Rejected in 1941
Twin Falls voted to continue "dry" at the first local option vote on June 17, 1917. The "votes" carried by a majority margin at a special election. A total of 4,882 votes was cast on the issue.
A vote of 1,393 was to be proper to owners, Mrs. Leber said. They must, however, meet the resident requirement. Anyone who has lived in 10 general municipal elections will be allowed to vote unless he has been previously rejected. Special elections are held in April to elect a new council and in December to select the city manager commisioner.

- The number of licenses be limited to 11, in addition to fraternal and veterans' organizations with national affiliations of at least 5 years.

- No blind windows permitted.
- No card playing or gambling permitted.
- Licenses limited to only one to any person or firm.
- Bars must be closed Sundays, Holidays, general or primary election days, and from 1:00 A.M. to 10:00 A.M. on all other days.

The provisions of such an ordinance will not permit saloons in our city—neither will monopolies be permitted, nor will our business district be ruined. We sincerely feel that with such regulations, our city will have better law enforcement than is now possible.

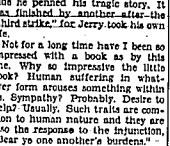

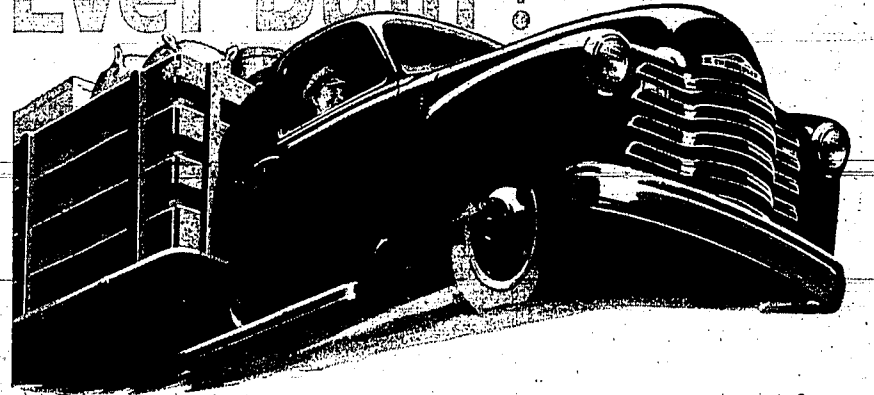

Lack of Sound Personnel Policy in Highway Department Criticized Again in Road Report

HIGHWAY MAINTENANCE

Much of the responsibility for maintenance of state highways in Idaho is delegated to five district engineers whose counties are as follows: 1. Inspection of federal-aid highways, and the maintenance of the same in accordance with the standards of maintenance. 2. With the assistance of the traffic engineer, supervision of the production and repair of signs and pavement markings which are handled on a statewide basis with the state as a headquarters. 3. Control of other traffic engineering activities—minor responsibility, since this work is directed for the most part by the traffic engineer, who has considerable latitude for independent action. 4. Inspection and liaison with the district engineers—supervision of all state highway maintenance activities. The district engineers, for the most part, control the nature and scope of routine maintenance.

State Highway Districts

A detailed appraisal of the existing geographical division of the state for maintenance purposes indicates that districts 1, 2 and 3 are very large, whereas districts 4 and 5 embrace areas and road mileage which are susceptible to reasonably adequate control from a single headquarters. Personnel Policies

The maintenance operations of highways are adversely affected to a greater degree than any other of its functions by the lack of

a sound personnel policy. With change in administration, most maintenance employees go to and including turnover and sometimes higher than the rest of this wholesale turnover cannot be specifically expressed in terms of dollars, but the fact that the gross cost of the state road high program cannot be so stated in fact. Maintenance Costs per Mile for some of the major routes on the state highway system were compiled by maintenance sections and compared with the average mile costs for the same sections. The data are as follows:

1. A considerable amount of money has been expended in unsuccessfully attempting to maintain in good condition certain road sections which should have been replaced by reconstruction. 2. Expenditures on many sections which carry little traffic are continuously high. 3. The cost of maintaining forest highways, some of which are unpaved, is so high as to be a serious problem.

