School Group Asks State to Plan for Help

BURLEY, Dec. 22—A resolution, asking for greater state aid for educational purposes, was passed at a meeting of residents of the Cassia County school district at the high school this week.

About 40 teachers, school leaders, and citizens attended and the various phases of school finance were discussed. The Rev. Lloyd Ballfour was moderator at the meeting, which was conducted on an open forum basis. Wesley Stigmore announced that the purpose of the meeting was to outline definite needs of the new district to be placed before legislators convening next month at Boise.

Demell Wrightley, assistant superintendent of Cassia county schools, suggested that an equalization of the tax levy throughout the state would provide equal educational opportunities for all children. R. Robert Bjorkman, superintendent, also spoke on the financial condition of the county unit, and representatives from various service groups spoke briefly. The resolution passed by the group.

"It is resolved that the state of Idaho support from state sources a definite program which has arrived at by determining the average cost of education for each child in grades one to 12 over the state and then raising the local millage rate to meet this average daily attendance sufficient to support the educational program in that county. Then this state aid shall be levied in all counties of the state and the balance to be provided from a state source.

The purpose herein is to accomplish the following: 1. Place the responsibility of school finance where it should properly be. 2. Create a greater equalization of educational opportunity throughout the state. 3. Relieve the property tax and lighten the financial burden on the local level."

Proposed merger of American Overseas Airlines with the trans-Atlantic division of Pan American Airways may raise a question in some minds.

But even if there were only one American line flying the North Atlantic there would still be competition.

Prices among these competitors are fixed by international agreements. But the foreign lines are owned and operated by their governments.

So it can be seen that while they have most of the business, the American lines cannot afford to run many half-empty planes across the ocean.

In a way, American air and ship lines on the Atlantic are in the same fix, although the airlines obviously have the best of it.

Foreign airlines are buying the latest and best American equipment. Our lines must do the same, if they are to enjoy supremacy in at least one of the two means of transatlantic travel.

If a merger of two lines can help maintain that supremacy through more efficient operation, and can reduce the government's subsidy expense in the process, the question of monopoly seems academic rather than realistic.

OLD ILL, NEW TREATMENT: A committee of lawyers and doctors in New York state has proposed legislation to recognize alcoholism as a disease rather than a crime.

Slowly but surely, the way is being opened to an intelligent understanding of alcoholism—one of the most baffling problems of our time, and one of the most misunderstood.

It is recognized that evil is bred and with better at its source than in its consequences. It is also generally recognized today that alcoholism is a medical and psychiatric, rather than a legal, problem.

One of the credits for clearing up the misunderstanding about alcoholism goes to Yale University and Alcoholics Anonymous, which has clapped the insane into mad houses and exhibiting them for the public's amusement.

Alcoholics Anonymous and psychiatrists can now point to thousands of notable successes with problem drinkers, some in our own communities such as Twin Falls, Boise, Burley, Pocatello and Ashton where active chapters of AA are well established.

No one has ever heard of any similar successes achieved by throwing the drinker in jail. It is time for our state and local governments to abandon such archaic measures and begin giving intelligent attention to the serious and persistent problem of alcoholism.

RETALIATION—American producers, both agricultural and industrial, may suffer in the event of a hand-to-hand trade war for Canada, has been our best cash customer in recent years.

WELCOME—In raising the salaries of top officials in the executive departments, as proposed by the Hoover commission, President Truman, congress may legislate against the practice of writing books and magazine articles while the authors draw federal salaries.

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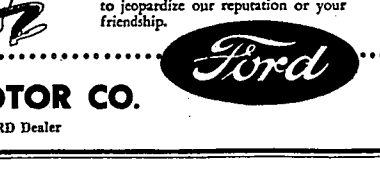

2 New Weed Puzzles Test U. of L. Men

UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO, Moscow, Dec. 22—Two new weed control puzzles have been tossed to the University of Idaho's special research men, Lambert C. Peterson and Clarence I. Seely, who already are keeping close check on about 5,000 weed control test plots throughout the state.

These 5,000 plots, involving every major Idaho farm crop and every serious weed pest, are in cooperation with the 35 counties having active weed control programs. County agents, county weed supervisors, and individual farmers.

In Carrot Family
By coincidence, both of the new trouble-makers are members of the carrot family.

In southwestern Idaho, which produces most of the carrot seed planted in gardens throughout the United States, growers want to head off any possible invasion of the wild carrot, already a well-known pest in eastern states.

Try Various Methods
Tests will be established to try various methods of getting rid of the wild carrots that have gotten a start in Idaho.

In the grain fields of Franklin county another member of the wild carrot family, cogweeds, has stepped into the major weed pest roll. It draws so much soil moisture in the spring there isn't enough left for the grain plants. Test plots to see how 2-4-D and some of the other new chemical weed killers will do on cogweeds have been set up near Preston.

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State's Mines Build Houses To Gain Men

By JOHN FAHEY
KELLOGG, Dec. 23 (UP)—America's big metal producers are going into the housing business to beat the labor shortage.

Adequate housing for mine workers in the rich Coeur d'Alene district is one of the items of a labor recruitment program.

It also includes asking congress to admit immigrants for mine labor replacement of men with machinery and a publicity campaign to convince young men that mining is a dignified and necessary calling.

Urges retooling
Glancing back toward the early days of this century when the metal mines were well supplied with immigrant labor, Roy E. Hooper, assistant superintendent of the Bunker Hill and Sullivan Mining and Concentration company, suggests the mining industry petition congress to admit a reasonable number of men from European countries who would accept work in mines and smelters.

The wartime manpower shortage bred mechanical improvements. Today, two and three-man crews equipped at a cost of \$20,000 a crew, do the underground work of large prewar gangs.

Inadequate Since 1937
Not since 1937 has the mine labor supply been adequate. Although 4,500 men are working now in the Coeur d'Alene, executives estimate the nation's metal diggings could employ 5,000 more if they could attract them.

Forty years ago, Bunker Hill pioneered company homes for employees under the leadership of the company's present president, Stanley Easton. Pend Oreille Mines and Metals company, enlarging its mill near Metairie Falls in northeastern Washington state, is spending \$150,000 remodeling a hotel into 58 apartments.

Even before they're completed, housing projects seem to be attracting miners. Bunker Hill has more than 100 applicants for the 48 homes in Kellogg. With this response, the mining industry is hoping it again may handicap the men who live in its towns and work in its mines.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 23 (UP)—The pilot threw up his hands. So did the co-pilot. The rest of the crew just sat on their hands.

And when I looked at it in the DO-3 GRID to navy men) and Eddie Saxman, the what was going on, I almost jumped out the escape hatch.

There we were sitting from the runway at Dolling field in the two-engine plane with nobody at the controls.

"Look, ma! No hands!" said some wag.

But sure enough. No hands! The navy was taking us slot to demonstrate a new "angle of attack" auto-pilot dreamed up by the navy and perfected by Minneapolis however.

It's something that some day may solve all the weather handicaps

that have been in the pilot's forehead since the days of the Wright brothers.

Come to think of it, as we took off, it was as if the spot of Wilbur or Orville Wright were up there, sitting in a co-pilot.

All Commander Eddie Saxman, the "pilot," did before we tipped down the strip and took wing was to flick a switch no larger than the one which controls the night light in your apartment bathroom.

