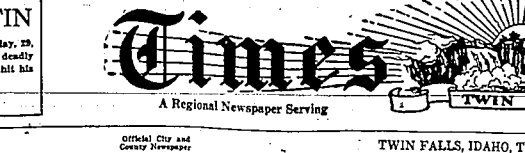

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'No Harm' Is Seen in Steel Hike

WASHINGTON, Jan. 24 (AP) - President Benjamin Fairless of U. S. Steel corporation told a congressional committee today the recent steel price rise should cause no "harmful effect whatsoever" on price levels in other industries.

Any upward changes added the head of "big steel" will be due more to increased labor, transportation and other costs, than to any change in the price of steel.

Fairless said the price boom his company suffered was "made necessary by heavy increases in our costs. This is the simplest explanation."

He said U. S. Steel's cost costs have risen about 10 percent in the closing months of last year and that freight and other costs were up nearly 43 percent.

However, he pegged the price hike solely on the pension and insurance programs.

Tucker Faces More Suits in Auto Venture

CHICAGO, Jan. 24 (AP)— Preston Tucker, acquitted on mail fraud charges, was in another courtroom yesterday.

... involved an Indiana farm he bought and a corn crop he sold. It was a no decision affair, however, and Tucker, in his luxurious gold coat apartment, later told his reporters:

"The next thing I want to do is to go buy and build Tucker cars."

His lawyers, elated over their Sunday triumph in federal court, still have some lesser legal matters to tangle with.

Other Suits Pending

Among them are old suits to take Tucker's car (the one he rides in), his Lake Shore drive apartment and his furniture, and some \$130,000 in cash, and to throw him into jail.

A lawyer for a Noblesville, Ind., woman tried to put Tucker behind bars yesterday, less than 24 hours after the president of the unsuccessful Tucker corporation and seven associates were found innocent of federal mail fraud and conspiracy charges.

Farm Not Paid

Mrs. Justina O. Perkins asked a municipal court judge to throw Tucker in jail for failure to pay a 1949 judgment for \$3,527. She claims it is due her as unpaid balance on a farm she sold him and on sale of the farm's corn crop.

The hearing was continued to Thursday.

Meanwhile, Norman Nachman, attorney for trustees of the firm, said he plans a civil suit against Tucker to obtain about \$30,000 to meet stockholder, dealer and other creditor claims.

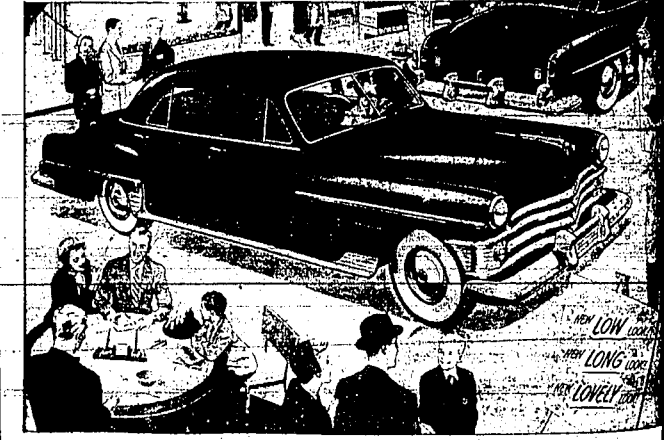

Project Completed to Improve Living Quarters at Twin Falls Fire Station



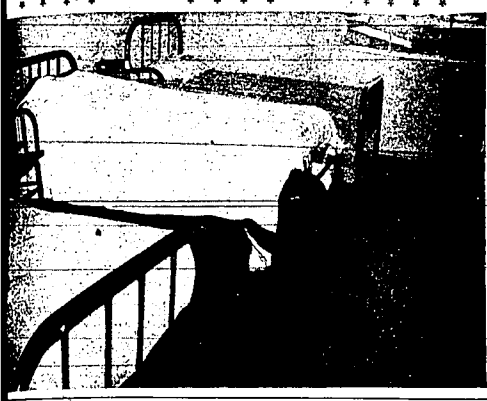

Twin Falls Firemen Move Into Station's New Living Quarters

Twin Falls firemen have moved into new, clean living quarters built on the back of the old fire station after many years of daily life in quarters that had seen little change since the time horses were stabled in the building.

