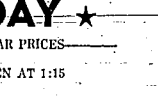

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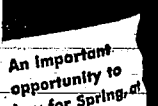

Tax Division Reports Rise in Collections

Jan. 11 (AP)—Collections in Idaho office of tax collector reported to be 1,385,400 more during last six months of 1929 than for corresponding period of 1928. P. H. Hill, head of the office, reported that the entire year collections all sources were \$1,855,372 in 1929 as against \$1,469,972 in 1928.

Tax Increases Listed

The calendar year, the license tax was \$20,000; beer tax \$207,000; punchboard tax \$14,627; and \$4,627; inheritance tax \$13,000; and \$56,128.

Because there is always the odd rumor it might be true.

And that would be as disturbing as if Robin Hood should come alive again, and lose a bow and arrow match with an unemployed Indian.

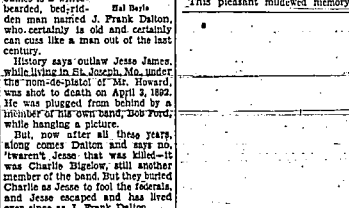
The gent who claims he's Jesse James is a white-haired, bed-ridden man named J. Frank Dalton, who certainly is old and certainly can cuss like a man out of the last century.

History says outlaw Jesse James, while living in Elk, Joseph, Mo., under the pseudonym of "Al", Howard, was shot to death on April 3, 1882. He was plucked from behind by a "bullet" that cut him "two-thirds" while hanging a picture.

But, now after all these years, along comes Dalton and says he "wasn't" Jesse that was killed—it was Charlie Sigmond, still another member of the band. But they hunted Charlie as Jesse to fool the feds, and Jesse escaped and has lived ever since as J. Frank Dalton.

If this account is true—and there are those who believe it—how are there are those who believe that if you leave a horsehair in a jar of water it will turn into a snake—old Jesse would be right onto 100 years old, something of a record in the outlaw business.

To the effect that it is a matter of mere feet whether old Frank is old Jesse, but it isn't to anyone who looks his legend in the "Museum of the James-bands." To us Jesse then was a symbol of the defeated south, a man who refused to surrender, who robbed the rich and



would be shattered mightily if it turned out that, instead of being murdered by a traitor snuck, old Jesse had been taking "it" on the lam from the law for almost 60 years. We want our James and our outlaws to die gamely—with their boots on.

Wouldn't it make you a little sick, even, to hire an elderly perchance in a suit suit 20 years from now and have him turn out to be Adolf Hitler?

Certain situations in life require certain endings. And the only way J. Frank Dalton could satisfy us he is the real Jesse James is if he were winged and captured by the FBI as he stood, six guns flaming and beard streaming in the wind, trying to hold up a train to pay off the mortgage on some poor widder's That was the Jesse we believed in, although he probably never really lived either. Stay in your grave, Jesse.

Nevada Taxes Upon Gaming Hit New High

RENO, Nev., Jan. 11 (AP)—With a resident population of only about 140,000, Nevada did well enough of legal gambling in 1929 to give mighty encouragement to his state like New York and California.

Both of the latter are dabbling with the idea of granting their own gambling laws.

Directors Fall Off

Another Nevada business, divorce and marriage, definitely fell off during 1929, but gambling hit an all-time peak, the state tax commission's records show today.

Here are some figures for the vast New York and California populations to ponder:

Nevada's treasury during 1929 received \$119,328 from state gambling taxes. In addition, the state got an estimated \$150,000 as its 25 per cent share of state tax license fees levied by the 17 counties.

This would average out about \$10 for every man, woman and child in the state.

Big Tax Tack

The remaining 75 per cent of the county license collections go 25 per cent to the counties and 50 per cent to the cities or towns in which the gambling operations are conducted.

Plus this, the cities and towns also use their own gambling licenses, keeping that revenue to themselves.

Whether the cities and towns actually make a profit from their gambling revenue is often debated. The city of Reno, for instance, has only about 40,000 residents, but maintains a police force comparable to those in cities of 200,000 to 300,000. This is because of the vast number of visitors attracted by open gambling.

The bulk of the state gambling revenue comes not from licenses but from a straight tax.

NLRB Action Against UMW Chief Is Seen

WASHINGTON, Jan. 11 (AP)—Senior Director R. H. Isaacs predicted official action later this week by the national labor relations board to get full-scale coal production under way again.

After the conference with government representatives he told reporters he is convinced the President is still unwilling to interfere in the coal dispute.

He said the NLRB action would be to force the UMW to permit work on full time.
