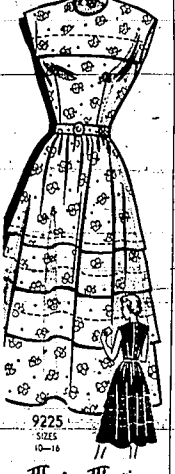

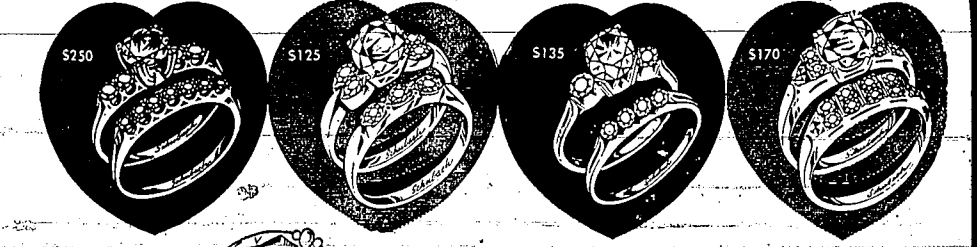

Jim Thorpe Rated Nation's Greatest Athlete by Poll

NEW YORK, Feb. 11.—(AP)—Jim Thorpe, that almost legendary figure of the sports world, had additional laurels heaped upon him as the nation's greatest male athlete of the half-century.

Previously voted No. 1 football player of the past 50 years, Thorpe became the only double winner in the Associated Press poll when 252 out of 338 sports writers and radio broadcasters accorded him the ultimate honor.

Thorpe's total score came to 815, while Babe Ruth had 406, and Jack Dempsey 246, and Cobb 148.

Thorpe's greatest athletic feat was his performance in the 1912 Olympic games at Stockholm.

Thorpe's win was the fourth straight for Idaho this year—the second over W.C.C.

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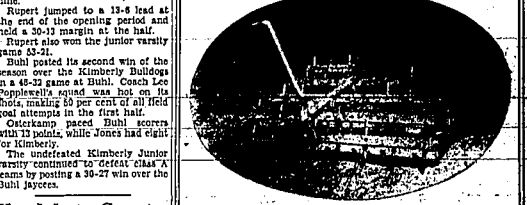

Hell's Canyon Dam Described As Toughest Construction Job

By WILLIAM R. HATCH

WASHINGTON, Feb. 11 (AP)—Building of the proposed Hell's Canyon dam on the rushing Snake river may be the toughest job in American construction history.

Engineers here today outlined the project, which Secretary of Interior Oscar L. Chapman recommended to Congress earlier this week and said it presented some "mighty tough problems."

"One thing they said, the spectacular dam will be far from good roads and railroads. It will be located about 104 miles north of Weiser, Ida., on the rugged Snake river; secondly, there is at present no sign of a decent access road to the canyon bottom, 5,000 feet below the rim.

"We're going to have to build roads and railroads, and some way for getting men, materials and heavy equipment to the bottom of the canyon," one of the bureau of reclamation engineering staff said.

The problems faced by engineers who will build the Hell's Canyon dam, if it is authorized, will be tougher than those at Hoover dam on the Colorado, engineering experts said. It is in such a deep, narrow canyon that "we may have to chip a highway down to the damsite right out of the hard bedrock."

To the canyon rim the bureau said a "heavy duty highway" would have to be built. The road would run from Council to the damsite, 40 miles of it over an existing logging road, and the last 23 miles new construction. The existing road from Halfway, Ore. to The Bar, where the construction campsite probably would be located, must be improved," the bureau said.

The railroad line would be brought in from Honesdale, Ore., to the site of the dam. One equipment is gotten to the bottom of the canyon the problem of getting such massive items as generators, bulldozers, cranes and hoists to the bottom will be tackled. In Boulder canyon the contractors had to build a road to augment the trolley which was suspended on a giant cable and which still is being used by the bureau to lower and raise equipment from the bottom of the canyon. At Glen canyon, also on the Colorado river, the bureau is contemplating an inclined cable-car railway, somewhat similar to a ski-lift, and much bigger.

However, the cost of operating either a trolley or an inclined cable-car system would be "tremendous over the period required to build Hell's Canyon," the bureau said. "The cheapest way in the long run

This is a sharp contrast with the experience of those areas of the Pacific Northwest where the Federal Government has assumed responsibility for power supply. And the percentage increase in the demand for electricity in those areas has not been as great as in southern Idaho and eastern Oregon.

The whole program of development of more power for the region has been by private enterprise—done in the way that is characteristic of this area and its people. To construct and equip the hospital completely, \$600,000 is required. The government will give \$300,000 provided the people of this county raise a like amount. The last bond issue was voted in 1946. Since that date, the cost of construction has risen 34%. Your Hospital Board wishes to avail itself of the government grant and thus make sure the hospital is complete in every detail.

2. What Will You Get for Your Money?

A first-class hospital ready to accommodate 161 patients and providing special accommodations for children and isolation cases; and also the finest equipment necessary to insure the best medical and nursing care. The total cost of building and equipment will amount to \$11,000 a bed compared with a national average of \$16,000 a bed. So you will get a fine hospital built as economically as possible.

3. What Does It Cost You?
