Tank Trucks Start Hauling Products Brought Here Through New Pipeline

BURLEY, Jan. 14—The first line from Salt Lake City to Burley was less than four months old and testing of the line started Dec. 12 and was completed Dec. 25. He explained the method of pumping the various fuels over the line.

Cuyler gave this history of the Standard Oil company operations in this area, stating that from 1930 to 1938 the area increased its consumption of gasoline from 180,000,000 gallons to 350,000,000 gallons, or 88 per cent increase. During this same period there was an increase of 251 per cent of fuel oil sales, and the consumption of furnace and diesel oil rose from an average of 823 barrels a day to more than 8,000 barrels a day.

The speaker reviewed the development of the Rangely-COLORADO field, where the crude oil is pumped through a pipeline 10 inches in diameter, a distance of 482 miles to storage at Salt Lake City.

There a new refinery has been constructed to take the crude oil and turn it into gasoline, stove oil, diesel fuel, furnace oil and industrial fuel oil. He said: "When the refinery is completed it will represent a cost of more than \$17,000,000 and more than two years of planning.

The new pipeline will serve residents of northern Utah, Idaho, and eventually eastern Oregon and eastern Washington, Cuyler said. The plan to construct the line to Boise could be carried out in a matter of weeks if the steel strike, but in the spring the work will be pushed again toward Boise and then on to the new terminal to be built at Pasco.

The oil starts flowing from the Salt Lake refinery and passes through the vicinity of Ogden and Burley, following the Snake river to Twin Falls. Its eight-inch diameter and electric weld pipe climbs to a high point of 5,600 feet near Juniper, Ida., and will be capable of transporting more than 600,000 gallons per day of products. Three powerful pumps driven by six-cylinder supercharged Diesels will maintain pressures and keep the oil moving along the way to Twin Falls," Cuyler explained.

The new facilities will give regular jobs to some 175 local people and increase this area's payroll by about \$100,000 annually. These wages and the operating supplies to be purchased locally in turn will contribute to all other businesses, he said.

In closing, Cuyler announced that the completion of the new line has brought a reduction of one-half cent per gallon of motor-gasoline and diesel, and a reduction of one-half cent a gallon on stove and turbine oils.

"While the reduction may not seem to be large on just one tankful of gasoline, the possible savings by all purchasers take on highly important significance, and according to estimated demands there would be a reduction of nearly \$500,000 annually in total supply to consumers," Don Chisholm, president of the Burley Chamber of Commerce, spoke briefly, and Lloyd Douglas, local distributor for Standard Oil had charge of arrangements and represented Mayor Joe Peters, who was unable to attend.

Company officials visited the new plant and inspected the installation there Thursday morning.

These funds are made available by the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis whose sole support is the annual march of dimes and the generous response of our people," the statement continues.

"The foundation epidemic fund has been completely exhausted. In conclusion," Schwendeman says, "in January during the 1939 march of dimes you and I along with millions of other Americans will be faced with the decision as to whether or not the National Foundation program shall have the opportunity to continue aiding Idaho's polio victims. I am certain you will agree this campaign should occupy a foremost position in our civic lives during the period of Jan. 18 to 21.

"The march of dimes is an assurance of our favorability against physical and financial ruin by an adversary which struck over 500 and killed 15 of our Idaho citizens in 1939."

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Wonder Drug Use on Cows Nets Troubles

UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO, Jan. 14.—Dairymen using penicillin streptomycin or similar materials in mastitis control were without a warning today.

They were advised to withhold from their market milk shipments the first four milkings from the treated quarter of the cow's udder. Professors Henry C. Hansen and James C. Boyd of the University of Idaho dairy husbandry department sounded the caution note.

Caused by Complication

It came as the result of cheese-maker complaints they were encountering the same trouble reported in other areas in making cheddar and cottage cheese and butter.

Some cheese vats were completely "dead." Others were slow to make and produced poor quality cheese.

Running down all possible leads, the university dairymen finally discovered the trouble came from traces of penicillin in the milk. This penicillin came from cows being treated for mastitis.

Causes Difficultly

It was found that as little as one part of milk taken from a cow 12 hours after treatment with 200,000 units of penicillin, when mixed with 99 parts of milk from untreated

Need of \$558,630 For TB Hospital Clarified at Meet

GOODING, Jan. 14.—Need for \$558,630 in state funds for improvement at the state tuberculosis hospital here was outlined at a meeting of the Gooding County Anti-Tuberculosis Association.

Dr. K. A. Tyler, medical director at the hospital, was speaker. He said \$218,000 of the total was needed to remodel and renovate the east building. This would increase bed capacity from 70 to 110 and provide living quarters for personnel.

Of the total appropriation, if approved by the state legislature, \$77,000 would be used to operate a mobile X-ray unit in the state, Dr. Tyler said.

Remaining funds would be used in operating and maintaining the state hospital.
