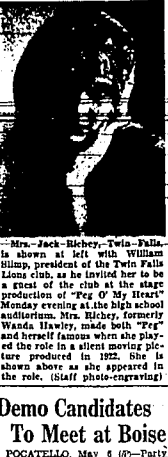

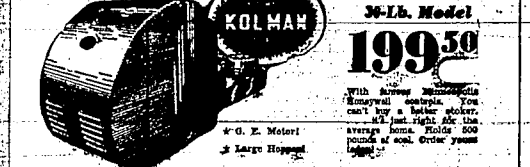

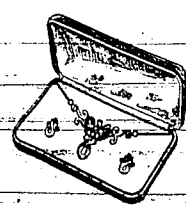

Jayne on April 1. They state they induced him not to sue and did not make any independent investigation of the value of the company and its assets.

On March 27, the complaint states, Regan and Kirk told the Bayers the reconstruction finance corporation had secured a \$250,000 loan and recommended the Apache company apply for a \$250,000 loan.

The complaint contends there had been no approval for a loan nor any approval nor any recommendation for an additional loan had been made by either Regan or Kirk. The defendants knew the Bayers would not be protected against the loan.

Four days earlier, according to the complaint, Regan and Kirk told the Bayers that they had secured a \$100,000 loan of which \$50,000 would be received as soon as \$25,000 in stock had been approved.

The directors had authorized an amount of \$25,000 worth of stock with option for payment in cash or stock.

The Bayers would be protected by physical assets worth more than \$180,000.

The complaint contends no loan had been approved by the RFC, no application had been made for the loan, and the assets were not worth more than \$180,000.

On his first visit, March 4, the complaint accuses Regan of "falsely and fraudulently" stating that the concern's indebtedness as very little or none, that the company's mill was working, that its mine tailings were worth \$6 a ton and that production was 100 tons a day.

The complaint contends indebtedness exceeded \$25,000, that the mine and mill were not operating and not producing in any way.

Chamber of Commerce Hears Details of Plans for New High School Plant Here

Details of the proposed new Twin Falls high school building were explained to members of the Chamber of Commerce Friday noon at the Park hotel. Background and plans of the new school were presented by Clyde Koenig, chairman of the school board.

Albion Warner, chairman of the chamber's education committee, served as program chairman.

Morgan reported plans for the new high school were based on surveys of the needs for high school for the next 10 years. He explained that with no growth in population and only the present number of grade school students advancing into high school, Twin Falls will have 1200 senior high school students in 10 years. The present number is about 740.

The superintendent outlined how school planning officials contacted towns all over the western United States and discovered only two high schools built since this war. These are located at Bellevue, Wash., and Kirkland, Wash., near Seattle.

School board members, school officials and architects visited these new school buildings before plans for the Twin Falls school were begun. He said in this way the planners studied both what should be done in school construction and what should look like.

Morgan said plans for the Twin Falls high school call for 49 classrooms, each designed only for the subjects that will be taught in it. He said the Citizens' Committee for Twin Falls School, school officials, teachers and state-school officials all aided in planning individual special rooms.

Smith pointed out that changing methods in education had brought about a change in school architecture. As examples he pointed to the emphasis on natural light for

rooms and halls and placing classrooms for related subjects in the same wings of buildings.

Architectural details he disclosed were that the building will be 800 feet long with 120,000 square feet of floor space. The building will be constructed of brick and glass blocks. Rooms will be 27 feet long but partitions will be removable and several rooms may be combined into a large one.

There will be a gymnasium with a seating capacity of about 3,000 persons, he said, and a separate vocational arts building with 4,000 square feet of floor space. Seventy per cent of the heating of the school will be radiant type and the other 30 per cent circulating type.

