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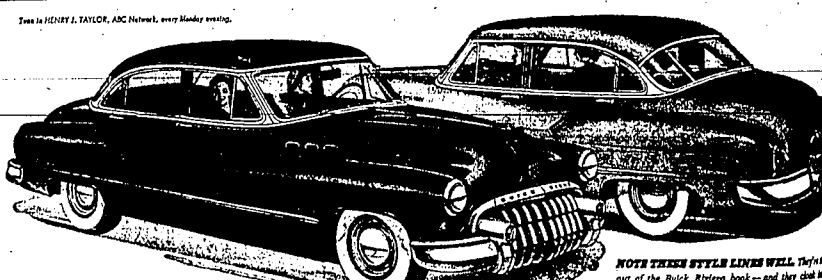

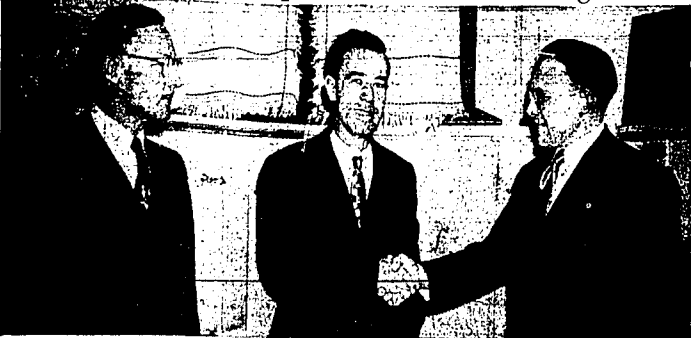

 The announcement said Premier Joseph Stalin was elected "unanimously" as deputy to the supreme Soviet. Eleven other members of the politburo also were elected "unanimously."

### Home Unsafe In Next War; Survey Finds

LONDON, March 14 (AP)—If there is another war, you might be safer at the fighting front than at home. A United Press survey of secret and semi-secret weapons ready for use or in the laboratory stage shows the art of killing civilians is far outpacing that of killing soldiers. Soldiers would have plenty of trouble in a new holocaust. They are away, and more or less expected. But next time, if any civilians are expected to take the heaviest beating and the heaviest casualties.

**H-Bomb Too Vast**  
The hydrogen bomb would be a weapon for too vast to use on the fighting front. If it is ever dropped, it almost certainly will be aimed against a great metropolis or possibly behind the lines of an advancing army to devastate their communications lines and base areas.

Actually only a handful of targets are large enough to warrant its use, places like New York, Chicago, San Francisco, Los Angeles, Philadelphia or Boston.

A British scientist told the United Press that, barring the hydrogen bomb, he raised the terror weapons of any new war in this order:  
1. Germ bombs—To spread plague and mark big cities.  
2. Atomic bombs—For use against cities or large concentrations of troops.

**Radioactive Clouds**  
Radioactive clouds—To lay waste agricultural areas and cities.  
"Sound bombs"—To break civilian morale.

"Sound bombs" would be used for the employment of prolonged high-pitched noises, the full effects of which are not known.

Poison gases for use against either armies or civilians. There are new "shells" upon which are now mounted by light tanks as in World War I and for which there are no effective antidotes.

And any or all of these could be carried to the target by guided missiles as well as by conventional planes.

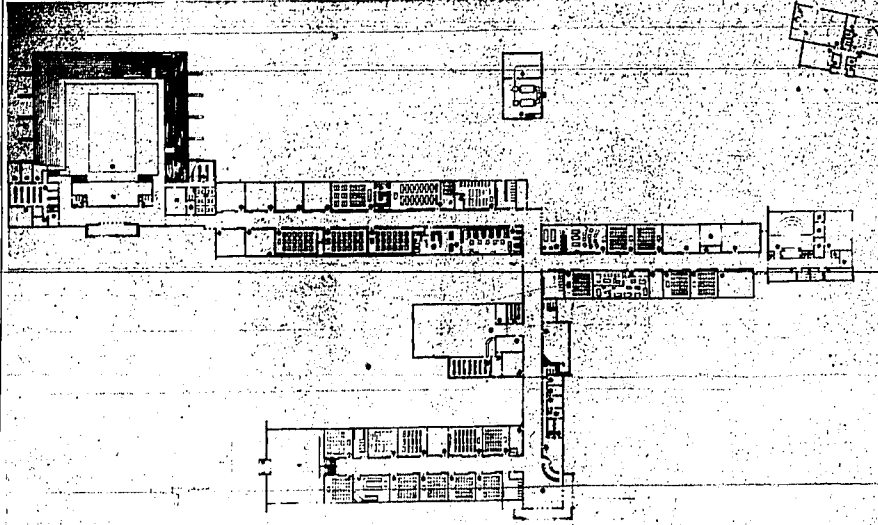

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### Truman Lives In High Style, GOPer Finds

WASHINGTON, March 14 (AP)—President Truman, with his yacht and his big motor launch, is in the world of the best paid man in the world.

At least that's the way it looks to a Republican congressman who has made a close study of how the chief executive lives.

