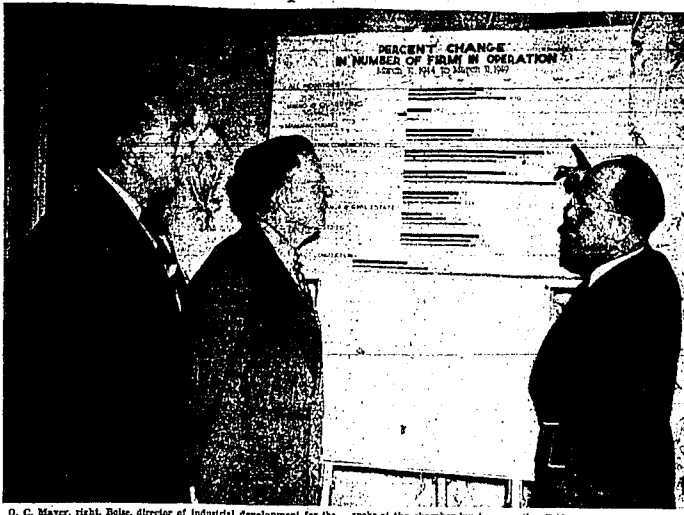

Ohio Senator Raps Truman Budget View

WASHINGTON, Feb. 18 (AP)—Sen. Frank La Follette, R-Ohio, said today the country might as well give up hope of balancing the federal budget as long as President Truman is in the White House.

Taft, head of the senate GOP policy committee, told a reporter he thinks Mr. Truman's Thursday night Jefferson-Jackson speech committed the president to long-term deficit spending.

"He has relegated the idea of a balanced budget to the distant future and it obviously will never come what Mr. Truman is president," the Ohio senator said.

La Follette said that "the Democratic party will not play politics with the federal budget." Mr. Truman said it is "out of the question" now to trim expenses to the level of income because so much of the budget "goes" to pay for past wars and to work for peace in the future.

"The President has made it clear he intends to give these and other ideas wide publicity in a whistle stop tour in the 1950 fight for control of congress."

Plans Taft said he thinks expenses can be cut "but before we can balance the budget we'll have to have a president who wants to do it."

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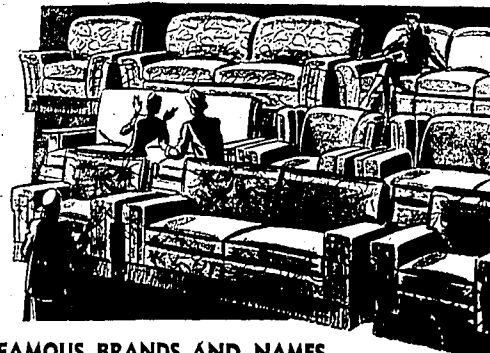

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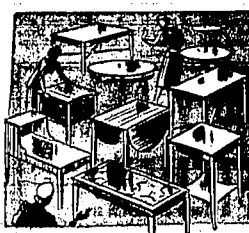

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Big Crowd Is Expected for Slalom Races

A record number of skiers and spectators are expected at the Magic mountain ski area when the annual White flag slalom races and ski jump exhibitions are held at 2 p.m. Sunday.

The winter sports area, within an easy hour's drive of Twin Falls, is fast becoming one of the major skiing centers in Idaho. Since the installation of a new 2,250-foot Oestman T-bar lift last year, the area has become better and as good facilities as any in the state with the exception of Sun Valley.

5,000 Lift Area
Claude Jones, lift operator and U. S. forest service permit holder, estimates between 4,500 and 5,000 persons have used the area since this season opened Dec. 25.

Sliding is expected to be good through March and even in April if weather follows a regular pattern in the region.

Approximately 60 inches of snow are on the two major ski runs. Runs include the expert run on Magic mountain and the beginners' and intermediate run on Pike mountain.

New Lift
The new T-bar lift, which has been installed on Magic, is being extensively used for the first time this season. Although it operated a few times last fall, extreme winter conditions kept the area closed with blocked roads.

The new lift can deliver up to 250 skiers an hour, which is more than three times the capacity of previous installations.

In addition to the new lift, a reconditioned rope tow is in operation on Pike mountain.

A new ski school has been formed this year with Bill Leah as head instructor, assisted by Jim Brown. Jones is director of the school.

