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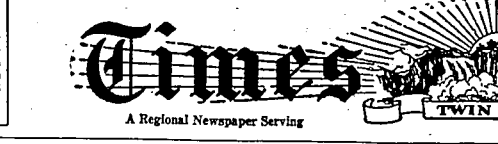

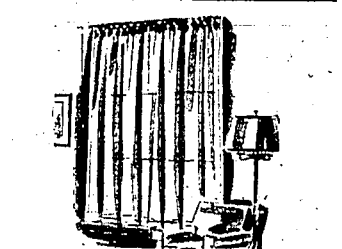

Allee Facing Biggest Test; Party Is Split

Allee, Feb. 27.—Prime Minister Allee faces the biggest test of his administration today as he attempts to secure a new cabinet to succeed the one which resigned last week.

Upon the king's accession to the throne, Allee was sworn to maintain the policies of the late government, which included a magisterial grip on the economy.

Allee had no great changes in mind in his cabinet. He must secure on the part of his ministers something else.

Allee's party leaders, divided on the subject of his new cabinet, must agree on a policy with their nationalization program.

Allee had won the election by a common majority but has been able to press through his nationalization program which included sugar, cotton and the wholesale distribution of goods.

Allee would have been no more successful in the nationalization of the economy had he not passed into law the nationalization act effective Oct. 1.

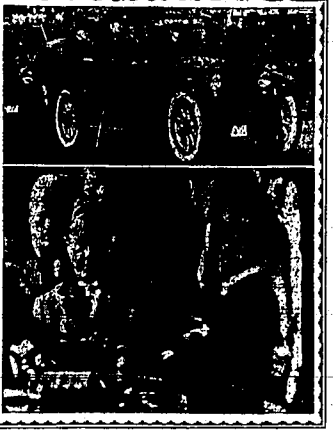
Allee's new cabinet must face a bold challenge which will test the strength of his government and lead to a general election within a few weeks.

Read Yourself to Sleep, He Advises— And Publishes Book on How to Do It

NEW YORK (NEA)—Dr. James Bender never had any trouble sleeping in his life. Never, that is, until a few weeks ago when he lay awake worrying about the deadline for the book he was writing. The book which contains his sleep is called, "How to Sleep."

Although the book touches on all phases of sleeping—from the fine art of snoring to how to get children to go to bed—it is primarily designed for the aid and comfort of insomniacs.

"I believe very strongly," says Dr. Bender, a psychologist, "in the potential power of the mind to alter the path of parts of our lives. Sleeping habits can be changed if we approach the matter with common sense."

For those who want to try, Dr. Bender has a 18-point program for the producing potent pillow powders. In 10 minutes, here is what he recommends:

1. Sleep in a good bed. Make sure it's big enough for you.
2. Sleep on a pillow that fits you.
3. Dress your bed right. Dr. Bender even sees the whole hog, and advocates a daily change of linen for severe cases of non-sleeping.
4. Don't sleep in a room decorated in exciting colors. Pastel greens and blues are the most restful shades, Dr. Bender says.
5. Keep the room dark. If necessary, buy and wear a pair of eye shades.
6. Build a shrine to Morpheus. Dr. Bender's way of saying that the bedroom should be strictly for sleeping; make it a pleasant, restful room, with things nearby that induce slumber.
7. Take a bath before going to bed. A bath is more relaxing than a shower, especially if a few drops of pine needle extract are added to the water. The temperature of the water should be between 95 and 102 degrees.
8. Be the master of noise. A pain killer and a pair of ear stoppers help keep the room quiet.
9. Ventilate your room to suit yourself.
10. Try melotherapy. That means music, which hath charms to soothe the savage insomniac. Among the selections Dr. Bender suggests are Mendelssohn's "To a Water Lily" and Debussy's "Afternoon of a Faun."
11. Make friends of your senses. In other words, rest them. Some ways you can do that are to brush your hair before retiring and to burn a stick of incense in the bedroom.
12. Eat a snack. But be careful.

Dr. Bender advises the bedtime menu consist of a glass of skim milk and a plain cookie. If you're very tired, maybe two cookies.

13. Kill yourself alone. Dickens, says Dr. Bender, couldn't sleep unless his bed pointed north. If you need a secret trick—like crawling around the bed 10 times—go to it.

