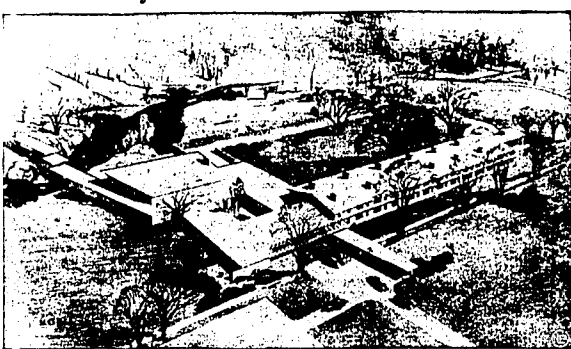
