Some of these unhappy lives can be avoided if better use is made of Idaho's eugenic sterilization law. This will protect the mentally deficient from interbreeding without any change in social characteristics or capacities.
While a superintendent of the Bonanza state home for the feeble-minded in California more than 5,000 operations were performed before discharge. This did not interfere with fully satisfactory marriages. Having learned from other patients who had the operation that no change resulted, many of them would ask me, "Doctor, isn't it about time for my operation?"
Some of them whom I saw later would tell me that they had married and were able to support themselves but couldn't have done so if there had been children.
If more people knew, as doctors do, that sterilization does not remove any organ from the body or interfere with its working, Idaho's law for the protection of the insane and the feeble-minded would be more widely used.

Colorful Life Concludes for Area Woman

BELEVUE, March 4—Mrs. Dororo Draper, 80, died at 10 a. m. today of pneumonia at her home, Mrs. Draper was a daughter of the late Venable at Kelchup, a well known resident since 1902.

Draper was born in England and came to this country in 1882 with her parents when she was 3 years old. They settled in California, later moving to Eugene, Ore.

She was married to John A. Draper at Ruby Hill, Ore., in May, 1888. Her husband died after several years in Nevada went to South Africa at a later date. The couple had six children, three of whom are still living.

Draper was a member of the outburst of the Boer war, and returned to the U. S. Her husband followed when he was able to find his holdings, which he sold in Wisconsin, then returned to Bellevue in 1902. He succeeded in 1908. He later became an artist in Bellevue. Mr. Draper sank a large portion of his money salvaged from Africa into unsuccessful Hard Times mine.

Draper had been a member of the Methodist Episcopal church for many years and was a member of the First Presbyterian church. Her survivors include the daughter, Catherine, and three others, Mrs. M. B. Baker and Mrs. Mary Taylor, both Ogden, and Mrs. Dororo (Draper) Carey, two sons, Eldon Draper, Bellevue, and Fred Draper, Portland, and a grandson who died from infancy, John Draper. She left eight other grandchildren and 13 great-grandchildren.

Funeral services will be held at 2 o'clock on Tuesday at the Bellevue Community church with the Rev. Vernon Hall, pastor of the Haller Community church, officiating. Burial will be in the graveyard. Mrs. Draper was 86 years of age.

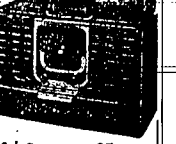

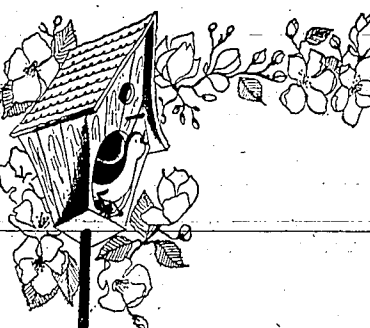

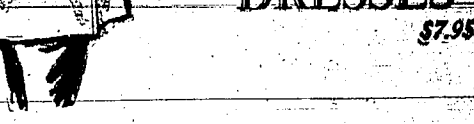

Entries must not exceed 800 words and will be judged on the basis of 65 points for effectiveness, 20 points for originality, 15 points for practical application of the subject matter and 10 points for grammatical correctness. The U.S. has been divided into six regions and winners from each region will compete for the six national awards.

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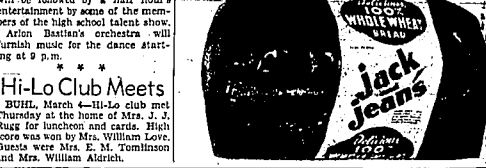

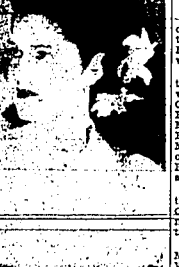

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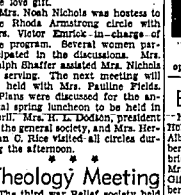

Class Studies

Atomic Age's Possibilities

FILER, March 4—Keeping pace with the possibilities of cheap atomic and other forms of power, Filer high school students are exploring the possibilities of Twin Falls county clay deposits becoming valuable natural resources for the area.

They are learning more than reading, writing and arithmetic in a wide program of academic studies, extra-curricular activities, vocational and manual training courses.

Study Local Clays In addition to regular courses in vocational and manual training, there are courses in leather working, photography and ceramics. It is the "ceramics class" taught by Mahlin S. Hansen, that the students are studying clay in this week.

The course in ceramics covers the study and use of clays in making pottery, brick, tile and similar material. The students have taken the initiative in testing various types of local clays.

