"Ace-in-Hole" Uranium Ores Seen for U.S.

WASHINGTON, March 11 (AP)—America's supply of uranium for atom bombs may be bigger than most people think.

Whispers and even announcements of new discoveries in recent months hint that the nation's power-packed element probably has been located here at home to strengthen this country's hand considerably in international dickering.

Many Need Censor

The United States still may have to lean heavily on Belgian and Canadian uranium mines for some time, much uranium comes from the Belgian Congo.

But even in the United States both the government and private citizens are putting on a nation-wide hunt for the element.

It is not clear how the work being done will guarantee a good price for the stuff.

Many Ores Reported

The atomic energy commission says "a large number" of uranium finds were reported in the past year in the West. Most of the work was done as a matter of fact, there already is some production in Colorado.

But the report says that the work of stepping up the uranium output at home was an announcement of a new era in the industry.

They said what is believed to be the world's largest deposit of uranium and rare earth oxides anywhere in the world has been found near there in Big Bend near the Colorado-Utah border.

Geologists and engineers say the deposits are 50 to 500 feet thick and contain more than can be mined out by the relatively cheap method of leaching ore out of the ground.

Heyburn's Art Exhibit Opening Today; Superior Quality Is Noted in Preview

BUTLER, March 11.—Sunday afternoon the doors of Heyburn high school auditorium will open to admit visitors to the first showing of the 15th annual art exhibit, which has become one of the traditional events in the cultural life of Magic Valley residents.

Exhibiting for two weeks, the show will be open to visitors each afternoon and evening, except Saturday. Frank Watson, Heyburn high school principal and director of the exhibit, announced.

Although the number of paintings this year does not quite equal that of some years previous, the quality is superior, officials of the exhibit said. Friday when completing the cataloging of entries. The variety and types of paintings and subjects make the exhibit one of the finest and most interesting since the first show in 1933.

On three walls of the school auditorium are four paintings of this year's exhibit, while the fourth wall contains the 38 paintings which comprise the school's permanent gallery. Each year, another picture, and one which she collected during her travels.

Outstanding stills are the florals of Michael Cannon, Utah painter. His "Cherry Blossoms" is a study in white, showing fresh blossoms in a vase, with a small Oriental figure at the base.

Alf Moller, Magic Valley painter, has three still life pictures, two of which were in "figure arrangement." Neil Miller, Preston painter, has his exhibit before, again has placed one of his floral paintings at Heyburn.

Two portraits by Mildred Miller, Valley Center, Calif., will appeal especially to art lovers. "Clara" is a beautiful woman with a cereus dress and a white flower in her dark hair, while "John" is a more solemn person with deeper and more somber coloring.

The artist, who once managed the Pennsylvania Academy of Art, has painted portraits of many famous people and is well known throughout the United States. She has another picture, "The Pool," which is a study in blue and white.

Meeting old friends will be the pictures of Hans Jorgensen, Florence T. Ware, Paul E. Smith, Paul Salisbury, LeComte Stewart, and J. V. Anderson. These artists have exhibited at the Heyburn art exhibit before, and their paintings are popular with art patrons, especially those who enjoy true western scenery.

E. T. Anderson, Utah painter, has two paintings which will be popular with visitors. "Looty," a study in orange, has a lonely cowboy on his horse overlooking a colorful scene, such as found in southern Utah. "Looty" shows a typical ranch home, with low hills in the background, and "Unexplored" is a southern colorful painting of Utah. Visitors should watch for the three excellent Indian figures in Anderson's paintings, Watson said.

LeComte Stewart, Kaysville, Utah, another well known painter, has several paintings which will appeal to lovers of the out-of-doors. "March in the Hills" is a summer ranch scene with deep green pastures, while "A Day in March" is a ranch scene, quite the opposite, with snow-laden trees, and a somber, yet home-like, ranch house scene.

Paul Salisbury, Provo, Utah, has two typical western pictures, while Harold Woolston, American Fork, Utah, has two canyon scenes. Mrs. Van Gott, Provo, has sent a group of six paintings by various artists from the Provo gallery.

Two Indian pictures, "Indian War Bows" and "Indian Country," by Florence Ware will appeal to visitors. Paul K. Smith, Denver, whose colorful city scenes were popular last year, is exhibiting landscapes this year.

"The Freightier," one of a group of four paintings by Hans Jorgensen, is certain to be a favorite with art patrons. Although it is dark in coloring, the quiet scene of a freighter, plowing through a moonlit sea, is a beautiful and a moonlit scene.

"The Haystack," showing farmers putting up hay, is sure to be popular in this farming community.

Another interesting painting is Robert Atwood, who started out as an electrical engineer but ended up being a painter. He also is an accomplished colorist, having painted with eastern emphyrean orchestras. "The Ernst Farm," a winter farm scene, and "Autumn on the Rio Grande" are always exhibition favorites.

Among the unusual paintings, a scene bound to be popular with children are two pictures by Belva Parley depicting children. Both pictures are entitled "Artist and Critic." Picture number one shows two small boys, one doing the painting while the second boy, with his hand to his chin, muses, looking on critically.

