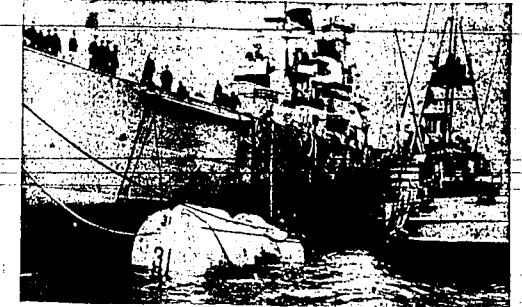

Snow Depths for Rock Creek Are Under '49 Totals

Rock creek snow depths are far below those of this time last year, about equal to the average since 1946, Wayne J. Cloward, forest ranger for the Cascade National Forest, said today.

The average depth on Jan. 23 was 36 inches with a water content of 6.25 inches, he said. On Jan. 23, 1949, the average depth on the course was 64 inches with a water content of 10.5 inches. The five year average for the latter part of January is 38 inches with nine inches of water content.

Cloward pointed out that more snow is needed to provide ample water from the watershed. However, the snowfall from Jan. 21 to 23 was 17 inches, indicating prospects for more late snow, he said.

A portable potato washer, said by its manufacturers to be the first one built in Twin Falls, was designed and built by the Douglas Machine shop. According to C. B. Baldwin, shop owner, there has been only one company besides his own in the west to manufacture such a washer. Baldwin is quick to point out the advantages he has incorporated into his machine over the other make.

The outstanding reason for potato washer, the shop owner says, is that washed potatoes will in. Cut also for 25 cents a sack more than the unwashed variety. By having a portable washer that will go right into the cellar where potatoes and the sorter are located, the operator can save an additional 15 cents per 100 pounds by eliminating the handling normally needed to move sacks to a washer. Baldwin says.

The first apparent feature of the locally-built machine is its small size and light weight. Baldwin and one helper will move it around readily to show the ease of handling. The original washer is about the same width as an automobile and subsequent models will be narrower by another six inches. Idaho Firms Saving in New Rate in Table

BOISE, Feb. 1 (AP)—Idaho businesses will be saved up to \$1,500,000 under the new rate schedule recently approved by the Federal Reserve Board, according to a study published at headquarters in Boise.

The ruling tables provide a low rate for the majority of firms which have started a stabilizing influence on employment according to Executive Director T. G. Osborn of the agency.

7 Per Cent Kept

Under the Federal social security law the employers are required to contribute up to three per cent of the payroll to U. S. and state funds. However, the Federal contribution is only three-tenths of one per cent, remaining two and seven-tenths of any portion of it remains with the state.

Under the new rate schedule contributions are set by the state legislature and decrease according to the rating cards if the employer has had five years' experience and three, eight or more years' experience are made yearly but are based on the average payroll for the past three years. They cannot be extended to the employer prior to March 31, as he can pay his first quarterly installment.

Tables Set at 1943

The first experience rating tables were set up in Idaho in 1943 in the legislature and were based on minimum rate up to 10 per cent, where it stands at the present time. However, the new tables and experience ratings must pay the full two and seven-tenths rate.

Osborn said, "Even though Idaho is the only state in the country to employ the experience rating cards in its employment, the plan was worked out through the cooperation of the state employers and the state public."

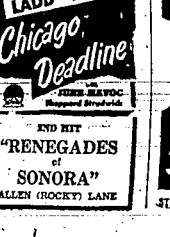

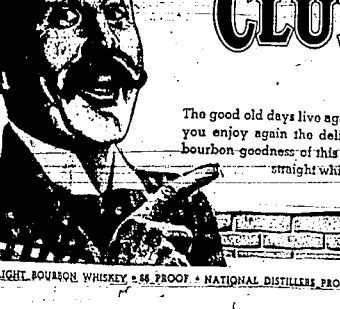

Bomb Process Could Involve Atom Fusion

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1 (AP)—Now that President Truman has directed the atomic team to try to develop a hydrogen bomb, the attempt may follow one of two paths.

An effort to shortcut the process by which the sun and other stars get their atomic energy through the "fusion" or combining of hydrogen atoms to form a new substance.

"Bombardment of the elements known with hydrogen atoms would take place in a compound containing the two."

Primer Needed

In either case, it may be presumed that an orthodox atomic bomb of uranium or plutonium would be necessary as a "primer" or "trigger" to start the super-explosive.

The starting of the nuclear chain reaction of the hydrogen in the stars and oceans, the only limitation of the explosion is the amount of hydrogen practically and delivered on a large scale.

Yast Energy Released

The unfulfilled wish is that a bomb employing the fusion of deuterium would release eight times as much energy as a uranium or plutonium bomb containing an equivalent weight of potentially explosive material.