The new living unit, composed of a kitchen, two dormitory bedrooms and a lavatory and shower room, has been under construction for several months under the supervision of the city building inspector. Cost of the work was about \$12,000, according to Blaine Swann, building inspector.

Formula for Revenue Distribution Outlined by Experts in Highway Department Survey

(Editor's Note: Distribution of improvement revenue to city, county and state is a somewhat intricate subject. The highway department has prepared a report which is particularly significant. It is suggested that readers of this issue refer to the report for further information.)

ELEVENTH INSTALLMENT

Highway-user revenues to be shared.

There appears to be no clearly defined principle underlying the present practice in Idaho of apportioning each type of highway-user revenue account as follows: (1) to the county in some instances transmitting only a portion of their collections to the state; (2) highway-user revenues such as tolls and therefor should be cleared in total through the state treasury. The following is recommended:

1. All highway-user revenues, including the full amount of all such revenues as tolls, motor-vehicle use taxes, motor-vehicle registration fees, special taxes on auto transportation companies, and all other fees or charges incidental to the regulation or use of motor vehicles on the highways.)
2. The following is recommended with respect to expenditures from the highway-user fund:
 - a. Appropriations made by the legislature to state agencies engaged in the enforcement of highway laws and in the administration and collection of highway taxes should be made from the highway-user fund, and only the residue remaining in the fund should be deemed available for apportionment to state and local highway agencies.
 - b. The central accounting records of the state should adequately reflect all transactions in the highway-user fund, and the following is recommended:

3. The state auditor should record all transactions affecting the highway-user fund on a double-entry basis, should establish such revenue accounts as will clearly show the amount of each type of highway-user revenue deposited in the fund, and should establish separate accounts for each local unit of government, showing the amount apportioned to each from this fund.

Basis for Determining the State's Share

If all types of highway-user revenues are placed in a common pool, as recommended above, the amount according to the state should logically be set at a fixed percentage of the net balance in the highway-user fund, and the following is recommended:

1. Thirty per cent of the net balance in the highway-user fund on March 31, June 30, Sept. 30, and Dec. 31 of each year should be set aside for distribution to local units of government.
2. The remainder on each of the above dates should be transferred to the state highway fund to be used solely for the administration, maintenance, construction, and development of highways in the state system.

Elements of an Apportionment Formula

The 30 per cent share of highway-user revenues recommended for local governments should be divided among them in a manner that will best underwrite the development of a balanced and integrated system of secondary roads in the state. Road needs should be the criterion, but uniformity there is no ready-made yardstick for measuring precisely the relative road needs of two dissimilar areas, so that an equitable formula has to be derived through a common-sense approach.

The components of an apportionment formula should be based on statistical information that measures, to some extent, the characteristics of different localities and their relative needs for highway transportation. The statistical information used should be of a type that is compiled regularly and is unequivocal in the sense that it cannot be manipulated or distorted to the interest of persons. It is essential that one or more components of a formula be based on statistical data that reflect changing conditions, for otherwise the formula would be unsatisfactory after the lapse of a few following years.

Among the 46 state governments there are seven factors that are commonly used for measuring road needs. These factors are registration, road mileage, equal division, population, equal valuation, and local revenue from gasoline sales. In practice, two or more of these factors are usually brought together as components of an apportionment formula, but in one of them alone can be considered a precise formula denominator of road needs, particularly if localities differ from one another, especially in physical or economic characteristics.

