Fewer Bees Get Blame in Lower Yields

PAUL, March 23—One of the reasons farmers do not produce as much clover and alfalfa seed as they did some years ago is because there are not as many bees in the county as there were before, according to H. H. Eckert, a local beekeeper who has been in the business some 30 years.

Eckert referred to an article written by J. E. Eckert, University of California, on the pollination of legumes. In the article Eckert points out the dependence of legume seed production on insect pollination, explaining that the honey bee is the only insect which can be increased in the required numbers and transported as colonies when needed to affect seed set.

Although the increased seed yield is directly proportional to the number of pollinators, the natural returns in surplus honey to the beekeeper drop off as the number of bees in a given area are increased.

The remedy for this situation, as suggested by Eckert, is to combine the interests of the beekeeper and the seed grower so that each will be interested in the production of a maximum amount of seed rather than in the production of a honey crop.

This can be done by contract considerations wherein the beekeeper is guaranteed a return from the seed yield when he distributes his colonies to pollinate the honey production in favor of increased seed production.

Lack of Whip Hikes Crime, Analyst Says

 Britain's epidemic of crimes of violence, similar in many respects to the postwar problems in numerous other countries, has produced a heated public sentiment on how tough the law should get in dealing with the outrage and the rapidly increasing number of gangsters.

The debate has been revolving around the question of whether the "cat-o-nine-tails" — abolished two years ago under the socialist regime — should be revived as a means of deterring crime.

Rape Is Blamed
 Lord Chief Justice Goddard himself recently declared he believed the violence was due to the fact that men know they can no longer be whipped for rape.

However, the condence of the socialist government brought out a different view for a revival of the whip. Instead of the lash, more policemen are to be provided. In this that a couple of years ago hanging for murder was suspended until the socialistists, only to be revived six months later to know your England to appreciate just what the present crime wave means.

"Bobbler" Unarmed
 One of the smallest and most successful police administrations was that "bobbler," as the constables are called, never carried guns excepting by special assignment in connection with a desperate mission.

Because the police didn't carry firearms the underworld, on the whole, responded in kind. Bobblers and similar crime rarely involved the use of guns by the perpetrators. I suppose the demand for revival of the whip is based on these circumstances which made England relatively free of crime.

The law doesn't want to see the police and the underworld armed, for that means war and bloodshed.

They said the craft apparently was following the road up Willow creek canyon when it crashed into the side of a hill.

A flying service operator at Prico, Utah, east of the crash scene said he never the plane last yesterday afternoon and mentioned that he was afraid it would run into "heavy snow" as it passed the mountains.

Bonneville Barley Not OK'd in State

ABERDEEN, March 23 (AP)—Ralph Knight, superintendent of the Aberdeen branch experiment station here, said today Bonneville barley has not been approved for certification and use in Idaho.

The Bonneville strain has been released in Utah and Oregon. However, Knight said that because the barley is a good variety in several respects, it is not at present recommended for Idaho in preference to such varieties as Velsor and Gem.

Knight added that southern Idaho tests showed that Bonneville matures about two weeks later than Gem, and has a slightly stronger stem.

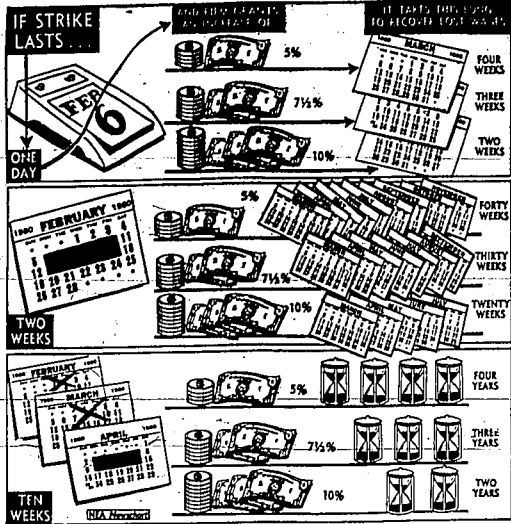

Expert Notes Farm's Paint Color Usage

UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO, Moscow, March 23—American farms are generally red and the houses white for a couple of good reasons. The first reason is that the second is thrift. Sometimes thrift comes first.

W. R. Friberg, agricultural engineer at the University of Idaho, passes on this information he received from Fredrick Brown, USDA wood chemist, who set out to find a substantial answer to the old question of why barns are red and houses white.

"The farm home," Friberg said, "is usually a small house in the midst of a group of larger buildings. White paint makes the home the center of the scheme against a background of larger, darker buildings. That's the art."

Now for the thrift. Red paint lasts longer than white paint, the engineer pointed out. A red barn can go eight or 10 years without a paint job. The white house should get a treatment every four or five years. Barns are the biggest. It would cost more to have them white and the house red.

