 Undertaking in history. A trial which lasted 2½ years and cost an estimated \$10,000 a day.

Central figure in the Sumaguro prison drama was Isidoro Hachidzeme Tojo, the 64-year-old virtual war dictator of Japan. He took over the reins of the government in August two months before the Pearl Harbor sneak attack.

Tojo was the one who ordered that sent 100 Japanese planes and seven military submarines against the Hawaiian Islands on Dec. 7, 1941, in a surprise raid which caused the death of more than 3,000 Americans and killed the American navy for many months.

At the time of the attack, two Japanese warships were talking to American ships in the open sea only after it became obvious that war was lost.

Tojo, known as the "tiger of Manchuria," was the Japanese most hated by the Chinese people. He was the driving force in the manufacture of "incidents" to further Japan's expansion on the Asiatic continent.

His role in the Japanese drive in 1935 and 1937, was one of seven leaders of the "young" imperialist organization that spread a policy of fear over Japanese-occupied territories.

### Probers List 562 Units as 'Red' Groups

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22 (AP)—The United States harbors 562 organizations cited as communist or sub-fronts and 190 such publications, the house un-American activities committee reported here.

It listed the names in a 144-page pamphlet and said this is the first time anybody ever sounded them up. They came from official government agencies—federal, state and city, the committee said. It noted that they've been named before.

"Greatest Weapon"

"The fronts are communism's greatest weapon in the country today," the report said. It estimated there are hundreds of them. The committee's definition of a communist front is:

"An organization or publication created or captured by the communists to do the party's work in secret fields."

The committee is in a comparative year-end quiet while it writes its official story of communist intrigue in America.

Changes Seen

"Methods are in for some broad changes after the first of the year if one of the most prominent members, Representative Mundt, R. S. D., gets his way."

Some of his proposals are long lines suggested outside of the committee in bitter attacks on its methods of dealing with witnesses. Mundt said he will seek these new procedures:

1. Permission for witnesses to ask questions for the committee to ask accusers or other witnesses.
2. Private questioning of witnesses before public interrogation to avoid "staring accusations" against possibly innocent persons.
3. Giving accused persons the right to be heard before the committee issues a report.
4. Preventing subcommittees from making reports before the full committee has approved them.

### Javanese War Explained by AP's Analyst

Java is a rainforest country, a fair and smiling land, fertile, productive, an infinitely beautiful. From the air, it seems all jewel-green, streaked with scarlet, orange and silver that turn out, at closer range, to be frangipani and tea and slow-moving streams.

In mid-day, the light can be coming. Tropics heat: slow you to a walk. But usually, in the late afternoon, you feel a warning puff of wind, the sky turns purple-black, and from somewhere out of the ocean, the rolling curtains of rain pounds across the land. It is so lush and violent that you can't see the street from your front porch.

Others have beauty. The other islands in the "general belt"—as they call the Netherlands Indies—have their own rich beauties. Bali is mountains and mist. Celebes looks like a wintered orchid on the main. Sumatra still mainly jungle, but not such a thick and savage jungle as Borneo. The Moluccas and the Philippines are straightaway. "South Sea Islands," Hollywood version.

This is the scene of the newest political turmoil.

Together, the archipelago, long under Dutch rule, has become known as "Indonesia." But the present Dutch quarrel is not with all the 70,000,000 people in the islands. It is with a single government, which took the name of the "Republic of Indonesia."

Not Representative. The republic does not represent all the people, by any means. On the contrary, it had its capital on Jogjakarta, smack in the center of Java, and its authority reached only through a nearby radius and into portions of Sumatra.

There are 10 other governments set up in the remaining islands. They were formed by their own people. The plan, eventually, is to unite them all into the United States of Indonesia. The Dutch would continue to play a certain administrative, but not the controlling role.

Here are some points to remember in evaluating the most inflamed situation between the Dutch and the republic:

No Real Quarrels. The Dutch have had no real quarrels with any of the other Indonesian regimes in the three years since the war ended. Agreements have been reached between the Netherlands authorities and the other Indonesian administrations. They were neither dictated nor imposed. They were based, out on a give-and-take basis.

2. Just the opposite seems to have occurred in the negotiations between the Dutch and the republic. In baseball parlance, this government was called a "hold out."

Charges and counter-charges are flying, since between the republic and the Dutch. They have culminated now, in "police action."

It would seem significant that the Dutch have been able to achieve a working agreement with the other Indonesian regimes, but that one remained outside the proposed framework. Without the republic, located as it is in the most fertile and strategically central part of Java, the United States cannot exist.