The second picture depicts two girls, one modeling with clay, while the second girl squints critically at the object. The third Parley painting is "Heritage of the Sage," a log cabin scene.

Moller will show two Teton scenes, and Oliver Panson, Ephraim, will show several winter scenes. Henry Moore, Logan, Utah, also has chosen to display Teton lake scenes. Other fine artists in the show are A. R. Mitchell, Leroy E. Greene, Jack Voege, Walter Dean Ferguson, Russell O. Mann, and Burman Pearlman.

Pearlman's pictures have a rugged quality about them which make one want to reach out and touch them. The themes and scenes depicted are as rugged as the mountains still arising Friday were more paintings to be shown at the exhibit, and the job of carefully unpacking, cataloging and finally hanging each picture takes a great deal of time and patience, exhibit officials said.

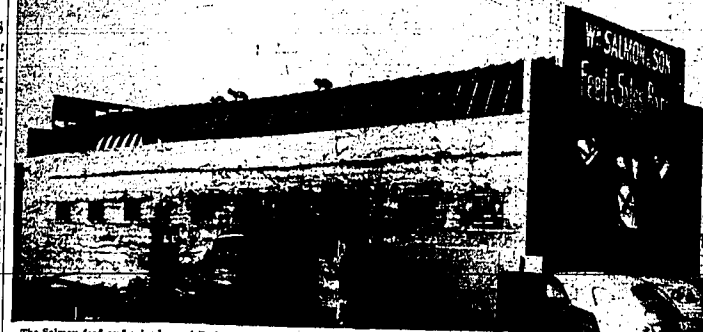

Magic Valley Grass Raising Project Starts

JEROME, March 11—How to raise grass seed as a cash crop was explained to some 40 Magic Valley farmers at a meeting here this week by Russell H. Blair, manager of the Magic Valley Experiment Station. The meeting was called by the North Side Soil Conservation district. Sixteen farmers signed to raise seed under the district's seed production program. The raised acreage to hold 50 per cent of the seed produced for a six-month period for sale to nursery and cooperators. After that the seed can be sold to anyone. The district supplies certified seed and technical assistance.

Conservation Aspects
Blair pointed out how systems do not increase the organic matter in the soil nor do they protect the soil from erosion. In contrast, a conservation crop, increasing organic matter, stopping soil movement and preventing weed invasion.

Grass seed supply is and has been extremely short and many farmers wishing to plant grass with legumes or in pastures have been hard pressed to find it. Most of the seed will be planted this coming spring and some seed will be available from this planting.

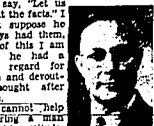

AS YOUR MINISTER SEES IT

The Facts

In seminary days I had on Old Testament professor who had a high regard for facts. When a student would under the pressure of this man's scholarly presentation of the fact would rise to challenge the professor, and likewise rise to defend a pet prejudice, he would look earnestly at the budding theologian and say, "Let us get at the facts first."



As a people we are so scientific in science and so unscientific outside of it. Can it be that we want the facts and are willing to build on them in our factories, laboratories, farms and exploration in a mundane world; and we do not want them in government, in economics and industry; and refuse them in the church? Can't we talk about improving the government without injecting the score of dictatorship? Can't we discuss economics that differ from the status quo without calling someone a communist? Can't we face the facts of the frankly in the church without using the meaningless epithets of "reactionary" and "modernist"? Dr. E. Stanley Jones was right when he said, "Our trouble is not that we are too scientific, but rather that we are not scientific enough." It is not easy for any one of us to lift himself above his feelings long enough to think clearly today, and to see life steadily and see it whole.

How often we imagine we are thinking when we are only engaged in rearranging our prejudices. In no field is it more necessary today, (shall we say for our own happiness and personal safety?) to honestly face the facts, than in the field of international relations. The scarier commodity in our time are these facts. We read and hear plenty from the mouthings of newscasters but precious little about actual situations from the pens and lips of gentle diplomats.

After a recent outbreak of boasting and hating I wrote in deep sorrow of those words which for me characterize not the scientific and Christian quest for a better world; but the insane psychology so presently practiced:

respect for what it does say. I think we are on more solid ground today in Biblical interpretation because science has forced upon the theologian the inductive process of study.

What amazes me is frankly this: As a people we are so scientific in science and so unscientific outside of it. Can it be that we want the facts and are willing to build on them in our factories, laboratories, farms and exploration in a mundane world; and we do not want them in government, in economics and industry; and refuse them in the church? Can't we talk about improving the government without injecting the score of dictatorship? Can't we discuss economics that differ from the status quo without calling someone a communist? Can't we face the facts of the frankly in the church without using the meaningless epithets of "reactionary" and "modernist"? Dr. E. Stanley Jones was right when he said, "Our trouble is not that we are too scientific, but rather that we are not scientific enough." It is not easy for any one of us to lift himself above his feelings long enough to think clearly today, and to see life steadily and see it whole.
