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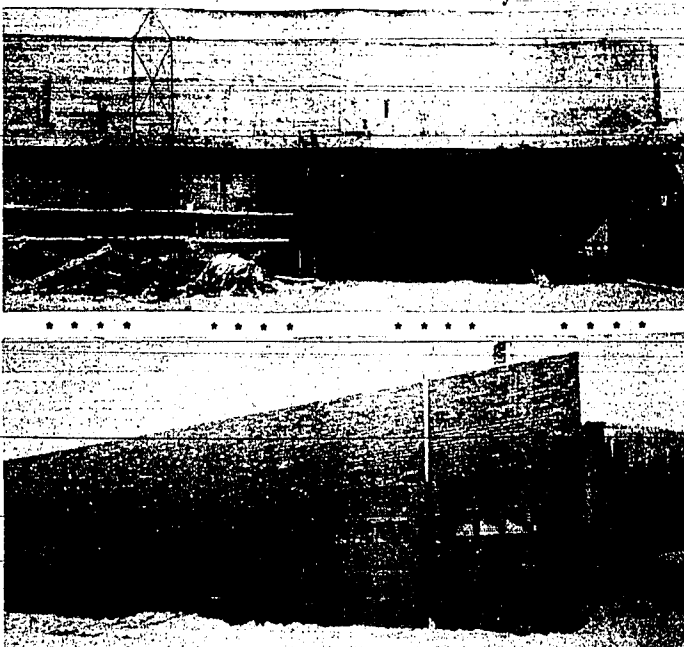
March Extended for Kupert Area

Large Building Being Erected At Burley Despite Cold Days

BURLEY, Feb. 6—Being rushed to completion is the new Burley fire department building on the corner of Oakley avenue and 13th street, which will be one of the most modern fire department buildings in the state, according to city officials.

The structure which is located on the site of the Taylor garage, is constructed of brick, with stairs for the two city fire trucks and the new rural fire truck which is housed and manned by the city. There will be storage space for city equipment as well as room for repairing of trucks and other city vehicles.

The building is modern in design, with the windows on the east side of the building made of glass brick about half-way up. The building arrangement was designed by W. L. Lewis, city engineer.

The city maintains two fire trucks, with Ota Williams as fire chief, while the new fire truck owned by the Snake River Mutual, is housed by the city and is available as an auxiliary fire fighting unit if needed within the city as well as on rural rural runs.

The new Skaggs-Sawney building, under construction on Himes avenue, represents the largest building permit granted by the city during 1949—\$75,000. The new market will be one of the most modern in this area. Constructed of cinder blocks, the building is approximately 75 feet wide and 125 long. Part of the front is bricked in, while the remainder is open for a large entryway.

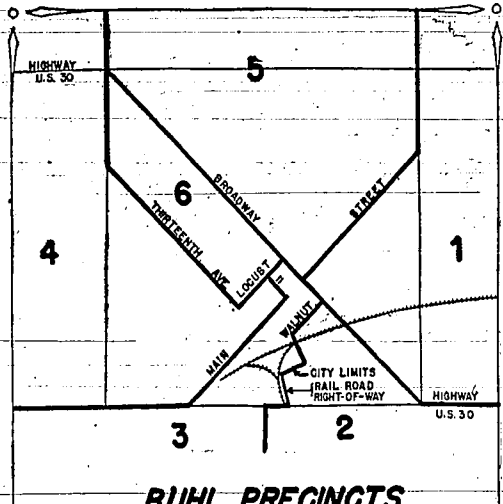

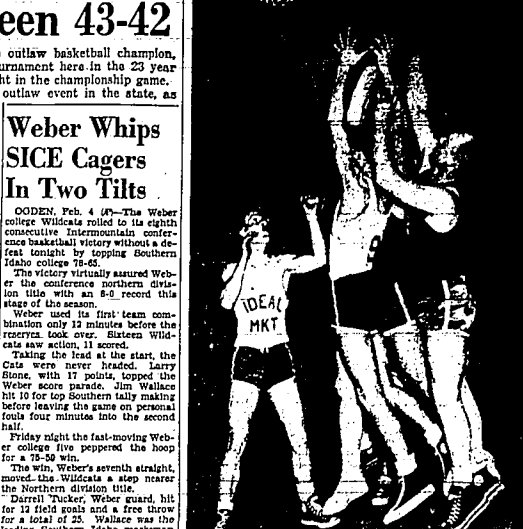

New Boiler Heats School



A new 15-pound pressure heating boiler has been placed in operation at Washington school to replace the one which supplied heat for the classroom since 1916. New Heating Unit's Installation Finished at Washington School

Washington grade school in Twin Falls has completed installation of its new heating unit designed to heat both the old building and the new addition. Installation of the boiler unit and connecting pipes cost approximately \$23,000.

The heating system was installed by the Home Plumbing and Heating company on a contract for about \$20,000. The boiler house and chimney, to the rear of the school, were built by Fitzpatrick and Walker, contractors, at an estimated cost of \$2,000.

The new boiler is of the 15-pound low-pressure type designed to heat 11,000 square feet of floor space with an output of 3,500 British thermal units each hour. It has been connected to the radiator lines and unit system of the old building and the radiant heat system in new sections of the school.

The boiler is in a reinforced concrete building located away from the classroom buildings. A 48-foot chimney rises over the building.

The old boiler for the school's heating system was located in the basement of the main building directly under the auditorium. Purpose of the new boiler house away from the school is to lessen the danger of injury in case of an explosion. Ed Wattle, school janitor, points out an explosion of the old boiler during an assembly could have been catastrophic.

The old boiler was installed when the original school building was built in 1916. It also was a 15-pound pressure boiler.

Installers cannot recall its specifications but say it used only about 450 pounds of coal an hour compared to about 700 an hour for the new boiler.

Output of heat is usually relative to coal input, so the new unit should be about half again as adequate as