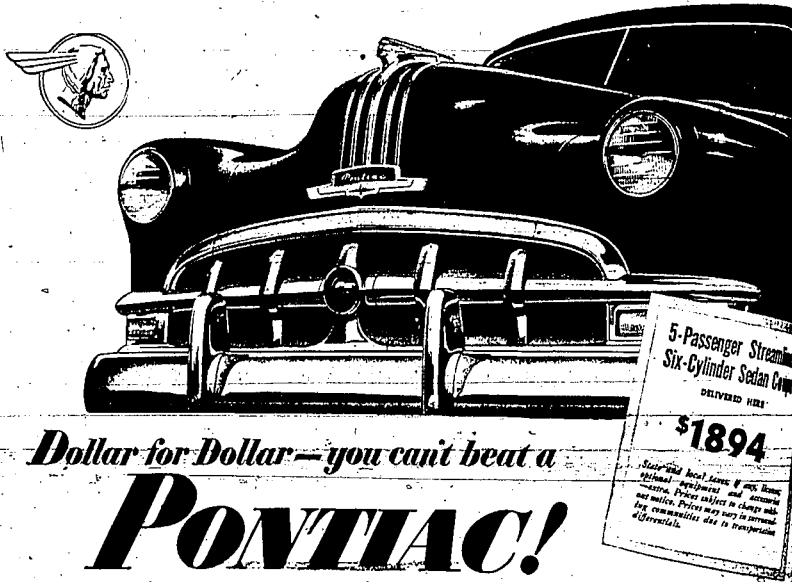

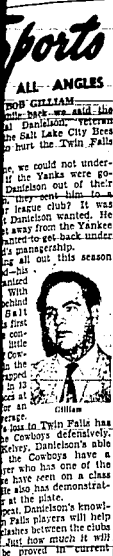

CHURCHILL DOWNS, Louisville, May 6 (AP)—Middle-ground, a chestnut racer from the fabulous King ranch in Texas, came a-running in the stretch at Churchill Downs today to outgame everything that chilled him and win the 76th Kentucky derby.

The son of Bold Venture, new to the early contention, proved himself a better colt than Your Host, the California favorite, Int Prince, the Virginia threat, and all the others in 13 trials.

He ran the classic mile and a quarter in two minutes and three-fifths seconds, only one-fifth of a second off the derby record set by the famous Whirlaway in 1941.

He reared B. J. Rice, Jr., owner of King ranch, with \$725,000, and placed the hearts of the crowd in Texas continuing in the crowd of close to 100,000. Bill Prince finished second, Mr. Trouble third and Sun-Glow fourth in a field which was strung out for considerable distance.

Made Stubbish Run Hill Prince, ridden by Eddie Arco, made a stubborn run at Middle-ground within the last 100 yards, but he couldn't take him. Only two weeks ago they returned the order to him for \$400,000. Bill Prince's Wood memorial at Danbury.

Your Host, the pride of the west, went into the front as he was expected to do. The first 100-yard winner of the Santa Anita derby dashed to the lead in the first run of the stretch. He was the probable winner approaching the mile.

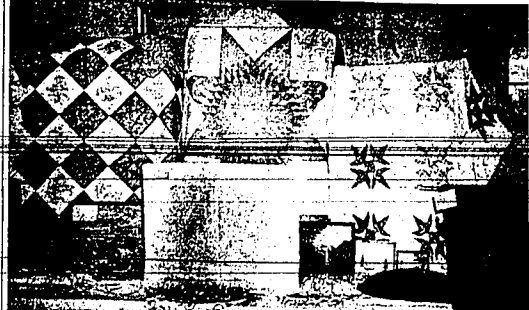

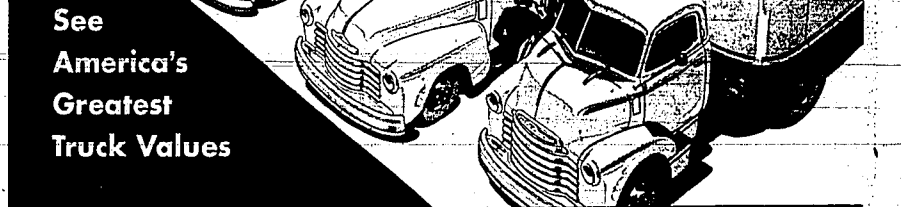

AS YOUR MINISTER SEES IT

Forgiveness

By ALBERT PARRETT
Pastor, Methodist Church
"Some day I wish you would preach a sermon on forgiveness." These were the words of a Christian woman as she looked intently in the direction of her minister last Sunday night.

The subject of discussion seemed to be "Communion." People were discussing, freely the subject and some were wondering what Christians meant by "forgiveness" when they confront this acknowledged God of Christianity and of democracy.

She offered the suggestion to her minister because she "doubtless" thought that greater use should be made of forgiveness in our dealings with Russian communism.

It is paganism of the worst variety that holds to the opinion so often expressed, "The only language Russia will listen to is the language of physical and material might." The only solution, she thought, lies in means to offer in the hot dash of ideas is more wings, more floating fortresses and more bombs.

What about Christian love? "Oh that stuff! Well, they'll never listen to the acid test and see if the man who proposed it as a principle of peace knew what he was talking about!"

Once this man whom we idly call Lord; but whom we often shame by our refusal to obey; once this man told a story about a Pharisee and a publican. He said that the Pharisee was proud of his own righteousness; proud the fact that he was better than the publican who probably did not fast nor tithe. But the publican,

said the story over, was ashamed of himself. He looked at the ground beneath him and he "mote upon his breast, saying, 'God be merciful to me a sinner.'"

Too many people are like the Pharisee; too few are like the publican. That is one of the troubles with America, and Russia and the world today. We are all so proud of ourselves and so disgusted with the "other fellow" that we are unable to extend any forgiveness.

