T. F. Budget Lowered to Cut Tax

A budget of \$1,096,005, a decrease of \$40,013.70 from the \$1,136,018.70 budget estimate for the 1949 fiscal year, was approved Monday night by the Twin Falls board of commissioners for the fiscal year beginning May 1, 1950, and ending April 30, 1951.

The budget prepared by City Manager William H. Smith in cooperation with the commission shows a tax reduction from 48 mills to 45 1/2 mills or nine per cent.

The anticipated revenue for all city funds shows \$393,760 from the property tax assessment and \$701,255 in from unexpected funds such as water service, parking meters, court fines and miscellaneous. The 45 1/2 mills will be levied against a total anticipated assessment valuation of \$9,000,000 for city real property.

Example cited—Smith explained that tax reduction means a person with \$3,000 assessed valuation will have his city taxes reduced from \$144 to \$131.

The total anticipated revenue for 1950 is \$1,096,005, a decrease of \$40,013.70 from the \$1,136,018.70 budget estimate for the 1949 fiscal year.

The new budget includes expenditures for administration, engineering, police, fire, streets and parks and miscellaneous. The total anticipated revenue is \$1,096,005.

Boyd was taken before Justice of the Peace J. W. Lampert, who set bond at \$5,000. Boyd was tentatively set for arraignment at 10 a. m. tomorrow.

After consulting later with Blaine, Lampert was advised that Boyd was relieved of his duties by Governor Robins today.

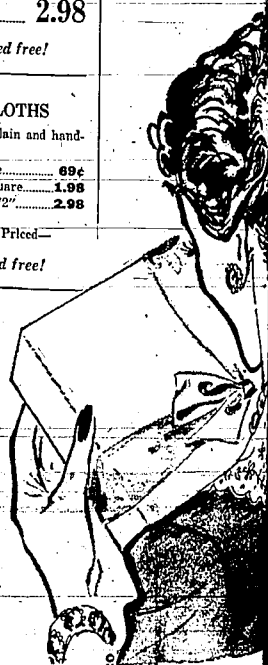

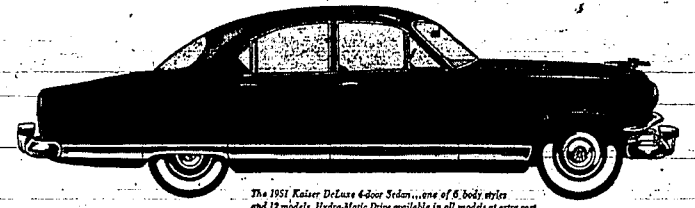
