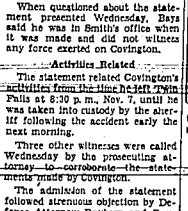

East German Refugee Sees No Red Fight

WILHELMSHAVEN, Germany, May 4 (AP)—A non-communist east German cabinet minister who fled to the west said today he is certain Russia will not go to war over Germany.

"Russia might go to war elsewhere," he said, "but not over Germany. She will be the Russian ally in any invasion of western Germany—here. They expect to win the war on objectives by total cold war."

The minister is one of the cabinet members who recently fled the Soviet zone states of Thuringia, Saxony-Mecklenburg and Brandenburg when the communists began purging members of the new Independent Christian and Liberal Democratic parties.

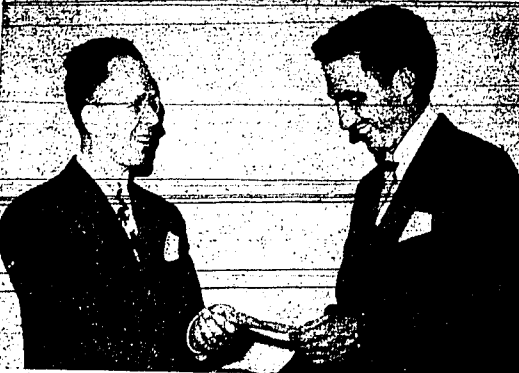

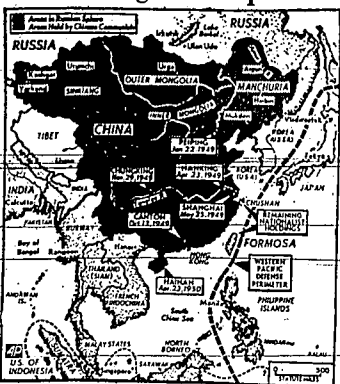

Happy Fire Chief at Ketchum Is Sad About Public Attitude

KETCHUM, May 4—Fire Chief Richard Ransom is satisfied and he's dissatisfied.

The chief says he's all right pleased with the performance of his 18-man crew and volunteers in tests this week. It's not all unhappy over the \$500 cleared at the fire's toll just week, and he's thanking all who helped make the damage a success. He purchased fire equipment was on display.

But like many fire chiefs elsewhere he's vexed with the public disregard for sirens, impeding volunteers on their way to a fire and otherwise hampering the department. He's planning a public-education campaign and meanwhile Lyman Hammon, the town marshal, has his instructions to cite those who violate fire regulations.

In one of this week's test demonstrations, an unannounced alarm came in at 2 p.m. Monday. Five minutes later the crew had water on the imaginary fire about one-half mile away. Representatives of the company supplying the equipment said it was one of the finest practice performances they had seen.

The truck is a Ford with a Lincoln motor. Its pump's listed capacity is 500 gallons per minute, but during the Monday test the gauge registered 588 gallons per minute. This re- quired five men on each of the two hoses being used.

Other equipment bought included several hundred feet of hose in three sizes for chemical extinguishers, chemicals to increase the wetting power of water in the storage tank and water hose.

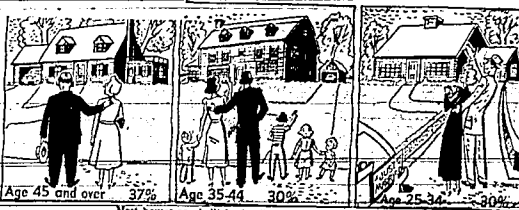

Yardmen Call Off Plans for Strike Action

CHICAGO, May 4 (AP)—The AFL railroad yardmen union called off a three-day strike scheduled for today at seven railroad rail centers. The union ordered yardmasters to stay at work after an emergency fact-finding board promised to hear the demand for a five-day work week.

Francis O'Neill, chairman of the railroad yardmen union, said the union "agreed to appeal before the presidential emergency fact-finding board next Wednesday and present its case."

Sought Hearing
Union President Milton O. Schoch said the union's purpose in calling the work stoppage had been to get a chance to present its case before the fact-finding board. Previously, he said, the board had said it was "too busy to hear the case until sometime in the near future."

Schoch said the union was satisfied after Judge Roger T. McDonough of the Utah supreme court, chairman of the board, arranged for hearings to begin next week.

The yardmasters were not included when 100,000 other non-operating employees won a five-day work week last year although they had participated in the original demand.

Cities Targeted
The strike would have affected 1,000 yardmasters at Minneapolis and St. Paul, Minn., Omaha and Lincoln, Neb., Council Bluffs, Ia., and St. Louis and Kansas City, Mo. Union officials had expected many other unions to respect their picket lines, affecting 18 railroads, but company spokesmen said they would not.

The fact-finding board is currently hearing a strike-threat by conductors and trainmen but expects to finish in time to hear the yardmasters' case.

April Record Is Set for "Craters"

ARCO, May 4—Travel to Craters of the Moon national monument during April broke all previous records for the month, announced Aubrey F. "Sam" Houston, superintendent of Idaho's only national park service area.

