Soft coal contract talks tonight headed for their first Sunday as government mediators pressed hard for a sudden agreement before the holidays blow again.

Officials drew some slight encouragement from today's long meetings—"they've had a lot of offers and a lot of counter-offers."

The session opened with a long recap of the coal contract negotiations. The coal operators' position was that another \$10 million in concessions would be required to get a contract. The miners' position was that they would accept a 3% raise in wages and a 10% raise in benefits.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 25 (AP)—

A proposal for junking federal rent controls—now covering 11,000,000 housing units throughout the nation—was made to the senate today by its powerful appropriations committee.

The senate passed a measure to junk the controls operating the remainder of the present fiscal year, and apparently was expecting that controls would extend until the past the scheduled June 30 expiration date.

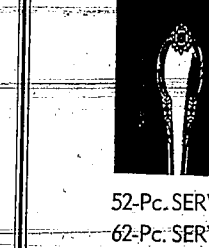

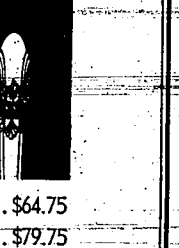

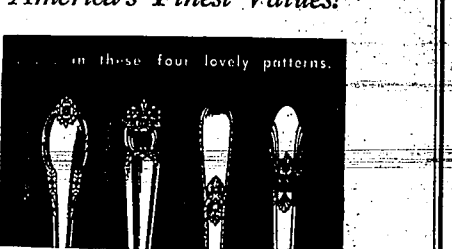

Nation's Big Game Hurt by Food Shortage

WASHINGTON, Feb. 25 (AP)—The nation's big game population is beginning to feel a shortage of food. As a consequence, the agriculture department reports, big game populations on some areas are being brought to a halt. Many feeding ranges are said to be overpopulated with deer and elk—the leading big game species.

Population Holds Own
The department's annual big animal population survey estimated the number in national forests at 2,600,000 head, or virtually the same as a year ago. The survey provided food and cover during the winter for approximately 30 per cent of the nation's big game animals.

Deer Is Most Common of the big game in national forests with an estimated population of 2,130,000 compared with 1,920,000 a year ago. Elk and moose populations were 180,000 and 180,000 a year ago. The mountain goat held its own at 20,000 head.

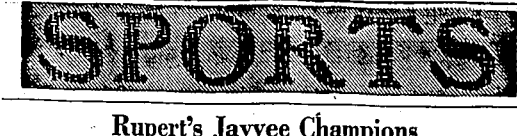

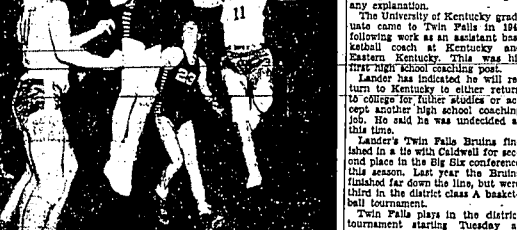

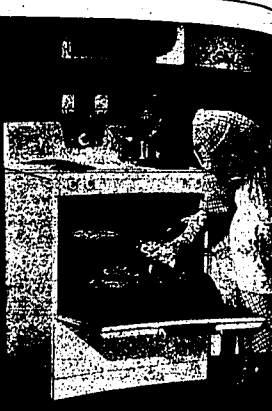

Swedish Conditions Described
By Ex-Resident Visiting Bluh

Bluh, Feb. 25 — Mrs. Helen Johnson, a former Bluh resident who is now a house guest of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Goad, has made a trip to Sweden with her travels and color film.

She and her husband shot more than 1,000 feet of color film while visiting abroad in 1948. Many Bluh residents remember Mrs. Johnson as the former Helen Herzog, daughter of Dr. and Mrs. W. H. Herzog. Dr. Herzog was a former pastor of the Methodist church in Bluh.

"The trip to Sweden came about when Mrs. Johnson's father-in-law wanted her to visit to his native land after an absence of 52 years. The Johnsons were living in New Jersey at the time and he left all the travel arrangements to me," Mrs. Johnson said, "we finally were able to secure passage. We departed from New York on the Gripsholm April 23, 1948. Travel conditions were still so crowded following the war that we had to make a type accommodation you don't see in almost all cases forced to sleep wherever you can when the company could work out."

"When we boarded ship it was necessary for me to share quarters with three other women, and my husband and his father with two other men."

The trip took over 12 days, one day longer than usual because they were delayed a day by icebergs. They landed in Gothenburg, Sweden, and spent the first month of their trip in southern Sweden, visiting relatives and old friends.

