## State Senate OK's Withholding Plan For Income Taxes

BOISE, Feb. 16 (AP)—The Idaho senate today passed one of the major items in the governmental reorganization program, the bill providing a withholding method of collecting state income taxes.

After a morning-long debate, the measure was passed 80 to 14. Fifteen Democrats and 15 Republicans voted for the bill, nine Democrats and five Republicans were against.

The measure would require employers to deduct an amount equal to 10 per cent of the salary withheld up to meet the state income tax. The amount would be paid a refund in form of over-allowance as it is done under the present federal law.

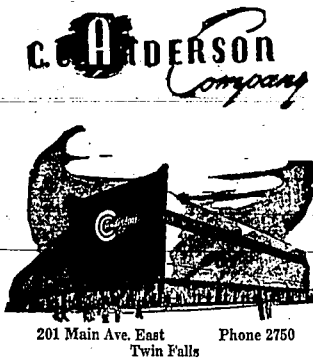

### Brannan Acts To Halt Farm Bureau's Bank

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13.—Secretary of Agriculture Charles F. Brannan has struck back at leaders of the farm Bureau's bank. Brannan federation in a showdown fight over his controversial farm plan.

He and his supporters have invited the enemy camp in an attempt to stir up a membership fight against the federation's national leaders.

Brannan apparently has decided to accept his proposal, so long as the federation, the nation's largest farm organization, opposes it.

Higher Supports

His best weapon seems to be the fact that his plan for subsidizing growers would offer farmers generally higher supports than the plan of the farm Bureau, which promises consumers lower food prices.

He also may capitalize on the discontent of farmers with a continued drop in farm prices at a time when farm costs remain high.

While the farm Bureau's federation's president, has denounced the Brannan plan as a "socialistic" scheme to reduce farm production at a cost of billions of dollars to taxpayers.

**2 Tipoffs Given**

The tipoff on the new Brannan strategy came this week:

A spokesman for the secretary told the board of directors of the Bureau convention at Raleigh that some of the organization's "national farm plan" was "not so bad" because they would drive some farmers out of business. 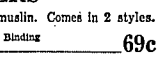

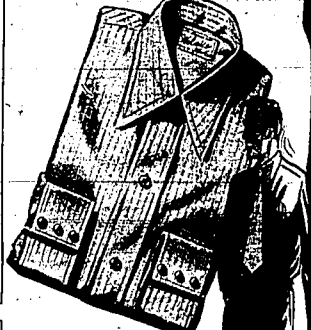

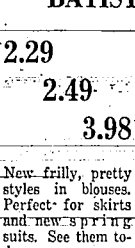

**Soviet Satellites Forging New Economic Ties With Red China**

LONDON, Feb. 15 (AP)—A number of eastern European nations were reported today to be forging in concert with Russia a multi-million-dollar trade pact with communist China.

The countries are identified—besides Russia—as Poland, Czechoslovakia and Finland, which while anti-communist, is dependent upon the good will of neighbor Russia.

Delegations from these countries have been in Moscow during the lengthy Chinese-Russian talks which culminated yesterday with the signing of a new Sino-Soviet treaty.

The effect of such an agreement, which would be an interlocking basis, would be to weld European and Asiatic communism even more closely together.

Figures have not been mentioned by eastern diplomats here, who regard the treaty moves, but the amount is expected to be large. Evidently they would supplement the \$100,000,000 Sino-Soviet agreement that negotiated in Moscow.

China's new program for reconstruction and eventual industrialization through it. Mao Tse-Tung would get some of the machinery, steel and tools he needs to convert China's now predominantly agricultural economy into an industrial one.

The centers of European nations could profit, also, through access to China's vast stores of raw materials and natural resources, such as coal, iron and tungsten.

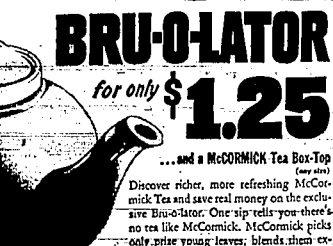
Taken in combination with Russia's concessions to China in Manchuria, such a pact could well eliminate the United States as a required factor in the future development of China.

It could put China's communist leaders in a position to break their ties economically at both Britain and the United States. Diplomatic isolation could result in an even greater coalition in Peking toward the west.

A Moscow dispatch said foreign diplomats there were attaching great importance to a section of the alliance dealing with "international actions which have as their purpose securing of the peace and security of the whole world."

**FSA Reports Increases in Life Lengths**

WASHINGTON, Feb. 15 (AP)—The average length of life in the United States has increased to 67.3 years, the highest figure on record, the federal security agency announced today.

The agency's office of vital statistics based its calculation on 1948 mortality figures. The 1947 average life was 66.8 years.

The agency also reported that the decline in the death rate since 1940 has been greatest—more than 60 per cent—for children from one to four years of age.

It is still comparatively high—35 out of 1,000—for infants under one year, compared with the 9.8 in 1,000 for all ages. 16 for children one to four; and 0.7 for ages five to 14.

Death rates for other groups: 18-24, 14; 25-34, 7; 35-44, 4; 45-54, 3; 55-64, 1.9; 65-74, 1.4; 75-84, 0.9; 85 and over, .74.

"Declining with the age decade 35-44, the declines in the death rate since 1940 grew smaller with advancing age," the agency said.

**Male Rates Higher**

"In every age group the death rates for males are higher than those for females, and except for the age groups over 75, they are higher for the nonwhite population than for the white population."

