President Is Facing 3 Defeats

WASHINGTON, Dec. 31 (AP)—President Truman today, as Congress begins its session, is expected to be widely as good as whipped for this session on three major planks in his "New Deal" platform. The banks, expected to be straddled again in his opening message to Congress.

1. Double Tax Relief
Repeal of the Taft-Hartley labor law, Senate Democratic leader Hubert H. Humphrey, told newsmen he is certain that the senate will attempt any major legislation in the new session that starts Tuesday. Humphrey's forecast is based on the fact that the 1949 session failed in the 1949 session.

2. Enactment of compulsory health insurance, assisted by opponents as "socialized medicine."
Democratic leaders say there is no chance for approval this year of a broad program, unless which the government would undertake to pay individuals' doctor, hospital and medicine bills with money collected by payroll taxes.

3. Term Defeat Seen
The "stimulus" plan for the present farm price support program. The plan, sponsored by Secretary of Agriculture Charles Brannan, would provide direct government subsidies to producers of perishable crops to stabilize market demand for the farmer's previously determined "fair" return. Lucas said he personally would like to see the 1949 term for itself.

Boosts in U.S. Payroll Taxes Go Into Effect

WASHINGTON, Dec. 31 (AP)—A 30 percent rise in the total payroll tax—adding up to almost three-quarters of a billion dollars more in 1950—went into effect today with the new year's holidays.

The payroll tax, which has stayed at 1 1/2 percent for 11 years, rises to 1 7/8 percent. It is levied alike on employers and their workers. For a total of 3 1/2 percent.

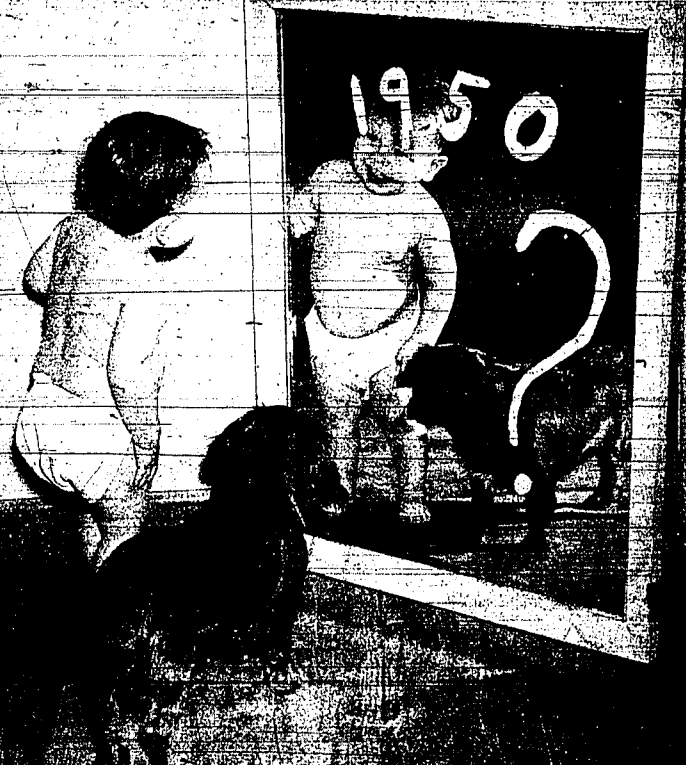

\$300,000 Bond Issue for Hospital

An election on a \$300,000 bond issue, to be matched by federal funds, was scheduled for Feb. 14, Friday-afternoon by Twin-Falls county commissioners to start completion of the new Twin Falls county hospital. J. C. McGilvray, hospital superintendent, said \$300,000 from the bond issue and \$300,000 to be supplied by the federal government would be necessary to complete the structure. The original bond issue for the hospital was approved in 1946 for \$1,250,000.

Plans for the hospital, now under construction, include the latest hospital equipment and design. However, economy was a watchword of the building committee during the stages of designing the structure. Increasing costs from the time the bond issue was approved accounted for a large portion of the added expense, it was reported.

The \$300,000 project from the government will be made available through the Idaho state department of public health if the bond issue is approved.

Selection of polling places and election judges and clerks from the precincts in the county now underway, according to DeWitt E. Young, county commissioner. He said details of preparations for the election would be announced when the council action Tuesday.

Meanwhile, county commissioners and members of the hospital board are negotiating the purchase of present hospital buildings when the election is held.