"We confidently expect that travel for the coming season will continue to break all earlier records," he continued. In April this year 840 persons were counted, entering the monument in 267 private automobiles.

A total of 3,174 visitors in 1,049 private vehicles have been counted since Oct. 1, 1949, and 20,554 persons in 7,684 vehicles have entered the monument since last July 1.

In April, 1949, there were 656 people in 209 automobiles who visited the area, which constituted the record for April up to the present. Most of this year's April travel occurred after the middle of the month, when the loop road leading to the big crater and the visitor center first was opened for the season. Most of the April travel was local in origin, although nearly every state was represented.

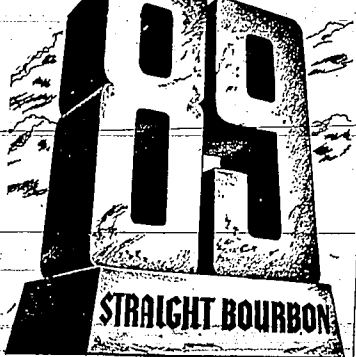

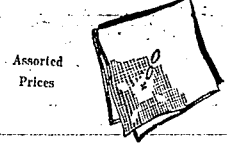

'Rain-Making' Spoils Joys of New Yorkers

NEW YORK, May 4 (AP)—Personal to Dr. Wallace E. Howell, chief rainmaker, New York City. "Take it easy, will you, don't!"

In one form or another, this plea went up today from basketball fans, golfers, rheumatism sufferers and a number of other persons who would like to see the sun shine.

It may be just coincidence but: Last March 14, when the city hired Harvard's Howell to try his brand of artificial rainmaking, everybody was moaning about the water shortage. New York was being called "Sakara," the Japanese name for drought.

Shortage Not Over Six weeks later the shortage isn't over, but hardly a day has gone by that New York hasn't had rain, snow, sleet, fog or all of them in combination.

Last week-end the Olmsted and Dodgers were rained out—not for the first time.

Tuesday the publicly minded management found a swimming pool, across the Hudson river in New Jersey, offered to double the price of admission if they would call the rainmaking off.

"Perhaps science can develop some way to give nature the clouds," urged the owners, whose usual crowds have been staying home out of the rain.

The New York Post interviewed citizens at random. "I don't object four to one against rain-making," Howell has tried eight times to make rain, usually by "seeding" the clouds with sodium iodide. Rain has fallen each time but Howell declines to take credit—or blame. He says it's much too early to tell whether his efforts helped nature along.

The U. S. weather bureau here is inclined to give nature the blame—or credit. "Howell doesn't try to make rain unless rain is due," says Meteorologist Ernest J. Christie.

New Bulletin Published on Poultry Data

UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO, Moscow, May 4—Two birds are better than one. The old saying is proved again in culling chickens, according to a poultry bulletin published this month by the college of agriculture, University of Idaho.

The bulletin, published in color, tells how a poultryman who uses his head can get rid of loafers in his flock by looking at the heads of his birds.

Head Tells Story "The story of a hen's egg production is in her head, comb and wattles, if you know what to look for," the illustrated pamphlet declares.

"Feeding the loafer hens costs money. Cull all low-producers. Eat them or sell them for meat. They lose you money, labor and time. Keep only the birds that are laying eggs. Cull continually to eliminate the hens that take a vacation at your expense."

Authors Listed Authors of the bulletin are Field Merrill, extension poultryman; C. F. Peterson, associate poultry husbandman, and G. E. Langman, head of the department of poultry husbandry.

In addition to head culling, the bulletin gives pointers on culling by other means, and offers suggestions for maintaining a healthy, profitable flock.

New Camera 'Big Success' For Jet Craft

PHILADELPHIA, May 4 (AP)—An air force officer says a new camera in a jet airplane flying at 500 miles per hour took a picture of a man playing cards on the ground so clear you could read the ace of spades.

Col. George W. Goddard, director of photography and research development at the air force center, Wright field, O., told the Philadelphia chapter of the Armed Forces Communications association in a speech that the new camera was capable of taking clear pictures from a low-flying plane traveling 3,000 miles an hour—if such a speed were attainable.

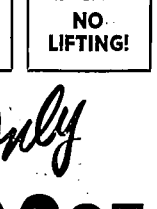

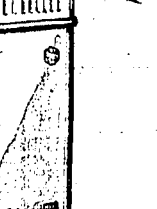

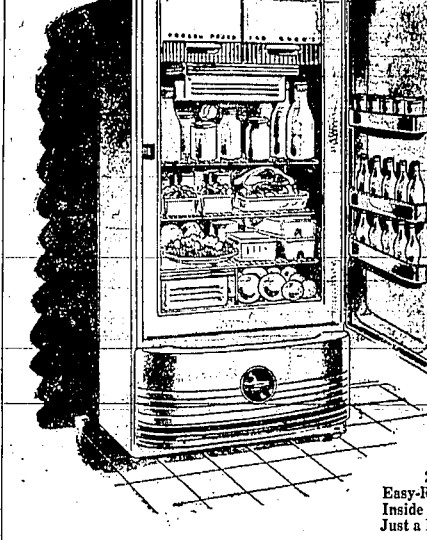
