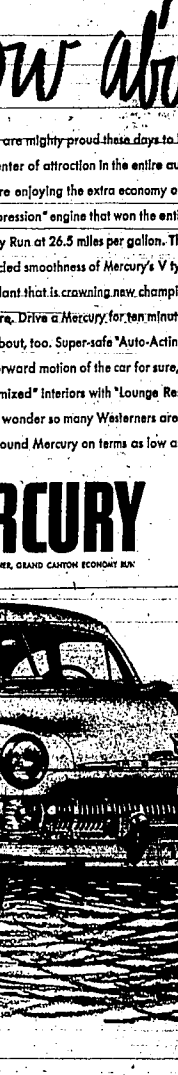

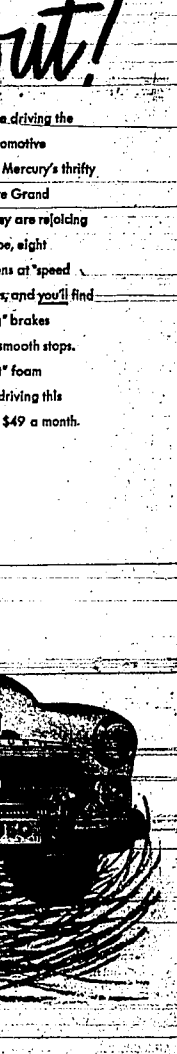

### Few Senators Listen to Talk For Aid Plan

WASHINGTON, April 23 (AP)—Three United States senators sat in the senate chamber and listened to a four-hour talk in favor of the \$377,450,000 foreign aid bill. Then Senator Connally, D. Tex., announced that he would not support the bill.

The very idea of passing on a great matter like this when you can count the senators present on one hand, the foreign relations chairman exclaimed.

Connally and Senators Wherry, R. Neb., and McFarland, D. Ariz., were the only members present at the hearing. The bill was introduced by Senator Albert Thomas, D. Utah. It was yesterday's only address on the foreign aid bill, pending business before the senate. Much of the session was taken up by talk about construction.

Connally is floor manager for the bill. He announced he will do his best to get the senate reach agreement for an early vote.

"We are transacting important legislation," he said, "and yet the senators do not perform their duties in listening to the debate. It is a reflection on the senate."

Wherry, the Republican floor leader, noted that four committees were meeting during the session and that some members were absent for that reason. He agreed that the senate knows that there should be speedier action on the bill.

James Stewart, Marlin, former chief of the reconstruction bureau in Germany, told a House subcommittee investigating committee that American steel firms were an integral part of prewar cartel activities which could "make or break our official foreign policies."

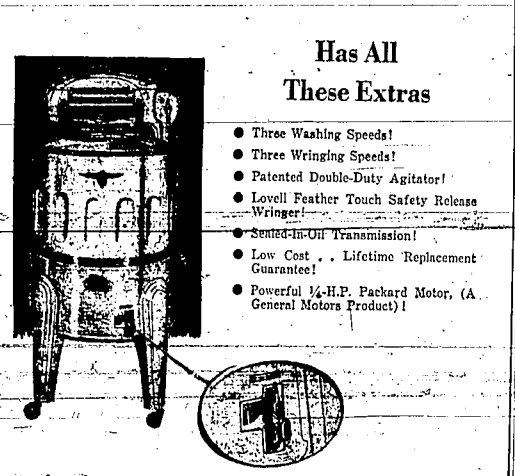

**Czechs' "Spy" Purge—Snares 47 More Men**

PRAGUE, Czechoslovakia, April 25 (AP)—Czechoslovakia's spy machinery has ground out sentences of death and long prison terms for accused enemies of the state.

After sentences of 18 Czech spies and saboteurs were the week-end and the state courts moved on with another batch of 18 Czechs accused of "espionage," high treason, attempted murder, illegal armament, proposed murder and public assault.

All connected to U. S.

(Apparently 47 of the defendants in the four trials were accused of connections with alleged American spy rings.)

On Saturday 47 convicts were meted out in state courts at Prague, Saturday and Sunday. It was disclosed. Another trial was still in progress at the Brno state court in Moravia.