Declares Friberg, "a recent vogue for white barns may have the advantage of keeping them cooler in summer. But, since many farmers have not been able to keep up with the 10-year painting schedule for red barns, it seems unlikely that white will replace white while every five

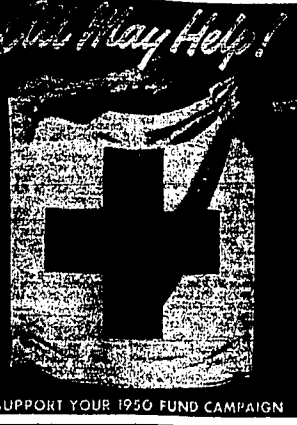

Idaho-School Board Okays New Building

Board Members Said

Board members said yesterday a broad policy will be agreed upon, with that yet to be worked out. No estimates were made, they said, as to the numerical reductions to be effected in secondary teachers graduated.

The board agreed that secondary teachers would be trained at the schools hereafter in English, arts, social studies, high school sciences, physical education and health only.

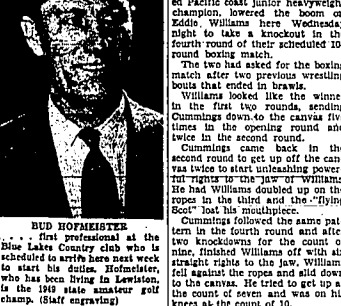

Horse 'Beef' Deal Denied By Shippers

MINNEAPOLIS, March 23 (AP)—Louis E. Raben, president of the federal agency of trafficking in un-stamped horse meat.

Raben and Meyer Gilgus of Kansas City have been named in charges filed in Dallas, Tex., of shipping horse meat in interstate commerce which had not been federally inspected and which was not labeled horse meat.

At Kansas City Gilgus was arraigned. He waived preliminary hearing and posted a \$3,000 bond returnable April 17 in federal district court there. He is the owner and operator of the Meyer Gilgus and Son Meat Provision company.

Raben, 28-year-old former Minneapolis butcher, had received his

had purchased horse meat from a Vermont dealer in South Bend, Ind., and had shipped it to Chicago. There he sold it to Gilgus after removing the labels from it.

Raben denied altering the meat's packaging or sold as beef. He said he paid from 40 to 60 cents a pound for the meat and sold it to Gilgus for 47 to 65 cents.

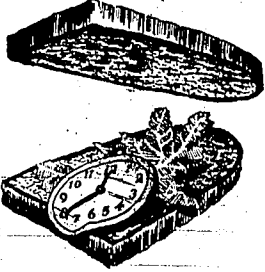

**Action Urged

WASHINGTON, March 22 (AP)—A congressional committee called last night for government action, including tax revision, to stimulate a flow of private capital into small business.

The group, an investment subcommittee of the senate-house economic committee, found that Americans are shy of risk-taking despite record high savings. It said some small concerns are starved for funds with which to undertake expansion that would create new jobs.

The committee, composed of three Democrats and two Republicans, recommended:

- 1. Prompt action on the part of government to provide aids for supplemental channels for capital loans and equity capital to small enterprise.
- 2. An early systematic review of present tax laws with special emphasis on their impact of small business and on the availability of equity financing.

The Democrats, Senator O'Mahoney, Wyo. chairman; Senator Douglas, Ill. and Rep. Patman, Tex., filed a 28-page report that was generally approved by the two Republicans, Senator Taft, O. and Rep. Hester, Mass.

But Taft and Hester declared in a supplemental statement the Democrats put "too little emphasis on the results of heavy taxation" in hampering investment.

Paid by Idaho on
U.S. Excise Taxes**

BOISE, March 22 (AP)—Idahoans paid nearly a million dollars in federal excise taxes during 1949, the Idaho State Chamber of Commerce said today.

The chamber said bureau of internal revenue figures showed Idahoans paid \$977,182.20 for excise taxes on furs, jewelry, luggage and toilet preparations.

Excise taxes on jewelry amounted to \$500,009.77, toilet preparations \$237,802.12, furs \$49,352.58, and luggage \$100,820.01.

The chamber said Idaho women are not buying as many furs as formerly. Excise tax payments dropped from \$122,919.10 in 1948 to only about half that much in 1949.

