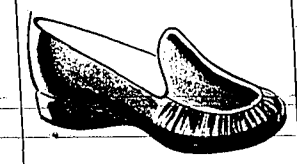

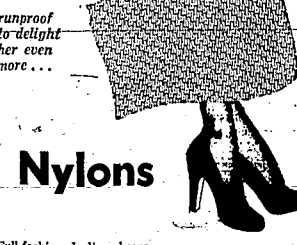

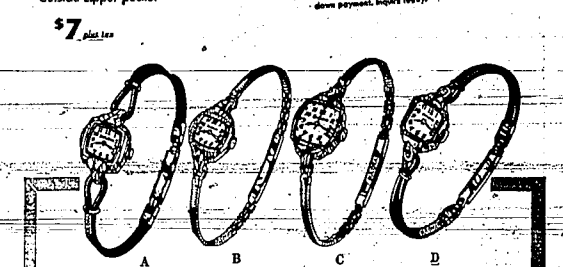

### Chiang Warns Chinese Cities Of Air Attacks

PAIPI, Feb. 9.—The Chinese nationalists have warned the people of the Pacific islands to be ready for air raids.

Map shows that the MATS—military air transport service—does when it isn't flying the "Berlin airlift." Although red blockade threats keep it ever alert to resume the Berlin airlift, MATS normally operates a clockwork of 300 planes and a chain of 250 stations, ranging from large air bases to tiny outposts. With its top headquarters in Washington, MATS operates three major air transport divisions—Atlantic, Pacific and Continental. The Atlantic division is based at Westover, Mass.; the Pacific division at Hawaii and the Continental division at San Antonio, Tex. All told, MATS flies over 70,000 miles of air routes.

### Boost of Rate Termed Need In Area Plan

WASHINGTON, Feb. 9.—(AP)—East Outrigger committee of the Bonneville power administration, believes an increase in the BPA rate for power would be needed to carry out a proposal to have the agency handle power from proposed Columbia River dams and water costs allocated to power phases.

### Russ Beat in Plane Output, Expert Avers

WASHINGTON, Feb. 9 (AP)—An American aviation expert said today that Russia is ahead of the United States both in aircraft production and in the number of military planes in service.

However, said John F. Victory, executive secretary of the national advisory committee for aeronautics (NACA), this country isn't disturbed by that situation because it feels that it has the better plane.

"We think we still have supremacy in the air," he said, "because of the superior performance and military effectiveness of our aircraft."

No Superplane Planes  
In a prepared speech Victory said neither the United States nor Russia has a practical military plane of supersonic speed.

U. S. plane can do faster than sound now only when unarmed, he said, adding: "We see ourselves in the position of a runner in a race who knows he is being hard pressed."

Victory, first employee of the NACA when it was founded in 1915 as the nation's chief agency for basic air research, addressed the Comptonian club.

Struggle for Survival  
"The struggle for the survival of civilization is now underway in the research laboratories of our land," he said. "Others the outcome of our present campaign to hold communism in check and prevent another world war is being decided."

He said the atomic bomb "is solely an offensive weapon—of no value without a means of delivering it to its target."

"So," he added, "air power becomes the key in the problem of preserving our own security as well as preserving world peace."

### Russians Lack Good Bomber, Expert Claims

LONDON, Feb. 9 (AP)—A British expert says the Soviet air force is as strong tactically today as any in the world, but it would still be unable to carry the atom bomb to Washington.

Aber Lee, who was a wing commander in air intelligence during the war, made the statement in a book entitled "The Soviet Air Force," published today.

### Monopoly Count Is Filed Against 2 Drug Makers

WASHINGTON, Feb. 9 (AP)—The justice department today charged two Indiana drug makers with trying to monopolize the sale of hard gelatin capsules—used for "vitamin pills" and other medicines.

Attorney General McGrath announced the filing of a civil antitrust action in federal court at Detroit against Parke-Davis and company, Detroit, and Eli Lilly and company, Indianapolis.

Hard gelatin capsules "are used primarily as soluble containers for drugs and medicines taken in pill or 'capsule' form," the department explained. One chief use is in vitamin pills, an official added.

Both companies make and sell hard gelatin capsules as a part of their business marketing pharmaceuticals and biologicals.

The justice department charged that, acting together, the companies have obtained control over machinery used in making and filling hard gelatin capsules.

This control, it added, has been used to achieve and maintain a monopoly over the manufacture and sale of such capsules.

ONTARIO, Ore., Feb. 9 (AP)—Adoption of the Hoover reorganization plan and other economy measures which would save an estimated \$200,000,000 was recommended here by Sen. Wayne Morse, R., Ore., at a Republican luncheon rally.