A couple of green flickers flicked, indicating that everything automatic was automatic.

Co-pilot Dick Knokeckel, who didn't have anything to do, either, tried to explain what was going on. He did his best:

"Angle of air attack," he said, "means, well . . . the difference between where you are going and where the plane is headed."

Uh-huh!

Cmdr. Bob Dose, an officer of naval research, said it was a lot simpler than that. Angle of attack, he said, using both hands, means

the wings are headed up a little and the rest of the plane is going straight.

Since we are going perfectly straight on a perfectly wonderful day, there was no challenge.

If you can understand it, there seems to be a lot of advantages to "angle of attack" auto-pilot control. A big plane with a heavy load practically can stall and come in at slow speed. Much safer that way.

You start in and hit the beam. Watch the instruments. Get down to 100 feet, nose headed for the runway. There is some disturbance. Like a little bad weather. You're on

the beam and you stay there. Don't move the runway, can't you? You don't have to. For instance, as rolling, we came in at 75 knots, heavy speed (22 miles an hour as the crew flies) and made a perfect landing. That's a lot slower than present day planes make it and a lot smoother and lot safer.

Once more—no hands and no guff from the control tower except the cordial "come in."

By George, man, it was wonderful. Down the middle.

PRAGUE, Dec. 23 (AP)—Prague will have its own equivalent of the Red square one of these days. It will be a monumental 20-acre tract designed especially for mass demonstrations and national ceremonies. Venues for such things will have a century-old tradition as the scene of all the Czechs' national joys and sorrows, the magnet to which every Prague inhabitant is drawn when anything important is happening.

Prague city planners told Czech journalists about the new square, but admitted that "it will take several five-year plans" to bring their outline of the new Prague to fruition.

"Garden City" Planned
The plan, which will be brought into compulsory operation gradually, as the supply of money, labor and materials permits, will transform the dingy, cramped city of today into a "garden city," they said.

Planners said the present population of just under 1,000,000 was about right for the area and would not be allowed to increase. The city itself, however, would spread out to double its present size, with the inhabitants grouped in small quarters surrounded by green belts.

Cave Yielding Odd Relics of Years in Past

ing. A few yards back, he found the cavity large enough to hold three molorcars. In that room he found an ancient muzzle-loading rifle, a bundle of what appeared to be paper money and a haul of silver coins, most of them U. S. two-cent pieces.

A legend has persisted in this part of the state that the James gang secreted some of the Gads hill train robbery holdup loot in the hills.

Also during the Civil war this area was overrun by guerrilla bands and soldiers of both the north and south, and stories have persisted that wealth was hidden to protect it.

Pilgrim Fete Ignored for Many Years

PLYMOUTH, Me., Dec. 28 (UP)—Though the Pilgrims landed here in 1620, it was 121 years later before their stepping stone here became publicly identified as Plymouth rock.

The man who first got Plymouth rock into the historical archives was Elder Thomas Faunce, shaking with palsy in his chair at the age of 90, he told the story of the rock's part in the Pilgrim's landing as he learned it from his father.

Covered by Wharf
Even then the rock was beginning to crumble, for a wharf had been built over it. The rock protruded through the wharf's surface and the passage of barrows and chairs damaged it.

It was 1774 before the town fathers decided to do something about protecting the rock. Thirty teams of oxen were linked by a chain to the rock to move it to the town square. The rock split in two. One half fell into a sand pit and eventually was buried by wind and tide. The other half was dragged to the square.

Protected by Fence
Again, 60 years later, the rock was protected by an iron fence from souvenir hunters. Still, a vendor managed to hawk pieces of the rock "the size of a common hen's egg" for \$1.50 each.

The lost part of the rock was found in 1852 by the Pilgrim society. It was serving as a doorstep for an abandoned warehouse. The rock was cemented together in 1880 and 40 years later was moved to its "resting place" near the bay shore so that its legend would be more believable for tourists.

Now it is enshrined in the floor of a Grecian temple contributed by the Colonial Dames of America.

Model Prisoner Is Found to Be Town's Burglar

JUNEAU, Wis., Dec. 28 (UP)—Mild-mannered Glen Norenberg, 34, was a model prisoner in the county jail by day, but at night he picked the cell lock and slipped out to promenade the town as a burglar.

Authorities discovered Norenberg's Jekyll-Hyde characteristics early Tuesday. He was clever at getting out of jail, but his clumsiness in breaking into a gas station led to his downfall. He made so much racket he awakened the whole neighborhood.

One disturbed stealer called Sheriff Avery R. Canniff, who sent deputies to the scene. They found Norenberg covering inside the gas station.

He admitted he was responsible for a gas station burglary Dec. 21, after picking the lock on his cell door with a hairpin. Norenberg said he slipped down a side stairway without being discovered. The lock from his one successful burglary he hid in the prison basement, where he worked during the day.

Ratings High In Milk Shed Survey Here

A survey of the Twin Falls milk shed by the state milk authority in November rated farm producers as 91.8 per cent and plants at 88 per cent with 90 per cent rating considered excellent, according to the semi-annual report of the south central district health unit covering a period from July 1 to Dec. 31.

The ungraded milk plants also are considered to be operating in a satisfactory manner, according to the report. The number of dairy inspections in the district totaled 203; number of milk samples examined in laboratory, 335, and six dairies were degraded or closed.

Cases Increase
In spite of the improvement in city milk supplies, there is an increase in the number of known cases of undulant fever, the report stated. Of 171 laboratory tests during the past six months, 18 were positive, indicating that many dairies have changed cows and are using raw milk.

Municipal water supplies and sewage disposal work is done in coordination with a public health engineer from the state department of health, Boise.

Stockman Fined
By means of inspections and regular testing of samples, an effort is made to maintain safe supplies of domestic water. Charges were filed by a unit sanitarian against a stockman for polluting a stream used as a public water supply. He pleaded guilty to a charge of disposing of cadaver material in the river, and paid a fine, the report stated.

Impure Water
Impure water is a problem of considerable magnitude in Magic Valley. Water for city use is treated easily, but this is not true of farm supplies, according to the report. About 35 per cent of the samples brought in from private wells or cisterns proved unsafe. A total of 663 samples were examined in the laboratory, of which 108 were unsafe. An increasing number of small chlorinators have been installed on farms during the past two or three years, as more people become aware of the situation.

Tests Reported
The unit laboratory reports the following tests and results during the past six months: Blood tests for syphilis, 5,790, with 48 positive; smears for gonorrhea, 174, with 16 positive.

Food and drink establishments are inspected about once a month in cities like Twin Falls, where there is a "grade A" ordinance; and perhaps once in three or four months in ungraded areas.

It should be pointed out, the report states, that the law requires certain tools and equipment as well as certain practices in food and drink establishments. However, since the sanitarian is present for perhaps one-half hour in a two-month period, it is obvious that many unsanitary practices can be, and are carried on in some places.

Inspections Listed
During the past six months there have been 400 inspections of market and grocery stores and 820 inspections of food and drink establishments. Four food establishments were closed.

The area of the district includes approximately 12,000 square miles, with a population in excess of 100,000 and assessed valuation in excess of \$70,000,000. It has been the aim of the health unit to make the program fit local needs and desires. Suggestions and help in this connection are welcomed, according to the report.