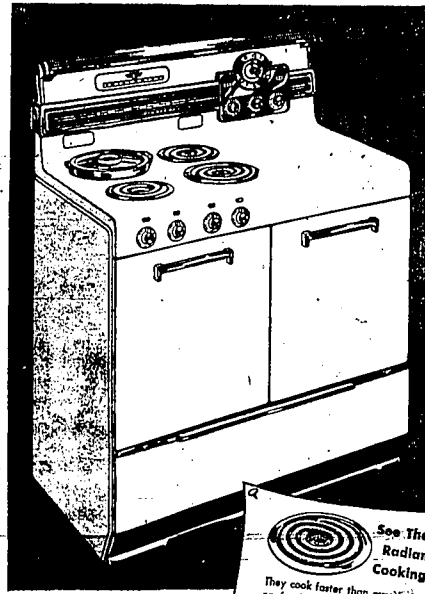

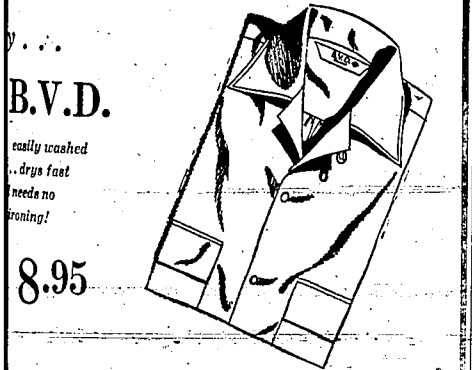

Help to Reds Seen in U. S. Atom Power

PHILADELPHIA, March 22 (AP)—A leading American scientist has said last night U. S. possession of atomic weapons might aid Soviet Russia to subdue Europe and Asia a little a time. The United States, he said, does not need the hydrogen bomb as yet to start. Dr. Joseph R. Zaccarias, director of laboratory for nuclear science at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, made the statements at the closing session of the fourth annual Philadelphia Bulletin forum.

"It is a very terrible strategic weapon, the less likely to be used to start. The Russians can be daring in piecemeal movements and will be reluctant to try to halt their progress by initiating all-out warfare," he said.

The physicist said the answer is development of powerful atomically equipped army, navy and air force to make "any gradual aggression by the Russians difficult, dangerous and costly."

He sharply criticized present U. S. policy of "out of balance, to the point of being dangerously impractical."

Dr. Zaccarias said the atomic navy and tactical air force, rather than as a strategic air force.

On the hydrogen bomb, he said, "I just hope and pray that the Russians never succeed in making it. It is a very terrible strategic weapon, the less likely to be used to start. A reporter for the independent Wah Kiu Yat Po came back with the story that the nationalist handings coupled with guerrilla activities have given Canton increased confidence that the nationalists really will launch a counter-offensive on the mainland.

4-Day Ordeal in Wilderness Ends

CLE ELUM, Wash., March 23 (AP)—A dramatic helicopter rescue ended Wednesday afternoon the four-day ordeal of a Spokane businessman and amateur flier in the deep snow of the Cascade mountains.

The rescued man was Victor C. Roberts, 29. He successfully battled the snow and cold for survival after having survived the crash of his light plane in a crash-landing on a frozen wilderness lake Sunday.

Since Monday morning, he struggled only three miles through snow in an attempt to reach the town of Elton, on the east side of Snow-capped peaks.

He still was about a dozen miles from his destination when two air force men reached him today, 24 hours after they had parachuted into the Lake Wapinitia area where his overturned plane was found yesterday.

The coast guard helicopter brought him to a hospital here. Although he was suffering from frost-bitten feet and hands and exposure.

To be effective this year, we must raise a campaign fund; we must have a united party organization to organize every Idaho precinct. To be effective our party organization must not permit itself to become embroiled in the personal fortunes of any candidate or candidates, desiring as they may."

 5. Creation of an agency outside the government to help Americans make use of their overseas contacts in fighting the spread of communist ideas.

 Benton declared the real battle between democracy and communism lies in the struggle for men's minds, but he said "we are still preoccupied with physical force—as though this were the answer to our problems with Russia."

Benton was formerly assistant secretary of the state in charge of the "voice of America" government radio.

Idaho Power Report Stresses Growth in Electric Facilities

Growth in electric facilities serving this area in 1949 is the keynote of Idaho Power company's annual report to stockholders, which was released Thursday by T. E. Roach, president of the utility.

Power's total plant investment has increased from \$41,800,000 in 1946 to \$74,900,000 at the end of 1949. In this period of expansion of plant facilities, the company has encouraged greater use by its customers, Roach told stockholders. "Electric service, more than ever before, is the biggest bargain in the entire field of goods and services," The report showed Idaho Power's average rate for domestic service to be 1.70 cents per kilowatt hour in 1949, compared to the national average of 2.96 cents. Domestic rates are an average of 4.30 kilowatt hours, compared to the national average of 1,023 kilowatt hours.

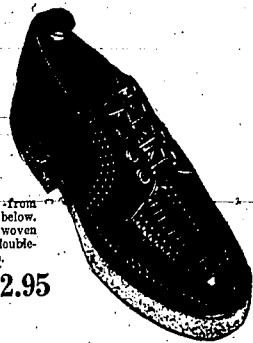

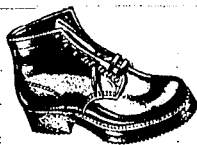
