There is No Justification For a Telephone Strike

The union leaders of the Communications Workers of America, Division 17, are threatening a telephone strike for February 24.

The union leaders have not presented evidence to this date on which the Company could justify submitting to the Union's demands for another round of increases in wages, a shorter work week, and expensive changes in working practices. The telephone employees have had nine general wage increases in the last ten years.

The Company believes that to provide good telephone service it must have competent, high type employees. To get and keep high class employees the Company must pay good wages and afford good working conditions. That telephone wages and working conditions are good is indicated by the fact that we are not losing out regular full-time employee a month per 1,000 employees, to other employment.

Are These Good Wages?

Here are some wage facts in this district for the telephone employees whom union leaders are advising to strike:

AVERAGE EARNINGS	Per Week	Per Year

Telephone employees are paid while learning and telephone employment is steady. On V-J Day there was a total of 11,370 employees in the Company—today there are 18,300. Due to this expansion of the force along with force turnover there are, of course, many employees below top rates. These employees receive regular progression increases from the time they start until they reach the top of the schedule. That progression increases will average six cents per hour this year for those employees below top rates.

EMASCULATED ROAD PLAN

It has become all too apparent during the present special session of the Idaho legislature that recommendations for reorganization of the state highway department will not be adopted unless the most important provisions are first eliminated altogether.

So once again we witness the spectacle of the legislature acknowledging its inability to cope with a job which is the current organization of the state's highway system. We say "acknowledging its inability" because this same legislature authorized such an investigation by competent and independent investigators for which survey it appropriated \$30,000.

With the investigation completed and the recommendations now before them, we find our legislators picking the special road report to pieces.

One of the principal recommendations made by the Public Administration Service, the agency which conducted the investigation, called for elimination of the various local highway districts over the state, and a better integrated system of control could be established. In fact the investigators attached much importance to this provision and indicated that the recommendations were contingent upon this one principal change in our highway set-up.

U. S. Seeking Permit to See Red-Held Men

PRAGUE, Czechoslovakia, Feb. 22.—The United States embassy said today it is still seeking permission from the Czech foreign office to conduct two American missions to see prisoners held incommunicado since their arrest Jan. 23.

The embassy's frequent representations to the ministry have brought only the reply that the two men are arrested for attempting to enter a "prohibited area."

James H. Hendrix, counselor of the embassy, said American officials still have not been informed where the missionaries are being held, though it has been reliably reported they are in jail at Olomouc, central Moravia.

The missionaries, Stanley E. Ad-bott, 23, Lehi, Utah, and C. Alton Johnson, 22, Idaho Falls, Ida., were detained while traveling through Moravia to visit church members living near the Polish-German border.

U. S. to Strip 'Confessions'

WASHINGTON, Feb. 22.—The United States is planning steps to focus world opinion on the Communist and Soviet Government "confessions" at political trials.

American diplomats have been gathering information on refinements of torture preferred under the auspices of the Soviet secret police, which diplomats say will prove revolting to the entire civilized world.

It is expected here the revelation will cast light on the "confession" of Robert A. Foggy, an American businessman sentenced to 15-years imprisonment in Hungary.

Similar methods were said to have been used on British employees of the American legation in Sofia, whose "confessions" have been made public by the London press.

The United States broke diplomatic relations with Bulgaria yesterday.

While a similar move against Hungary undoubtedly would be against Soviet interests, it would be in the cards. Observers pointed out that maintenance of the U. S. legation in Budapest depends on machinery for continued efforts to free Foggy.

The department served notice yesterday it regarded Foggy's case as a grave on justice and procedure or its findings.

British consul in Budapest described him as both a brave lieutenant commander and an army colonel.

It is expected by the Hungarian propaganda radio contained numerous seeming contradictions. Officials believe that by comparing it with the known facts, they will be able to prove it was fabricated and that Foggy made it under duress.

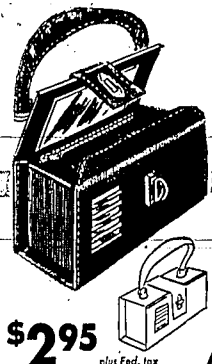

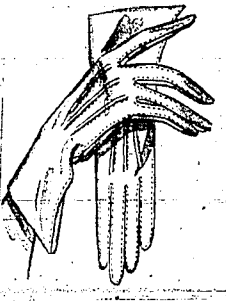

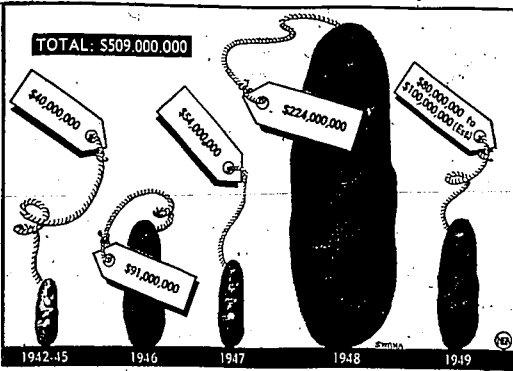

Taxpayers Scorched as U. S. Agencies Shuffle Problem of Surplus Potatoes

WASHINGTON, (REX)—Potato politics now being played in Washington are even rougher than the proverbial peanut politics. It will have cost the taxpayers \$509,000,000 by the time this year's potato crop is sold. The government is now holding a long statement on the problem, but it was careful not to tell consumers what it should do. He said, in fact, that he hoped the secretary of agriculture would not be accused of opposing support.