Examination of Factors for a Formula

The factors most suitable for consideration in Idaho are: registration, population, road mileage, and equal division. All are based on readily available data that are not subject to manipulation at the source. Registration and population reflect substantially the same thing as far as road needs are concerned, with registration the preferred measure. Road mileage obviously bears a close relationship to road needs; and equal division, being a fixed factor, can serve to temper the effect of the variable factors in a formula.

The other three factors do not appear adaptable to Idaho. The area factor and the assessed valuation factor bear little relationship to road being subject to possible manipulation. The inclusion of motor vehicle tax on gasoline sales is unsuitable because it would give unbalanced weight

to those counties traversed by major trunk-line routes and would not reflect relative local rural highway needs. No breakdown of gasoline sales by local area is available for Idaho.

A Formula for Distribution to Cities

Some rather empirical decisions are necessary in weighing and bringing together suitable factors as components of a formula. The differences among Idaho cities are not so pronounced but that population alone could be used as a measure of road needs; the only point to be determined is the proportion of the total local government share that should go to cities and the minimum population required for eligibility. The following is recommended:

1. Four per cent of the local government share should be divided among cities of 2,000 or more population in the proportion that the population in each bears to the total population of all cities of this class.
2. The 4 per cent figure approximately, as nearly as can be determined, the percentage that the total number of miles of improved streets in municipalities of this size bears to the aggregate of the mileage in improved local rural roads and improved city streets in the state.

This money should be allocated to cities for street purposes with no particular strings attached, but the intent of the allocation is to provide cities, faced with a growing problem of metropolitan traffic congestion, some added resources with which to undertake the reconstruction of major streets and to match federal funds in the PAB and PAV programs. Furthermore, it would be inopportune not to allocate some highway-user revenues to cities in view of the previous recommendations that the state should no longer be required to contribute funds to urban projects not on the state highway system.

A Formula for Distribution to Counties

The differences among Idaho counties in respect to area, climate, terrain, natural wealth, density of population, and economic pursuits are so pronounced as to rule out the possibility that any single factor could be used as the sole basis for measuring the relative road needs of the 44 counties in the state. After 4 per cent of the local government share has been allocated to cities, it is recommended that the remainder be apportioned to counties on the following basis:

1. Ten per cent divided equally among the 44 counties.
2. Forty-five per cent divided among the counties in the proportion that the revenue derived from the registration of motor vehicles in each county bears to the total of such revenues from all counties.
3. Forty-five per cent divided among the counties in the proportion that

the total miles of improved rural roads under local control actually bears to the total of such mileage in all counties.

An important objective of the proposed formula is to enable each unit of government to accept full financial responsibility for the roads in its designated system. It is urged again that the money thus allocated be spent solely for the construction and maintenance of highways in the particular road system for which the recipient government is held responsible. Financial and operating responsibilities should never be separated except under the most extraordinary circumstances.

FINANCING HIGHWAY IMPROVEMENTS

Substantial improvements in Idaho highways depend not only on ability and willingness of the people to pay more for highways and upon the ability of highway officials to develop a satisfactory plan and then to adhere to the broad objective of the plan over a period of time.

A REVENUE PLAN

The question naturally arises as to whether the yield from present sources is sufficient to develop and maintain a satisfactory system of state and local roads. There is abundant evidence that it is not. It is doubtful whether tinkering with the revenue structure will produce appreciable results unless recommendations made elsewhere in this report with respect to abolishing local highway districts, strengthening highway law, changing the administrative alignment of the highway organization, installing a personnel system for state highway plays, and revising the method of apportioning highway-user revenues, taken in the face of this, it would be difficult to justify any plan to provide for additional revenue unless these changes are made.

Basis of Need for Additional Revenue

It is true that present highway revenues could be made to produce a satisfactory result in the way of improvements if the present standards within a reasonable time. The funds offered are based on the premise that an additional \$2,000,000 will be raised annually from the state and local road systems. If the apportionment recommended earlier is adopted, the additional \$2,000,000 will be as follows: \$1,400,000 to the state and \$600,000 to local governments. (Concluded tomorrow)

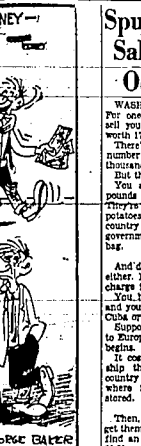

Spud Surplus Sales Present Odd Problem

WASHINGTON, Jan. 24 (AP)—For one cent the government will sell you a brand new burp sack worth 10 cents.

