Egypt Prime Minister Is Killed by Assassin

CAIRO, Dec. 28 (UP)—Egyptian Premier Mahmoud Fahmy Nokrashy Pasha was assassinated today by a college student
organization, the Moslem Brotherhood.

The assassination was believed in retaliation for Nokrashy's action in suppressing student political demonstrations, which often verged into terrorist activities, and for outlawing the Moslem Brotherhood early this month.

The brotherhood was declared an illegal organization and its officers arrested on grounds that it had been active in fomenting sectarian terrorism.

The brotherhood claimed 1,000,000 members, but was believed to be much smaller. Nokrashy's assassin, a first-year college student who was disguised in the uniform of a first lieutenant of the Egyptian police, was shot dead by police.

Police identified the assassin as Abdel-Meguid Ahmed Hassan, a first-year college student who was disguised in the uniform of a first lieutenant of the Egyptian police.

Details Released
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Special precautions were taken to satisfy the fears of a possible revival of German aggression tendencies. The United States agreed to supply the Ruhr with the machinery of the 50-year disarmament treaty which was proposed by the United States in 1919.

French Plans Unanswered
But French demands for eventual international ownership of the Ruhr and the nations listed a committee which admittedly was designed to make it easier for the French government to control the Ruhr.

Three Objectives
The committee emphasized that the plan for the Ruhr has three objectives: to provide a permanent basis for the economic life of the Ruhr; to further the recovery of the countries of Europe, including democratic Germany.

Reds Release Six GIs After Shot Incident

FRANKFURT, Germany, Dec. 28.—Six American soldiers captured by the Russians were freed today unharmed by a halt of bullets which forced the Russians to release them.

They said red army soldiers fired 10 times in seizing them at the heavily defended border between the American and Soviet zones of Germany Sunday afternoon.

An official U. S. army announcement said the Americans did not fire a single shot in reply. The Russian shots went over the heads of the Americans.

Crossing is "mistake"

The army announcement added that the soldiers, all members of the 22nd constabulary squadron, had strayed across the small boundary by mistake while patrolling in leaps at a point where the border is not clearly defined.

They were returned safely by the Russians about 30 hours after their capture. They said they had been extremely well treated.

The British also released a German border policeman who was controlling with the soldiers.

They were seized near Kassel, some 50 miles north-east of Frankfurt. Kassel is near the most northerly point of the U. S. occupation zone.

Last week Russian troops shot and wounded one British soldier and captured six others who crossed the zone's frontier while chasing a rabbit they had wounded on a hunting expedition.

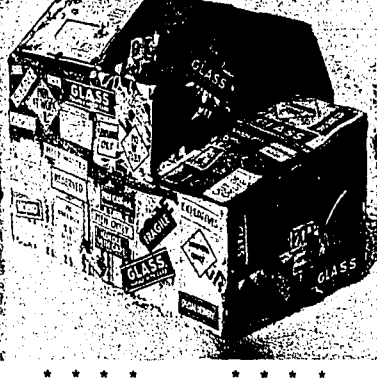
PTA at Ketchum Has Yule Party, Exchange of Gifts

'Extraordinary' Yule Gifts Are Hobby for Twin Falls Couple

Something unusual in Christmas presents or gift wrappings is the rule rather than the exception with Mr. and Mrs. Harry Povey, 1730 Kimberly road.

Among such gifts as exotic perfume hidden in a quart jar of beans, or a gorgeous bouquet of radishes and colorful vegetables nestled in carrot ferns, the Poveys consider a cardboard carton converted into a "house," and an old hat remodeled into a fashionable chapeau as the best illustrations of their Christmas hobby.

Several years ago a relative had the Poveys just about stumped on the Christmas wrapping problem. No matter how they could always poke, prod, rattle and shake the packages and unfasteningly know the contents without unwrapping the box.

Determination to foil Mr. X-ray-Eyes resulted in a Christmas tray of gifts with the Poveys' ingenious and each year since then they have wrapped some gift cunningly, whether by simple re-labeling canned goods with highly original brand names or dressing up plain with buttons and bows.

The hobby started in 1945 when they had bought Mr. X-ray-Eyes a pair of handmade doeking gloves. Regardless of how they were wrapped they still looked like a pair of gloves. Taking a medium-sized cardboard carton, Povey remodeled it into the form of a house.

Federal Land Bank to Give Big Dividend

SPOKANE, Dec. 28.—More than 4,000 Idaho farmers and ranchmen will share in a \$180,000 dividend declared by the federal land bank of Spokane today.

Henry Matthews, president, announced here. This six per cent dividend, payable to all stockholders of record as of Nov. 30, 1948, brings to almost \$1,000,000 the total dividends declared by the bank in the last five years.

Matthews said approximately \$400,000 of the 1948 dividend will be paid to the 10 local cooperative national farm loan associations in Idaho which make and service loans for the bank and which own 774,000 of the bank's capital stock. These 16 associations, in turn, will pass the dividend on to their 4,047 member-stockholders, retaining only a small portion needed to assure a long-range sound business operation.

"The Federal Land bank of Spokane is owned by its borrowers through its national farm loan associations in Idaho, Washington, Oregon and Montana," said Matthews. "These associations own all of the bank's capital stock and approximately 19,000 farmers and ranchers own all the stock of the associations. As cooperatives, the bank and the associations, after providing for necessary reserves, distribute their earnings to stockholders in the form of dividends."

