USAF's B-36

Project Costs Top 1 Billion

WASHINGTON, May 1 (AP)—The total cost now has more than \$1,250,000,000 invested in "superfortresses" airplanes, it was disclosed today.

The number of B-36s, including those delivered and ones on order, is 110.

The total cost of the B-36 program is exactly as obtainable from the War Relocation Authority. That figure totals to an average of \$11,250,000 per airplane. More may be required in fiscal 1941, which begins next July.

Includes Parts, Training

The estimated cost of each airplane covers the airplane, engines and accessories, tooling, pro rata share of training equipment cost, flight testing, spare parts—total 3 years' operation and necessary ground handling equipment.

The total figure includes 47 B-36s which, it is reliably reported, were ordered in the present fiscal year. The air force is expected to officially only order values for fiscal 1940, not numbers of specific types of airplanes ordered.

Termed "Blunder"

When Adm. Arthur W. Radford, chief of the board, called the B-36 a "\$1,000,000 blunder" in congressional testimony during last week's confirmation hearings, the Air Force Secretary W. Stuart Symington testified:

"The B-36 bomber program is completed, however, including all expenditures, past, present and future. The total cost of the B-36 reconnaissance planes will be considerably less than one-billion dollars."

Some Specially Equipped

The reconnaissance planes are fitted out for photographic, mapping and radar jamming work and presently would precede the bombers over enemy territory in a war.

The air force plans to have four B-36 bomber groups. The total number of groups is 12, all of the same type, and two B-36 reconnaissance groups. The B-36s are 159 bombers, 60 per group and 20 spare planes.

The B-36 reconnaissance group is scheduled to have 30 airplanes each. These figures include 100 additional planes which will have to be ordered.

Technical Aid for Europeans Climbs To Peak in April

WASHINGTON, May 1 (AP)—The Marshall plan's technical assistance program reached a peak in April when 23 western European specialists began studying U. S. "know-how" in fields ranging from fuel to the proper utilization of land.

The economic cooperation administration said last night these specialists came from 12 recovery countries. The specialists are involved in 24 technical assistance projects which will require from three weeks to one year, according to the United States.

Under the recovery act, ECIA is charged with bringing Europeans to the United States to learn American production methods. During April, teams arrived from Austria, Belgium, Denmark, France, the German federal republic, Greece, Luxembourg, the Netherlands, Norway, Sweden, Turkey and the United Kingdom.

They worked for an hour with the torch, but fled when their lookout shouted that someone was approaching. Two of the safes had been burned open. The others were partially burned.

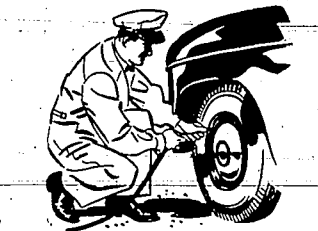