14. Read nothing to sleep. A good book or a daily moonpaper.

15. Make a happy event of going to bed. Look on sleep as a delightful escape from problems.

Besides the Soporific Pillener, Dr. Bender has other suggestions. "I have almost a religious fervor in the belief that relaxation exercises are a big help," he says. Some ways Dr. Bender advocates relaxing are by standing on your head, or yawning, or blinking. Yawning, incidentally, is good for you, and you shouldn't try to swallow your yawns.

So, the next time you can't sleep, follow these simple instructions: Stand on your head, change the linen, paint the room blue, put on your eye shades and ear stoppers, take a bath with pine needle extract, play some music, read a book, brush your hair, burn some incense, eat a snack, read a book and crawl around the bed 10 times.

By that time, it's morning.

Nickel Losing Its "Value" in Postwar Rise

WASHINGTON, Feb. 27 (AP)—The nickel is losing its popularity. Suffering from the effects of post-war inflation, the five-cent piece no longer pays for a subway ride in New York, a bus ride in Washington or a cup of coffee in many restaurants.

The nickel, however, is not the only coin not being used as much as formerly. Government figures show all coins are declining in use and "holding money" is gaining.

Even the advent of retail sales taxes and parking meters in the past 10 years has failed to halt the postwar decline in coin usage.

Peak Reached in 1945 The United States mint delivered only 140,004,000 nickels to banks in fiscal 1945. The peak was \$727,810,000 in 1943 and the number has been dropping since.

Production of other coins is off even more. Banks required only a third as many pennies in fiscal 1945 as they did four years earlier. Sixty million half-dollars were shipped out by the mint in 1945; in 1940 only 11,455,000 were dispatched to banks.

Meanwhile, the bureau of engraving and printing has been hard pressed to keep up with the demand for currency. In 1944, Bureau press rolled out 113,000,000 sheets of currency, with 12 bills on each sheet. In 1948 the figure jumped to 121,000,000, and last year the number rose to 140,000,000.

New Coins Added Despite the reduced usage of coins, Congress has asked this year to approve at least five new coins: Three cent, six and a quarter cent, seven cent, seven and a half cent and 12½ cent pieces.

Equipment Is Installed for Reserve Use

Electronics equipment to provide complete training for naval reservists to take their places in the modern fleet in time of emergency is now in operation at naval reserve headquarters in the Hoops building, Twin Falls.

Seven powerful radio receiving sets, three transmitters, one ground search radar set and 272 identification (id) units (or 100) were installed last week by a special team from the Puget Sound navy yard, Bremerton, Wash.

Powerful Equipment
With this equipment, Twin Falls reservists may receive radio messages from almost anywhere in the world, transmit radio signals which will reach as far as Tokyo and see on the radar screen the terrain of Maple Valley 40 miles away in direction from Twin Falls. There also is enough portable equipment to meet any emergency.

Electronics warfare company 13-35, The Twin Falls unit, is part of the navy's large network of electronic stations. As soon as personnel become qualified and the unit receives its radio license, direct communication will be set up between Twin Falls and other stations of the 13th naval district, along with training ships off the Pacific coast.

Most Follow Procedures
All radio communications must conform to navy procedures and monitors tune in on the messages of every station participating in the drills. Each week, a bulletin is issued from headquarters in Seattle pointing out mistakes and improving procedure of each unit. In this way, the navy hopes to have a constant body of trained communications personnel.

The emphasis in the naval reserve is on training of electronics men, and the navy has based this emphasis on its needs. To train electronics personnel takes time, too much time in an emergency, so a trained electronics reserve is the fighting navy's answer to this problem.

Weekly Drills Held
The Twin Falls unit meets once a week for electronics training. The drills also include basic instruction in general navy fields and showings of instructional and entertainment moving pictures. Members of the unit receive credit for military retirement for attending drills. If they have a good attendance record, they are eligible for a 10 percent bonus on their pay.

Commands Unit
Lt. J. D. Brown, USN, is commanding officer of the local reserve unit. At present, 25 reservists are held at a p.m. each Tuesday at headquarters in the Hoops building. The reserve unit is authorized to move when the unit helps participate in authorized radio communications exercises.