### Red Tape Gets Loose; Adopted Girl Is on Way

LOVELAND, Colo., Dec. 22 (AP)—The tree is trimmed and Santa Claus is waiting for 4-year-old Teressa Erbes Swisher, nearing San Francisco on a boat from Manila.

Her adopted father, Dick Swisher, 21-year-old veteran, leaves Denver by plane tomorrow to meet her. He'll bring her back by plane for a reunion with her mother, Soledad, two years after they were parted.

Swisher married his wife while on army duty in Manila in 1946. Teressa was born on a boat from Manila. Swisher came home, expecting his wife and daughter to follow. But because the child was an American citizen, Mrs. Swisher had to leave her with relatives.

It's taken two years to unravel the red tape, and Teressa is aboard the steamship General Wedel, in the care of nurses returning to the United States.

A Christmas tree is set up in the small apartment where Swisher, a restaurant cook, and his wife live. A doll, piano and clothes are among the gifts waiting for Teressa.

"Soledad is so excited she can hardly talk," Swisher said.

### Atom Experts Not Martyrs, One Declares

CHICAGO, Dec. 22 (AP)—Dr. Gerald Grotringer said he does not consider himself and four other physicists "martyrs to science" because atomic radiation caused cancer which clouded their vision.

He said he plans to keep right on with his research work in atomic energy.

"I do not see how this could keep any prospective experimenters out of the field, since there were so few men affected," he said.

"Many have others," he said. "And the ones who have received a minor handicap, such as this really are not playing the roles of martyrs. There are many scientists whose names will never be known to the great mass of the public, who have given much more than we have—much more."

It was revealed Monday that five scientists suffered cancer after helping set cyclotrons.

Dr. F. Wheeler Loomis, head of the University of Illinois physics department, said three of them—Grotringer, P. Gerald Kruger and Lloyd Smith—suffered impaired vision after helping set up the Illinois cyclotron in 1943.

Dr. Loomis said at a news conference that he was not certain of the

### Pipeline Project's Contract Awarded

SPOKANE, Dec. 22 (AP)—The bureau of reclamation awarded a \$7,614,000 contract for construction of a giant water pipeline in the Columbia basin reclamation project. It was reported today.

Winners of the contract were the Utah Construction company, San Francisco, and the Winston Brothers company, Asus, Calif., who submitted a joint bid.

The contract calls for construction of a concrete and steel pipeline more than two miles long and from 22 to 25 feet in diameter. The pipeline is to be known as the 8000 lake siphon and will have a capacity of 28,250 gallons of water per second.

Approximately 4,000 feet of the siphon will be of reinforced concrete 25 feet in diameter. About 8,000 feet will be a steel-lined concrete pipe 22 feet, four inches in diameter. The pipe is expected to carry water sufficient to irrigate 250,000 acres of land.

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### Survey Indicates Pork Production May Be Curtailed

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22 (AP)—An agriculture department survey indicated farmers may not expand pork production as much in 1949 as the government had recommended.

Several months ago, Secretary of Agriculture Brannan urged a 17 per cent larger pig crop next spring than was produced last spring. But a check of farmers' plans showed a prospective increase of only about 10 per cent.

The coming spring crop will provide the nation's pork supply next fall and winter.

Reports from the field say some farmers fear that big expansion in hog next year would bring a sharp reduction in prices that would take the profit out of hog raising. They were said to have been influenced by the fact that the general level of farm prices has dropped about 12 per cent this year.

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### Parley Urged For Planning Of U. S. Aims

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22 (AP)—A national conference to bring labor, business and the farmer into agreement on long range policy was demanded on Capitol Hill last night. Senator Flinders, R. Vt., said they must consider what principles are best for the nation's economy, and study the effect on the government of wage negotiations and prices.

**To Ask Senate**  
Flinders, chairman of a house-keeping economic subcommittee looking into business profits, declared he will ask the senate to sponsor such a conference if the administration doesn't call it in the next few months.

**Favor Parley**  
Both he and Senator O'Mahoney, D. Wyo., a committee member, have asked they favor such a meeting.

Flinders said that such negotiations cannot continue on wages, or action be taken on prices without considering the effect on the problem of raising farm prices.

**Made Good Case**  
Flinders said of the hearings that business and the farmer have a better case for their profits than I expected. Business spokesmen argued that their profits are not too high because they are needed to meet a growing demand for greater and greater production.

