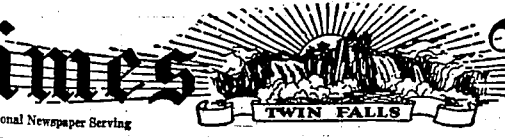

USDA Slates Crop Storage Plan Revision

WASHINGTON, March 15 (U.S.)—The government plans to use a new system for handling price supports for this year's crop, according to a report from the department.

The system may mean farmers will not like it. The agriculture department has announced that it has approved by Secretary of Agriculture Charles F. Brannan.

Under the new system the grower—and not the government—would store the surplus for surplus crops of these crops from harvest time until the government actually takes title to the crops the following spring.

What Cut Will?

That means growers will "net" less than the support price for surplus turned over to the government. In only those growers who use their own bins to store these crops would be able to make the full support price.

That's the way price supports always have operated for corn, barley and wheat. For surplus crops, however, they are largely farm-stored. Hitherto wheat, soybeans and flaxseed have received special treatment. They are crops which largely flow from farms into country elevators and terminal warehouses at harvest time.

Received Full Price

Under the old system all growers of these three crops netted the full support price for surplus turned over to the government. Some growers got more than the support price.

That's the way price supports always have operated for corn, barley and wheat. For surplus crops, however, they are largely farm-stored. Hitherto wheat, soybeans and flaxseed have received special treatment. They are crops which largely flow from farms into country elevators and terminal warehouses at harvest time.

N. Y. Mayor OK's Plan on Making Rain

NEW YORK, March 15 (U.S.)—Mayor William O'Dwyer plans to try \$20,000 on scientific rain-making experiment to end a year-long drought in the nation's biggest city.

He said he wanted to supply a team of meteorological experts with airplanes, radar and cloud-seeding apparatus immediately in hope of filling half-acre reservoirs before heavy summer convection begins.

Harvard Man Plans

Dr. Wallace E. Howell, Harvard university meteorologist, drew up the plan for the project.

If the scheme works out, the threat of weekly water holidays and other conservation measures would be ended for New Yorkers who have been asked to skip baths and showers at least once a week since December.

O'Dwyer asked the city board of estimate to appropriate the needed funds. The \$20,000 will finance the first six months of what he expects will be a year-long experiment.

Has Two Purposes

The plan has two purposes. Primarily it is aimed at forcing clouds over the city's upstate watershed area to loose their water, filling the city's reservoir which sank to critical levels last fall through rising consumption and a prolonged period of scanty rainfall.

The second aim is to give scientists knowledge of how best to induce and control artificial rain or snow.

All known means for making rain from clouds will be used, including flying over and through clouds will pour quantities of dry ice. Ground containers will cast silver iodide upward toward the cloud bottoms.

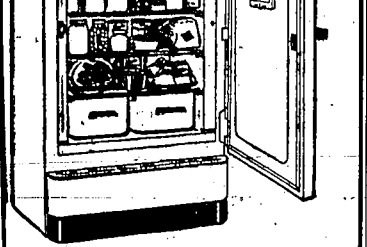