There's practically no limit to the number you can buy—hundreds, thousands, millions.

But there's a catch to it. You also have to take the 100 pounds of potatoes in the bag. There's one more catch: If the potatoes or its any other crop in the country eat them. If you do, the government will charge you \$3 per bushel.

Can't Throw Away
And don't try to throw them away either. If you do, the government charges \$1 per bag.

You have to export the potatoes and you can't ship them to Canada, Cuba or the Caribbean.

Suppose you decide to send them to Europe. That's when your troubles begin.

It cost about 30 cents per bag to ship the potatoes to port from country shipping points in Idaho where most of the potatoes are stored.

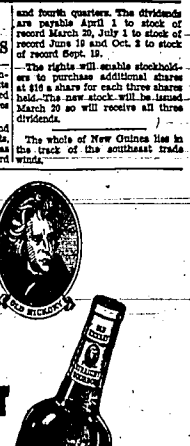
Export Doubtful
Then, it costs another \$1.50 to get them across the ocean. If you can find a European buyer who'll pay \$1.81 per bag, which officials say is doubtful, you'll break even.

Not so little Sam. He loses \$2.00 on every 100-pound bag you buy. The one-cent export deal is part of the government's program to get rid of potatoes or its any other crop in the country at any cost. Officials doubt it will help dispose of any of them.

I have just finished "A Mencken Christmas" (to me one of the most delightful books of 1949) and was surprised that in his flogging of the unions, the stupid, the pious, and the hand-scrubbers, the "age of Baltoomer" had not had the same-same status to amateur athletic officials.

I can only surmise that Mr. Mencken has never known any amateur athletic officials. Otherwise he would have lambasted them to kingdom-come and back-spring neither his strength of arm nor mind.

In 22 years as a newspaperman, 12 of which were spent as a sports writer, I can truthfully say that the most disagreeable people I met were those middle-aged and beyond men who were in charge of amateur sports: be it the sport tennis or football.

Exceptions, yes. But how many times did you ever find a \$100 bill which was spent as a sports writer when you were rummaging through the pockets of an old coat?

Today's column was prompted by the recent meeting of the National Collegiate Athletic Association in New York City. Despite the water-cherishes, they saw fit to wash their dirty linen. Or, to put it better,

lions of dollars out of great football and basketball teams will come to their senses and, with a tinge of conscience head round the world, try to help the halfbacks and forwards they forget on graduation day.

How much money would you guess that such schools as USC, Notre Dame, Michigan, Alabama, Tennessee, Ohio State, Texas, Pennsylvania, Army, Navy, said a score of others have made from the skill of athletes? I won't tell you in detail what the sanity code is, because to do that a man would have to become a child again and when I start playing with rocks the last one to show about it will be my teacher.

But, roughly speaking, the sanity code says how much a college can pay an athlete, how much food a college can give him for free, how nice a college can be to an athlete when he is quit with high school and looking for a place to use his muscle and speed and coordination, and at the same time acquire a little education.

The NCAA Napoléons want every college to sign a paper saying this is what I'll do, this is what I won't do, and if anyone violates this slip of paper he is a cheat and a fraud and undermining Fort Knox, and Washington's reputation, the constitution, and the White House.

What nonsense! What childish, silly day-dreaming by men who, for the most part, run their own football or basketball or baseball on the head-chains that stir war for yards across their stomachs.

Anyone with a grain of sense in his head knows that good athletic teams are paid for. No accidental benefits in his line. Heavily underpaid, too. Sometimes the colleges which have made millions and mil-