Near-Perfect Bogus \$10, \$20 Currency May Flood U. S., Treasury Men Warn

WASHINGTON—Every bank in the U. S. has had a special warning from the U. S. treasury department to be on the alert for a possible flood of almost perfect counterfeit money during the Christmas shopping season.

The tip-off on what could be the biggest and most expert counterfeit ring ever to operate in the U. S. came in New York and Baltimore recently with the discovery of thousands of bogus 10s and 20s in circulation. One "green" of the bills, which have been identified as coming from the same press, was arrested in Baltimore. Other passers are expected to be picked up soon, too.

That the passers aren't part of the ring which is printing the money and probably don't even know who the printers are, according to a secret service spokesman.

The ring can't be considered broken until the actual printing plant is discovered, the surviving plates destroyed and the key members of the gang arrested. A nationwide manhunt is on for them.

The fake bills are of excellent quality. In both cities where they have been discovered, many of them first passed through the hands of a dozen or more experienced money-handlers and weren't detected until they reached federal reserve banks.

The green on the backs is lighter than on the good bills. The outlines of the pictures of the men aren't clear-cut. The paper of the bogus bills has a slightly different "feel"—a little softer. Extremely clever crayon marks have been put on the paper to simulate the serial of the real money. The treasury has sent detailed descriptions of the faults of the counterfeit bills along with the serial numbers of those in all of the banks.

According to the secret service experts, the Christmas shopping season is the best time of the year for passing bad money. A lot of temporary, inexperienced clerks are working during the holidays.

Cashiers in the big stores are usually rushed so that they don't have time to examine the money as carefully as they usually do. And the tremendous volume of money in circulation means that a fake bill gets passed around several times, probably, before it reaches a bank and can be detected. Thus the first passer can seldom be traced. Even the banks are rushed and can't examine the money as closely as usual.

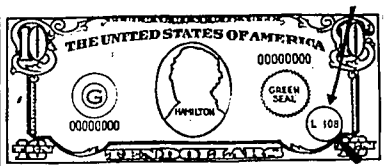

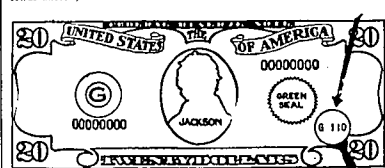

counterfeit notes. Counterfeiting in general has reached a new high since the war. In the fiscal year 1946, bogus bills worth \$39,171 were discovered to be in circulation. In 1947, bogus bills worth \$246,170 were seized, and during fiscal 1948 the figure jumped to \$3,094,230.

Part of the reason for the increase, secret service men say, is that there appears to be a great lack of cash in the underworld these days. Crime in the U. S. is away down generally. And practically all of the black market operations which flourished during the war and just after have disappeared. As a result, crooks who are finding it hard to

earn a dishonest dollar have taken to printing them.

The gang that prints the money usually doesn't get more than six to eight cents on the dollar for their work. With the demand currently up, however, the price is probably up, too, according to the experts. The first sale is usually in large batches to dealers or "distributors." The stuff might change hands a half-dozen times, with a small profit on each transaction, before it finally gets into the hands of a passer.

Passers pay about 20 cents on the dollar for it. They stand to make the biggest profit, but also take the biggest risk.

Device Heats Residence by Sunbeam Use

DOVER, Mass., Dec. 23 (AP)—Dr. Melvin Teikes, who heats his home without fire or furnace, says it's "done with mirrors."

Not exactly mirrors, but rather an 800-square-foot glass and metal device that traps the sun's rays for Dr. Teikes' five-room "solar house" in suburban Dover, 15 miles from Boston.

The rest of the heating system consists of a cheap chemical unit that Dr. Teikes developed in experiments at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

First of Its Kind
First of its kind, the pioneer model cost about \$2,000 to install. But Dr. Teikes expects it to operate virtually forever without additional expense while furnace-heating householders continue paying an annual average of \$150 for fuel.

There are other benefits besides the cut of fuel bills, she said. No fire hazards. No coal or oil shortages. No transportation tie-ups. And no coal-shoveling, ash-carrying or mechanical breakdowns.

Will the unit heat the house? Dr. Teikes thinks so, but isn't certain. To find out, she's living in the house for the winter, without any other source of heat.

"Cozy" Thus Far
It has been cozy thus far, but the scientist won't pronounce the experiment a success until she's been through the bitterest part of the winter.

From 1/2 heat trap built into the south side of Dr. Teikes' house, the solar warmth is conducted to a series of "heat bins."

Each bin contains an inexpensive chemical compound known as sodium sulfate dehydrate. When the chemical is warmed, it melts and absorbs heat. When it solidifies, it releases the heat.

Thermostat Controls
A thermostatic control system is connected to each bin which in turn is hooked up to warm air registers. When the thermostat is adjusted to raise the house temperature, stored heat is released from the chemical and wafted into the rooms via the registers.

Dr. Teikes said the chemical can store heat for up to 10 days. Despite the possibility of long storms and overcast that might blot out the sun's rays for days, she says statistics show the heating unit will beat even a New England winter.

College Will Back Arctic Expedition

HANOVER, N. H., Dec. 23 (AP)—Dartmouth college will sponsor an Arctic research expedition next summer.

The 100-foot schooner Blue Dolphin, with a 12-man crew, will sail June 15, under command of David C. Nutt, Cleveland, Arctic specialist of the Dartmouth museum.

Now berthed at Gloucester, Mass., the Blue Dolphin is being put in shape to withstand the rigors of its polar cruise.

The object of the expedition is to create "an awareness of the Arctic and its role in the world today."

Protects Ice Age Relics

delay construction of a flood control dam across the Licking river at Palomouth, above which lies the only "dying place" of gigantic mammals on the American continent known to those who study prehistoric life.

At Blue Licks spring and in the salt bogs at Big Bone Lick, mastodons in ages past were trapped in the spongy mire and starved to death. The now-dried briny marshes have yielded rare fossils on display at the Blue Licks state park museum and the skull of a muskox now in the Peabody museum at Yale university.

Geologists feel sure that the bogs contain skeletal remains of vast numbers of mastodons as well as the fossils of other extinct ice age animals.

Dodge, a naturalist and paleontologist in his spare time has been organizing excavation parties at his own expense while urging study by experts of the Blue Licks bone deposits. Preliminary diggings have brought up fossils of mastodons, the ground sloth, muskox, bison and elk. Their time in Kentucky stretches back to the late ice age of 25,000 to 30,000 years ago.

While Dodge has been rallying educators, scientists and legislators in behalf of recovery of the bone relics still entombed, farm owners of this area have organized in opposition to creation of the artificial lake for another reason. They claim the waters will remove from cultivation some of the best farming land in

Kentucky. But engineers insist it will prevent floods on the lower Ohio and Mississippi rivers. Property owners of the fossil bed declare they will not sell it to the government for reservoir use without court action. But it is available almost for the asking should the commonwealth of Kentucky, "for the education and scientific advancement of the people" take the lead in the exploration work.

Model hospital plans please Welfare Secretary C. R. Barber

State Shamed to Fame for Its Mental Hospitals Now 'Proud'

HARRISBURG (AP)—Pennsylvania's mental hospitals now are getting bouquets instead of bricks.

