### Electric Transmission Line's Construction Details Reviewed

By LUCENE CLEMENTS

AMERICAN FALLS, March 3.—It took just a slight twist of the wrist from Operator Roy Kemmerton to bring the control switch in reverse and to send a 138,000-volt charge surging down the Idaho Power line, right out of the sagbrush and 110 miles below here and the new plant at Blida.

Fred Sawyer, local superintendent in charge of the line, was thrown at 8:30 a.m. Wednesday, as another step in progressive industry. For many hours here were made beginning at 10:15 p.m. Tuesday, supervised by the line foreman, Boles, Boise, and American Falls.

Final adjustments were made on the line late Saturday, and the 90-mile local run returned to normal.

Line foremen were Frank Servin and Clyde Schott, who were in charge of the line.

Government litigation against the power company early in August held up the procedure until late September.

The line provides increased power for expanding industries in the American Falls area, particularly the new Westaco electric furnaces, one of the most recent of which is valued at \$50,000.

The increased power, according to Operator Don Rae, already has stabilized the voltage conditions in the area of the power company.

He also reported the full current was in running from Boise to American Falls, on to Westvaco, into Utah, and to the Great Arconada line, and is ready for use by the northwest power pool, where power can be bought when needed at various plants.

Sawyer stated, "to give an idea of the volume of electricity the Westvaco industry alone has a light bill of \$108 an hour, or \$2,800 a day, and they draw more power than can possibly be generated at the local plant."

Erection of this triple line is considered to have put into use the heaviest line ever placed on wooden structures in Idaho.

The line, which is valued at \$4 cents a foot, it was placed from a special rail constructed by the American Falls dam in 1918, down through the years to this present, modern plant, recent improvements and the line just constructed.

### Ruling Favors Paper's Claim In Radio Suit

BOISE, March 3 (UP)—District Judge O. E. Winstead has awarded \$1 damage to the Statesman Printing company in its \$100,000 suit against radio station KIDO.

Five other stations were involved in suits stemming from a broadcast by Sen. Glen H. Taylor.

The printing company, publisher of the Idaho Daily Statesman and the Idaho Evening Statesman, charged that damaging statements were contained in its broadcasts.

The court decision followed a stipulation agreement that included radio stations KVMY and KSTP at Twin Falls and KBEI at Pocatello.

Maurice Greene, Statesman attorney, said a similar action against station KID at Idaho Falls was dismissed by stipulation of the parties.

He added that the suit against station KID at Burley may yet reach the court.

In settling the suits, the following stipulation was filed in court by the station:

"Just prior to the 1934 election, radio stations KIDO, KSTP, KVMY, KBEI and KID broadcast as a paid political advertisement, a transcription of an address by Sen. Glen H. Taylor. In that address specific mention was made of the Idaho Daily Statesman.

"Senator Taylor's remarks concerning the Statesman have been ruled by the courts to be libelous. The radio stations involved accept the findings of the court, that the subject matter of the address, so far as it pertained to the Statesman, was libelous.

"They deeply regret the unjustifiable attack on the integrity of the Statesman was broadcast over their stations. At the time of the broadcast, the radio stations felt that under section 315 of the federal communications act of 1934 they had no power to censor the broadcast."

### Buhl FFA Team Takes Top Rank In Crop Contest

BUHL, March 3.—The Buhl high school FFA crop and weed judging team, accompanied by its instructor, Wilbur Holdrege, journeyed to Pocatello to compete last week in the state crop judging contest.

The Buhl team won first in the crop judging division. The team was made up of Jerry Ruffing, Jack Hunt and Howard Harder. Harder was the high point man in the crop judging contest.

The same team was entered in the potato grading contest and placed second. Jack Hunt was high point man for the state in this contest.

In the 13 years the Buhl Future Farmers of America judging team has placed first 11 times; the other two years it was second.

### Wheat Called Too Costly to Feed Poultry

SPokane, March 3 (UP)—It takes 10 dozen eggs to buy a bag of wheat and that's not chicken feed, in fact, it's too expensive for chicken feed, says Fred H. Cockell of the Oregon Poultry council.

He said a lot of surplus wheat is in northwest warehouses but poultry farmers can't afford to buy a great deal of it for their birds this year.

He noted that eight and one-half dozen eggs would buy a bag of wheat last year but that because of a decline in egg prices it takes 13 dozen today. A bag of wheat contains a little more than two bushels.

"The poultry industry is the third largest producer of cash income on farms," he told the Pacific Northwest Farm council, "and it could be an outlet for millions of bushels of wheat if prices were right."

Cockell, who lives at Millwauve, Ore., said the Poultry council in his state favors the certificate plan as a means of obtaining feed wheat at a price competitive with corn imported from the middle west.

Officials explained the certificate plan would give farmers the right to sell grain in the open market while protected in the amount of 60 cents a bushel by a certificate obtained in advance of the crop season.

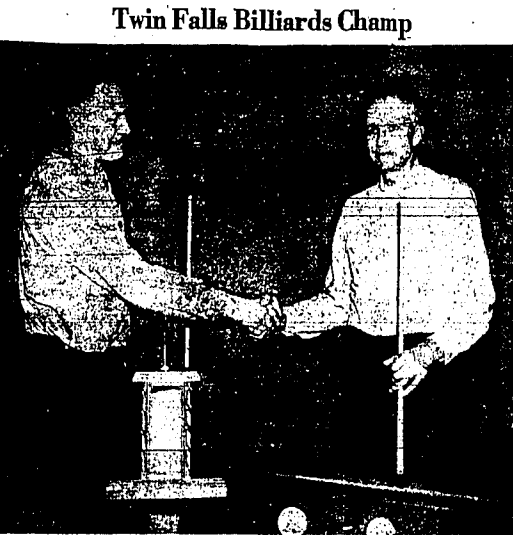

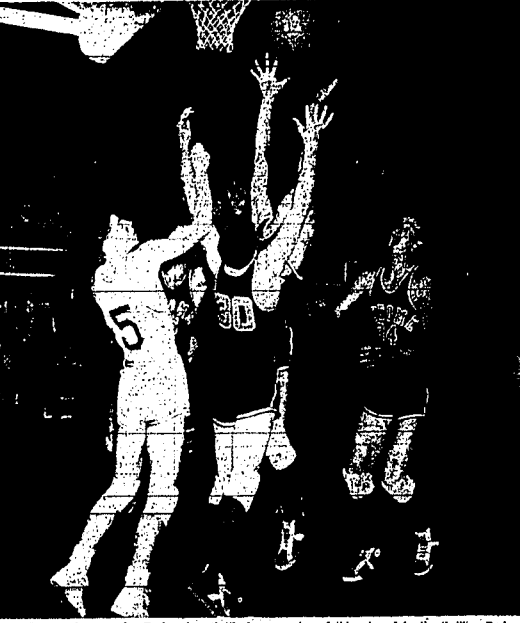