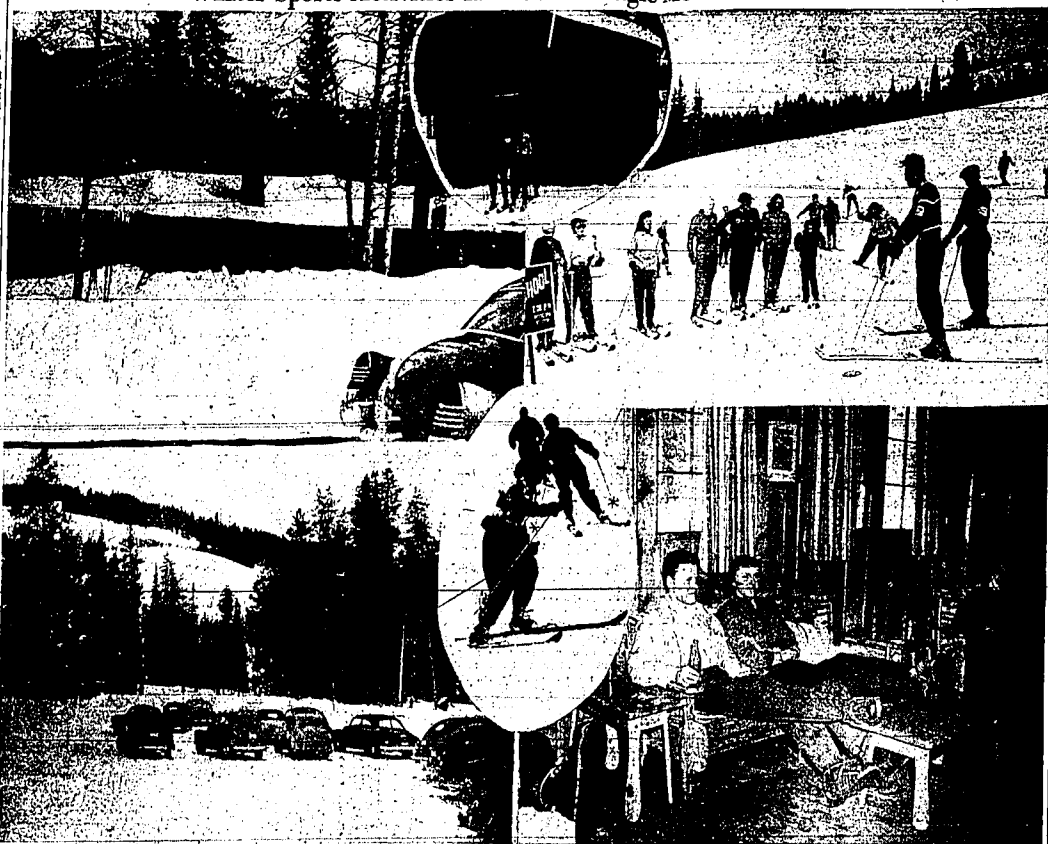
Roads to Open

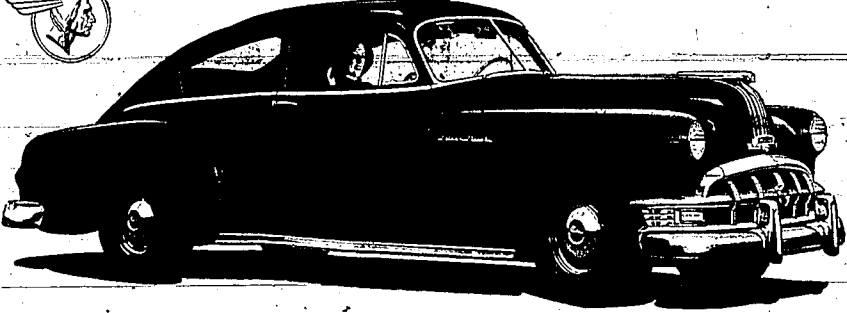

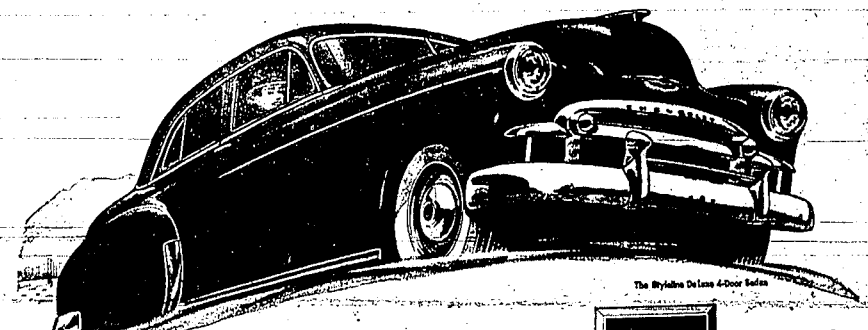

Council Flays Publicity for Spud Surplus

BOISE, Feb. 13 (AP)—The Idaho agricultural council today criticized the Idaho potato marketing board for publishing the dumping of surplus potatoes, thus hurting the Idaho potato market.

The council, composed of presidents of 18 major Idaho farm organizations, also urged better participation of farmers in the 1937 election and suggested that farmers express to "important officials" their views on potato marketing.

Letter Sent
Rep. Johnson of Preston, council president, said a letter is being sent to Brannan asking his reasons for his action on the potato problem. He pointed out that had the surplus potatoes been disposed of quietly or possibly shipped to democratic people of China and Japan the problem would have been eased.

"This kind of publicity, which the whole potato market is disturbed and depressed and upset," Johnson said in his letter, "disturb the crop, if it had not been for this break in the market precipitated by your unwise publicity, would have gone into the normal channels of trade, had the present prices cut the farmer's profit in half, or wiped it out due to your department's adverse publicity."

Prices Drop
At least 90 to 95 per cent of the crop would have gone so. As it is about a third of the crop is yet to go on the market. However, most of it is still going on to the market in the normal channels of trade, had the present prices cut the farmer's profit in half, or wiped it out due to your department's adverse publicity."

In a statement the council declared "too often we elect those who are professional office seekers to represent us in positions that are very vital to the welfare of the economy of the industry and the nation. We must assert our voice in selection of government representation."

The agricultural council also recommended that a study be made of Idaho's tax structure to lessen the burden now paid by farmers for education.