If we are interested in reconciliation in a world of cold international politics, we had better make serious with Christian forgiveness. It still remains the mightiest untrapped by the operation of it, man-kind may yet be freed from war and strife.

It's so easy to focus our eyes upon the injustices, the lies, the antipathies, the inconsistencies and the cruelties of a sister nation and miss the mistakes of our own. Let the Pharisee we can with the blurred vision of only one eye see what is wrong with Russia. Russia has made a spectacle of herself before the civilized world. But can we see with two good eyes anything wrong with ourselves? Have we like the Pharisee lost the power of self-criticism?

This much is certain. If we have, we will not beat our breasts and say with the publican, "God be merciful to me a sinner." And this is precisely what we ought to be saying; not because we are worse than Russia; not because we are as bad as Russia; but because we have all sinned and fallen short of God's purposes for us. And once we really repent and experience—God's—forgiveness—we will feel more like extending that forgiveness to Russia.

And who of us can say what an enemy may do then? Is it not within the realm of divine probability that she may be noticed in soul and likewise repent? We can live together in peace and harmony if in place of tearing and hating each other, we will admit realistically our differences and forgive each other as God forgives us.

The way out, if there is a way out, is in the teachings of Jesus; to love

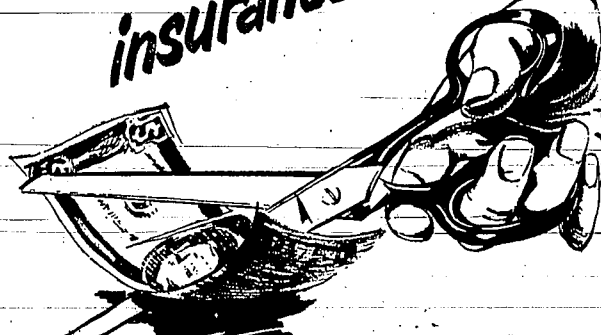

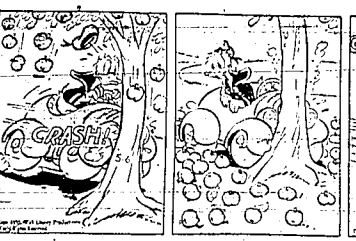

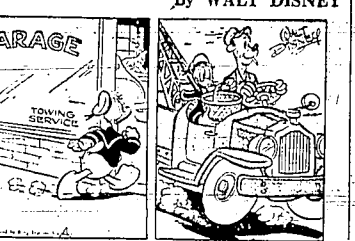

AEC Denies 'Poisoning' of Idaho Water

TWIN FALLS, May 6 (AP)—Atomic energy officials in Twin Falls labeled as a "misrepresentation" a statement in Quick magazine that atomic reactors were poisoning Idaho water.

The magazine stated, "The AEC is worried about poisoning underground water in Idaho with its atomic reactors and that the industry is covering up the truth."

In an official statement today, AEC officials said that not only was the AEC doing ahead with construction at the site, but in many cases was ahead of schedule.

"The geological survey of the interior department is building up a substantial backlog of fundamental knowledge of the water resources of a large section of Idaho which will contribute to a general inventory of ground waters in the basin."

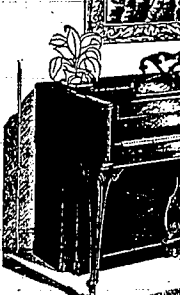

Jerome Notes Sewer Work Is Advancing

JEROME, May 6.—The sewage lift being installed by city crews between Peach and Cedar streets is nearing completion after weeks of slow and difficult progress. The lift has been constructed by R. C. Clawson, Twin Falls, at an estimated cost of \$8,000. Great difficulty has been met in running the trunk line to the lift. It has been necessary to go as deep as 77 feet, and the shafts are up Cedar and down the half block of Peach to the lift.

This trunk line provides drainage for all sewage beyond avenue G to avenue B and O to the southwest section of the city. The sewage will run by gravity from the feeder line into the main trunk line until it reaches the lift. There it will be raised from 18 to 30 feet by automatic pumps into the main street trunk line and on to the Inhoff tank northwest of the city limits.

More to Be Done
According to Mayor John Hoeman, an additional \$50,000 worth of sewage expenditures still remains to be completed before the entire city sewage system is finished. Funds are now on hand to complete the entire project, which will amount to approximately \$500,000, which includes two miles of sewer laid under the old WPA program. This has been done without the issuance of bonds levied on tax sources.

This snapshot was taken in Buhl on the morning of May 7, 1930, and shows spruce (bridal wreath) in full bloom buried under a foot-thick fall of snow while tulips stood bleak and forlorn above the snow. The season was further advanced than this spring of 1930. The poplar trees were in full leaf and showed the strata and adobe with a tremendous wreckage of broken limbs.
