

# Quakes Jar Reno Area, Down Light And Phone Lines

RENO, Nev., Dec. 29 (AP)—A rumbling earthquake struck heavily throughout Nevada today, breaking power and tearing continental telephone lines. The nearby town of Verdi was shaken into a welter of broken glass, chimney bricks and fallen plaster.

Despite the widespread damage to Verdi, small mountain community 10 miles east of Reno, no one was injured. The earth shocks rattled dishes and windows in Reno and across the Sierras into northern California. They were felt as far west as Francisco and southward into the San Joaquin valley to Fresno and Merced. A light shock was recorded as far south as San Diego, Calif.

A reporter from the Reno Gazette telephoned from Verdi that "every thing in town is damaged to some extent."

Wall Knocked Down  
One wall of a 33-year-old building which once housed the Verdi general store was knocked down completely. Elsewhere house frames were twisted, chimneys down, wall plaster fallen, and windows and screens broken.

Mrs. and Mrs. Robert Crump were living in the old general store when the first shock hit. Mrs. Crump said the store rocked violently, and the two-foot front porch was thrown from the street with a "grinding tearing crash."

Lines Snapped  
Overhead transcontinental telephone lines of the Bell system were snapped southwest of Verdi in the Truckee river canyon. A line between Verdi and Reno was maintained through underground circuits.

Minor Slides  
Minor rock slides peppered U. S. highways throughout Nevada today. The main east-west transcontinental highway was not blocked, however, small slides caused traffic to quickly clear away the debris.

Three quakes, the first reported since Reno was destroyed in 1864, are thought to have been caused by stress on Nevada completely away.

Seven Times Monday  
They were the latest in a series of quakes recorded Monday night, when Reno was shaken seven times within a period of four and a half hours.

Prof. Vincent P. Gianella, seismologist at the University of Nevada, said he was able to get his seismograph working again shortly after 8:30 a. m.

Records Shocks  
It is the most recorded continuous shocks of fault nature, according to "after tremors," at a rate too fast to count.

Berkeley, Calif., the University of California seismograph recorded a large earthquake at 6:54-6:57 p. m. on Dec. 29, according to Berkeley and lasting 45 minutes on the record.

Utah Digs Out As New Snow Storm Coming

Reports of a new storm headed for the intermountain area today disclosed that Utah is beginning to dig their way out of the last one. However, the storm was not expected to be of long duration.

The Salt Lake weather bureau said the storm, moving down from the northwest, brought light snow showers in parts of Idaho today. It would hit the northern third of Utah tomorrow.

Temperatures were low in the two-state area today. Lowest in Utah was 12 below at Milford and 11 below at Bryce canyon. At Great Salt Lake, the lowest in Idaho reported to the weather bureau.

Forecast for the minimum of 13 Idaho Falls 16, Twin Falls 8 and Boise 2. It was 19 at Ogden 17, at Boise 19, and 10 at Provo. A wind, much as rain, snow swept over parts of the midwest, slowing transportation and disrupting public service.

Several communities in Nebraska and Kansas were isolated as ice and snow snapped telephone lines. Kennedy, Pa., was without electricity because of a power line break.

The fresh falls of snow were whipped by winds ranging from 20 to 50 miles an hour and much drifting was reported over areas in Nebraska as a result of a cyclonic storm. Temperatures dropped over the snow belt and colder weather was forecast for most of the north central region tonight.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 29—President Truman returned today from his Christmas holiday to join congressional leaders in determining the shape of things for 1949. Part of that problem is deciding who shall be subsidized and who shall pay more taxes—perhaps whether some shall pay less. There are likely to go up because neither Congress nor the president expects to bring expenses down and the treasury may be headed for another deficit. The cost of federal government in the next fiscal year probably will exceed \$44,000,000,000 by a good many billions.

The Republican-backed 80th congress will meet once more on Friday and then the new Democratic-backed 81st congress will meet on Monday for a first session sure to be troubled and to last six months or longer.