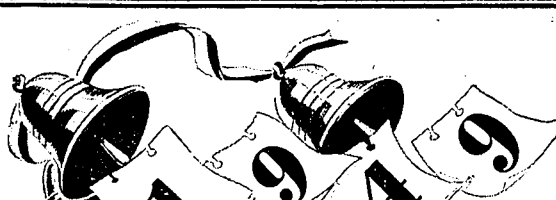

Group Seeks Tighter State Juvenile Law

BOISE, Dec. 28.—More stringent regulations in Idaho juvenile laws and new child labor law for the state were recommended at a meeting of workers in Boise.

Mrs. Kathryn Wolfe, superintendent of the Children's Home and Family Society, said the present adoption law is so ineffective that provision is made to prevent a child placed for adoption from being sent to the former home.

State Rep. Edith I. Miller, R. Ada, advocated the establishment of a complete new child labor law. She said Idaho could have no effective provision for enforcement of present laws and stressed the need of a provision that only workers should work during school hours.

MARKETS IN 1949

New Year's resolutions are made by individuals, not by nations and their governments. So all of the New Year's day stock-taking cannot change the tide of international events.

Three hundred and sixty-six days have gone by since the last change of date on the calendar, but the question remains the same. The only difference is that 1948 brings us closer to an unknown day of climax and resolution.

It is impossible to prophesy what will happen in 1949 to decide the great question one way or the other, though some will try it. Even speculation must be cautious.

Europe should advance further toward normal life with our help. The Palestine war should end in agreement and the recognition of Israel.

The answer to that is bound up with a question of our domestic economy. And the problem which will hinge upon a crucial judgment. That seems to be one of the few certainties among the imponderables.

The prime obligation of the newly elected government of Germany is to stabilize its home and abroad. The new government will draw up a budget with that in mind.

Each question will be considered and each answer made in the shadow of Russia's veiled policy and unpredictable tactics. We can only pray that those who operate our government and shape our national destiny will be given the wisdom to pierce the veil and predict the unpredictable.

LET'S GET THE ROAD OPEN

It is unfortunate that a combination of circumstances has kept the skiing season in the Magic mountain area from getting under way, especially right now during the holidays when so many ski enthusiasts sport.

While this is intended as no criticism of the Twin Falls highway district, we do think some definite program should be worked out by the district, or in cooperation with state and federal highway departments, to provide for adequate maintenance of the road in question.

Those responsible for the skiing facilities which have been installed in the Magic mountain area have quite an investment.

Skating at Magic mountain, however, has become a major attraction in this part of Idaho, one in which not only the skiers, but our chambers of commerce, civic organizations, and business men as well, should be vitally interested.

Why don't representatives of these respective groups arrange a meeting with the Twin Falls highway district board at the earliest opportunity and work out some feasible plan for keeping this road open from here on out?

It's a big thing for Twin Falls and all Magic Valley.

TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG POT SHOTS

WASHINGTON—President Truman is shopping for a secretary of state of the stature of the late Charles Evans Hughes in an effort to wrest top command of the State Department from the hands of the present incumbent, Acheson.

Secretary Marshall's illness, as well as the prospect that he may not be able to take over the cabinet, offers opportunity for the White House to do the prospective secretary of state. So does the prospective secretary of state's own experience in the White House chief of staff, after the January inauguration.

AGENT—Although Gen. Douglas MacArthur may remain on as supreme ally of American troops in Japan, Maj.-Gen. McCoy as American member of the eastern committee will be brought under stricter and closer White House and state department supervision when Mr. Truman becomes chief of state.

INHERITED—President Truman does not hold any of these men personally responsible for the mishandling of the American foreign policy. He inherited his colonial family from the Roosevelt administration, with the exception of Secretary Marshall.

FEAR—General Clay, perhaps rightly, has permitted his military gear of Russia to influence his policies. He is MacArthur in the far east and Forrestal in the middle east.

INTENTIONS—General MacArthur's similar dread of communist infiltration and flanking—in the Kuriles, Korea and now China—has led him to crack down on labor and American foreign policy. He has been forced on him by the Russian menace, like Clay's in Germany.

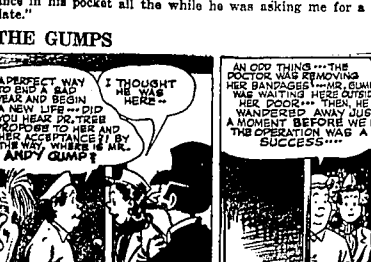

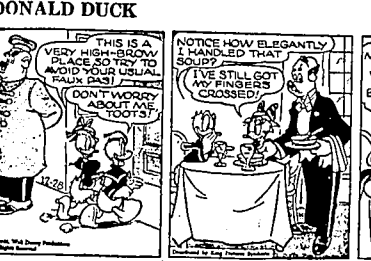

On Capital Return

WASHINGTON, Dec. 28 (AP)—A top Democrat, returning to Washington after the convention of congress, declared "there is nothing that business need fear from this administration," it was reported today. Representative Mc Cormack of Massachusetts, slated to become House Democratic leader, made the statement to reporters. "The Democratic party," McCormack said, "will give the people sound and progressive legislation" dealing with the country's economy. President Truman proposed an excess profits tax to the 80th congress as the top priority in his annual inflation program, but congress let the proposal die with hardly a look at it. Indications now are that economic legislation may be in these principles. The "nothing to fear" statement is "strengthening" of rent controls, which otherwise expire in March. Later, after thorough studies, possibly some legislation to control and allocate scarce materials such as steel and tin. The tax on the tax laws will be a tax to getting more revenue. The bill will crackle beginning January 3 when the Democrats organize the new congress.
