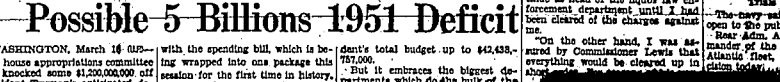

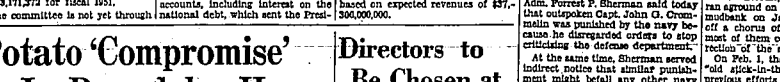

7. Stop systematically distorting to their own people the picture of the world outside their borders and of our country in particular.

8. Stop using Communist party apparatus to overthrow by subversive means established governments with which the Soviet government stands in an outward state of friendly and respectful relations.

### Test Well Site Change Brings Longer Delay for Striking Oil

By LUCILLE DUFFEE  
CLEMENS PERRY, March 16—More and Owyhee county residents literally are holding their breath these days, anxiously awaiting the results of the patient and methodical drilling which goes on night and day about eight miles south of Hammett, in search of "black gold," fabulous stuff of which men dream.

Visitors stream to the site in the hope they'll accidentally be there when the oil geologists say it there, comes in. But the citizenry will have to keep its breath bated a little longer. Drilling operations were halted at the 200-foot level this week in favor of a new site one mile north and four west, where equipment is being moved now.

The cutting tool, geared to do 300 revolutions per minute, had been slowed to 150 "rpm" because of the hardness of sand and shale through which the drill slowly was forcing its way. Rate of cutting averaged about 20 feet per eight-hour shift, and with every "cutting" of a new casing length the crew hopes, "Maybe this will be the last one!"

Geologists for the Hammett and Payne Oil company, Tulsa, Okla., mapped out three sites for drilling in the Indian Cove area, which lies in Owyhee county, just across the river from Elmore county.

The drilling crew moved in Jan. 1, and had its rig set up and ready to go Feb. 4. Mont Miller is superintendent of operations for the oil company, and Carl Hammett heads the drilling crew for Carpenter and Trent, drilling contractors from Rangely, Colo.

Miller, pointing out where the next drilling will take place, said he expected they would make a deep-

cut outfit would not go much beyond the 4,000 foot depth.

A four-man crew runs the rig for each eight-hour shift, and on duty were Ed Norman, Rangely, who operates in the "crow's nest" when it is necessary to change the drill point; Tom Lightner, Hammett, spokesman; Jack Reddon, driller, and E. D. Gosh, floor man.

Explaining how their rig works, Tom Lightner pointed to the series of huge tanks filled with grey-looking thin mud, told how it was mixed from such stuff as "mascobar" and water hauled to the site in 500-gallon tanks from nearby Snake river. The mud is forced by suction pumps into a huge six-inch fabric-constructed hose and then into the hole where cutting operations go on with hardly a break.

Two 350-horsepower diesel engines are housed in a shack back of the rig, with one a "standby" in case of failure of the other, so that the flow of mud into the hole may be constant.

After the mud goes down the hole, to serve as a filter for cutting debris as well as to cool the cutting drill, it comes back up with the cuttings, runs out another pipe at the side of the rig, over a "shale shaker" and back into the first of the series of tanks.

After it has passed through the tank series, it is ready for reuse in the hole. Shale and other cuttings which come out of the hole are run off into a large pit near the rig.

Each time the drill progresses an approximate 35 feet into the earth, its head is hauled up and an additional 20 feet of pipe is added to the casing which lines the wall of the hole.

Then "pictures" taken at the bottom of the hole through use of the "subsurface view" and "Tulco" show the hole is not being drilled perfectly straight, the entire works is lifted and a new drill installed. Lightner explained that when the hole starts going crooked, it means the drill is dull.

Besides the two 350-horsepower diesels for handling the mud, another 375-horsepower job provides power for the actual drilling process. Between the two in constant operation, the noise and vibration about the rig is terrific, but workers grow so used to the sound and feel they hardly notice.

They just patiently go on with their work, and every little while wander to the side to see what is coming out with the mud from the

hole, for it is there that all will make its first appearance, if they find it.

### Metal Prices Give Hints on U. S. Trends

NEW YORK, March 15.—Metal prices often reflect the state of industry and give hints as to which way the cycle is turning. Just a year ago, for example, they turned down sharply, and last summer they steadied.

Today they, like so many other indicators, are straggling. Some, like copper, are firm on rising in anticipation of a continued boom in building and a good market for home appliances and automobiles.

**Lead Still Falling**  
Others, like lead, are falling and the trade says it's the tinkering with trade and money by the governments of many nations that is to blame. Foreigners are dumping their lead here, with a thud that has sent the price down to 10 1/2 cents, a pound, lowest since government controls ended in the fall of 1942.

However, tin prices, rising after a long fall, show the aftermath of government control, which ended this week—among the list of wartime holds to be given them.

**Zinc Moves up**  
While zinc prices appear to be turning up again, partly as the result of the cold war—Washington is back in the market buying for a stockpile, after a year's absence.

Pressure is on in congress, too. Mining states want the government to spend \$80,000,000 a year for three years to aid in finding and mining strategic metals. Also, some domestic copper producers are clamoring once more for a restoration of the 2-cent-a-pound tariff, suspended when copper supplies in this country were so short during the postwar boom that foreign metal was sought eagerly.

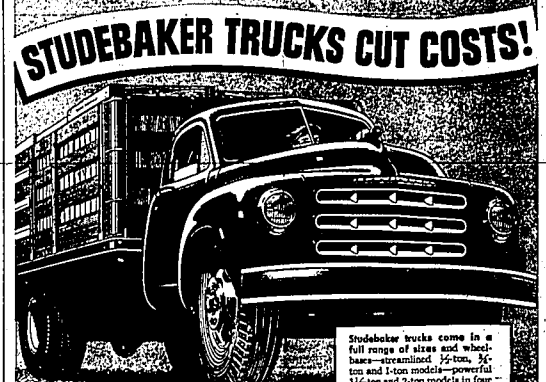
