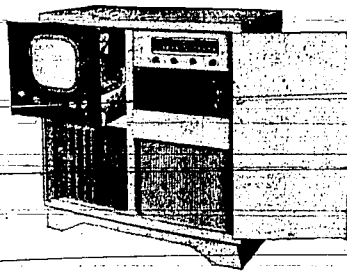

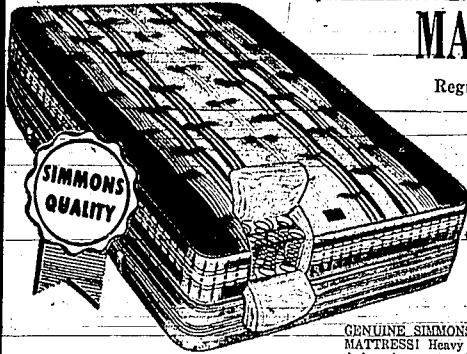

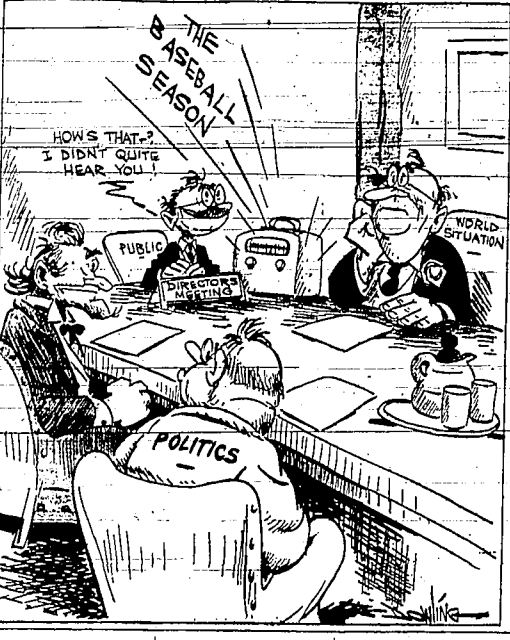

Valley Agents Prepared for Testing Soils

UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO, Moscow, April 20—With the development of county laboratories, soil testing in Idaho has many prospects from the central laboratory at the University of Idaho in Moscow.

The laboratory was developed by Dr. W. H. Smith, extension soil specialist, in collaboration with Glenn Lewis, agricultural chemist, and C. C. Burt, soil technologist at the University of Idaho. They are in use now in 37 counties in the state.

Scope of Data.
The county soil tests give farmers information on phosphorus, potassium, nitrogen, potash, salinity, and acidity, and the types of salts present. Where these tests suggest an unusual soil problem, the sample is sent to the university for more complete analysis.

Getting the right kind of sample is the first and one of the most important steps in soil analysis, says Smith explaining. "First, visit the county agent's office and get some instructions as to an envelope in which to put the soil sample."

Available in Magic Valley.
All Magic Valley counties except Blaine and Camas, have these soil testing facilities.

Before taking the sample, remove all straw and other foreign material from a spot on the soil surface. Then cut a hole six or seven inches deep and cut a thin slice of soil from the smooth side. Put this slice in a container. Do this in at least six to eight different places in the area being tested. Mix the samples thoroughly and put one pound of the air-dry mixture into the envelope. Then see that the sample gets back to the county agent's office for his analysis.

Keep Separate.
Submit separate samples from each different area. Do not mix samples taken from unlike areas.

Soil testing by county agents, on the increase in Idaho, has several advantages, Smith declares. Agents can show farmers how to take a proper sample. They know the area, the soil type, and can talk to the farmer personally about special problems. In turn, farmers can solve their own soil problems while the county agents assist them in interpreting results of the tests.

Help Sought; Halogeton Is Being Studied

JEROME, April 20—An extensive study of the poisonous range weed known as halogeton is being carried on by the county weed office. As early as 1917 it was known that the weed had infested Jerome county. However all persons are urged to watch carefully for the weed, and anyone finding the weed immediately should report it to the county weed office. A reward of \$5 is being offered to anyone reporting the first infestation of halogeton in Jerome county.