Secretary of Agriculture Charles F. Brannan now has proposed to dump an estimated 25,000,000 bushels to save from \$10,000,000 to \$20,000,000 in transportation charges which he says the Gore-Anderson farm bill does not authorize him to spend. And for this economy the secretary is being charged with playing politics himself—wanting to make the present farm bill look bad so as to advance the cause of his own farm plan.

East German Army Formed Under Russia

BERLIN, Feb. 22—A new German army, sworn to fight for Russia, is drilling in the center of Europe.

Judged by size alone, it is a mere drop in the world military bucket. It has only 45,000 young soldiers, according to latest western intelligence reports.

But it is a professional force—a re-education of the military. This is the Osters army. It doesn't call itself an army, of course. Its "cover name" is *Bereitschaften* (or a re-education unit) of the Volkspolizei (people's police).

Western powers have known of it since it was established in the fall of 1943, but they can't touch it. Critics predict the westerners will train German troops of their own in a year or two.

The recruits are a hard-training cadre of combat specialists, who wear the blue uniforms of the Volkspolizei. They are in barracks, study under visiting Soviet army officers, espouse Stalinist ideology, and look forward to their day.

Their boss is a whodunnit character named Wilhelm Zaisler who fought in Spain during the civil war as a leader from Moscow, General Gromov.

Western agents say Zaisler, alias Gromov, has been a big wheel in international communism since the end of the first world war, in which he was an officer of the Kaiser's forces.

To figure out what Russia wants from this 45,000-man military force, turn the history pages back to the 1930's and re-read the story of the Reichwehr. Russia helped the Reichwehr secretly, opening its own tank, artillery and aviation schools to clandestine German students.

The reason: Kremlin strategists sensed the circumstances under which the decaying Weimar republic and converted the Reichwehr into a murderous antagonist of its former benefactor. But the shock of this has so diminished since 1933 that the Russians are willing to run the same risk again.

Dip Noted for U. S. Output, Farm Income

WASHINGTON, Feb. 22—Declining farm income and a drop in the nation's output of goods and services have been reported by government agencies today.

The commerce department said the total national output, which President Truman recently said had expanded to \$300,000,000,000 in five years, dipped nearly 20 percent in 1944 to \$247,000,000,000.

Decline on Farms
And the agriculture department pictured a worsening farm financial picture by declining income, lowered value of assets and increased debt.

The commerce department report also showed an overall national income decline of two per cent from booming 1944 to a \$27,000,000,000 total.

Income Average Down
The agriculture department's 1944 summary said the average income of persons on farms was reported at \$700 compared with the four-year average of \$1,055. The 1944 figures for the two groups was \$600 and \$1,075.

The farm situation is expected to decline further this winter, government officials said, pointing to shrinking farm product prices and overcast markets.

Caribbean Naval Tests Slated by 4 Allied Powers

WASHINGTON, Feb. 22—Nearly 100 warships of the United States, Britain, Canada and the Netherlands will practice defense against submarine and air attack in the Caribbean next month.

The joint exercises, the largest international maneuvers in western hemisphere waters since World War II, will be held in the Caribbean.

The fact that fleet units of the four Atlantic pact powers will take part in Caribbean exercises has been disclosed previously. However, in confirming this formally today, the defense department revealed many additional details.

The exercises will take place about March 15, after the end of separate U. S. military exercises called portops.

To combined maneuvers called Caribbean, British and U. S. fleet units will operate as far north as Charleston, S. C.

Stassen Calls for U.S.-Russ Confab As 'Peace Effort'

NEW YORK, Feb. 23 (AP)—Harold E. Stassen said last night a great majority of the American people believe a mid-century peace conference should be sought between Russia and the United States.

The former Minnesota governor proposed such a top-level conference in a speech last Saturday at Grand Rapids, Mich.

The response was overwhelming, Stassen told the New York Times Republican club.

Stassen said the conference should be held on neutral ground, such as Stockholm, Helsinki or Vienna.

The GOP leader and University of Pennsylvania president said the American delegation must be bipartisan. He suggested as members State Attorney, Defense Secretary Johnson, Republican Senators Vandenberg and Taft, Bernard Baruch and the United States.