Once termed "Pennsylvania's shame" due to overcrowding, understaffing and obsolete facilities, the mental hospital system is no longer the target of the bitter censure it was two years ago.

Pennsylvanians are starting to point with pride at the new, modern buildings that are going up under a \$22,000,000 expansion. And there is more trained personnel for the care of 43,500 unfortunates in 22 hospitals as a result of a continuing and intensive recruiting and training drive.

The program was set in motion by Gov. James H. Duff when he took office in Jan. 1947. The red-headed executive raised the millions needed by new taxes and the streamlining of other projects. He brought in Charles R. Barber, then Erie's colorful mayor, to administer the system as state welfare secretary and appointed William H. Behrens, retired rear admiral, to push construction.

Now a year later, more than \$25,000,000 worth of work is either completed, under contract or on the planning boards.

Two new buildings, costing nearly \$5,000,000, are going up at the Philadelphia state hospital at Byberry—the place some called a 19th century "Dante's Inferno." Two others have been completely renovated and work on still two more is under way.

Modern buildings are under construction at five other hospitals and work will start soon on many more.

"We want to restore patients to their homes and occupations and we are not resigning ourselves to the belief that custodial care is the answer," said Governor Duff.

He likes to tell the story of an acquaintance whose wife "suddenly went completely out of her head." The husband was told by several physicians that nothing could be done; that she should be confined to a mental institution. But another doctor traced the condition to organic poisoning and she returned to her home in good health.

Pennsylvanians want to provide "that kind of care," Duff said, envisioning the day when the state will have "one of the best setups for mental health anywhere in the world."

That is the long-range program.

"Before you can provide more hospital beds, you have to enlarge the facilities for light, heat, water, laundry, the preparation and serving of food and sewage disposal."

Barber, who will relinquish his post next May to become state treasurer, came to the welfare job with only a layman's knowledge of mental health. He took over at a time when welfare groups were urging appointment of a psychiatrist to the post.

"I leave the type of care to the hospital superintendents," Barber said, "but when I visit a hospital I want every locked door opened and I want to know what is behind them. And I never tell them when I am coming."

Barber said that from the start he drove for a clean-up of the worst conditions without waiting for new buildings.

"I saw a lot of things that could be done," he said. "It takes time to build new hospitals and find and train more doctors, nurses and attendants, but that shouldn't stop us from patching broken plaster, fixing the plumbing and making the best use possible of the facilities we have."

But he counts his biggest accomplishment the planning of the new-type admission buildings.

"The name is sort of misleading," Barber explained. "What these buildings will really provide is the latest in care. When a patient is admitted instead of sending him to one of the older buildings, he will be kept here for treatment. If he responds, he may never see any other part of the hospital. All the latest equipment will be here under one roof."

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Package Bathroom Built for Farmers

BREMEN, Dec. 23 (UP)—A manufacturer says he has the perfect answer to the farmer's plumbing problems. It is a factory-built "package" bathroom complete with built-in medicine cabinet.

J. F. Donahue, president of the Builders Manufacturing company, announced that production has begun on a fully-equipped bathroom unit that can be added to the exterior of any house without sacrificing space or changing the interior arrangement.

It is a weather-tight, permanent installation of frame construction with plywood interior, linoleum floor, copper pipes, brass fittings, electrical wiring, tub, shower, lavatory, toilet, electric heater, medicine cabinet, linen cabinet, towel bar, soap dish, tooth brush and tumbler holder.

All the buyer has to do is build a foundation, provide a doorway or opening from the house to the new bathroom, and make arrangements for electrical, water and soil pipe connections.

It will sell for \$1,005 plus an average installation cost of \$150.

He said that as the Communist international works through fear to establish tyranny, the freedom international must work through confidence and truth to establish freedom.

"The world's failure to engage the Communist international is regarded in Moscow as a first class blunder," Watson declared in the treatise.

He added that the Kremlin fears nothing so much as the average citizen in the outside world lives.

Secretly "Outmoded"

Watson attacks unlimited sovereignty as "outmoded" and an instrument which leads to international anarchy.

He points out that the sovereignty doctrine had to be modified before the United States could be brought into existence through the joining of the original 13 states.

Watson said the freedom international "should avowedly and openly be an instrument of United States policy" just as the Communist international is an instrument of the Russian government.

LONDON, Dec. 23 (AP)—The royal mite in Princess Elizabeth's arms has a blood line almost frightening in its grandeur.

Most people would be satisfied if they could honestly boast about ancestors on the Mayflower. Or even in the Revolutionary war.

But the little prince has in his veins the blood of Alfred the great, of Charlemagne, of Louis and the great Barbarossa.

Charred to 1066

He can boast familiarity of his direct ancestor, Richard the Lion Hearted, or of "The Old," in his family tree, which is minutely charted back to 1066, the year William the conqueror crossed from Normandy to Hastings, the romance and the triumph and the tragedy of Europe's royal.

In the vast halls of Buckingham palace and Windsor castle and the other royal homes, when he grows old enough, the prince will see the portraits of his noble forebears.

Black Prince Included

There is the Black Prince, the mighty warrior, who brought back from Spain in the 14th century the fabulous ruby which adorns the imperial state crown. And his fairy tale wife, Joan, the fair maid of Kent.

There are the kings of England and the fierce kings of Scotland—Queen Elizabeth, Henry VIII, hero of many a martial fray. There is Mary, the tragic Queen of Scots, and Charles I, who also died under the executioner's axe.

Yankees Flee From Shanghai As Chinese Communists Gain

SHANGHAI (NEA)—Perhaps it's old stuff to army wives and their kiddies, but it always brings tears.

Once again they are being pulled away from their soldier husbands. A few years ago it was a world war. Before or since it was a change of station. Today it is China's civil war.

The 900-odd dependents of officers and men of the Joint United States military advisory group are pulling out of China in the face of the Chinese communist advance. One group of them left on the U. S. army transport Republic.

With them, by army arrangement, went civilians who are fleeing China too; men who have spent a lifetime in business here, Chinese-Americans, exchange students, professors.

"I'll be home soon," a captain could be heard saying to his attractive wife. "Don't get any more. They'll get us out of this mess in time."

"Take care of yourself, Harry," shouted another wife, waving from a deck to a young man in a camel's hair coat on the dock.

And a youngster who might have been a doctor, a lawyer, a professor, "Shoot those dirty old Reds for me, daddy."

There were tears in some eyes for another reason: Shanghai was home to many of these people after years of residence here. Much as they may hate its crowds, noise and dirt, these Old China hands revel in its easy life, intrigues and excitement.

Perhaps the most senior passenger was the Rev. James M. Wilson, Louisville, Ky., for 31 years U. S. Episcopal missionary in China. Wilson has made a similar trip before. After months in a Japanese concentration camp, he was repatriated on the Swedish ship Grifflund in 1943.

"Of course I had to be going now," the missionary said. "Anybody would under conditions in China now." But he wishes that things

were different in China, that it was a country fit to remain in.

There are about 7,000 Americans in China, exclusive of diplomatic, economic cooperation administration and army and navy personnel and dependents. A considerable proportion of these are leaving.

The actual number of evacuees is impossible to determine because Americans—missionaries, businessmen, technicians, teachers and students—are scattered over the face of China. However, about 50 per cent of the 684 American civilians registered in the Peking area of north China reportedly are going.

