Ruling Backs Solons' Right In Sugar Act

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7 (AP)—RIGHTEOUSLY the court today ruled against the amount of refined sugar which Puerto Rico may ship to the U. S. mainland will be upheld by the supreme court.

Justice Frankfurter, speaking for the court, said congress had the power to regulate the refining of sugar even if the legislation brought slight hardship to individual sugar companies.

Referred to Congress "this court is not a tribunal for the court and the equities of complicated experimental economic legislation... the issue was thrown out by congress; congress is the place for its reconsideration," Frankfurter said.

The United government had attacked the constitutionality of the 1948 federal sugar act, and two Puerto Rican senators had urged the court to strike out the allocations to refineries which the U. S. secretary of agriculture made under that act.

The court held that the act was constitutional and ruled that the secretary of agriculture had the authority to regulate the refining of sugar which congress laid down when he fixed allocations for Puerto Rican plantations.

Justice Black dissented. He said he would have upheld a decision of the U. S. court of appeals here. The appeals court ruled that the secretary exceeded his authority under the act, but it did not pass upon validity of the law itself.

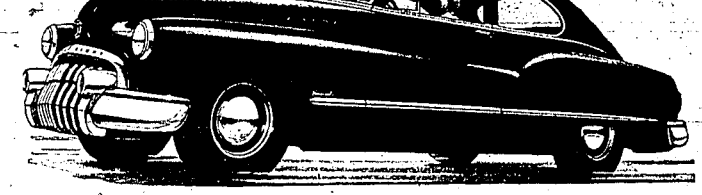

Navy Reveals Powerful New Plane Rocket

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7 (AP)—A powerful aircraft engine, the "mighty midget" as it has been named, has been developed by the navy for airplane use. It is the first of a new line of engines that will be used in the "mighty midget" rocket plane.

The department sketched this picture of the new development: It has a greater speed and range than aircraft rockets developed during World War II.

It is small enough to be carried in quantity by its "mother" aircraft, and is powerful enough to destroy any known plane with a direct hit.

The new rockets may be fired singly or in salvo from the launcher, which is attached to the airplane wings or to its fuselage. The department said: "They are aimed by aiming the wings or fuselage at the target."

The department called it the "first major step toward the 'mighty midget' as designed for use as a new type airplane rocket launcher.