"The only relatives left were cousins and their hospitality was unbelievable—and, under such adverse circumstances, too," she continued. "Having a good time in effect on such items as coffee, sugar, butter, fats and oils, my only fruit was apples and pears. However, before we left we were given a ham, canned haddock, tomatoes and spinach."

"The children had almost forgotten that oranges were a food item in during our stay and the fruit was rationed out very carefully to give every one a chance to enjoy the luxury. The fruit was imported from long distances and the expense of it made it a treat in Sweden, home. The people just didn't have the money for such luxuries."

"The income of the only fruit was controlled by the government regardless of occupation. As an example, she cited the instance of a Swedish man who founded and was operating a flourishing airline company. His income was above the average but he wouldn't be a wealthy man by our standards as he would be in the United States under the same circumstances."

He was the owner of a Plymouth car which showed that he was far above average in the income group. Most of the cars were very similar to the American Austin and cars of European make.

"You see very few American made cars unless they are being used for commercial purposes such as taxis," Mrs. Johnson said.

Because of rationing, meat was included in the menu only twice a week, although cold cuts served at our lunch meals were similar to what we had in the States.

"Coffee, in spite of rationing, was a treat in the Swedish home. Mrs. Johnson remarked, 'if you visit in the afternoon, coffee, sweet cakes and kare are served.' Seven cakes, she explained, are seven different types of cake, and the most is expected to take one of each."

"One afternoon we called on Mrs. Johnson's old homestead friends and were served coffee and kare seven times. We also visited the Harlingen church where Mr. Johnson took interest was to Kronborg church where Hamlet is buried. It is still intact and complete with roof and drawing. The Johnsons were told that Goetting spent considerable time there during the war."

"The second month of our visit was spent in and around Stockholm. This is a lovely and cosmopolitan city. It is located on the Baltic sea and because of the many canals and lakes has been called the 'Venice of the North.'"

It is very modern and almost unrecognizably clean. There are refuse containers on the streets and these are used even by the little children.

"While we were in Stockholm we witnessed the celebration of midsummer day. This is the longest day of the year and is celebrated by the entire population."

National costumes are worn, the festivities start early in the day and continue late at night. Dancing is a feature of the day and one of the features of the May pole dance—not so different from Sweden because ropes of May poles are entwined around the poles.

"Another dance, which is performed by the children, tells a fairy story. In its action, it is a beautiful sight," said Mrs. Johnson.

"King Gustav celebrated his birthday while the Johnsons were there. Despite the republican form of government, the Swedish people are very fond of their King and would oppose any move to do away with royalty.

"During the course the royal palace at Droptingstrasse is a must on every visitor's itinerary." Mrs. Johnson said, "and we were taken through all the private quarters by a guide." The grounds are an exact replica of those at Versailles.

A side trip was made to the Vadssten history, the oldest church in Sweden, now used as a museum. There they saw the deep grooves in the kneeling stones made by the religious at their prayers.

"Though Mr. Johnson had been away 52 years, his homelike home was still standing and being used as a residence."

"The return to Gothenburg was made by way of the Gota Kanal. On this short trip, they went through 94 locks and took three days and two nights to make the trip which could have been made by rail in two days. The best accompanied 25 passengers and made five knots an hour."

"The Swedish people, as far as we could ascertain, consider America the land of opportunity and were highly enthusiastic over American food and clothes," Mrs. Johnson said.

"English is a required subject in the schools and is spoken fluently by the younger generation. As a matter of fact, most business places require a speaking ability of the English language. The older generation use little English. Some learned it in school, but have forgotten it, so they speak Swedish exclusively for the most part. 'There is no way of expressing how much I enjoyed the trip and I would certainly like to make it again someday and extend the tour up into France and Germany.'"

A deadline of 3 p. m. Monday for bids for potatoes for livestock feeding has been announced by Ben E. Wood, Twin Falls county production and marketing administration chairman.

Wood reminded farmers Saturday that bids must be submitted in sealed envelopes. Bid forms may be obtained at the point of purchase upon justification. They must do their own loading and hauling.

In addition any livestock feeder must agree to place the potatoes in a position where they may be fed easily. This may entail removing them from the sacks or placing them so each individual cart may be fed, he said.

The PMA chairman said bid orders will be filled on the basis of the highest financial return to the government. However, the potatoes must be available for the applicant must have sufficient livestock to justify his order and the county PMA must believe the potatoes will be used only for livestock feed.

Penalties for use of the potatoes for anything but livestock feed will be in the form of liquidated damages. A maximum of \$3 a hundredweight or fraction thereof will be assessed to any quantity used for human food or seed and the rate of \$1 a hundredweight with respect to any quantity used for other purposes. Hansen said.