The evacuation began after United States consulates in north China advised it and the embassy at Nanking said that it believed that those in central China "without compelling reasons for staying" should go. The embassy later issued a "last warning" which an official said was "a recommendation" rather than "mere advice."

The Americans are taking advantage of navy LST's, army transports and merchant shipping. Both Northwest airlines and Pan-American World always have put on extra planes to handle the burden. Furniture packers report an unprecedented business.

Many Britons, French and other foreigners also are leaving, but a smaller proportion than Americans. The reason for the American preference is simple: The United States, having spearheaded the foreign support of the

Weed Control For Idaho Is Big Business

UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO, Moscow, Dec. 24—Weed control is big business on the farms of Idaho, in both the irrigated and non-irrigated sections.

"Large acreages of wheat and smaller acreages of oats and barley are now being treated with 2,4-D spray for control of both annual and perennial weeds," report Lambert C. Erickson and Clarence A. Seely, the special weed research workers at the University of Idaho.

Active Program

Thirty-five counties, they report, have active weed control programs. Thirty of these counties have weed supervisors.

Carrying out selective weed control in their grain fields, farmers in Latah county, for instance, operated 175 2,4-D spray rigs last year. Harry Gaul, director of the Twin Falls county noxious weed control drive, reports that approximately 10,000 gallons of 2,4-D in that county's extensive weed control campaign in 1948.

To provide information about the new chemical weed killers and how to use them, university research workers have established approximately 6,000 test plots. Practically every crop grown in Idaho and every major weed pest figures in this program, carried on in cooperation with the county weed districts, county agents and hundreds of individual farmers.

2,200 Tests

Weed control research in the non-irrigated sections of the state last year involved 2,200 individual tests, covering 25 different crops and as many as 10 different varieties of some of these crops. Thirty different chemicals were tested.

In Twin Falls county, 2 varieties of oats, wheat and barley figured in two series of tests, totaling close to 1,000 different plots. Tests near Twin Falls are to observe the effect of 2,4-D and other new weed killers on growing crops. Near Murtaugh is the other series to study the residual effect of 2,4-D in the soil, particularly how a little carry-over may affect alfalfa, beans, oats, corn, potatoes or other crops planted in that soil.

Killers Compared

Near Meridian, a series of tests is comparing 2,4-D with 2,4,5-T, which made its appearance ahead of 2,4-D. The university men are particularly interested in how 2,4,5-T will work on ground cherry control.

The oldest 2,4-D plots in the university research program are near Grangeville. Canada thistle was the first weed tackled there.

It was at the Grangeville test plots, incidentally, that one of the major research victories was scored. Tests showed how 2,4-D could conquer crowfoot, a weed which had near death grip on winter wheat production in a large portion of north central Idaho.

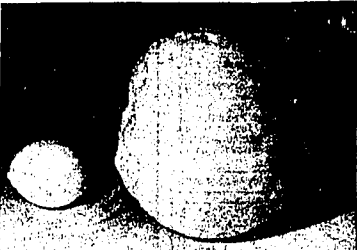
Campus Experiment

Lawn weeds, principally the dandelion, are in the spotlight in tests on the university campus. Practically every obtainable formulation of 2,4-D is being tried out in spray and dust form, alone and in combination with fertilizer.

Other major weed research test centers include Sterling, in Dingham county, where knapweed, a serious pasture pest, is under study; Aberdeen and Idaho Falls, quack grass studies; Laylav, gaintweed, a major range weed in the northern counties; and Teton, where blue lotus is the subject. In addition to these test centers, Erickson and Seely have hundreds of small test plots on individual farms in all parts of the state.

Jet Airplanes Will Aid U.S. Duck Census

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 23 (UP)—Jet planes and high-speed cameras developed during the war promise to make the tough job of counting the nation's wild ducks and geese an easy one for the U. S. fish and wildlife service reports.

The federal agency already has made one experiment using an air force jet fighter plane and pronounced it "100 per cent successful."

Robert G. Sears, director of the service, said that the jet's speed and accuracy of survey of large areas in a matter of minutes.

A Lockheed P-80 "Shooting Star" made two runs over the grasslands section of the San Joaquin valley. The plane charted a 22-mile strip of marsh in three minutes and three seconds.

Flying at more than 400 miles an hour, the jet whizzed low over the marshland at an altitude of 300 feet.

Equipped With Camera

The plane was equipped with a Sonne 5-7 camera, a device which takes a ribbon picture 8 1/2 inches long. The pictures were obtained in high-altitude aerial photographs. The pictures, the wildlife service reported, are accurate as far as ducks in the area.

At present, most duck-counting is done by hand. Counting wild ducks in the area is a tedious and often inaccurate job. The use of jet airplanes frighten birds from their feeding grounds and prevent methods of counting that do not include an aerial camera. An "eye estimate" of ducks is not nearly as accurate as the photographs.

Old Gun Misfires 100 Times, Then Slays Its Finder

BERKELEY, Calif., Dec. 23 (UP)—An old .24 caliber automatic misfired 100 times and then fired a bullet that killed Joseph P. Clark, 43, an unemployed salesman, police had reported today.

Clark's wife told police her husband found the gun while the couple were drinking at home. She said he wandered around the house for more than an hour clicking the weapon harmlessly.

After she was asleep, she said, she was awakened by a shot. Clark tumbled out of bed and died on the floor with a bullet wound in his chest.

Police tested the weapon twice. It fired both times.

"Flood" of Russian Deserters Provides Anglo-U.S. Headache

SOVIET-AMERICAN ZONAL FRONTIER, Dec. 23 (UP)—So many Russian deserters per month are crossing into the American and British occupying areas of western Germany and Berlin that the problem of handling them has become a major Anglo-American policy headache.

The deserters are enlisting men and officers of the Soviet army, and civilian employees of the Soviet military administration, some of them with their families. Some are officers of such rank as Col. G. B. Tokajew, who went over to the British 10 days ago. One check point reported that nine field grade officers passed through in one week.

"What a few weeks ago was a trickle of deserters has become a sizeable stream," one reliable source said. "If the western powers should flatter off such deserters will be treated as political refugees, it would become a flood."

Men closest to the problem believe the time is near when the western allies must:

1. Openly declare their policy on the matter.
2. Provide adequate funds for screening, quartering and eventual placement of the fugitives.

The problem now is handled on an ad lib basis.

This startling increase in Soviet desertions, particularly to American-occupied territory, dates from the retreat of U. S. officials in Vienna to surrender to the Russians two Soviet pilots who deserted in October in a stolen Russian plane.

Until then, most if not all unformed deserters had been turned back to their commands under an agreement made during the "honey-moon period" of Soviet-western relations immediately after the war.

Tuesday was his second day on the job. And as he stepped across the street to get breakfast at his mother's home, he already was thinking what he would buy the children for Christmas.

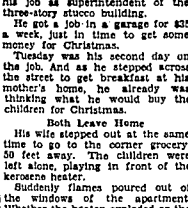
Both Leave Home

Diphtheria Gone, Doctor Forecasts

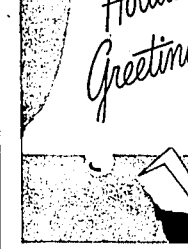

"Fronstering" Industry

Fairbanks and other major video producers claim too that the break with the movies—reshooting old westerns and other films on television—is not far distant.