Benjamin Fairless, president of United States Steel, told the committee that steel production had hit new highs in 1940 but that the present demand isn't going on forever.

The industry is turning out a record of 63,000,000 tons of finished product this year, according to a 69,000,000 next year, barring labor troubles, Fairless said.

### 23,191 Acres Available for Homesteads

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22 (AP)—Four western reclamation projects will provide sufficient land to admit 200 new homesteads totaling 23,191 acres, the reclamation bureau has announced.

**The new openings:**  
In February—49 farm units, totaling 5,727 acres, on the north Pavilion division of the Fluvion project, and 104 farm units, 11,621 acres on the Heart mountain division of the Shoshone project, both in Wyo.

In September—48 units, 4,320 acres, Payette division of the Boise project; eight units, totaling 523 acres, Moza division, Yakima, Wash. project.

World war II veterans have preference in the 1040 homestead openings, the bureau said, irrigation water will be made available during the new year to more than 200 acres of privately owned land of five projects: Boise, Decatur, Okla.; Yakima, Wash.; Tucuman, N. M.; and W. C. Austin, Okla.

BOISE, Dec. 22 (AP)—The industrial accident board's denial of compensation benefits to Vernon Hill, Kellogg, has been upheld by the state supreme court.

The high court affirmed the board's decision on grounds that Hill had not worked in the Sullivan Mining company mine since 1939 and that the occupational disease statute provides that a claim must be presented within two years after Hill had sought compensation on account of silicosis and bilateral pulmonary tuberculosis.

They were Harry Worrell, Ralph Barfield and Gordon Barnard, all of the Detroit area. Circuit Judge John Simpson found them guilty of contempt after a hearing and sentenced them to serve 60 days each.

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# Freezing Weather to Make Valley Duck Hunting Poor

Hunting in Magic Valley during the second half of Idaho's migratory waterfowl season will be poor, P. J. McDermott, district conservation officer, reported. The season will officially begin at noon Thursday.

Cold weather, freezing most waterways and lakes including portions of Snake river, has forced ducks and geese to leave the area, McDermott explained.

Warren W. Lowery, Burley, conservation officer in the Minidoka and Cassia county areas, reported Tuesday Snake river is frozen over from Jackson bridge, about six miles below Minidoka dam to Milner dam. Sections of the river from Jackson bridge to Minidoka dam also are covered with ice, Lowery said.

Ducks remaining in that area have been forced off the river and into drainage ditches. The drain ditches do not freeze over, Lowery said. Duck hunting in Magic Valley appears to be in the Silver creek area in Blaine county, McDermott said. He explained he had received a report from Tom Miller, conservation officer in the Wood river valley, saying there are plenty of ducks on Silver creek.

The stream, which is fed by warm water springs, never freezes over. A fair amount of ducks also was reported in sections of the Wood river. Most central and side lateral in other sections of the valley are reported to be frozen over, McDermott said.

Wilson lake, which is usually good duck hunting area, is frozen over. McDermott pointed out that it is considerably warmer there because of its high, valley scattered around. It will find few ducks in this immediate vicinity.

A good portion of the local ducks in the valley are reported to have migrated to American Falls in the last few days.

During the week-end large numbers of ducks and some geese were seen in Cassia country, but most of the birds have departed since then, McDermott said. The best hunting, outside of Warm Springs and Wood river, can be found near American Falls and below Glenns Ferry at Indian cove.

# Pro Grid Peace Movement Still Snagged, But Truce Is Hinted

PHILADELPHIA, Dec. 22 (AP)—The pro football peace movement remained snagged Tuesday as the national football league held its annual draft meeting here and the All America conference went through a similar procedure in Cleveland.

There were strong hints, however, that the effort to reach an understanding had not been abandoned and that harmony might be arranged by the time the National league holds its annual meeting in Chicago, Jan. 20.

Some observers had assumed that Marshall's objections to have a club in Baltimore caused the impasse when Benjamin P. Lindheimer, AAO executive committee chairman, said that the Baltimore situation was a major factor in the breakdown of negotiations.

Bell said: "Regardless of what has been said or written, Mr. Marshall at the meeting requested to be kept out of any discussion of the Baltimore controversy. Nine members went on record as being opposed to Baltimore, and Mr. Marshall at his own request, did not enter into any discussion regarding Baltimore."

Marshall said later: "I am not opposed to anything that would improve the situation. I don't oppose the entry of Cleveland and San Francisco into our league."
