Auto Costing Under \$1,000 May Be Built

NEW YORK, Jan. 5 (AP)—New cars may build a small automobile for \$1,000 or less, according to a public reaction to such a car displayed at a banquet here at the Waldorf-Astoria hotel here today. At the same time it passed a questionnaire designed to get an expression of motorist opinion on present showing and what will be made in Washington, Chicago, Los Angeles and Detroit.

Not Tooled

Each emphasized it is not now to produce the car and that should not be expected. The car would be produced to supplement a plan to reduce to supplement a present medium automobile, which units George W. Mason, president, said the smaller car could not be manufactured for less than \$1,000.

Experimented

Each calls the small vehicle the "X-1" (each experimental in nature). The car shown today is a two-passenger convertible, powered with a four cylinder, 18-horsepower engine. It would cost \$1,000 to \$1,200, and would have a top speed of 40 miles an hour. It weighs 2,500 pounds.

Irrigation District Leadership Retainer; Advances Are Told

MURTAUGH, Jan. 5.—The reorganizational meeting of the board of directors of the Miller Dam Irrigation District was held at the plant office Tuesday.

Edna W. Moonman was elected president of the board. Russell Carlson was reappointed treasurer. Earl Beck was reappointed secretary. August Hebestock is the other board member.

A general business discussion was held, and it was decided to hold the next meeting at 2 p. m. Jan. 11 at the Miller-Dam irrigation plant, one and one-half miles west of Miller.

The pumping project enters its 30th year of operation in far different shape than its first year when it had a comparatively small acreage and one pumping plant with two 500-horsepower units.

The project has grown to 1,133 irrigated acres. Three plants are in operation—No. 1 with four 500-horsepower units and one 250-horsepower unit; No. 2 built in 1923; one 150 and two 60-horsepower units; and No. 3 built in 1928, one 125 and two 60-horsepower units.

Plants two and three are used to lift the water to higher land. Plant one, located near the Miller dam, originally took power from the Idaho Power company at high voltage and reduced it as needed. In 1922 the plant went under government power.

The project commonly is called the Moonman tract in honor of the late D. B. Moonman, affectionately known as "the father of the project." He was active in financing the construction and the operation for several years after completion.

Operating under state laws, the district issued bonds and bought storage in the American Falls reservoir. It was the first project to sign for storage space. The bonds were sold and the project went under the PUC in 1924.

The district now is on a cash basis and the canal, plants and pumping systems are in better shape than ever before. Sagebrush bounds a large portion of the project, making prospects good for greater growth.

In the early 20's the "hacks" on the tract mostly were the "shocks." Today all homes on the project have electricity, the majority have running water and a great many are completely modern.

A "board of directors" consisted of Neil Jensen, Hyrum Pickett and P. J. Terrell with C. E. Beck as secretary. They were elected in 1921.

Edna W. Moonman, son of D. B. Moonman and active with his father from the start, was elected to the board of directors in December, 1929 and has been a board member since that time.

Others who have served are Glenn Hyde, Glenn Briggs, David Hayes, Henry Reed, A. L. Robert and Lloyd Davis. Scott, who was reappointed secretary, also is plant superintendent and has been with the district 17 years.

In the governor's proclamation he called upon the Idaho advertising commission to give nationwide advertising and other promotional efforts to the spud, so that the fame and goodness of these fine products may be known throughout the world, and so that the growers of these important crops may continue to contribute so generously to our state's economy.

In a public declaration, commissioner of agriculture said advertisements will appear on food packages of growers' products of the country's markets from Jan. 12 to 21. Grocery and produce trade publications also are carrying advertisements on the spud.

In issuing his proclamation, the governor invited farmers, grocers and restaurants to join in the observance.

WHAT'S A FAIR PROFIT?

THOSE DEATHS AT BLACKFOOT

Our state officials don't seem to get much concerned about recurring irregularities at State Hospital South in Blackfoot.

But as we see it, the people of Idaho have good reason to become suspicious. Too many mysterious things have happened at Blackfoot. And there has been all too much evidence of these mysterious things being "brushed off" or "hushed up."

Outside of what appeared to be casual investigations by the local authorities at Blackfoot, nothing has resulted from two recent deaths at the institution.

A part-time employe in the boiler room at the hospital apparently was killed by an inmate who beat him over the head with a hammer. So what? What could be done with such a patient?

And previously an aged patient died under circumstances which resulted in two of the hospital attendants being charged with assault and battery, which charges were later dropped.

It is evident that these two most recent deaths at Blackfoot should have been investigated and brought out into the open in greater detail. If misconduct on the part of the hospital personnel is in any way responsible for such occurrences, the people have a right to know and thorough investigations are the only way such irregularities could be brought to light.

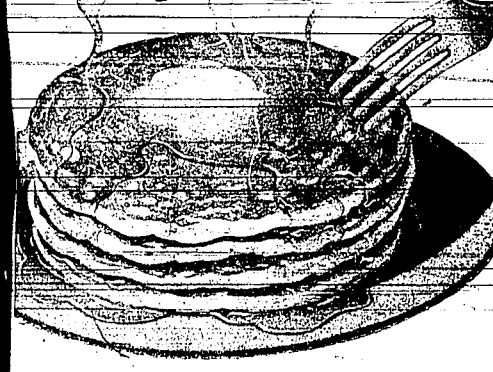

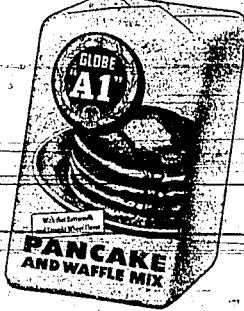

"By my knowledge not one of the 500 polio cases reported in Idaho has gone without the finest medical care available," Whitehead said.