Rep. Roy D. Woodruff, R., Mich., says Mr. Truman has a yearly salary of \$100,000 after taxes, a pretty substantial take-home pay by any standards in these days of high taxes.

But it's not just the salary that impresses Woodruff.

**NO OARS, 3 FLAMES**

The president, he noted, also sports a fleet of 35 automobiles, two planes, a private Pullman car, a yacht, a motor destroyer escort and a couple of vacation hideaways.

They cost an estimated \$30,433,000 originally and are manned by 665 people whose salary runs to about \$1,200,000 a year, Woodruff said.

A private launch, he added, would need \$2,500,000 a year to live on the same scale.

**Navy Pays for Yacht**

The president's yacht, the *Willamowitz*, would cost a private owner \$250,000 a year. The navy, which supplies a crew of 100 men, stands the expense.

The president's two planes, complete with kitchen facilities and stoves, are paid for by the air force. The independence, a super-deluxe DC-3, costs \$100,000 a year for the crew alone.

Woodruff said Mr. Truman's private railroad car, with radio, telephones, kitchen, dining room, bedrooms and shower, cost between \$250,000 and \$300,000 originally. It requires the services of a steward and two mess boys from the *Willamowitz*, he said.

**Marines Guard Retreat**

The marines supply a detail of four officers and 50 men to guard Mr. Truman's hideaway retreat, Shangri-La, in the Catskill mountains of Maryland, 70 miles from Washington.

But what caught Woodruff's eye was Mr. Truman's trout boat. It has gold-plated doorhandles, vanities and perfume cases. And its roof is specially designed so Mr. Truman and his guests can get in and out without taking off their top hats.

**Red Cross Chooses Early-Day Nurse for Her "Ideal" Career**

Bertha G. Wilson, who was one of the few qualified nurses in Magic Valley when she arrived here in 1910, has been selected by local Red Cross chapter officials as the local nurse whose career most fully fits the ideals of Jane A. Delano, founder of the Red Cross nursing service.  
 The selection was made as an observance of Jane Delano's birthday Sunday and was based on Miss Wilson's continuous service to community and armed forces nursing work.  
 The Twin Falls nurse came to the area in 1910 after receiving her training and serving as head nurse at the Wilcox Training school, Cook county, Ill. Immediately after her arrival, she was urged to aid in the construction of the construction of Salmon dam and served for three months. Upon her return to Twin Falls she helped operate small private hospitals until World War I, which resulted in a need for nurses in 1917.  
 Miss Wilson had been a volunteer Red Cross nurse for several years before World War I and was called to army service from the Red Cross nursing work at military nurses at the time. In August, 1918,  
 "Upon her discharge from the service in April, 1919, she pitched right into civilian nursing once more. She took a course in public health nursing at Teachers' college, Columbia university, and went to work as a public health nurse at various points in Idaho and Oregon. During this time she became the first public school nurse in the city of Portland.  
 She continued her nursing work in Portland, taking several summers off to complete her studies for a degree from the University of Oregon, until 1927. In that year she returned to Chicago as a director in the educational department of Cook county hospital. She later became an assistant director of nursing service in the surgical department of the hospital and had supervision over 700 beds and eight operating rooms.  
 In 1928 Miss Wilson transferred to the Good Samaritan hospital, Portland, as director of nursing, and served there until 1928 when she "retired" to Twin Falls.  
 Her retirement was short-lived as the United States soon found itself in World War II with a need for nurses in the expanding armed services. Miss Wilson volunteered for and became head of the Red Cross recruiting service for military nurses in the Twin Falls area. Her success is seen in the fact that her quota of nurses was always filled.

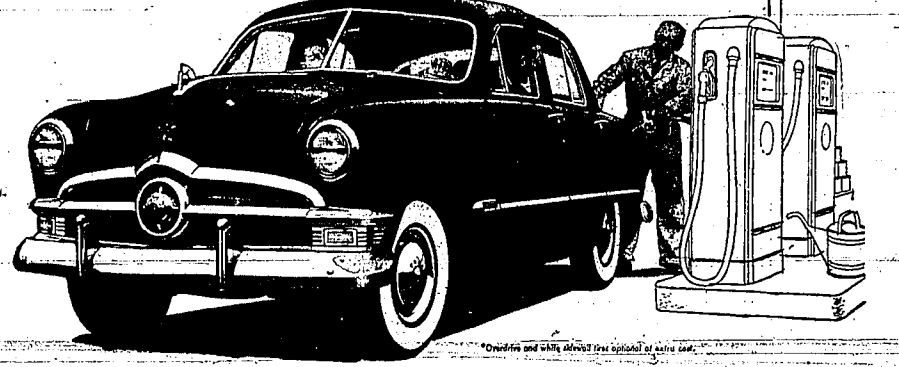

### Chaotic Radio War to Break Out in Europe

FRANKFURT, Germany, March 14 (AP)—A chaotic radio war is due to break out in Europe today.

United States authorities in Germany rejected a recent Copenhagen agreement among the big European nations, including Russia, to reassign radio frequencies which look away most American channels for tracing behind the iron curtain.