At the Moravia trial the state passed sentences on 11 persons convicted of sabotage and terrorist activities. The newspaper reported that Ladislav Grosz, leader of the group; and two others were sentenced to life imprisonment. The other eight received terms ranging from eight to 30 years.

Entered U. S. Service

The 16 defendants now on trial in Brno were declared by the newspaper to have entered the service of the American imperialists. They were accused of being members of an anti-state spying organization "Orbita," operating in Moravia.

The newspaper said all of the accused had confessed and given detailed descriptions of their activities.

**Wheat Producing Farmers Girding For Frost Battle**

FAIRFIELD, April 25.—Camas county wheat growers, busy yearly by "summer" frosts during the critical growing stage of their crop, aren't just talking about the weather—they're doing something about it.

Carroll Stewart last week tested an Army surplus smoke generator which he obtained at Ogden, Utah. Upon the basis of the test, he plans to buy about 20 more if that number is available.

The device produces copious quantities of smoke by burning oil mixed with water. Farmers have been storing large amounts of straw and other heat and smoke producing material to ward off the killing frosts.

Now available at the courthouse are recording thermometers ordered by farmers who pooled their efforts and expense in fighting the frost. Martin Shaw, the group's thermometer chairman, announced more will be ordered if needed.

The accurate thermometers will be placed strategically on nearly mile-high Camas prairie. The Boise weather bureau will cooperate in warning farmers when to expect killing frosts. In previous years, airplanes have been used to mix cold air at field level with warmer air above.

Average annual precipitation in Utah is only 12 inches.

### Red Minority Plots Seizure Of Isle Reins

NICOSIA, Cyprus, April 23 (AP)—A powerful communist minority quietly building up strength in the hope of seizing this strategic British Mediterranean base if the red revolution erupts successfully in Greece. Communist leaders here want to incorporate Cyprus in the Greek people's national army last year.

The Greek Orthodox church is working just as hard to convert this British crown colony to the east Mediterranean into a province of King Paul's Greece.

Heads Entrenched

The communists here have entrenched themselves behind the west's plect line of anti-communist nations around the Mediterranean. Of Cyprus' 482,000 population—four-fifths Greek—the reds claim allegiance of 85 per cent.

They are estimating 200,000 Greek colonists and some Greek church sources, is 25 per cent. The most accurate figure probably is about 35 per cent. In the 1949 municipal elections, communists and their sympathizers won 44 per cent of the vote.

**"Hands Off" Attitude**

British colonial administrators take a "hands off" attitude toward the communists, although this is a British right. The British troops are stationed here. At Nicosia, on the island's north coast, 10,000 British troops are stationed in the islanders favor the union. Only the church-communist feud keeps them divided.

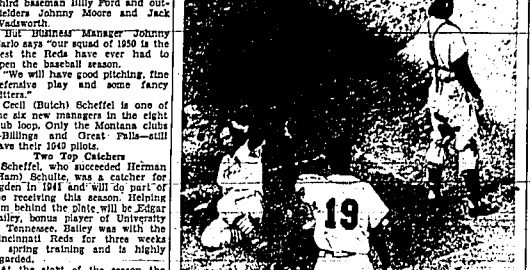

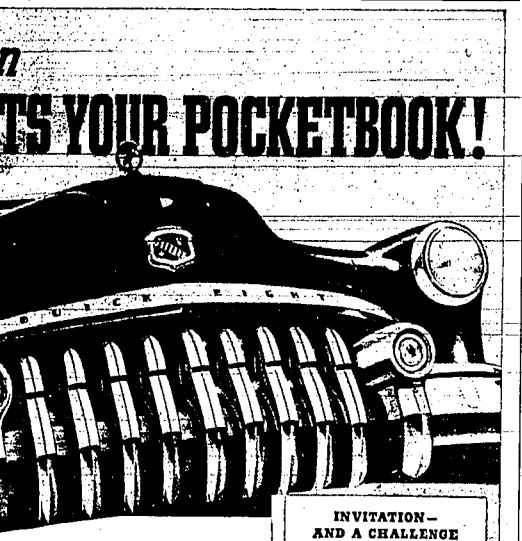