Plan to Divert Basin's Water Still Pondered

WASHINGTON, Feb. 22 (AP)—The reclamation bureau's dream of diverting water from the Columbia river to the Pacific northwest for use in California and Colorado basin states is still under study.

The Columbia basin, with its enormous excess of water, is the only known possible source of water for the Pacific northwest for use in California and Colorado basin states, the bureau said in a memorandum to the house and senate interior department appropriations.

The bureau, asking \$170,000 to continue this and a year or two before it can make a report to congress on the possibility of diverting Columbia river water which now empties into the sea.

COLUMBUS, O., Feb. 22 (AP)—The government yesterday filed a \$26,000,000 foreclosure action against Lustron corporation, mass producer of steel homes.

The reconstruction finance corporation, which financed Lustron's attempt to turn out 100 homes daily on an assembly line basis, told the federal court that Lustron "cannot be continued without loss and the wasting of its assets." Lustron has lost \$20,000,000 since its organization began late in 1947, RPO claimants.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 22 (AP)—About seven per cent of the civilian work force was unemployed last month when the jobless total hit a postwar high of 4,600,000, the labor department reported Tuesday.

This compares with the four and a half per cent figure for January, 1930, when the number of idle workers was 1,000,000 less.

The department said industrial and commercial employment dropped 1,500,000 between mid-December and mid-January to a total of 4,221,000—about 1,500,000 below the same period last year. But it said there are signs the downturn is leveling off.

Memorandum Released

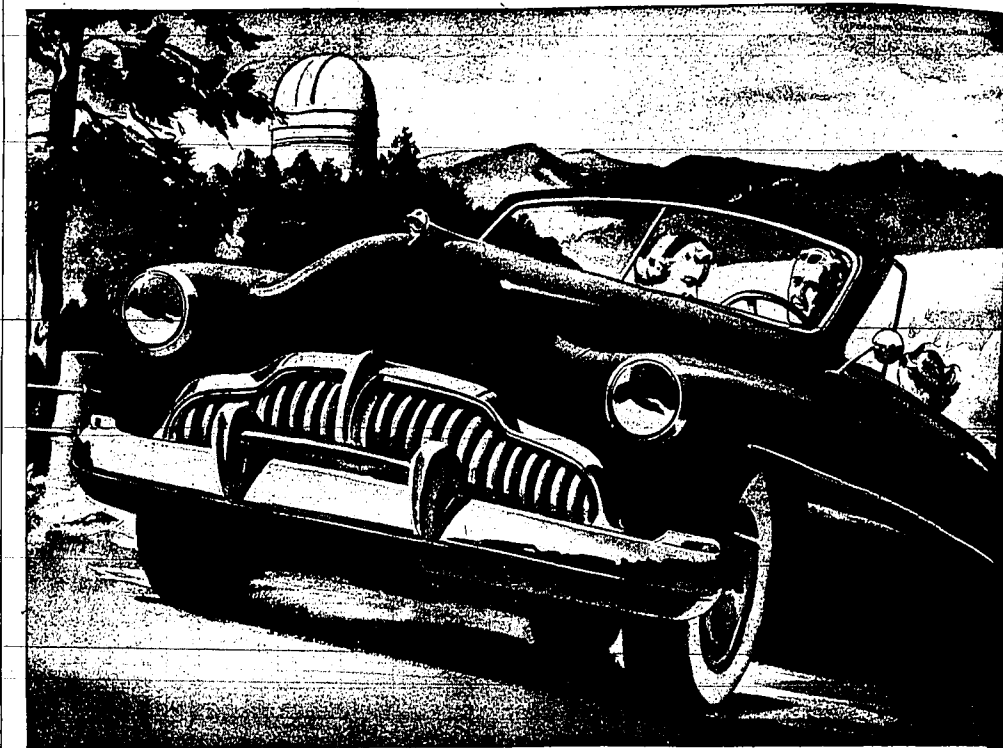
The system is expected to be in operation within weeks. It will extend through west coast states and east to the Rockies.

Special telephone communications will be set up within the entire western area, according to Lieut. Colonel T. R. Clinkscale, WADP director of civil defense.

Colonel Clinkscale said civilian centers would be warned in less than a minute should the defense center receive word that air attack is imminent. He stated local warnings to the public will be arranged for by states.

He cited modern weapons and long range aircraft as a cause of the creation of the warning system.

Only Existing Surplus
The Columbia river, the memorandum said, "and these adjacent streams are the only ones with a foreseeable surplus of water—water going in large quantities into the sea and to a degree that all of it probably never will be used for beneficial consumptive purposes in the natural drainage basins. The other western rivers are notably deficient."

The memorandum said it appears there is a possibility of diverting some of the surplus waters from the Pacific northwest, bringing them down the west coast through California to an ultimate junction with the Colorado river.
