Czechs Flee Iron Curtain in Large Scale Air Exodus

ERDRIG, Germany, March 26 (AP)—Twenty-six Czechs elected tonight to stay in Germany as fugitives from communism, thereby partly unravelling the mystery of the German-made, unheralded landing of three Czechoslovak planes loaded with 85 persons at this U. S. air force base yesterday.

Fifty-eight Czechs who chose to return to Czechoslovakia, among them the president of the Czech air line, said they were shanghaied in flight by seven of the 12 crewmen. They said one of the planes was captured at gun-point.

Mrs. Katherine Kosmak of New York City, librarian at the U. S. consulate in Prague, said she and 500 consular staff members returned to Czechoslovakia today.

She said she had followed passengers "seemingly terrified" when they landed here among U. S. air force soldiers and Prague their destination.

Full Story Refused

The fleeing Czechs refused to disclose the full story of how they managed to get control of the U. S. DC-3-type liners leaving from the widely separated airports of Brno, Bratislava and Prague and land them minutes apart in the middle of this captured base.

One of the Czech officers said the mass flight apparently was the result of a "coup d'etat" in Prague which involved Czech air line employees.

Assassination Hinted

The escape was engineered as Prague was captured by communists. Franzling had been assassinated and Rudolf Slansky, secretary general of the Czech Communist party, seriously wounded.

Full Story Refused

The Czechs were mingled with other unidentified persons yesterday at a secret "palace" restaurant at Prague.

Albert H. Brailsford, Pioneer, Passes Here

Albert Henry Brailsford, 82, pioneer actor, sheep and cattle rancher, died about 9:30 p.m. Saturday at his Twin Falls home.

He was born April 22, 1867, in Nottingham, England, and came to St. Catherine, Ont., Canada, as a child of 2 with his parents. He moved into what is now Magic Valley in 1888 and became an American citizen soon afterwards. He was engaged as a cowboy and cattle rancher for 15 years in Idaho and northern Nevada until 1898 when he moved to Buffalo, N. Y.

He entered the hardwood lumber business in Buffalo as a partner of T. Sullivan and company. On Nov. 7, 1910, he was killed in a logging accident at Buffalo. He and his wife moved west again in 1904 and settled in Hagerman valley.

Mr. Brailsford was in the sheep business on the mesa from 1904 until his death, although he had been retired from active work for several years. He and his family were from Hagerman valley to Twin Falls in 1920.

He survived by his widow, Mrs. Beatrice Elizabeth Brailsford, Twin Falls; four sons, James A. Brailsford, Fred, Edward and William H. Brailsford, Buhl; and Robert H. Brailsford, Hagerman; four daughters, Mrs. Helen Elliott, New York City; Mrs. Mary Devine, Minnetonka, Minn.; Mrs. Jane Hahn, Buhl; Mrs. Ella, and Mrs. Edith.

Every school has its problems, but we should hope to evade as much as possible the publicity which is given to school difficulties in general. Students of Magic Valley do not have their opinions about such matters as school problems, and sometimes not for the best.

plans his view of physical education and athletics, interest in which, he said, has been "greatly reduced" by the requirement that every boy and girl must have had a year of physical education to be graduated from high school.

"But we must not lose sight of the real objectives to be gained from physical and physical education," he added. "These objectives should be proper physical development, a true appreciation for real sportsmanship and the correct mental attitude playing the game, the student chooses to be at variance with those in charge, or questions their authority, then the greatest value in physical education is lost. For the same reason, it would seem to me that all concerned should respect the constituted authority which the people delegate to their school boards, superintendents and principals."

"It should be a school board's final authority to hire teachers, and although the teachers should be granted the right of a hearing in the event of disagreement, once such hearings have been granted, the board's decision should be final."

"Otherwise we're getting away from the rules of the game and appealing to folks on the sidelines and in the galleries to make the decisions," he said.

"It's a matter of result in discussion and division. We can't let the fans or friends of the principal make the decisions."

