## 50 YEARS OF "COLD WAR"

The prospect that the "cold war," with its huge cost and high tensions, will continue for at least 50 years is not one to cheer about. Yet that's what Prof. Arnold Toynbee, the eminent British historian, has predicted.

Toynbee is the author of a work that strikes deep into the nature of human history. He looks at events with the long view. So his comments on future trends inevitably carry weight.

The bright side of his forecast is, of course, that he sees no real likelihood of a shogun war before the year 2000. If his prediction turns out to be sound, the world will have experienced one of the longest periods without war since the middle of the 10th century.

But however grateful the millions of ordinary folk everywhere would be for such an idea, they could not be completely satisfied with a repetition of what the world has known as "peace" since World War II ended.

Toynbee isn't alone in predicting a painful extension of the cold war. Bernard Baruch, America's elder statesman, thinks the same. And so do some of our other statesmen and military leaders.

What they are all saying in effect is that Russia will not use its army to expand its area of control or influence in the world. But the Soviet union will employ every other device known to man—and undoubtedly many more—to achieve its apparent goal of global conquest.

If that is the course Russia does indeed intend to pursue, then the United States and the rest of the free world have no choice but to meet the relentless Soviet pressure with equal weight and determination on the other side.

Let's translate that into practical terms. It means we'll have to keep a bigger army than we'd like to have, for a longer time than we ever imagined would be necessary. It means, furthermore, that we'll have to take the lead in strengthening and coordinating the military forces of other free nations. We'll have to keep our own economy strong, doing our best to avoid paralyzing depression. And no doubt we'll have to continue helping other countries economically for a long time to come.

But there's one other thing they might not be able to resist: the corrosive effects of infiltrating communism. That's the outlook, say Toynbee and other far-seeing experts. If they're right, there's no use in our living in hope that an easy, relaxing sort of peace is just around the corner.

## GOP'S 1932 NOMINEE

GOP'S 1932 NOMINEE...  
Gov. Thomas E. Dewey has done his bit to clear the Republican political atmosphere by announcing he will not be a presidential candidate in 1932, 1936 or 1940. If he means what he says, the door is open to a steady stream of new names in the national politics and in Dewey's personal history.

No aspirant for the job since the Democrats' William Jennings Bryan ever tried so hard or so often as did Dewey.

He began as a boy in 1910, making his first bid for GOP nomination in 1910 when he was 38. He came amazingly close but lost to Wendell Willkie in hectic voting at convention time. Four years later he did get it. But although he polled 22,000,000 votes he bowed to Franklin D. Roosevelt in the election.

He declined nomination ever since, even a steady stream of Republican offers. But Dewey broke that tradition in 1949. Everyone remembers how confident he and his party were of national victory. The surprise was great when President Truman upset all forecasts to beat Dewey by more than 2,000,000 votes.

Over the history of that reverse, many thought Dewey would try to match Bryan by gaining a third nomination. But he apparently has decided against that course.

Whatever the governor may or may not do on a lesser political scale, his statement on the presidency marks the end of an era for a man who has been prominent on the national scene for a dozen years.

There's no great mystery over why he didn't make the grade in 1940 and 1944. He was young, and considered inexperienced for the problems of the great war then raging. Dewey in 1944 was the great war then raging. Dewey in 1944 was the great war then raging.

His 1948 failure was something else. It may have been partly a failure of personality. For Dewey does not fall easily into the role of the general, blue politician.

Most experts feel, however, that the 1948 outcome was more a failure of the GOP to develop a program both distinctive from its Democratic counterpart, and attractive to the voters.

If that's correct, then whoever takes Dewey in 1952 will suffer the same general handicap unless the party can frame a powerful program.

### 30 of State's Construction Projects End

**BOISE, Jan. 9 (AP)—**Thirty construction projects were completed in 1949 at a cost of \$10,000,000, the state's largest building program.

The state now has 31 other projects under construction costing \$7,500,000.

A report on state construction activity was released Saturday by Charles H. Clark, superintendent of building construction. Listed were projects completed in 1949 and those under construction, but not yet completed.

**Housing Plant Finished**

Among the larger construction projects completed was the housing plant addition at the state capitol building at Boise costing \$7,200,000.

Other completed work included: 100,000 sq. ft. of painting buildings at the state intercollegiate hospital; 100,000 sq. ft. of a shop building at North Idaho College of Education at Lewiston; \$11,775 for a restaurant at the state school colony at Nampa; \$7,150 for buildings at Elgin; 300,000 sq. ft. of a school building at Orofino; 37,200 sq. ft. of a new floor covering in the science building at Idaho State College; and \$1,000 for a building at Idaho State College.

**New Buildings Being Constructed**

New buildings being constructed under contracts not yet completed include: \$100,000 for a hospital and clinic at State Hospital South at Blackfoot; \$251,216 for disturbed patients at State Hospital South; \$100,000 for a utility building at State Hospital South; \$100,000 for a nurses' home at the state school and colony; \$100,000 for a male dormitory at the state school and colony; \$118,194 for a hearing plant building at State Hospital North; \$150,000 for a dormitory at State Hospital North; and \$350,834 for a general arts building at Idaho State College.

Other work still to be completed includes: \$65,250 for a hospital and clinic ward at the State school and colony; \$10,970 for a nurses' home at the state school and colony; \$15,000 for a male dormitory at the State school and colony; \$100,000 for a utility building at State Hospital South; \$83,314 for women and married students' buildings at State Hospital South; \$25,450 for utilities and \$20,000 for construction of tunnels and satisfaction of utilities at State Hospital South; \$14,543 for wiring and lighting house and accessories at statehouse and accessories; \$100,000 for painting the interior of a new building at State school and colony.