American authorities adopted their own frequency schedule for their broadcasts from the German frontier in the cold war. "This means we roamed around and found the frequencies which would best be used without too much interference with other countries," one official explained. "But there will be a howl from some of our countries—those—undoubtedly—there will be some interference."

Though the United States, which is financing western Europe's economic recovery, made stiff protests repeatedly, the reassignment of frequencies at the recent Copenhagen radio convention was to go into effect tonight.

By the change, countries behind the iron curtain got frequencies previously allotted to German stations which channel some American programs to listeners in the east. American and German officials called the Copenhagen agreement a major defeat for American broadcasting in its propaganda contest with communism.

### U. S. Is Held Not Liable for Loss of Water

PORTLAND, Ore., March 13 (AP)—Federal Judge James A. Fee ruled Monday that the government was not responsible for loss suffered by farmers when a reclamation canal broke and left their crops without irrigation water.

A total of 193 farmers in eastern Oregon's Malheur county had filed suit, asking nearly \$50,000 damages. The north canal of the Owyhee irrigation project in that county broke in July of 1946.

**Bureau Not Negligent**  
Judge Fee held that the plaintiffs had not proved that the bureau of reclamation, which built the canal, was negligent.

He ruled, however, that the government—though not liable for the lack of water—was liable for damage caused where the water flooded over farmland.

**Flood 'Trepasped'**  
He called the flooding a "trespass" and said that negligence did not need to be proved where that took place.

Meanwhile Gubitchev remains in jail. Gubitchev said he would sail March 20 aboard the Olympia-America liner Batery, the ship on which Communist Underground Leader Gerhart Ellner fled this country last year.

### Boost in Price of Soft Coal Planned

STRENGTHEN, March 14 (AP)—Speakers for the strike-weary soft coal industry today cautiously admitted they're preparing to tack a 10 to 20 cent hike per ton on the price of the fuel.

Whether the increase will be passed on to consumers, the spokesman said, depends on just what the boost amounts to.

When the United Mine workers' long strike against the industry ended a week ago operators forecast the probability of a raise in prices. Reports indicate there likely will not be a blanket increase. Rather, the boost will vary according to the financial situation and contract commitments of individual firms.

The spokesman declined to be quoted by name.

Murphy said the cooperating housing corporation would be set up with a potential financing capacity of several billion dollars. He said it would discriminate against existing loans now being paid for by veterans and others at interest rates practically double what the pending legislation calls for.

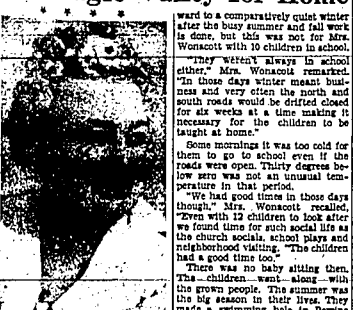

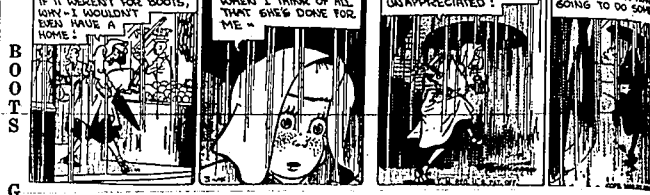

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### Senator Asks Impounding Of Revenues

WASHINGTON, March 16 (AP)—Senator Gordon R. Ore, today prepared to seek Senate approval of a plan to impound in a separate fund all revenues from 13 proposed new reclamation and power projects in the upper Columbia basin.

The Senate interior committee rejected his plan, in favor of a basin-wide fund.

Under Gordon's amendment, filed with the Senate today, money from power sales would be applied, after repayment of costs of the power units, to reducing the amounts to be charged water users on the new irrigation projects.

Gordon also proposed an amendment which would authorize construction of power units at dams on the McKenna and Bantam rivers in Oregon and at a re-regulation dam at Whitebridge. He estimated the total cost of this work at \$22,000,000.

No date has been set for Senate consideration of the bill.

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### Plane Purchased To Speed Travel Of State Officers

He said it would prove to be a faster and less costly method of travel than by auto or train to many parts of the state.

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### Acheson May Curb Talk of Soviet Deal

WASHINGTON, March 14 (AP)—Secretary of State Acheson is expected to slam the brakes this week on talk of a direct two-way action with Russia in the cold war.

It is anticipated that he will make his stand clear in two major speeches, one to be delivered Wednesday to the Commonwealth club at San Francisco, the other at the university of California at Berkeley on Thursday.

The speeches were arranged at a time when events are beginning to convince some of his advisers that Moscow might favor a two-world deal, based on the idea of spheres of influence and aimed at consolidating the communist empire in Europe and Asia.

Advance indications are that Acheson will again say "no" to any suggestion of direct American talks with Russia on matters which involve other nations and renew a plea for "total diplomacy" by the United States.

The secretary recently advanced the idea of "total diplomacy"—a peacetime version of "total war." He urged western unity and determination and said "no good would come from our taking the initiative in calling for conversations at this point."