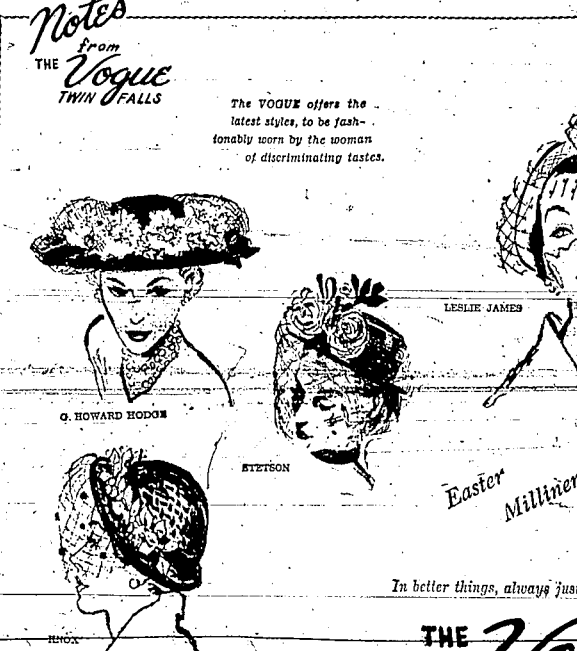

White Karakuls Are Developed by Jerome Man

White Karakuls Developed by Jerome Man in Last 16 Years

By OLIVE MAY COOK
A southern Oregon where a new breed of white Karakul is being re-established by Mrs. Ruth Kistler, Myrtle creek. Jones has inquiries coming in continually from all parts of the country asking him to sell breeding stock. However, with the exception of the few ram sales, he has refused to sell until he has built his herd up to the size he feels will be profitable to him from a standpoint of fur production, then he expects to branch into the sale of breeding stock.

The long staple wool (or half as it is more commonly called) shorn from the mature sheep and the finer more silky hair from the yearlings he has had made up during the past several years into blankets and robes (sometimes having it quilted with darker colored Karakul hair for plaid automobile robes). Since the American Karakul breeders society, a national organization with headquarters in Los Angeles, has been formed he has joined the group and now markets his lambkins and hair through that cooperative association.

Jones admits that it has been an uphill climb and many times he has become discouraged and about to give up. But now that his goal of white Karakuls is being accomplished from coast to coast, he feels the time and work invested are starting to pay satisfactory dividends.

He is very proud, his wife said, to know that he produced the beautiful, much publicized coat that is leading the way to a new era in fur fashion.

And Jones countered with the fact that he was more than proud to think that this is another evidence of what is being done in Magic Valley, once again "putting southern Idaho on the map."

There white Karakul fur, the dream of its sheep breeders for many years, has become reality in the carefully bred Karakul flock belonging to S. W. Jones in Jerome county. And the fact that the American Karakul breeders society, a national organization has drawn the attention of the nation's Karakul breeders and fur designers to Magic Valley now that the possibility of white fur of the same quality as black Persian lamb has become a probability.

The Jones herd hasn't grown overnight; it has taken almost 16 years of hard work, careful breeding and consistent culling to bring the animals up to their present high standard.

Now a product from the years of work has invaded Hollywood. At a recent style show "The Show Princess," white Karakul coat, was shown. The coat is made of white Karakul lambkins from the S. W. Jones herd and is valued at several thousand dollars.

Starting in 1918 to raise Karakul fur sheep, Jones took a fancy to some of the light brown or "foca" colored ones and when a few lambs came along with some spots of white, he made up his mind that he was going to breed a herd of pure white ones. So down through the years he has followed the procedure of selection and elimination until today he has achieved his goal.

"Now and then we get a spotted lamb or a black one," he remarked, "but this year's lamb crop is running almost entirely white."

Up to March 17 he and his son, Charles (Chuck) Jones, who works with him on the project, had counted 80 spring lambs with not over four that showed spots or off-coloring from the pure white.

The white Karakul rams, when in full fleece, are beautiful animals. Five of his young rams were shipped to a purchaser in New Jersey a couple of years ago, and another one

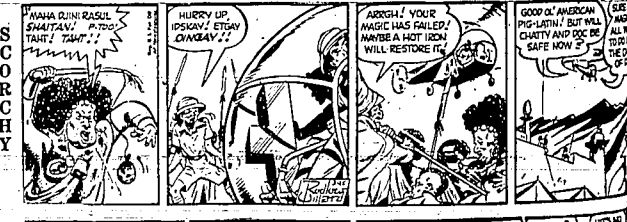
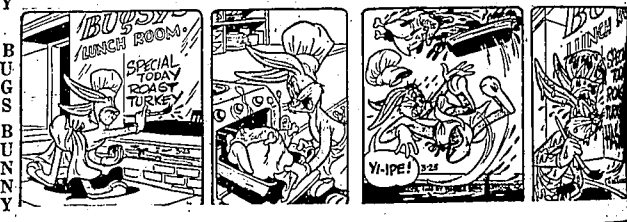
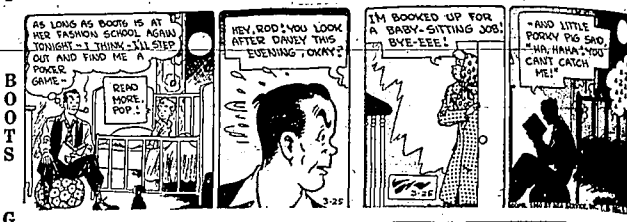

Mars' Canals Discussed by Stars Expert

By J. HUGH FRUETT
Astronomer, Extension Division

From the last week when we pointed out that the bright, twinkling, reddish object in the sky was Mars, we have here the promised discussion of the so-called Martian canals.

This is a subject on which there is considerable disagreement among eminent astronomers. Some believe these fine markings are abundant and quite distinct; others believe they are scarce or have never been seen and declare they are simply "figments of the imagination."

