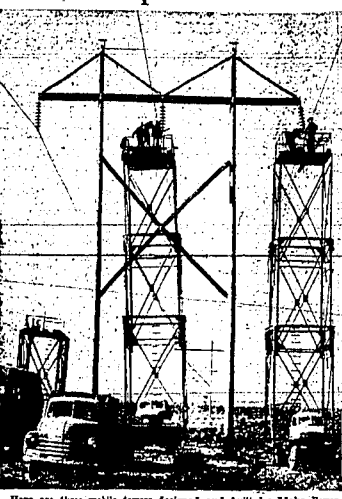

Soviet Learns FBI's Tactics At N. Y. Trial

NEW YORK, March 2 (AP)—With more effort taken to sit in court and listen, the Russians are learning these days about how the FBI handles spies—Russian or otherwise.

What use do the G-men make of wire-tapping?

What sort of secret records does the FBI keep on spy suspects?

How much does the FBI know about the activities of known or suspected Soviet agents in this country?

Given in Answers

Full or partial answers to these and many other questions of interest to the Russian secret police are given almost daily in the testimony of a trial of Judith Copson and Valentina A. Gubichev.

It is this information to the Russians?

"We have no comment on that matter at this time," said a FBI supervising agent.

Some Are New

Justice department officials said the Russians are learning some things, but not many that they couldn't have guessed. These officials said the Russians themselves know all about wire-tapping, street-trailing and other devices described by FBI.

Miss Copson, a former justice department employee, and Gubichev, a Soviet engineer formerly employed by the United Nations, are accused of conspiring here to transmit U. S. secrets to Russia.

Most of U. S. Revision Plan Now in Force

WASHINGTON, March 2 (AP)—Budget Director Frank Pace has informed congress the administration has acted to carry out about 77 per cent of the Hoover commission recommendations which do not require legislative action.

His report was made in a letter to Chairman John L. McClellan, D. Ark., of the senate executive procedures committee.

The budget bureau, he said, listed 61 steps which could be taken without congressional action to carry out the Hoover commission proposals for government reorganization.

Of the total, he said, 21 administrative steps were completed, 18 partly completed, seven were being studied and 11 had not yet been acted upon at all.

He said 78 reorganization plans, subject to congressional approval, would be required to carry out other commission recommendations. Of these, he said, 13 were completed, 14 partly completed, 60 not acted upon and two blocked by senate disapproval.

Egg Prices Reducing Flocks

**Hagerman Man Keeps Medal
He Won for Oratory in 1898**

By HUGHETTE WINEGAR

HAGERMAN, March 2 — Silas
Condit was awarded his medal
which is thought to be the first or-
atorical contest in the state of Idaho,
at any rate it certainly was the first
in southern Idaho. The contest was
held Feb. 22, 1898, in Gridley hall in
Hagerman.

Gridley hall was named for Char-
ley Gridley, an early day settler
of the region. "As time goes on re-
member," Condit recalled, "the other
men competing were Glenn Perry
and Goshone, the rest of this part
of the country was nothing but sage-
brush, jack-rabbits and coyotes."

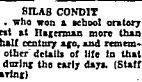
"Charley Reeves (the school-
master) who now practices law in
Boise was the teacher that year. It
was the only year he taught in
Hagerman. As I remember, that
spring he enlisted and went to fight
in the Spanish war."

"There were three judges, but the
only one I can remember was Stan-
ley Hagerman. I can remember, as
the man for whom Hagerman was
named. He also made the presenta-
tion of the medal."

"I spoke a simple little piece en-
titled 'My Going to Play My Wash-
ington' but I remember, as though
it were today the impressive recita-
tion given by a man from
Boise in the name of 'Black Horse
and His Rider.' I was only 8 years
old at the time and that piece im-
pressed me nearly as much as win-
ning the medal."

"There were two other contestants
from the Hills school, Annie Cur-
ran Bussey, who still lives here and
Lura Miller, who I believe, makes
her home in Boise."

"The schoolhouses in those days
were very primitive. They were
made of adobe, and the roof was
made of brush. The schoolhouse
Condit explained, "The schoolhouse
was a single one-room affair heated
by a brush-burner. The schoolboard
hired a man to cut and deliver sage-
brush to the school. Lighting was
provided when it was necessary, by
a coal-oil lamp," Condit recalled. "As
a rule we walked to school. Few of
us ever had over two miles to walk
and that was nothing in those days.
The district schools were located
fairly close together making a long
or walk unnecessary."

Most of Idaho Acreage Held By Individuals

MOSSGOW, March 2 (AP)—Nearly 90 per cent of Idaho farm acreage is owned by individuals, according to a report of the U. S. department of agriculture received by the University of Idaho.

One per cent is owned by corporations. Public ownership accounts for 8.4 per cent, and 1.6 per cent is Indian land.

The figures, based on 1945 conditions show Idaho has 15,209,322 acres in farms.

Idaho's percentage of individual ownership is above the national mark of 82 per cent. Corporate ownership in the nation is 1.6 per cent. Idaho's corporate ownership is lower than the 11 western states, topping all states in individual ownership to Virginia, with 98.8 per cent.

Other statistics in the survey include: Thirty-seven per cent of Idaho's farms are operated by the owners, compared with a national average of 33 per cent.
