Heart Attack Takes Life of Bellevue Man

BEDEVUE, Jan. 1—Frank A. Clark, 75, died here last Wednesday of a heart attack. He had moved to Bellevue to retire in 1934 after selling his ranch on Silver creek.

Born at Volga city, Ia., July 16, 1874, he came west to settle on a homestead in 1892. He was married to Mrs. Leta Clark in 1902. He had two sons and two daughters.

During the 35 years he lived in the west he homesteaded in Heppner county, broke range horses to send to the Klondike gold rush and played professional baseball.

At one time he operated a livery stable in Boise valley. In 1909 he homesteaded in Camas county and moved to Bellevue in 1912. He and Meridian. He came to Silver in 1924 and farmed on Silver creek until 1934 when he retired to Bellevue.

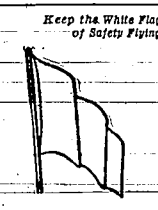

Bad Report Declares Twin Falls-Filer Highway Is "Striking Example of Poor Practice"

The Twin Falls Highway between Filer and Twin Falls is held as a "striking example of poor practice" by the Interstate Commission, according to an official report issued last week. The Interstate Commission, which is the highest authority in the United States for the regulation of interstate highways, has issued this report after a recent inspection of the highway between Filer and Twin Falls.

SEVENTH INSTALLMENT
Right-of-Way Acquisition
 Right-of-way for the present highway is performed by a city engineer, who is a direct subordinate of the director of highways and who is assisted by a staff of two technical employees and a checker. The present system of acquiring right-of-way for state highways is a makeshift system. It is normally not skilled appraisers and, in consequence, rights-of-way acquisitions can involve waste of public funds. An interest of local officials in obtaining property for state highway projects is particularly evident in Idaho, where some highway projects are undertaken exclusively of time lost in futile negotiations with owners of property titles and possession of property for highway purposes must be deferred until settlement outside of court or judgment by the courts has been made.

The objective of any right-of-way process should be to facilitate property acquisition at the minimum total cost with the maximum speed consistent with protection and fair treatment of property owners. The most efficient and modern system for accomplishing this objective is the so-called "radical" administrative method. Under this plan, the responsible administrative official, such as the director of highways, determines when property is required for public use. He approves highway project plans and causes them to be filed with the secretary of state and recorded in affected counties. This step transfers title of required properties to the state and empowers, or authorizes, the project to begin at once. Negotiations with property owners, or judicial proceedings to determine damages, transfer after transfer of title to the state and after commencement of work. This is in the public interest, because possession of property for a public purpose is public possession by default. The important thing to the owner, who is under the right of eminent domain, is to receive the full value of his property. It should be the value of the property and the amount of damages it can bear, and this can be settled after transfer of title as before.

It is common, where this method of land acquisition is used, for the state to obtain the full cost of rights-of-way for state highway purposes. This cost is paid by the state after negotiations with the property owners are commenced, and the staff of the right-of-way organization is able to develop consistent policies regarding appraisals, options, and standard values and thereby effect a substantial saving to the public. The adoption of the administrative plan of acquiring right-of-way is considered advisable in Idaho.

STRIKING EXAMPLE OF POOR PRACTICE IS THE FOUR-LANE SECTION OF THE TWIN FALLS-FILER HIGHWAY OCCUPIES THE FULL RIGHT-OF-WAY. THERE IS NO ROOM FOR SIDEWALKS AND DRAINAGE, AND CURBS ARE BUILT ALONG THE STRIKE LINES.

The basic elements of sound and effective personnel management are lacking in the bureau of highways at the present time. This lack is an important under-lying cause of the repeated charges that politics plays an undue part in highway administration. In discharging its responsibilities in connection with planning, building, and maintaining the state's highways, the bureau of highways is handicapped by the absence of the following basic requirements in personnel administration:
 1. Position classification.
 2. Recruitment and selection through merit.
 3. An equitable compensation plan.
 4. Credit provisions for employee tenure and retirement.
 5. Established training and promotional policies.
 The bureau has no assurance of obtaining the best qualified persons from among available applicants. A high level of competence among the personnel of the bureau can be assured only if concerted efforts are made to secure an adequate supply of qualified applicants for employment. The selection of the best qualified applicants should be based on an equal opportunity to compete and on relative merit and fitness. Past policies of selection, while they may have served the needs of political patronage, have also acted against the state's interests. Employees who obtained positions through political influence can be said to have had an undue influence on the job in spite of inadequate performance. Individuals capable of outstanding performance are often reluctant to work in such an environment.

flexibility in adjusting the over-all pay levels to changing economic conditions.
 4. An actuarially sound retirement plan that provides reasonable pension benefits be initiated.
 5. Regular planned programs of in-service training be made available to all employees of the department, and definite standards of promotion be established.
 It is recommended that the merit system could be legally sanctioned, that it be given authority for additional functions, such as classification, rating and training, and that the department of highways be required to make use of its facilities.

Reporting and Public Relations
 One of the most neglected aspects of highway administration in Idaho is the attention given to keeping the press and the public informed of highway projects and accomplishments, and to the relationship between the bureau of highways and other units of government. It is recommended that, as a step toward improving this situation, an administrative assistant be appointed and assigned the duties described below. This administrative assistant would normally be part of the staff of the administrative director, but much of his work would be directly for and on behalf of the commission of highways.

PLANNING AND TRAFFIC ENGINEERING
 Planning, as the function applied to highways in Idaho, has not been completely effective. The state does not have specific long-range forecasts for the orderly development and improvement of the highways; its short-term programs are confined generally to the scheduling of those projects which are financed in part with federal-aid primary and secondary funds.
 Under the proposed plan of organization the present planning unit of the bureau of highways would be elevated to a position of greater importance and be made responsible for long-range planning. This unit would also embrace traffic engineering in addition to continuing with its present functions.
 One of the initial steps of the new planning unit should be the development of long-range and short-term schedules for the improvement of the state's highways and other units of government. It is recommended that traffic studies should be made as a major index of need, but other factors, such as forest protection, timber yield, military, social, and recreational values, and other factors, should be given due consideration. The geographical distribution of proposed improvements should be evaluated, but emphasis should not be placed on it at present—unless the division of projects among political jurisdictions.
 The planning group should have general plans for road highway projects for a period of not less than five years and specific plans for road improvement, including priority of construction, extending over a period of not less than two years. The work with respect to programs should be continuous in nature so that at any time projections for improvement over any specified period of time could be developed quickly.
 The long-range and short-term plans prepared by the planning division, after review by the highway advisory board and approval by the commissioner of highways, would be followed specifically by the design and construction units of the department in scheduling and performing their work.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 19 (AP)—Republican leaders were divided today over how specific they should get in framing a platform and party policies for the 1950 congressional campaign.

A 15-member group named by the GOP national committee is meeting here to receive suggestions for the document. They had a caucus yesterday and planned another today. They are pooling their views with those of similar senate and house committees.

National Chairman Guy Gabrielson opened the subcommittee sessions with a prediction the three groups would draw a "definite and sound and convincing" declaration—ones which would bring such strength to the party it would regain control of congress next November.

The Gabrielsons' demand call for a specific statement clashed with the course advocated by Senator Millikin, who has a broad base of support among the front-line-lawmakers here and principles—one that would not affect the votes of any member of congress on pending bills that relate to the senate policy-drafting group.

Also, Senator Millikin, Colorado, chairman of the conference of all republican senators, told a reporter any policy statement will have to have advance approval of candidates before it is adopted.

Sen. Millikin said he was up for reelection this year. Millikin said all of them will get a crack at the platform before it goes to the entire senate-republican membership.