Complex 2 Series

Fairbanks has completed "Public Prosecutor," a series of shows, each 20 minutes long, and "Television Closeups," five-minute comedy features for NBC. He has three other series in production. Marshall Grant-Resnik production is scheduled as a "great stories" series for American Tobacco company that will start next month. Many others are likely to get in on the ground floor of the business, even though the foundations are just beginning to harden.

Plastic Album Is Aid to Collectors

CHARLESTON, W. Va., Dec. 23 (AP)—Robert D. Buzzard, stamp collector, has produced an album page requiring no adhesive but which permits rapid mounting. Buzzard describes his page as made of plastic with "lips" cut into them to hold and protect pictures, stamps, cards, currency or clippings. The "lips" are produced by prestressing clear plastic.

The inventor said he was dissatisfied with ordinary page appearance after hours of effort with paper hinges and corners. His plastic page prints neat frames and borders for exhibits in the plastic itself, and allows use of white, metal or colored backing sheets to obtain more pleasing effects.

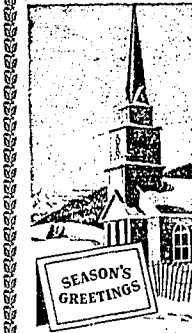

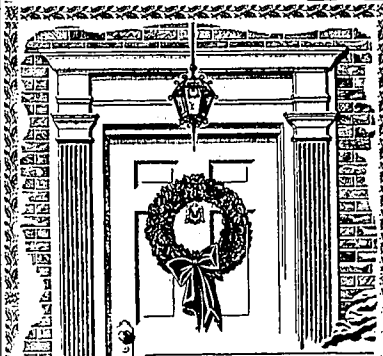

Student From Japan Thinks People 'Kind'

YFACIA, N. Y., Dec. 23 (AP)—The first Japanese student to be accepted at Cornell University since World War II finds Americans willing to forgive and forget.

"They don't hold grudges," said Miss Kawai, Tokyo. "I haven't found a single instance of prejudice since my arrival," she observed. "Everyone has been very kind."

Miss Kawai, one of two Tokyo mission school teachers sent to this country for a year's study of new subjects and teaching matter, says she would have felt very badly to be regarded as a former enemy.

Early Schooling Here

Although born in Tokyo, she was brought to this country as a baby and had all her early schooling here to teach, but, as she puts it:

"I think early training days with one. My family and I disagreed from the start with the militaristic regime. Because some people under suspicion and had to be careful to avoid arrest."

Generation Needed

She believes at least a generation of continuous effort is needed for the Japanese to learn the true meaning of democracy and how to practice it.

"I think that most of the people are trying. And the fact that they are trying and making mistakes makes them want to do what he advises. But backgrounds of the Japanese and their American counterparts are different. The culture of the people cannot be changed overnight."

Eggs Termed Alike Despite Their Colors

WASHINGTON, Dec. 23 (AP)—Food superstitions die hard, the agriculture department says.

Many people say they prefer brown-shell eggs to white—or vice versa. But there's no difference in taste (if both kinds are fresh) or nutritive value.

No Sugar Differences

Then there is the housewives' argument over the relative merits of cane and beet sugar for frying. There's no chemical difference whatever, according to the experts.

Some folks still cling to the notion that food will spoil if set away in a can. Although such acid foods as fruit or tomatoes may acquire a slightly metallic taste, they are not damaged. Food also may be kept safely in aluminum utensils, the department says. A darkening of the aluminum does not indicate harm to the food.

Fallacies Rapped

Many food fallacies are concerned with combinations of certain dishes at the same meal. There's no need to hesitate about drinking milk with tea, sour cream, tomatoes or any other food. If some of the combinations "curdle in the stomach," it's much the better for your digestion. No two foods that are good for you separately will hurt you when eaten together, nutritionists explain.

And in case anyone is still wondering, appendicitis is not caused from eating fruit seeds.

Trials Prove Armed Forces' Unification in Need of Change

WASHINGTON—At the end of nearly every working day, Defense Secretary James V. Forrestal sits at his pentagon desk before a pile of papers chest-high. He has to sign them all. This is one of the faults of the "national security act of 1947," commonly known as the armed service unification act.

Defense has no under secretary to handle all the administrative detail which merger of the army, navy and air force has thrust upon him.

At the other extreme, when the joint chiefs of staff for the three services reach a stalemate in settling their differences of opinion, Defense Secretary Forrestal has no authority under the law to move in on the situation, crack their heads together and make final decisions.

Or if the three service secretaries hauled at the secretary under unification, they are at liberty to do so under the law.

These and other similar situations are the natural results of the first 18 months of operation under unification. When this law was approved in September, 1947, after more than two years of debate among the services, the great fear was that too much authority might be given the new secretary.

The interesting thing to note is that the principal criticisms now hurled at the secretary are because he hasn't thrown his weight around enough to keep army, navy and air force from squabbling among themselves. The obvious moral is that the merger law must be changed by the next congress, to give him that authority.

Such differences as have arisen come from two principal sources. One is on division of money available for the services. The other is on the concept of fighting 10 or 20 years hence, when all the push-button weapons, round-the-world bombers and super-aircraft carriers now being planned by the research and development boards come into use.

On the question of how the services would function in case war should break out tomorrow, the service chiefs have, when all is said and done, no basic difference. Unification has been effected in the field far more effectively than it has been in the secretory planning staffs.

Secretary Forrestal, though without authority to do so, has by grace and tactful persuasion brought the chiefs of staff for navy and air into agreement on responsibility for strategic bombing and anti-submarine warfare. This was done first at the Key West conference last March. When the two services began to

Other States Make Use of Idaho Beans

UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO, Moscow, Dec. 23—At least four other states, Wyoming, Colorado and Washington, are making rather extensive use of the new bean varieties developed by the University of Idaho agricultural experiment station for the southern Idaho bean district, reports Dr. C. C. Holm, vice director in charge of the university's agricultural research.

According to Dr. W. H. Hunsinger, plant pathologist at the experiment station, under whose supervision the new beans were developed, about 80 per cent of all the pintos beans and all the great northern beans grown in the major bean producing area of Nebraska are strains developed by the Idaho station. All of the red Mexican beans in the bean area of central Washington also have UI prefixes, indicating they too came from Idaho. Idaho-developed pinto beans are being planted in increasing volume in Colorado.

"This goes to show that agricultural research knows neither state or national boundaries," commented Dr. Holm. "Idaho's agriculture is profiting from this because Idaho bean growers are providing much of the seed for the new plantings elsewhere. E. W. Whitman, Idaho seed commissioner, recently reported that 17,000 acres of Idaho-developed strains of beans were inspected in 1948 for certification. These fields not only provide seed for Idaho's big bean industry but supply growing markets in other states.

The new bean varieties appearing in other states are the same ones that have increased the income of southern Idaho bean growers by an estimated \$33,000,000 since 1936. That is the estimated value of the increased yields of beans since disease-resistant University of Idaho varieties appeared in 1934.

Healthy Diet Said Aid to Good Teeth

MINNEAPOLIS, Dec. 23 (AP)—A healthy diet and good medical care will go a long way toward preventing children's mental disturbances caused by poorly-formed teeth.

