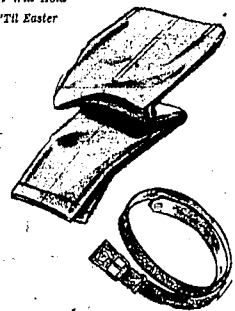

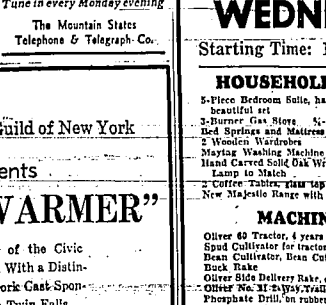

The Bulldogs' veteran squad won 29 straight games during the past season, and they play with an easy 82-84 victory over Lewiston in the class A championship.

Z. F. Grider, Boise, secretary of the Idaho Athletic Association, said he could not remember in recent years a team doing so well through a season without a loss.

Wainwright says she is now in the United States, but she is not sure when she will return to her native Idaho.

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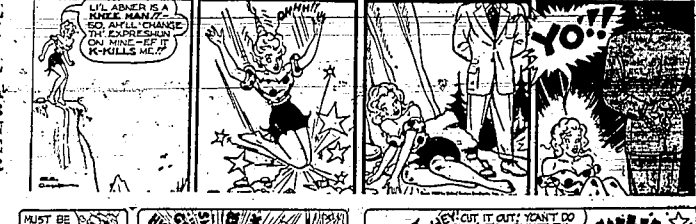
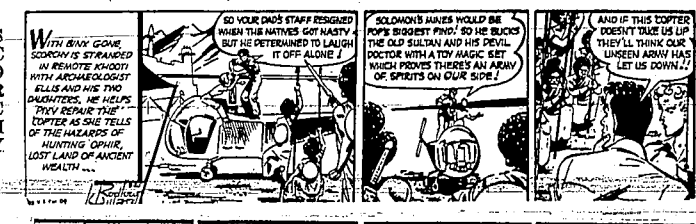
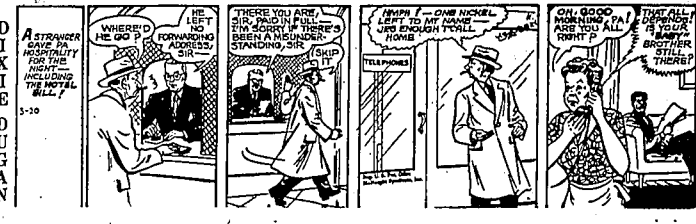
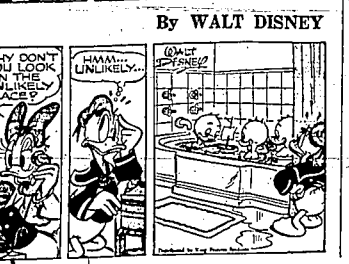
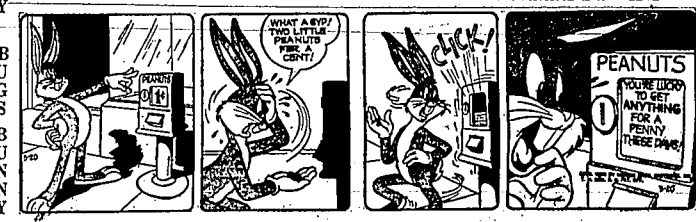
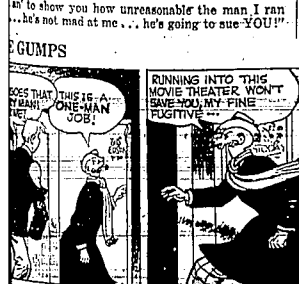
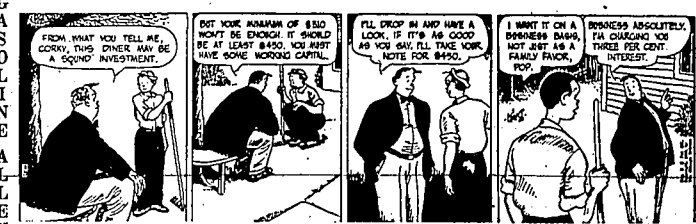
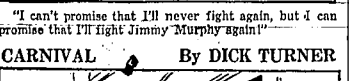
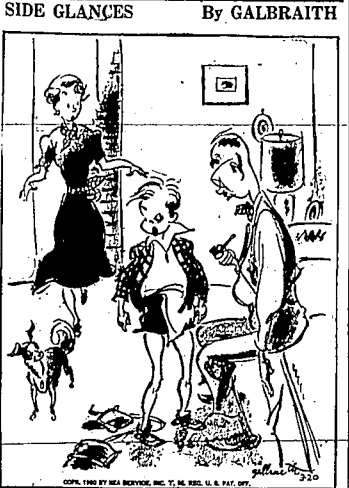
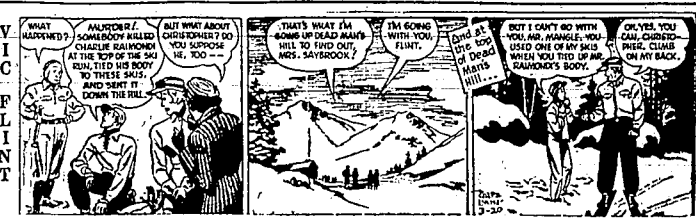

2 Area Counties Show Huge Gain In Business Life

BOISE, March 20 (AP)—Gooding and Blaine counties showed tremendous gains in retail, wholesale and service trade receipts between 1929 and 1944. The U. S. census bureau reported today.

The report covered additional counties to those previously reported. Gooding retail sales soared from \$2,700,000 in 1929 to \$11,500,000 in 1944. Wholesale sales rose nearly \$4,000,000 and service trade receipts gained from \$30,000 to \$477,000. Blaine retail sales totaled \$1,800,000 in 1944 compared to \$2,000,000. Wholesale receipts were \$2,600,000, compared to \$700,000 and service trade was up to \$332,000 from \$94,000, the bureau reported.