This county deserves the best and the hospital board is anxious to provide the very finest medical facilities as economical as possible. Radio Speeds Idaho Power Maintenance



A utility two-way radio system went into operation Thursday between the Idaho Power company sub-station on Miller avenue and service cars in the Twin Falls area.

On March 21 G. C. Anderson's new building was opened at the corner of Main avenue east and second street. It presented a new appearance and three times the floor space of the old building partially gutted by fire in 1945.

Later in the summer the Idaho department store underwent a remodeling and modernization job. It had a face-lifting to match the Main avenue store.

Other major building jobs completed during the year included the new addition to the Blue Lakes County club building in the Snake river canyon, a new municipal golf course clubhouse, an ultra-modern service station by 'Fireless' Farris on Fourth avenue south and a 250,000 addition to the Memorial Lutheran school.

In progress now are the addition to the Washington school, the new Twin Falls county hospital and the \$175,000 Baptist church at the corner of Shoshone street and Ninth avenue east.

Permitting was high month for permits issued. Mrs. Leber's records reveal with a \$10,255 total. November was a close second with \$9,200, followed by August with \$10,121. Other months were January, \$15,000; February, \$4,424; March, \$14,585; April, \$7,575; May, \$7,038; June, \$11,008; July, \$41,908; September, \$147,251; and December, \$4,247.

Board Parley Aids Schools' 750 Problems

Among the problems discussed were: increased transportation costs and the purchase of new school buses; increased school population with insufficient rooms to give the required educational program; reduced income as a result of lower property values; building maintenance, repair and utility; bond issues for buildings; discrepancies in assessed valuations and limitations on curriculum offerings.

Two-Way Radios Being Used by Idaho Power Trouble-Shooters

A utility radio station providing two-way service between the Idaho Power company sub-station on Miller avenue and service cars in the Boise area was begun Thursday. Ralph W. Carpenter, district manager, announced.

He said the system, now in operation, offers successful two-way operation in the Boise area. The design of the system was made by electrically trained and in the production of company property.

By using service men from independent radio telephone communications, we reduce service and time lost in the past procedure. Frequently there are several cars tied up awaiting for service. The new system has already found and repaired the break. Direct radio contact between a central station and cars eliminates the waste in time.

Carpenter also pointed out that the repair time is reduced by the repair man's ability to report from the scene exactly when power should be turned off the line, allowing men to work on it and when service through the station built with 15 local fibers present.

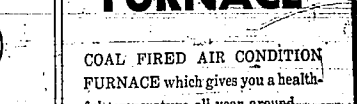

SUGGESTED RESOLUTIONS
 There are several New Year's resolutions which the people of Idaho might give serious consideration.

Every last one of us should resolve to assume a greater personal responsibility in a state-wide drive to reduce the number of traffic deaths on our highways.

Those of us who have a tendency to be careless, negligent and inconsiderate of others when we are driving our automobiles should come to the conclusion that it's pretty poor sportsmanship on our part. We should resolve, too, that it isn't fair to put other people's lives in jeopardy.

After all, safe, sane and courteous driving would make traveling a lot more pleasant for everyone, in addition to saving many lives.

We should also resolve to take a greater personal interest in our state affairs which are sorely in need of attention.

The legislative committee's forthcoming report on recommendations for reorganization of state government should be given serious consideration. Most likely it will suggest changes that would save the taxpayers of Idaho millions of dollars.

Those of us who have a tendency to be ignorant of what the state's governmental set-up is all about. Then it will remain for all of us, in the forthcoming elections and during the next session of the legislature, to make our wishes known.

We should also resolve to take a greater personal interest in the special investigation of the state's highway department, which was ordered by the last session of the legislature when public demand for a "non-political" highway department put the legislators on the spot.

If that report suggests a means of tidying the department of politics and getting the system set-up on a business-like basis, we should be prepared for a fight to the finish to bring such changes about.

With an election coming up we might also resolve to give greater thought to our representation in congress. Will we be represented in the United States Senate by the likes of Sen. Glen H. Taylor? Or will we make a determined effort to send capable men to Washington—men in whom we could have confidence and in whom we would be proud?

Let's resolve also that the CVActers in Washington will never succeed in selling us the Columbia river!

KEEPING THE DRAFT LAW
 Soundings in the congress suggest that it will be hard to sell on the idea of extending the draft law which expires in 1936. Yet there seem good reasons for approving the three-year renewal of the administration wants.

Naturally congress likes to enact anything so distasteful to people as a draft law during a political year. The old politicians are "dragging our boys off to military camps" will weigh heavily.

