Carrier's Patrons Confused By 'Wrong Side' Right Side

MURTAUGH, March 10—W. B. Lindau, Murtaugh rural mail carrier, is creating a great deal of comment and excitement here this week with his new truck. It has a right-hand drive.

Comments varied from persons wondering if they were "seeing things" to veterans who were in England, recalling war days dodging reversed traffic and driving problems.

The right hand drive permits the carrier to place the mail in the box without reaching across the seat and the mail bags. It will speed up the time it takes to complete the route.

The one-half-ton truck, believed to be the first in this area, features a left-hand shift, has a wide seat, all metal cab, and a four speed transmission.

Recalling the growth of the route Lindau said he started the route in 1927 with a model T Ford. His transportation methods have varied during bad weather he has used a bobbed and riders horse-back.

The route has grown from 15 miles tri-weekly to 50 miles six days a week. In 1927, 150 pieces of mail were handled and there were 41 families and 32 boxes. Now there are 2000 pieces of mail handled and 200 boxes for 250 families.

Asked if it was confusing to operate the right-hand drive, Lindau reported it always has been easy for him to use his left hand as it is his right hand.

Restriction Is Asked to Aid On Education

CHICAGO, Ill., March 10—Federal aid to education in the United States should be expanded for public schools only, a tax supported Parents and Teachers National Convention said today in a statement clarifying its stand on the issue now before congress.

The statement, signed by Mrs. Rollin Brown of Los Angeles, legislative committee chairman, and released through the organization's headquarters here, was as follows:

"Traditionally the National Congress of Parents and Teachers has supported the public school as the cornerstone of democracy. In every way the integrity of the public school systems because they have recognized the important part these schools have played in the perpetuation of American democratic principles and in the unification of the American people.

"It now appears that only federal aid will make a program of sound public education available to all children.

"The National Congress of Parents and Teachers is committed to the explicit and unqualified principle that, with safeguards for maximum local and minimum federal control, such aid should be expended for publicly controlled, tax-supported schools only."

Panel discussions on the weekly and daily newspapers and addresses by outstanding newspaper men and women are scheduled for the morning and afternoon sessions.

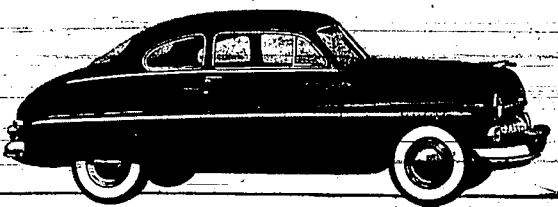

Teachers who are rated according to the averages their classes make in the subjects they teach are unjustly rated, and so is the class. There is no average child and no average class. No average mark tells the truth, so what good is it? More headaches has been caused by this stupid practice in the schools than by any other form of educational error. 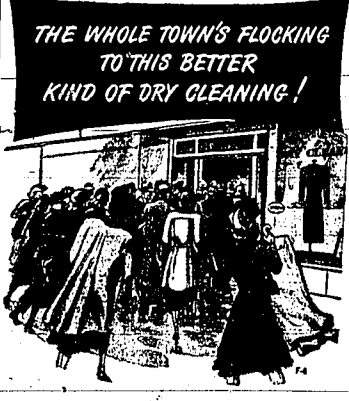

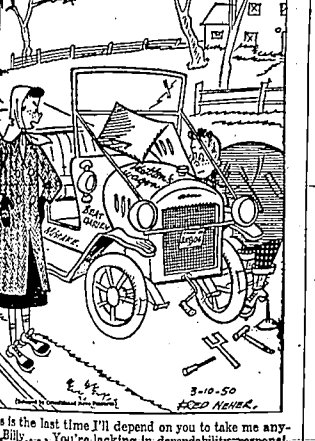

By a vote margin, 310 to 296, Prime Minister Attlee's socialists beat a conservative motion which would have ended the nationalization of the iron and steel industry. A defeat would have forced the government to resign only two weeks after a second term in a close general election.

Still ahead of the government, whose overall majority in the house of commons was cut yesterday to only 41 seats—a vote margin.

This, despite the government's failure to suggest housing program improvements in the speech it prepared for King George to deliver at parliament's opening last Monday.

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Chicago Firm Is Blamed for Texas "Beef"

DALLAS, March 10.—O. F. Reed, a state meat inspector, said he had received information that horse meat shipments to Texas originated in Chicago. The horse meat was sold in Texas as beef tenderloin.

It previously had been announced that a Kansas City meat commission firm had arranged the shipment of horse meat through a Dallas food broker. On arrival in Dallas, the meat was turned over to a Dallas meat packing firm and some of it was distributed to Houston and Fort Worth.

In Dallas, 4,000 pounds of horse meat, labeled as beef tenderloin, was seized by federal, state and city health inspectors at the Fort Worth 3,000 pounds were confiscated and in Houston, 1,911.

It was established that Houston consumers had eaten more than 3,000 pounds of horse meat and in Fort Worth and Dallas, also, horse meat had been sold for public consumption.

The Dallas food broker and meat packer said they had paid beef tenderloin prices for the meat and were not looking for horse meat. Reed at Dallas described the sale of horse meat as a \$1,000,000 racket and said he was pressing the investigation.