That is the consensus of a dental health workshop at the University of Minnesota, attended by dentists from throughout the state. They examined, among other things, the relationship between mental balance and facial defects caused by crooked teeth.

Dr. Thomas Spieldel of the university's dentistry school, said badly-formed teeth result in such things as inferiority complexes.

"For example," Spieldel said, "an otherwise pretty girl with crooked teeth in many cases will suffer just as surely as will a person with diseased teeth."

But, Spieldel added, "If parents can keep a child healthy, give him an adequate diet and insist on good, periodic dental care, they have done their duty toward a good-looking facial structure."

Vanport Refugees Don't Think Santa Will Halt at Stricken City

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 26 (AP)—Most of the 19,700 Vanport refugees, whose city was destroyed by flood last Memorial day, would like Santa Claus to leave them a house.

But they don't think he will. In fact, many don't expect him to even drive by.

"We're not going to have any Christmas this year," said Mrs. Christina Wells, 26, one of the thousands who lost everything they owned. "We just can't pay."

Mrs. Wells lives in one of the 400-unit trailer units which the housing government has brought in to replace the 5,304 homes of Vanport. She was working at the ironing board, which filled half the front of her trailer. A couch filled the other half. A tiny passageway flanked by a one burner and oven stove and a sink too tiny to immerse a platter, led to the trailer's rear.

Her three neatly-combed children were playing on the three-quarter bed that filled up the rear of the trailer. Outside, sleet was slopping into mud.

"It's a little crowded," said Mrs. Wells apologetically. "I hope we can get somewhere else to live soon. One of the boys is sick; the doctor says we shouldn't stay here."

"It's so sooty," said 10-year-old Dorothy gravely. "I gives him rash. None of us like the trailers, either. They're not big enough for winter. His families are split between trailers 20 feet apart. The community washrooms are many muddy feet from juvenile delinquency in the trailer area is rising."

But trailers, which cost \$1,000,000

of a congressional \$10,000,000 appropriation, are all they've been able to get. Only now, six months after the flood, is there a plan to start soon—to convert a shipyard barracks into 100 temporary apartments. Permanent housing is not in sight.

"We're hoping," said Harry Freeman, executive director of the Portland housing authority, "that congress will pass some permanent housing bill."

In weatherbeaten row housing sat Mrs. Joseph Brown, whose family of eight has been on relief since 1945. Her house was shattered. Her husband had a little business in Vanport, peddling ice. He hasn't worked since.

"Christmas?" said Mrs. Brown. "Oh, we won't have Christmas. Unless the relief does something."

Nearly 6,000 families were left homeless when Vanport, the nation's largest housing project, was destroyed at a loss of 14 lives and at least \$23,500,000.

The Portland housing authority, which gave refugees priority on vacancies, has re-housed some 2,000 families in trailers and other housing projects. The rest of the flood victims are jammed into the crannies of an already overcrowded city—in basements, friends' back rooms, parental homes, a lucky few in apartments or houses.

Even those who did find houses sometimes have trouble finding anything to put in them. The Red Cross spent about \$2,000,000 on rehabilitation—everything from food to furniture and eye glasses to dentures. The Salvation Army is supplying \$102,000.

Procedure to Form Soil Conservation District Outlined Here by Area Head

"How do we go about forming a soil conservation district?" is a question frequently asked Luther Jones, soil conservation service district superintendent. He said farmers losing valuable topsoil to wind and irrigation water are becoming increasingly interested in protecting the productivity of their farms.

"It is up to the farmer to organize their own districts," Jones said in listing a series of steps in the formation of a soil conservation district. He emphasized they are subdivisions of the state government, and as such are under the law and the procedures it provides.

The law established a state soil conservation commission of three members appointed by the governor and provides for other agencies to act in an advisory capacity. The commission has power to determine district boundaries, encourage district formation and coordinate programs between districts. However, each local district is independent and not subject to the control of the state government.

First step in the formation of a local district, according to state law, is petitioning the state commission for formation of a district. Jones suggested farmers first organize local committees and hold educational meetings, submitting as many signatures as possible.

The petitions are reviewed by the state commission which holds a public hearing on the question, if feasibility of the proposed district is clearly shown. Testimony is recorded at the hearings, at which objections are presented, district operation explained and the boundaries defined.

The commission again reviews the question before submitting it to a vote of the landowners affected. A majority of two-thirds of the landowners voting is required to approve the proposal. "Landowners" include individuals, firms or corporations, and contract-buyers. If the landowners reject the proposal, no further action is taken.

Upon a favorable vote in the area affected, the state commission appoints two district supervisors who apply to the secretary of state for a certificate of organization. Three more district supervisors are nominated and elected by landowners in the district.

All serve for three years except those appointed who serve terms of one year or two years. Like the state commission itself, the district supervisors receive no compensation. The five supervisors are the governing body of the district. The district has no authority to levy taxes, make assessments or vote bonds.

The district has power to conduct surveys, investigations and research in erosion control, conduct demonstration projects, carry out preventative and control measures as well as a variety of other conservation procedures.

Jones emphasized control of the district is by its local supervisors, rather than by the state or federal government. So far, 20 soil conservation districts have been formed in Idaho, of which three are located in Magic Valley.

After a district has been estab-

lished for three years, landowners may petition for its discontinuance if they desire. Jones said he knows of no district which has been discontinued.

An election is required to discontinue as well as to organize a soil conservation district, and a district cannot be continued without a favorable vote.

After formation of a district, the supervisors survey the problems and formulate a program of erosion control and preventative measures. Through the state commission they may secure the cooperation and technical help of the U. S. department of agriculture and any of its agencies, as well as state agencies.

Erosion control work may be done upon private lands only with the consent of the owner. Similarly, work on public lands may be done only through a cooperative agreement with the agency administering them.

Another question farmers often ask Jones is "How much will it cost me if a soil conservation district is formed?" The soil conservation service does not charge for its technical assistance and aside from the indirect federal taxes which support it, there is no cost to the farmer.

Nationally, there are two sources to finance the operation of local districts. One is through grants-in-aid made either directly to the districts or through state commissions by the soil conservation service of the USDA or other federal agencies.

The other comes through direct appropriations from state treasuries. Idaho and Oregon are the only two of the 48 states, Hawaii and Alaska not having such provision. A change in that respect was called for in a resolution adopted at a convention of district supervisors.

Early in the organization of a district, the supervisors formulate a work program, which is a statement of the particular problems facing a district, and a work plan of long-term methods to meet those problems. Supervisors meet monthly to take care of district business.

Conservation farm plans are drawn up between the individual farmer and the local district in the form of a cooperative agreement. They are explained at a meeting of the supervisors by soil conservation service technicians who work with the farmer in developing the plan. The farmer and the district sign to approve the plan and make the farmer a cooperator eligible to re-

ceive the benefits of technical help and equipment.

Included in the plan is a survey of the soil type and texture, present erosion, and capability of the land. A contour map is made for planning the irrigation system, and land use and irrigation are also mapped. A cropping plan is developed and a fertilizer schedule established. Plans are made for future development of the farm, including windbreaks and other conservation measures.

Jones pointed out Idaho law does not provide for land use regulation and emphasized farmer participation is voluntary.