A prime fact for the lawmakers to remember, however, is that existing draft powers do not need to be used now and probably will not be in the months ahead. The authorities are being held in stand-by cold storage while the services fill their requirements through volunteering.

WASHINGTON—"How does the administration at Washington," exclaims Mr. R. of New York, "expect the average individual, or even a great corporation to manage its affairs properly and plan for tomorrow, in view of the confusion surrounding the last time every major industry in the world and foreign nation today?"

"One day," a White House spokesman said, "a cabinet member held one side of a question, and next day he is contradicting or repudiating it by another spokesman or another cabinet member." "If there any policy at Washington, it is to contradict anything which the boss says."

DAKOTA—Answer: Mr. C's complaint is understandable because this has been a most confusing period. The only explanation is that these are disturbing times both here and abroad, and it's difficult to make a plan today that will not be upset by tomorrow's developments.

As the highest officials admit, they are operating on a day-to-day basis with respect to almost every major problem.

However, referring to specific citations of inconsistencies and contradictions in the public domain, I shall try to summarize them briefly, and then give the underlying reasons for the clashes and confusions.

The answers may not enable an individual of business man plan his affairs any more definitely or wisely. But they may help in the thinking and operations of the great minds at Washington.

IMPORTS—Marshall's plan: Administrator Paul H. Douglas, Denmark is the largest point of butter to the U. S., but Secretary Brannan uses his emergency power to block these imports. Organized labor also opposes imports due to "other nations' dollars" and trading position and therefore asks that they have support at the White House.

Answer: The administration is not in a position to tell here, for the whole European and anti-Russian policy is based on that foundation. But it cannot afford to antagonize European workers and farmers. Hoffman is a business man; Brannan is a bread-and-butter politician.

DICTATOR—Foreign Affairs: The U. S. recognizes and lends money to Tito, an avowed communist, and asks other nations to do the same. He is a man with equally despicable blood like Baron in Argentina. But we will have nothing to do with Franco of Spain, Hitler, our military ally, and the Japanese.

Answer: Secretary Acheson says that we help Tito because his break with Stalin has made him meaner to the whole communist system inside and outside Russia. He also insists, that financially, Yugoslavia is a "good" bet for the sake of our industry. He says that we must play along with Latin-American governments.

DEFENSE—Spain has extremely formal diplomatic relations with the U. S. Acheson points out. But the export-import and other lending agencies do not regard Franco backward and undeveloped country but a sound investment. Spain does not match Yugoslavia in natural resources.

Moreover, Acheson explains that we cannot seem to plan for a military retreat. In the event of the Russian invasion of Western Europe, that would mean the French, Germans, Dutch, Belgians etc. feel that we are not strong enough to stand up to them. We want any defense line fixed at the Elbe or Rhine rivers.

MERCANTILE—Domestic Distinction. Secretary Sawyer says Mr. Truman has told him to temper administration of the anti-trust laws by giving advisory opinions to industry. It is merely a matter of public trust. But attorney general says he will continue with trust-busting.

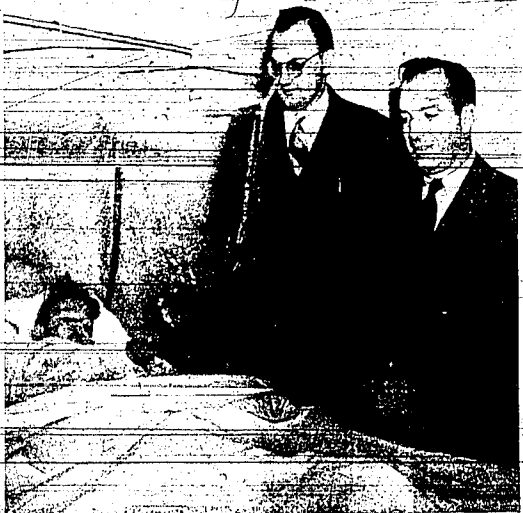

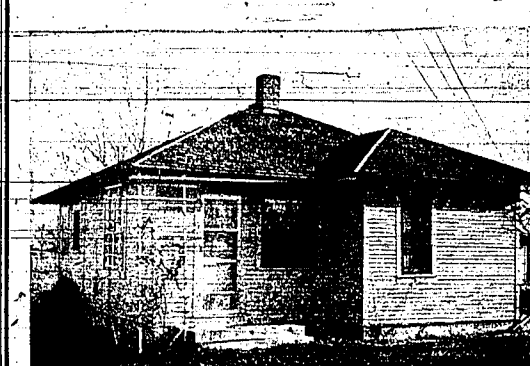
