WASHINGTON, Feb. 8 (AP)—John L. Lewis and soft coal operators agreed today to resume direct negotiations this afternoon at the request of President Truman's fact-finding board. The board, set up under the Taft-Hartley law, did not ask Lewis to send his 400,000 striking miners back to work. The request—and agreement—to resume direct contract negotiations came less than two hours after the board began hearing both sides in the contract dispute. The renewed negotiations collapse, and operators were not hopeful they would be so easy, said President Truman. He said he would order next Monday an effort to get miners back on the job for about 30 days.

## 550,000 Idled By Tiemp's of Mines, Autos

Railroads selected coal in trucks to keep trains running. The nation had only a day's supply of coal, well below the 25-day supply of oil. In addition to those idled by the mine strike, more than 125,000 persons were idled because of the work stoppage in the auto industry. ### Legality of 1947's Justice Age Law Queried in Court

BOISE, Feb. 8 (AP)—Constitutionality of the 1947 law prohibiting district judges over 70 years of age to seek reelection was attacked in a hearing before the state supreme court yesterday.

The high tribunal took the case under advisement after W. F. McNaughton, Coeur d'Alene attorney and former judge, told the court that the state constitution prescribed in detail the qualifications for district judges.

His brief in the suit brought by District Judge E. V. Boughton, Sandpoint, against Secretary of State A. D. Price contended that the legislation was without authority to prescribe the additional requisite that judges must not have passed their 70th birthday.

Attorney Robert E. Smylie defended the law's validity and two Boise attorneys, E. B. Smith and Robert H. Coppie, represented the Idaho Bar association as friends of the court. They defended the act.

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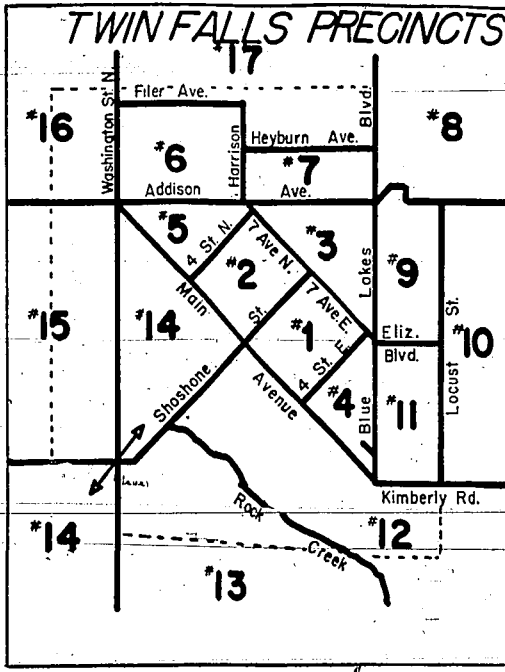

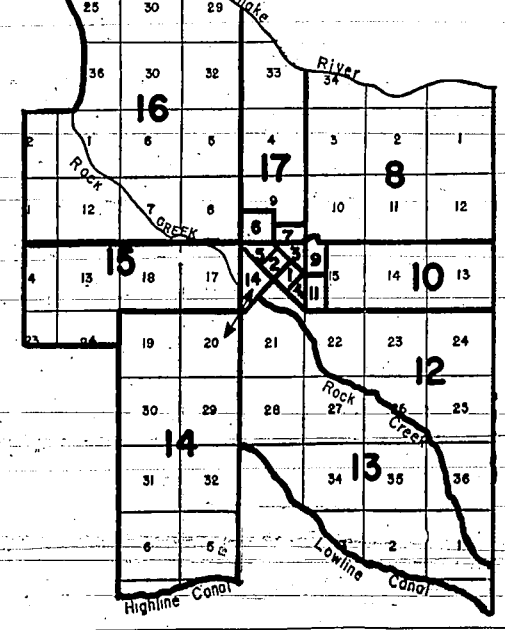

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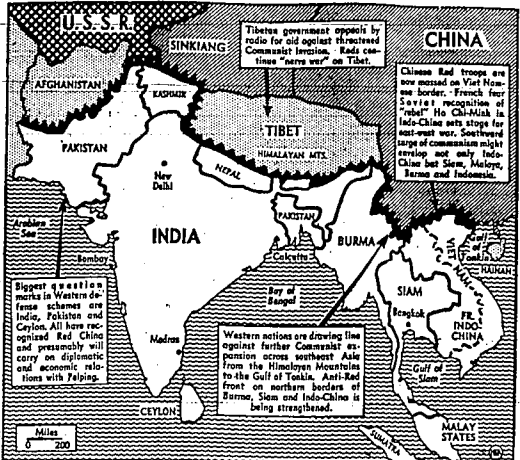
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Southeast Asia Girds for 'Red Trouble'

Forest Fires  
For Idaho in  
1949 Double

BOISE, Feb. 8 (AP)—Water on state and private forest and watershed land in Idaho during the 1949 fire season doubled that of 1948, state forester George Gurnsey said today.

However, the acreage burned was less than half that of the average for the past five years.

Gurnsey said 646 fires burned on state and private land last year, destroying 46,776 acres of timber.

In 1948 there were only 316 fires, but they burned 54,193 acres of forest.

The average for the past five years has been 637 fires burning 50,305 acres of timber.

Smokers, who Gurnsey said have been the greatest offenders of late for the past two decades, again topped the list this year in managed fires. Of the total state fires, 340 or 53 per cent, were managed and 99 of those were attributed to smokers.

Definite reduction in acreage burned was due mainly to the addition of more efficient equipment which the forestry department obtained this year, Gurnsey said.

Records show that 89 per cent of all fires were controlled before they had burned 10 acres.

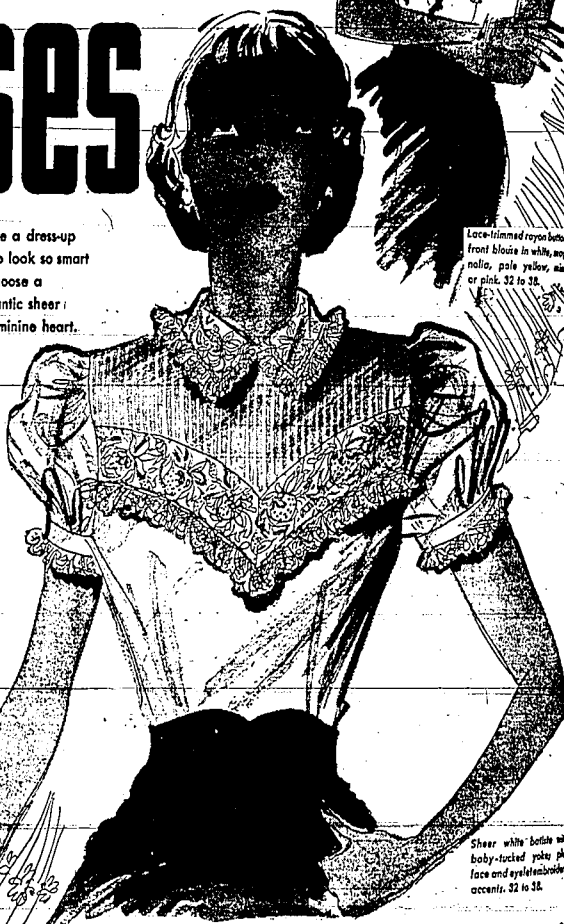

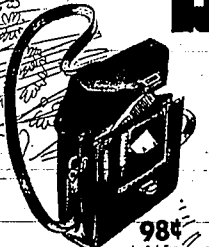