Lewis Avers There Is No 'Strike Code'

WASHINGTON, Dec. 23 (AP)—John L. Lewis says there is no secret code between him and members of the United Mine Workers to signal a strike.

He told the union's convention here he doesn't "ever hope to be able to educate the country" on that fact.

It was Lewis' first public acknowledgment that the American people is mystified by the way many of the great coal strikes since 1943 have occurred.

Most often a contract between the union and operators, or between the union and government, expired or was terminated. On the expiration day, all of the union miners quit work.

1945 Mines Cited
In 1945 a strike by farmen struck into another nationwide work stoppage until Lewis called it off. Not a miner made a move to return to work in November and December, 1946, during the government's court fight to force Lewis to honor his contract with Secretary of Labor Julius A. Krug until ordered to do so by him.

And in the fight over pensions in March and April, 1948, all of the miners quit work without an overt order from Lewis. Why? The answer there was only one official explanation.

Ruling Recalled
Federal Judge T. Alan Goldsborough said statements issued by Lewis about operators denouncing their contract on pensions constituted a strike call by "a wink, a nod or a code" last spring.

Lewis and the union have appealed that finding and the fines of \$1,420,000 to the U. S. court of appeals. The case will be argued soon. In their brief filed recently, the mine workers argued that there was not evidence by the government of "a nod, a wink or a code" being used to call the pension strike.

The supreme court eventually will have to decide.

X-Ray Microscope To Help Research

FALO ALTO, Calif. Dec. 23 (AP)—An X-ray microscope which scientists believe will enable them to study the secrets of living cells has been invented by a Stanford physicist.

Dr. Paul H. Kirkpatrick says he hopes his new microscope, when fully developed, will permit scientists to take X-rays of objects less than a millionth of an inch in size.

An X-ray microscope previously had been considered an impossibility because X-rays show almost no refraction and do not reflect at small angles. Kirkpatrick solved the problem of metal-coated, concave mirrors which focus the X-rays both vertically and horizontally.

The resolving power, or range, of the new microscope is expected to be somewhere between the type of optical microscope and the electron microscope, which cannot be used to examine living tissues.

3 Trips to Africa Net Needed Bugs

RIVERDALE, Calif. Dec. 23 (AP)—California has spent millions to keep out-of-state bugs away from its precious citrus crops.

Yet a state representative made three trips to Africa before he successfully imported a variety of ladybird beetles to help the citrus crops.

Harold Comper, research assistant at the University of California's citrus experiment station here, has returned with specimens of the beetles, among hundreds of insects, he picked up for study. The ladybirds are valuable in fighting red scale.

Comper first obtained specimens of the beetle in 1930, but lost them in a luggage mixup in Egypt.

He tried again in 1937, but their numbers became depleted after his return here. His latest 21-month trip began in February, 1947.

U. S. Drive Against 'Jerry-Builders' Who Cheated Vets Hitting High Gear

WASHINGTON — The government's drive against U. S. home builders who have cheated veterans, which has been gaining momentum during the past three months, is now in high gear.

Nearly 200 contractors who sold millions of dollars worth of faulty homes to several thousand veterans have been fined, indicted or jailed so far. Fines have ranged up to \$50,000 and jail terms up to a year.

Most spectacular results of the drive, however, is the way it has inspired contractors all over the country to make voluntary amendments for sub-standard homes which they sold.

Typical of what is happening all over the country is the case of the veteran in Dallas, Tex. who had been living in his house for two years.

One morning he was astonished by a crew of workmen who showed up to give him a completely new set of gutters and rainwater downspouts. When the veteran inquired, the contractor admitted that the original gutters weren't right, but that he had been waiting for materials to make the change.

That surprise visit happened one week after three contractors had been indicted by a federal grand jury for selling Jerry-built houses to veterans.

In the Los Angeles area alone in one recent month, the U. S. district attorney reported more than 1,000 satisfactory out-of-court settlements had been made for veterans who had complained about the houses they bought. Settlements ranged from \$200 to \$1,200.

According to Philip W. Yager, special assistant to the attorney general who is coordinating the govern-

ment's investigation, this same activity is taking place all over the U. S. He says:

"Our primary goal is to see that the veteran ends up getting a square deal on a house, not to send builders to jail. The most gratifying result of the work so far are the great number of settlements which we have helped to effect and which our investigations have inspired, without criminal or civil court actions."

The office of the housing experter reports the same results. OHE recently turned 281 special investigators loose on the problem of helping veterans who got cheated on postwar houses. The great bulk of OHE's results have been out-of-court settlements.

More than \$6,000,000 worth of faulty construction has been found in the first \$700,000,000 worth of veterans housing investigated.

When the investigation started gathering headway in September, the government had a backlog of 30,000 complaints from veterans. The wide publicity given the probe brought in another 200,000 complaints. It is estimated that settlements can be made on about 45,000 of these.

While the department of justice and OHE have directed their efforts to helping veterans who have already been victimized, the veteran administration has taken an important step to halt any future sale of inferior houses to veterans. It has established a code of mini-

mum standards for homes that spells out down to the last nail just what the government considers a satisfactory house for a veteran to buy.

Builders can ask VA to make an advance appraisal of a house under the new plan. If the house meets the minimum standard, VA puts a fair price on it and the future sale of it to a veteran, with a guaranteed loan, is automatically approved. VA can't force a builder to meet these minimum standards, but it can hold up the loan on a house that doesn't.

In addition to the work of the federal government, some city officials have taken a hand in the problem. In Baltimore 15 builders were brought into court, fined and ordered to improve the construction on veterans housing projects which violated local building ordinances. Thousands of veterans on their own have brought successful suits against builders who were proved to have violated contracts by using faulty materials and failing to supply such things as stoves, storm windows and screens.

The efforts of the government have been hampered by the lack of specific laws which protect veterans against unscrupulous contractors. Thousands of veterans are now living in houses with leaky roofs, bad plumbing, and wet basements.

ments; many of these houses are expected to become uninhabitable before the final mortgage payments are made. The veterans who bought

them are victims of gaps in the federal law. The government's probe will continue until next June. If the backlog of complaints isn't taken up by that time, congress will be asked for more money to continue the investigations and enforcement.

Swivel Wheels and Stall Horn Are New Boon to Mass Flight

WASHINGTON (NEA)—Two valuable aids to mass flying which the civil aeronautics administration has developed after long experimentation are now being produced on the aviation market, the CAA has announced.
One is the master-type landing gear, which makes landings possible even when runways do not face directly into the wind. The second is an automatic stall-warning device which tells a pilot when his plane is in danger of a spin.
The cater-type landing gear, which swivels like the wheels on an office chair, was perfected some time ago for small planes, and now comes in larger sizes for the DC-3. It permits a plane to turn its nose into a cross-wind and still roll along the ground in the direction of the runway.
CAA, which received a \$150,000 appropriation to perfect the idea, hopes that in addition to providing safe, almost foolproof landings without danger of groundloops, the cater-type landing gear may eventually cut the cost of buying airplanes as much as 50 per cent by cutting down the number of runways now necessary.

Parents should inspect electric toys their children receive at Christmas and supervise their play with any electric set, the National Board of Fire Underwriters states. Children may get a severe shock from touching a radiator or other "ground" while handling electric toys.
Following are general rules for safe toys:
1. Look for the Underwriters Laboratories, Inc., markers on elec-