During a tour of Owyhee county, Al Robinson, county commissioner and Hyrum Meacham, weed supervisor, familiarized themselves with the weed and secured samples which are on display at the hardware store, Hazelton; J. E. Investment company, Jerome, and the weed office in the courthouse.

According to Meacham, halogeton is the weed that has spread so rapidly in Utah, Idaho and Nevada causing heavy sheep losses. During the tour it was pointed out that two pounds of the weed is sufficient to kill sheep and five pounds to kill cattle.

The poison in the weed is oxalic acid which breaks down the tissues of the kidneys and even though an animal may not die from an overdose, it will never recover enough to be of any use.

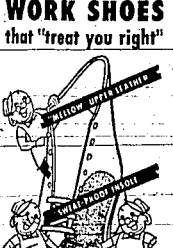
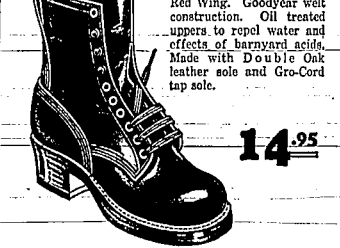

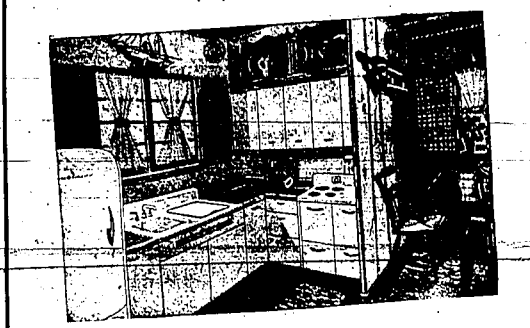

Says Don't Colds

... except that flu, grippe and some other diseases can damage the nose and so start a cold.

The usual causes, he said, are dusts, gases, emotions and especially those changes in the nose which come with changes in weather.

After an even temperature all summer, he said, you get cold-fall weather. Your nasal passages get over-cooled. The same over-cooling happened in early days of air-conditioning when buildings and train temperatures were kept down to 60 in summer.

All these changes damage the nasal passages. And that damage starts a cold. Germs multiply and make their way through the nose until the nasal passages are repaired.

Many Unavoidable Causes

Dr. Kerr said that a lot of things happen with weather changes which go unnoticed as possible causes of colds. An example is when a whole neighborhood starts furnaces on the same day in the fall. The nasal passages get a lot of unaccounted dust and Dr. Kerr said you don't have to

Plastic Valve 'Feasible' for Ailing Hearts

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., April 20 (AP)—Plastic valves for ailing hearts are described by four Albany, N. Y., Medical College physiologists.

Several dogs are fitted with the artificial valves in their hearts now, Dr. Nehmi Denton, Curators News, Benedict Macmillan and Harold Wiggers told the Federation of American Societies for Experimental Biology.

Within two years it may be possible to put the plastic valves into human hearts, substituting them for living valves damaged by heart diseases, they said.

Two, 3-Piece Affair
The valves are tiny, one-piece affairs, with no moving parts. They are electric and turned on at one end. Each is about half an inch wide at the funnel end, and a little more than half an inch long. They are sewed into the heart.

The heart muscle, by its movement, draws the valve in for contraction, it pushes up against the plastic valve so no blood backs through it. When the heart muscle relaxes, coming out of contact with the valve to let the heart chamber fill with blood.

Operation Safe
The operation placing the plastic valves in the heart now is relatively safe, the scientists said. It has been tried on about 50 dogs, and five of them are alive and well, and have lived so far for about six months.

The scientists indicated that more of the dogs would have lived if the operating technique had been used on them. But, they said, it required about a year of experimentation to devise the present-day technique.

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