Announced in 1877 the clear-eyed Italian astronomer Giovanni Schiaparelli was the first to announce the fine, dark lines which at times extend to the very edge of the planet Mars. Later, the astronomer Percival Lowell, of Flagstaff, Arizona, and others in America and Europe studied them minutely. They believe the canals are arranged double like the tracks of a railway.

The canals were given prominence to the canals was Percival Lowell at his observatory near Flagstaff, Arizona. His interpretations went further than any others. Favored with clear skies, an excellent telescope and the most sensitive of eyes, Dr. Lowell expressed his conclusions as follows:

Polar Caps Change
As winter approaches in either hemisphere, the white polar ice often small or entirely missing. Then sometimes gradually and at other times suddenly large portions of the polar regions turn white. Later, these gleaming areas may become quite greenish.

When spring arrives, the edges of this white mantle are the first to melt, and their place is taken by a sort of misty darkening or obscuration. It seems that the water, over which hovers very moist air or fog.

Lines Appear
Next, very fine, short lines appear running out from this area in a general direction toward the equator. These lengths at the rate of 81 miles per second. These lines reach the equator. When autumn comes, the lines disappear and a new set of lines appear on the opposite pole where it is then spring.

Water is scarce on Mars. Intelligent inhabitants, said Lowell, have constructed canals to ditch water from the melting poles and to carry it to the equator. We do not see the actual ditches, but rather the strips of vegetation which spring up on both sides of them. The large blue-green areas are broad expanses of green fields.

Mach Work in 1939
Considerable work was done on Mars in 1939. Dr. E. E. Pettit, of Mt. Wilson observatory and in South Africa. Dr. E. E. Pettit of Mt. Wilson observed extensive canals and belts. He is a believer in the reality of the fine lines. Dr. H. N. Russell of Princeton has recently written:

"There is now no doubt regarding the real existence of these finer details. By the drawings and descriptions of them by different observers are remarkably discordant."

I Will Walk Humbly

...and to those causes which we love and cherish. But does history bear out such a conclusion? Look for a moment at the first three centuries, A. D. The Christians, of whom it was said that they turned the world upside down were people who were quite literal in their interpretation of the words of their Master. If the conditions were hard they may have found strength and courage in the writings of the Apostle James, when he says, "God resisteth the proud, but giveth grace to the humble." I am afraid we have made the word "grace" entirely too much an ecclesiastical or theological term.

But let us return to present day conditions. The opposite of humility is pride. I find this definition of pride in Funk and Wagnalls' New Standard dictionary. "Pride ariseth from an over-evaluation of a man's self, or a want of a due sense of his dependency upon Almighty God." Such an evaluation is sure to produce a distorted idea of one's abilities, an "I can take care of myself" attitude, and a corresponding depreciation of others.

Again referring to Funk and Wagnalls, let us check the term, humility. One of the details is: "At another place the word 'humble' is defined as 'depressed.' If we were to take the last definition and apply it to the 'walk humbly with thy God' text, it would seem to infer that day by day, we should live and act in a way that will show our dependence upon God. The method one chooses will depend on his concept of how God operates in the lives and affairs of men.

Frankly, I am afraid for America. I refer to neither atomic destruction nor communist infiltration. I refer to the testimony of history that pride, immorality, indifference to right, and selfish bigotry have contributed to the downfall of many nations. We have within ourselves the possibilities of survival or destruction. The choice is ours.



Death of Famous "Tarzan" Author Revives Memory

GOODING, March 23 — Memories of the death of Edgar Rice Burroughs in California, the famous author of the "Tarzan" series of books, were revived when he was active in several fields in this area.

A. C. DeMayr divided into his habitations and found information indicating Burroughs had been active with his brothers and ranching operations.

The author came to this area when he graduated from school in the east. He first settled with brothers on a ranch in the Salt River area, but then, he rubbed sage brush and carried mail.

After knocking around at various times he finally wound up in Oregon where he began writing. He also worked in the Blackfoot, Okla., in Snake river dredging, had a stationary store in Postlello and was a writer for the Salt Lake City police force.

Expert Describes Kochia as Forage

GOODING, March 23 — Kochia or fire weed is a heavy seeder and has the ability to grow under dry conditions.

Robert E. Higgins, county agent, said when asked for information on the weed, he had the following to say:

"From all indications Kochia is an annual," he added. "It has a large number of leaves that stay green and persist in dense shade."

As the plant matures the fiber content increases rapidly and the protein percentage decreases rapidly. Kochia hay when cut in the bud stage about equal to alfalfa in total digestible nutrients, Higgins said.

"Kochia is a weed which grows less than alfalfa. Kochia hay is 70 to 87 per cent as palatable as alfalfa."

According to the county agent it is readily grazed when it is very young and tender. From Utah alone it is a weed along fences and roads and nothing will eat it. Kochia is not a desirable feed crop except in special conditions.