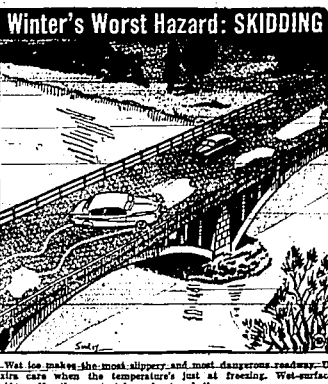
He estimated the total expenditure in Idaho for direct medical care of polio patients to be about \$1,000,000 for the entire year.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8 (AP)—Western senators' reaction to President Truman's state-of-the-union message was divided over development of natural resources, followed partisan lines.

Three Republicans saw in them a desire for more federal control. The fourth saw nothing at all. Democrats supported Mr. Truman's call for more government investments in conservation and "natural" resources programs.

The President devoted almost a page of his nine-page message to a general discussion of those subjects.

Must Use Resources
Among his observations: "We must use our precious assets of soil, water, forest and grass lands in such a way that they become constantly more productive and valuable."

"Development and development of our resources is necessary to the future economic expansion of the country."

"We need to enlarge the production and transmission of public power."

Calls for CVA
"Important resource legislation which should be passed at this session includes establishment of the Columbia valley administration."

Or westerners who could be reached for comment.

Senator Dworkin, R., Ida., said better use of natural resources can best be accomplished "by giving the people and congress more power in their operation."

"The President infers that our resources have not been developed consistently under an administration that has been in power for two decades," he added.

"There is little reason to expect any improvement under an agency like CVA."

"Nothing New"
Senator Malone, D., Nev., saw nothing new in the program. "There has been no major change for 47 years in the administration CVA," he said.

Senator Taylor, D., Ida., commented "It was very good to hear him mention CVA by name. It will give an added push to the authorization effort."

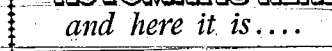

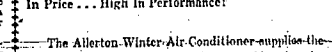

Four Convicts Lose Tries to Gain Freedom

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Jan. 5 (AP)—Four convicts who shot their way to freedom Saturday and touched off one of Arkansas' most sensational manhunts are back in custody today—two of them in a hospital with bullet wounds.

"The end of the grueling, five-day chase through rain and finally sleet and cold weather came last night when the last of the desperadoes were captured in North Little Rock."

"The old 'id' over" said 22-year-old Jack Rhyser, Sapulpa, Okla., one of the wounded men. "The cold was hell."

Arkansas Prison Supt. Lee Henzle said he, too, was glad the hunt was over. Rhyser and James Perry were the two fugitives who lived up to Henzle's prediction that the convicts would not be taken without a fight.

Cornered in a shack, the pair defied officers' commands to surrender. "Come and get us," they yelled. The posse of about 25 officers fired on the shack. Then the officers called out again: "Come on out, you haven't a chance."

From the splintered shed came a plaintive cry: "We can't come out, we're shot to pieces."

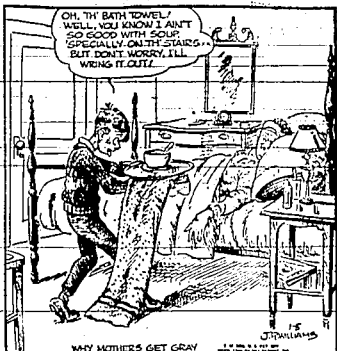

Aid 'Routine,' Faces Tough Road in 1950

Speaks Sunday

President Truman, by offering no new eye-catching suggestions for the prosecution of the cold war, may believe things will turn out all right if he just keeps plugging along the present line.

That's the hard part, of course, of such programs as the Marshall plan and the point four proposals, to keep plugging when the battle has become routine; not to go to sleep on the line pull.

When it comes to appropriating the money this year, congress will have no such spectacular things to attack in Europe as the hunger and imminent threat of communist conquest which spurred the program two years ago. Nor are the "hold your horses" successes of the past year, and some of the failures, conducive to great enthusiasm.

Nothing is far from the President's mind, but he is not inclined to fire congress as it approaches renewed debate on the subject. Of course the state-of-the-union message is not always the best place for such a move, but he is going to let the President slurred over the Atlantic crisis on which he has had some suggestions to offer. Republican criticism of "watchful waiting" the British are pushing in a particularly ugly spot by going ahead with recognition of communist China this week.

Major fights then will be over congress all along the way. Not over the principle of the Marshall plan, for instance, but over the size of continued contributions. Countries which cannot or will not meet U. S. demands about the conduct of their economies have injected a sour note into the plan, rejecting a loan from the world bank which means largely from the U. S., objects to letting us pay so much for their economic development. All such things have their effect on congress.

In all, unless a debate are conducted on a very high plane, a lot of America's friends abroad are going to get the idea that isolationism is once more raising its head here.