"Of 1,444,237 deaths in 1948, 113,169 were among infants under one year. The other categories exceeding 100,000 deaths were: 25-30 years, 134,218; 30-34, 138,445; 35-39, 132,401; 40-44, 117,751; 45-49, 104,291; 50-54, 125,200.

### Taylor Seeks Protection of Idaho Water

WASHINGTON, Feb. 14 (AP)—Senator Taylor, D. Ida., moved Wednesday to protect the water interests of Idaho.

He submitted to the senate Interior affairs committee an amendment intended to preserve the water rights of the Snake river.

The committee is considering recognition features of the pending river and harbor-food control authorization bill.

"Taylor's amendment would modify the authorization for the power dam planned for Hells canyon.

It would provide that operation of this dam and reservoir "shall be without prejudice to future depletion of stream flows arising from upstream depletion for beneficial consumptive uses in an amount which will not be less than the amount of water for the new and additional developments" indicated in the Interior department's report on the project.

The areas he seeks to protect include the Mountain Home, Brant and other smaller projects, still in the planning stage on the Snake river, the Snake dam, the Wood river, and "potential irritable areas" in the Boise, Payette, Boise, Clearwater and other river basins.

The committee is submitting this and other proposed amendments to the public works committee, which is handling the omnibus bill.

### Chinese Pact Sets Oriental Region Agog

HONG KONG, Feb. 18 (AP)—The new alliance between red China and Russia, set the orient today to wondering what the Soviets get out of it.

The militant overtones of the alliance sent tremors of fear throughout the nations in this leaning part of the world — from Japan down to Bangkok. There the diplomats wound up a strategy-mapping conference on the far east cold war.

The first reaction in British Hong Kong was that the announcement carried a lot of face-saving. Red China brings home big concessions to Manchuria and a \$300,000,000 loan and no one is saying what Russia got.

"I didn't take two months to write that treaty," said one diplomat referring to the long stay in Moscow of China Red Leader Mao Tse-tung. "There must be more to come."

**Russia Granted**  
Chinese nationalist leaders on Formosa — perhaps most immediately menaced — expressed belief the communists agreed to let Russia have secret air and naval bases on China's mainland.

They were anxious to see if Russia gives the communists a hand in the difficult amphibious operation for the invasion of Formosa.

**Japanese Government** sources in Tokyo also were wondering about secret clauses. Some were puzzled how the alliance could be directed against the possibility of attack from Japan when Japan is disarmed.

"We are forced to say," remarked a "red" spokesman, "that both China and Russia have advanced one step further in their cooperation program with Japan as their object."

Some Japanese, however, predicted a communist "peace offensive" since the alliance called for a quick peace with Japan.

American diplomats at Bangkok said some oriental governments feared the pact that brought a critical stage to already tense affairs in the far east.

**Philippine Center**  
In the Philippines, President Elpidio Quirino went to the conference with a military leader and cabinet. The meeting was called shortly after Defense Secretary Ruperio Masera returned from conferring with General MacArthur in Tokyo.

The rumors want the U.S. to limit Philippine defenses.

Chinese rattled in Hong Kong didn't mention the \$300,000,000 credit extended by Russia over a five-year period.

They thought that would be but a drop in the dry bucket which is red China today. They noted that U.S. aid ran to nearly \$50,000,000 in a scant two-year period.

Chinese communist newspapers in Hong Kong hailed the treaty as "crushing friendly relations" of China and Russia and as "a warning to the imperialists."

**State Expert Will Aid in Research**  
WASHINGTON, Feb. 18 (AP)—The agriculture department's European corn breeder research headquarters will be transferred from Toledo, O., to the Iowa State college field station at Ames, Ia., by March 31.

The department in making the announcement said it will not close out all research work on the corn here at the Toledo station.

Dr. T. A. Brindley, previously in charge of the department's parent investigations at Moscow, U.S.S.R., is being transferred to the new research program.

### Marshall Begins Red Cross Drive

PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 18 (AP)—Gen. George C. Marshall, national chairman of the Red Cross, last night launched the Red Cross 1950 drive for \$60,000,000 on the premise that "a strong Red Cross means a stronger America."

Marshall, former secretary of state and wartime chief of staff, said the Red Cross is a means of cultivating good will and understanding throughout the world.

At a news conference preceding formal opening of the drive—and Philadelphia's \$2,000,000 campaign—Marshall declined to comment on any political issues. He lumped discussion of the H-bomb, the A-bomb, a tense face-to-face meeting with Russia's Joseph Stalin and America's foreign policy in this category.

### President Names Special Assistant

WASHINGTON, Feb. 18 (AP)—President Truman has made Richard S. Brydson, 41-year-old White House lawyer, his \$15,000-a-year administrative assistant.

Brydson, a native of Bedford, N. Y., and a former treasury department lawyer, for the past year has been an assistant to the president's special counsel—the formerly Clark Clifford, now Charles S. Murphy.

Brydson fills the vacancy created when Murphy was promoted to succeed Clifford in the \$20,000 special counsel job.

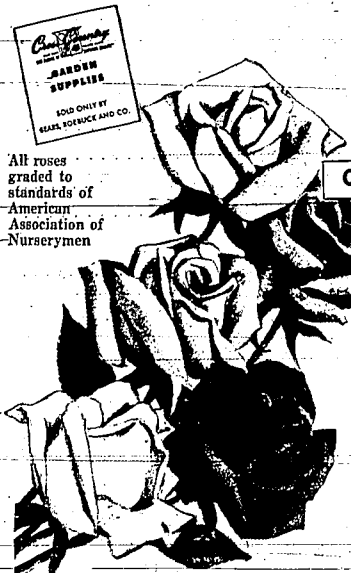