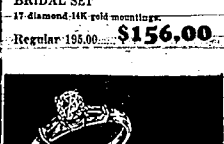

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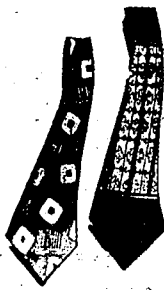

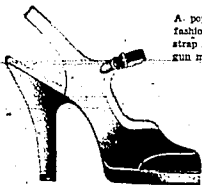

### FDR's Papers Show Change In U. S. Policy

WASHINGTON, Feb. 9 (AP)—The change in the administration's policy toward Russia since the war was disclosed Wednesday by the publication of extracts from the late President Roosevelt's news conferences spanning the last four years of his administration.

Time after time, Franklin D. Roosevelt expressed his conviction that Russia would cooperate for peace.

Now that hope has waned, the secretary of state admitted that the stand that the only thing which will make an impression on the Soviet is power.

Scooped at Reporter

On Feb. 17, 1943, Mr. Roosevelt scooped up the reporter and said: "Arguments that are made against loans to Russia, on the theory that it is dangerous to make loans to them—they will become too powerful after the war."

A year and a half later the President was asked whether he was confident that Russia would cooperate with us in maintaining peace.

Had Hope for U. N.

"I always have been, personally," Mr. Roosevelt said.

Returning from the Yalta conference six weeks before he died, the President predicted "the United Nations will be the major instrument of ever devised for stopping war."

It was at Yalta that Dr. F. D. Ives, minister of the United States to the Soviet Premier Stalin bargained on veto powers giving his nations the right to veto any Security Council resolution.

The collection of news conferences was compiled by the late Samuel I. Rosenman, New York who stood by Mr. Roosevelt's side for years as legal adviser and secretary.

They are in the Yalta conference files in the final four volumes of the late President's master papers to be published next week.

History Revealed

They supply a revealing glimpse of history in the making from the time Mr. Roosevelt began his unprecedented third term in 1941, until he died April 12, 1945.

History revealed through the news conferences of the strained months of 1941 scarcely can escape a feeling that it was a desperate race sooner or later we would get into the war on a shooting back.

It was so clear at the time that just before Pearl Harbor, Mr. Roosevelt said "Thanking dinner for years as legal adviser and secretary."

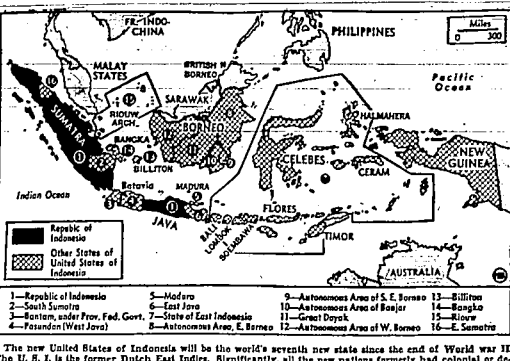

### Berlin Airlift Was Big Victory In Cold War, General Clay Says

BERLIN, Feb. 9 (AP)—Western resistance to the Soviet blockade of Berlin turned out to be one of the shining victories in the east-west cold war, but it is disclosed now that serious consideration was given in Washington to withdrawing in the face of Russian pressure.

This was one of the points brought up in Gen. Lucius D. Clay's "Decision in Germany," being published tomorrow in the United States.

The general's account of his four years as deputy and then military governor of Germany is a behind-the-scenes picture of four years of international negotiation.

It is by far the most authoritative book on postwar Germany yet published. If for no other reason than that the general was in Berlin in virtually every vital decision taken from 1945 to June 1949.

Although there is much that is in a repetition of previously published material, there are many heretofore unconfirmed or unknown incidents and detailed documented reports of Soviet double-dealing which systematically launched the east-west break.

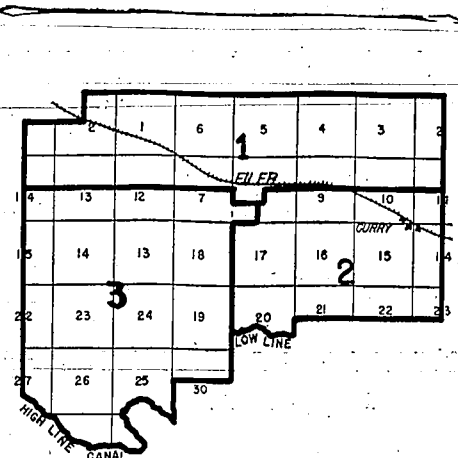

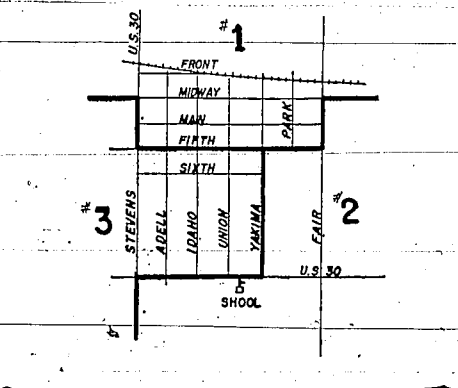
