Cobb Says Moderns Miss Finer Points of Baseball

HOUSTON, Tex., March 18 (AP)—Tyron Raymond Cobb, baseball immortal, cares little for the modern trend toward glugging, the lively ball and the general let-up in diamond defense.

Despite his lifetime batting average of .367, Cobb, who spends much of his time in Twin Falls, Idaho, looking after business interests, still is remembered primarily as the game's greatest base-stealer.

"In my day (1900-1928) one run decided a game more often than now," said Cobb who is stopped off here on his way home to Idaho Falls. "Great stress was laid on defense and a stolen base at the right time often meant the ball game."

"The great Cobb, now 63, added: "There are a lot of points to stealing a base, many of which aren't even considered in today's game where the home run is the thing. You can fall on either side of the bag to slide into, for instance, by watching the second baseman's eyes as he awaits the throw from the catcher."

"Which a player's managements long enough and you can anticipate his next move. You don't steal a base off the pitcher or the catcher, but off both of them."

Cobb, who played 23 full years in the majors and led the American league in batting 13 times, once hitting .40, talked some about picking up. "I had to do as my pleased Houston fans."

"Ty considers Dizzy Dean one of the finest pitchers the game ever had and Dean got his start in baseball in Houston. Cobb labeled Dean the last fellow he has seen who picked like they did in the old days. "Now they get some arms and stay on the bench most of the time," the Georgia Peach commented. "They celebrated if they win 20 games."

He cited Ed Walsh, the great righthander of the Chicago White Sox, "Walsh once won 40 games for the 'Hitless Wonders' and appeared in 26 more, almost half of them."

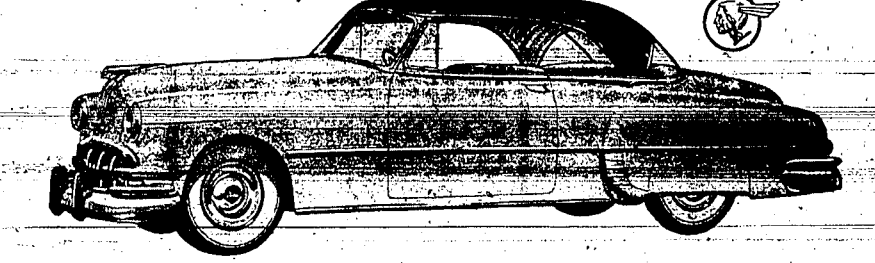

There were no winners, but Fanechon was nearly felled for the first time in his career of 61 professional fights by a left-handed left in the sixth round. A crowd "Ty" jumped backward about five feet to avoid going down.

On good soils, use an 8-4-4 fertilizer. Use a fertilizer spreader. Your local nursery or seed dealer will give you good advice for your particular case.
- 6-Topdress your entire lawn with a 1/4 to 1/2 inch of a good rich loam soil.
- 7-Seed lightly all bare spots. Establish a lawn in using about 1 to 2 pounds per 400 square feet (a plot 20 feet by 20 feet). Seed by hand or with a spreader. Do not seed with a light to cover seed with about 1/4 to 1/2 inch of soil.
- 8-Roll unless your soil is heavy clay or adobe.
- 9-Apply a light mulch of peat moss or wood shavings that stimulates more rapid and even germination.
- 10-Water with a fine spray. Keep your top soil constantly moist. Do not allow to water two or three times a day.

Farmers Slow To Send Back Agency Form

Many local farmers are neglecting to return approval forms for conservation practices and receipts for material used in these practices to the county production and marketing administration office by the expiration date agreed upon by the farmer, Ben Jansen, county PMA chairman, said Friday.

He points out that the forms and receipts must be received prior to the expiration date or payment cannot be made. If a farmer neglects to return the papers by the deadline date, the money approved for his practices is made available to some other operator on the day following the expiration date.

The PMA chairman said extensions should be requested by farmers if they are unable to comply with the original expiration date. He explained that extension requests may be made telephone if personal contact is not feasible.

Jansen also pointed out that the 1950 conservation program has been improved over that of previous years in that personal contact has been minimized and more money is available for practices through better management of payments. He urged farmers who have participated in former programs to bring their questions to the Twin Falls PMA office to learn the new procedures and benefits.

The two general rules of the program, he said, are that approval for the practice must be requested before the practice is begun and must be made in the form of a notification date agreed upon by the farmer. Payment for practices can be made only through compliance with these rules.
