"A minimum of national parks and game reserves" (to provide more land for grazing).

"An entirely new policy for grazing on public lands and forests."

"A steady long-term favorable attitude for the industry."

HALF-CENTURY HIGHLIGHTS



Old "number 999" was the wonder engine that had tongues wagging and heads shaking at the turn of the 20th century. No wonder; for the first diesel engine to haul the incredibly fast Empire State Express had a few years before barreled down the tracks to set a world speed record of 122.5 miles an hour on a run between Baitavia and Buffalo. Below is today's 20th Century Limited, hauled by a modern counterpart of old 999, a Hudson-type steam locomotive costing about \$140,000. Engine 999 cost about \$13,000. At the beginning of the century, there were only a few old-time locomotives with fancy stacks and cowcatchers. Today, steam power is giving way to electric and Diesel-electric power, along with other refinements in railroading.

University Entomologist Chats About Insect Control Methods

UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO, Moscow, Feb. 23—It's the last of February, and most of us are thinking of spring, but here's a tip that might come in handy for some of the cold days that are yet ahead. It sounds profitable, too.

H. C. Mania, head of the University of Idaho department of entomology, says that your spray equipment may have suffered during this long rest that it has had. So, it might be good to get it out and look it over a bit just to make sure that it will be in good condition when you want it this spring.

Here's what to look for: If you left water in the machine, you may have a cracked cylinder head or some other part. You may need to replace some such parts as gaskets, plunge cups, valve seats, or gaskets packing in guns and pressure regulators. Look to see that the dials in the nozzle head are not worn out. They may wear enough to give you more than your share of wasted insecticide.

That ought to do for the spray machinery. But there's something else that comes to mind now that we have mentioned insecticides. Be sure that insects are not eating your stored grain while you wait for spring to come.

Cold weather sort of slows those pests down—but it won't stop them. If there are enough of them to create their own heat down in your grain, you may be having trouble even though you don't know it.

Mania says the best way to figure this out is to check the temperature of the grain. If the temperature down in the grain is considerably higher than that of the surrounding air, insect activity is indicated. Examination of the grain where tem-

peratures are high should reveal the insects and their damage.

Carbon disulfide is one of the first thoughts of the entomologists who deal with insects in grain bins. You use it in a mixture with carbon tetrachloride. Ethylene dichloride mixed with carbon tetrachloride is also an excellent fumigant.

If the grain in the bin is not too deep you can simply cover the surface with burlap sacks and sprinkle the mixture onto the sacks. The gas formed penetrates down through the grain and kills off the insects as it goes.

If the grain in the bin is deep then you'll have to use a perforated pipe that is closed and pointed on one end. Shore it down into the grain and pour in the required amount of solution every time you shove the pipe down.

The liquid material goes out through the perforations, forms a gas, and kills off the insects. The pipe should be inserted into the grain at three- to four-foot intervals. Follow the recommendations of the manufacturer in obtaining the right amount of gas for a given size bin.

And we still figure that this is a good time of the year to make a visit to the office of your county agent. He will be glad to talk with you about some of your farm problems and especially about how you can get your windbreak trees from the University of Idaho.

Don't forget that you have to have that order in by March 1 this year. The order is made earlier than it used to be. The earlier you order, the more likely you are to get the kind of trees that you want.

"If It Isn't Right, Bring It Back"

Flying Discs 'Space Ships,' Writer Avers

NEW YORK, Feb. 22 (AP)—A navy officer says flying saucers were seen over the White Sands, N. M., proving grounds for guided missiles last year and he thinks the discs are space ships from another planet.

The officer, commander Robert D. McLaughlin, writes in the March issue of True magazine that saucers were seen at White Sands in April, May and June, 1942.

Chased Rocket
On one occasion, he said, two small saucers chased a navy rocket. The air force has called the discs hoaxes or misunderstandings of natural phenomena.

However, McLaughlin, identified by the magazine as a naval officer and a guided missile expert, wrote in his article:

"I am convinced that they . . . are space ships from another planet, created by animate, intelligent beings."