There is a need for the department to make continuing statistical studies—which is not now done—for the purpose of evaluating the relative cost and effectiveness of maintenance work among various types of road surfaces, traffic loads and districts and among sections within districts.

REORGANIZATION FOR MAINTENANCE ACTIVITIES

Under the reorganization proposed earlier, all state highway maintenance activities would be supervised by a chief maintenance engineer, who would be responsible for the maintenance of the state highway system. The chief maintenance engineer would have the authority over the district engineers, and his major responsibilities would be as follows:

1. Preparation of annual maintenance budgets for review and approval of the commissioners of highways, and for several months subsequent to a change in elective officials while new workers become acquainted with their jobs.
2. Supervision of district reporting methods to insure the availability of adequate cost and statistical data for control and planning purposes and to determine of performance within and among districts.
3. Development of maintenance standards.
4. Highway inspection.
5. Supervision of material procurement, assignment, use, transfer, and disposal, with the aid of an equipment supervisor.
6. Selection of highways to be posted for load limits below statutory requirements, and the installation of load limits to be set for such highways.
7. Issuance of permits for extraordinary highway use.
8. Roadside improvement.
9. Supervision of the central sign shop and pavement-stripping crews which would be assigned to district No. 1 for administrative purposes.

Under the proposed arrangement, the district engineers would be relieved of responsibility for design and construction and would devote all of their time and efforts to maintenance work.

Conditions of Equipment

A considerable amount of the equipment in the possession of the bureau of highways is antiquated and in poor condition. Examination of the available records indicates that the cost of operating and maintaining the older units is relatively high.

Earnings derived from the older equipment—based on hours worked and established rental rates—are low.

The work load is inequitably distributed among equipment units, and the older equipment being reserved for operation during periods of peak activity.

Repair of Equipment

Most of the repair work required on highway bureau equipment is performed by personnel employed by the bureau, using state-owned shop facilities. The services of private repair shops are used occasionally under contract.

Each of the five state highway districts has shop facilities located in the following places: 1. Headquarters at Boise, Idaho; 2. Headquarters at Shoshone, Idaho; 3. Headquarters at Pocatello, Idaho; 4. Headquarters at Idaho Falls, Idaho; 5. Headquarters at Twin Falls, Idaho.

REPORTS, RECORDS, AND ACCOUNTS

The theory used by the bureau of highways in reporting equipment use is that the district engineers should be held responsible for the accuracy of the report forms which have been adopted. This is of relatively minor importance, since the district engineers are not in a position to check the accuracy of the reports which must be carefully prepared to insure the accuracy of the accounting records of the central office.

District Building Facilities

Each of the five districts has shop facilities in the community in which its headquarters are located. In general, the shops are approximately two miles from the district headquarters. In the other districts the shops are located in the nearest town or city.

The bureau's district headquarters and shop facilities at Coeur d'Alene, Idaho, is the only one of the district headquarters and shops in Idaho which are suitable structures, but they are located in a cramped and congested area. In Lewiston, the district shop facilities are well located, but the district headquarters is in an area suited for residences. It is planned, however, to locate the Lewiston headquarters adjacent to the shops where suitable space is available. 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Big Payoff on Bonds Facing U. S. in 1950

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21 (AP)—The government faces this year the first \$1,000,000,000 payoff on the small-time savings bonds it has been selling since 1935.

Treasury officials here report, however, that paying off the fully insured bonds isn't any great problem.

Current sales, they explained, are running so much higher than cash-in-of unexpired bonds that the net intake has been covering most payments on bonds that have been held the full 10 years.

Peace-time Record

The net last year was a peacetime record for people bought \$429,000,000 in new series E bonds while redeeming only \$344,000,000 in E bonds, with the treasury began selling May 1, 1941.

The approximately \$100,000,000 in E bonds which were sold by the treasury exceeded cash-in-of E bonds during 1949 was a 53 per cent gain over 1948, although 1948 record high sales topped 1949 by 0.4 per cent.

To Become Acute

The problem of paying off maturing savings bonds is going to become progressively acute until 1954, when E bond maturities are scheduled to reach a peak of \$527,550,000 in reflection of wartime 1944's heavy sales.

The treasury has sold almost \$53,000,000,000 in small-size savings bonds since it started in 1935 with the series A issue and followed up with series B, C, D and the current E bond.