Find Fire Clays Some clays have been found to be useful in making pottery, brick and tile. Other Twin Falls county clays are found to have a high fusing point, 2,000 degrees Fahrenheit, classifying them as fire clays. Still others can be classed as pure clays since they remain white after baking. Cheap power is needed to make the industry economically feasible.

Hansen points out modern education is concerned with providing youth with a wide but balanced program of school and opportunities.

Look around the sky and "other worlds," both seen and unseen. Excluding the earth and planets of this solar system, there are known planets. Of those, easily seen without optical aid, not too near the direction of Venus now rises in the east about two hours before sunrise and swings somewhat as it climbs the heavens. Its greatest apparent brilliancy can be seen as a tiny blue-green star in a clear sky.

Between 9 and 5:30 a. m. on two weeks, search a star on the sun's north pole. You are on the shady side, but the chance of spotting it is the best.

Close Together
Mercury are very near in the dawn sky, but near the sun for observation. They are in line just before the evening sky. About 8 o'clock later if you save some considerably west of your time meridian—Mars, very red and glowing with a decidedly clear horizon almost

March 8, the big full moon on the sky alongside the planet. The following evening, it will be much further east and will be a hour later. This will observe a good idea of the eastward action around the planet.

Above Mars
Mercury higher than Mars, and somewhat farther, yellow Saturn shines high and almost level with the two planets—Mercury and Saturn—very bright star Regulus. most distant planet, Pluto, is very near the blade. Although it can be seen through telescopes, it may be some satisfaction in a spot very slightly west of the tip of the blade.

Another distant planet, in the south of directly 40 degrees, now appears to be seen through telescopes. Even Mars will be nearer than it at any time since 1946.

Life in MAGIC VALLEY

Many a youngster has been calling his back out on the bench these days in Magic Valley watching the home team play in district tournaments or being in line for a "hot" apple.

Probably, one in ten far away Tri-State, there's an ex-HEYBURN basketball player who's doing a lot of remote cheering for the old home team. No wonder, for the "hot" apple is a "hot" one.

Blair, 20, who tossed the ball for the team, struck the river for several scores.

Glen is the son of Mrs. Grace Baker, Heyburn postmistress. After graduation, he played basketball for SICE, Albion, for one year, and two years ago entered the army, going overseas in May. On Christmas day he played basketball in Austria, and during the season he has been a top scorer.

Glen has traveled extensively on the continent, taking advantage of a chance to see a lot of the world. Saturday, he left for Germany.

When he hears of the fine record of the Heyburn kids, he'll probably lose in a few field goals over there in their honor.

"That old saying, 'Some people get all their breaks' is aptly illustrated to Scoutmaster Walt Thueson for he received two breaks that turned out to be both bones in his right leg, below the knee.

And if you've ever wondered if all this training Boy Scouts are given is ever actually used and applied—we have the answer to that question, too.

The story goes about like this—Scoutmaster Thueson of LDB troop 35, with 15 Boy Scouts from 12 to 18 years of age, and Kelly Jackson, outdoorsman of the troop committee, started out on a hike on the old Odeon trail, five miles south and five west of JEROME to the river canyon.

The Scouts had been studying hard so they could pass various tests. First, they had to pass a test on the use of the knife. Then they had to pass a test on the use of the ax. Little did they dream what they were actually going to put to use in their honor.

The first descent to the canyon floor is a sheer wall and the Scouts used a ladder which has been in this particular spot for years—all went well.

The next level of 10 feet is steep with all sizes of rocks to crawl over.

Scoutmaster Thueson noticed the smallest Scouts were having difficulty in descending so all stopped and tied a heavy rope over a well anchored rock and then used this to make their way down to walking level—all went well.

The boys had a wonderful time, built their fires at the old fish hatchery, passed their tests and ate their fill.

But the return trip was a different story—all went well until they reached the sharp ascent from which hung the rope. Before Scoutmaster Thueson reached the rope, two of the larger Scouts had made the ascent, hand over hand over the rocks and reached the ladder safely. When one of the smaller chaps grabbed for the rope, Scoutmaster Thueson said, "Better let me try that first—it'll be sure it's safe." He swung himself from the first rock to the second rock, about three feet, when he began to swing to the next rock and when the rope came loose and he fell—very far, between five and six feet—but far enough to break his leg.

To show you what Boy Scouts can do—with a piece of wood and three suckers—they fixed splints for the painful leg, then after getting most of the little boys on top of the canyon, they tied the rope under the Thueson's arms and the little Scouts on top held the rope high to keep the slack out while the larger ones