In its January issue, True magazine published an article by Donald E. Keyhoe, who also believed the saucers were space ships from another planet.

Said the air force at that time: "Air force studies of flying saucers lend no support to the view that they come from another planet."

Probe Ends
Next day the air force ended a two-year investigation into flying discs by labelling them "misinterpretations of various conventional objects, a mild form of mass hysteria or hoaxes."

McLaughlin said that in April, 1949, a group of navy men and scientists "tracked" a disc with an instrument which was being used to watch a weather balloon and chart its progress upward.

He added that data obtained indicated the saucer was about 103 feet in diameter and flew at a speed of about five miles per second at an altitude of approximately 56 miles. It was visible for a minute.

McLaughlin also wrote that in June other observers saw two small flying saucers flit around a 2,000-foot-per-second navy rocket. The discs finally sped up and passed the fast-traveling navy missile.

U. S. Population Now 150,604,000

WASHINGTON, Feb. 22 (AP)—The U. S. population reached 150,604,000 on Jan. 1 after increasing by 2,553,000 during 1944, the census bureau reported today.

This counted 443,000 Americans serving in the armed forces overseas.

Experience Law Saves Money for Idaho Employers

BOISE, Feb. 22 (AP)—Experience rating legislation passed by the Idaho legislature saved Gen state employers \$2,366,470 during the 1944-45 fiscal year in contributions to the unemployment compensation fund.

The Idaho State Chamber of Commerce said reports from the employment security agency showed that wages paid in covered employment during the period totaled \$241,282,978 of which \$213,250,280 was taxable wages.

The chamber pointed out that had 27 per cent been collected on all taxable wages, the cost would have been \$65,146,000. Instead, through the experience rating plan passed in 1943, the contributions paid amounted to \$4,186,170.

Chinese Red Trooper Not Happy Youth

HOWHO, Hainan Island, Feb. 23 (AP)—Communist Party Wei Yung-kung has had a belly full of war, especially amphibious operations. Wei was part of the first Communist army, which sent out five units loaded with 250 internationalists from Moscow to Hainan island. Nationalist gunboats intercepted the Hainan Strait and sank four of them. Wei and 500 others surrendered, too weak to fight after spending two nights and one day in an attempt to cross the strait.

Red for 4 Years
The 31-year-old Wei said he had been a Communist for four years since his induction in his home town of Herbin, Manchuria. Wei had been drafted for capture at national headquarters, to which he and his comrades were brought after a three-day march to the streets under banners proclaiming: "Barfoot and wearing a faded green uniform, the moon-faced Wei had never been seen any place, but knew the Americans were 'imperialists who are helping (generalissimo Chiang) fight the Chinese people so they can buy out China.'"

Most Are Barfoot
The captive looked well fed, but most of them were barfoot or wore straw sandals. All wore Communist caps with the star flap over the forehead. Wei said he hadn't the slightest idea where he was going or what was happening. He said he was a messenger who always was kept busy training or listening to lectures. He admitted he would not recognize his own company commander if he saw him. The captives were well armed with rifles, tommy guns and two Bren guns.

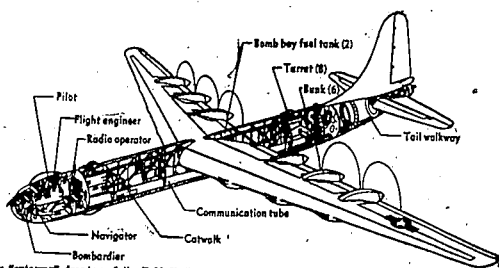

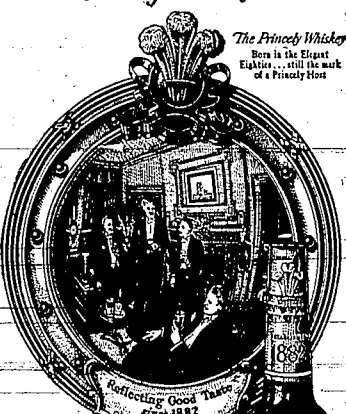