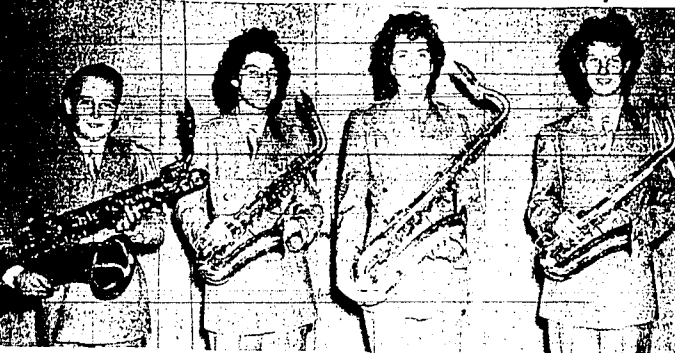

## Hoffman Says European Aid Job Not Done

**WASHINGTON, Jan. 9 (AP)—** Foreign Recovery Chief Paul G. Hoffman said today the greatest danger to fulfillment of the Marshall plan is to consider that its success thus far mean the job is done.

"But the job is only half done," the economic cooperation administrator told the Women's National Democratic club.

**Met First Challenge**

"We have successfully met the challenge of the first phase of the recovery program, but, in so doing, we have only opened the opportunity for the enduring part of the job," he said.

Hoffman said the "enduring part" lies in two directions — to help balance Europe's dollar accounts so that she can buy the raw materials and other items which spell more employment and better living, and to build there a more dynamic, expanding economy.

**Cut Is Asked**

Last week the ECIA said the Marshall plan nations of Europe have been asked to take about a \$1,000,000,000 cut from this year's \$2,775,000,000 aid—about a cut to 100,000,000—both Democrats and Republicans in congress have proposed a cut of about this size.

## New Tests Prove Body Capable of Absorbing Shock

**HAWTHORNE, Calif., Jan. 9 (AP)—** The air force, using human guinea pigs, to prove that the human body—a leather sack with a few bones and 14 quarts of liquid—can stand crashes amazingly if properly protected.

Maj. John P. Stapp of the medical corps, who gave the description of a body in describing tests resembling plane crashes—said that on some runs of a rocket-propelled vehicle running on a track it was braked from 180 miles an hour to 75 miles an hour in one-fifth of a second. 124 like stopping an automobile going 75 miles an hour in nine feet.

Such sudden deceleration, he said, can be compared with placing a man under a mattress and placing a load of four tons on him very briefly.

After such shock tests the subjects were examined for changes in pulse, temperature, respiration, kidney function and heart action.

**NEW YORK, Jan. 9 (AP)—**Madame Chiang Kai-shek, wife of the Chinese leader, ended her 10-day American military aid visit at the Chinese pavilion, prepared today to leave her husband on commercial planes.

General Peronne "wrote some of us may be killed in the battle we're waging."

Although the "mistake" kept the city and home of her departure for Chiang's island nation, a secret, she said she would leave the home of her "mother-in-law," Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek, to the National Broadcasting network. He vowed she and the generalissimo would wage war to the death against Chinese communists and asked Americans to aid "if it is in your hearts."

# Recommendation for Government Reorganization

Legislative committee recommendation of reorganization of the state government. The report is being made to the legislature at the present session of the legislature.

## SIXTH INSTALLMENT

**Self Insurance of State Owned Buildings**  
The state pays in premiums for fire insurance protection on its state-owned buildings approximately \$100,000 annually. Your committee believes that it will be a prudent act to provide that the state shall assume its own responsibility for loss of state-owned buildings; setting up a catastrophe reserve in conjunction with the permanent building fund. The state will pay only minor losses in the past quarter of a century, while premiums have continued high. By adoption of this suggestion a reserve for fire protection and for construction of needed public buildings could be accumulated by the state.

## Conservation Officers

The committee's report shows 210 state law enforcement officers who are paid an average of \$278.60 per month. Total salaries per month are \$58,506. 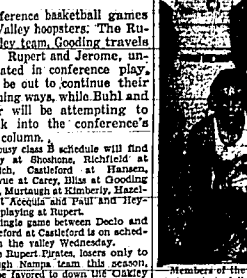

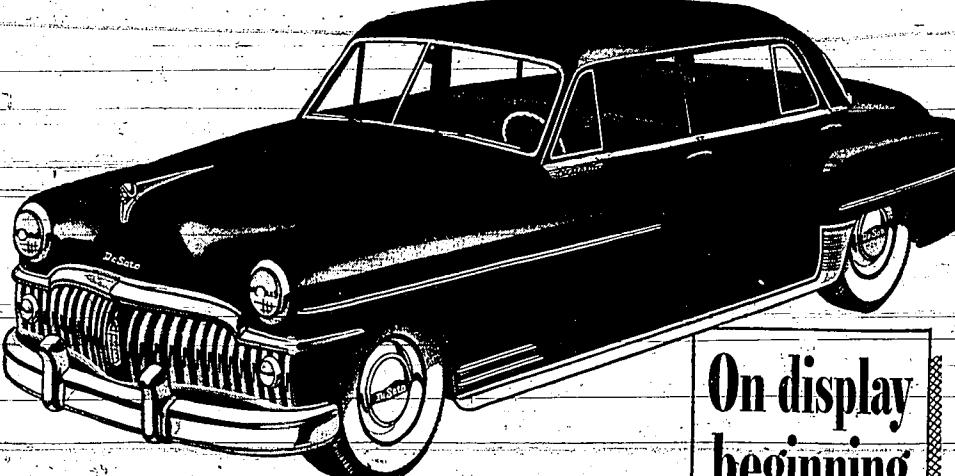
