At least that's been my experience. It is getting on towards ten o'clock when I am alone in my study...

Expert Notes Losses From Liver Flukes

GOODING, May 11—"Liver flukes cost us money," says Gooding County Agent R. Z. Higgins. A Gooding farmer called the county agent to report contaminated litter in the last two beef animals he had butchered—last year's farm-bred and this year's first-bred of young cubs.

Both of these losses were caused by liver flukes, said Higgins. There are other losses, not identified and not reported, caused by this parasite.

Liver flukes are trematodes. They commonly infect cattle, pigs, sheep and goats. Sometimes horses are infected.

Life Cycle Described

The host eliminates the fluke eggs with the droppings, the eggs develop in wet swampy pastures. Cold weather holds back development, warm weather speeds it up. The egg hatches into a larva which

must find a small host within a few hours or it dies.

The small host is the intermediate host. In the small the fluke larva multiplies and grows a hundred fold. It is then discharged from the small after which it swims about for a while and then swims up into a grass.

The cyst floats in the water or lodges on grass. Cattle, sheep and goats feeding in this wet pasture eat the cysts which develop and wander around in the body cavity for a while. It then enters the liver to start the cycle over again.

Symptoms Listed

Flukes usually kill sheep but only infect cattle. They are bloodsuckers, and the anemia thus produced causes droopy-like appearance, low or jaw swelling, digestive disturbance and in sheep, eventually death.

The county agent says prevention is the best care. Snails may be controlled by adding copper sulfate (blue vitriol) to the water. One part vitriol to 50,000,000 parts water will do the job. This is often the best way to break the cycle. Rotation of pastures and careful water control will also help.

Fish Out of Water—Can Exist Better Than Root Out of Soil

UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO, Moscow, May 11—A fish can live longer out of water than many plant roots can live out of the soil.

George Woodbury, horticulturist for the University of Idaho, has only one admission for his students when they forget and leave plant roots exposed too long. What he says is—get them out of there.

It is not difficult, the horticulturist insists, if the roots have to be bare for a time, see that there is a wet cloth or several thicknesses of wet paper around them. Don't leave them exposed to the sun and wind while you work with other plants or go to the house for a drink of water.

Leave some of the first soil on the roots if you can so that there is the least possible amount of disturbance.

Dry soil is another enemy of young plants. Be sure there is plenty of moisture in the ground at the time of transplanting. If there is any doubt about this moisture content, pour water around the

Woodbury says all too many folks leave their plants where they can dry out for some time during the transplanting operations in spring. Hot sunshine can ruin the roots or set the plants back badly in just a short time. Drying winds will do the same.

GOODING, May 11—"Crops will need plenty of water when the cold spell breaks," says County Agent R. Z. Higgins. "Although there is a little growth made now the ground is dry and when the temperature rises the crops will be ready to grow and will need water."

Continuing irrigation now will save a rush later on, he advises. Pastures and hay will have an especially heavy demand for water.

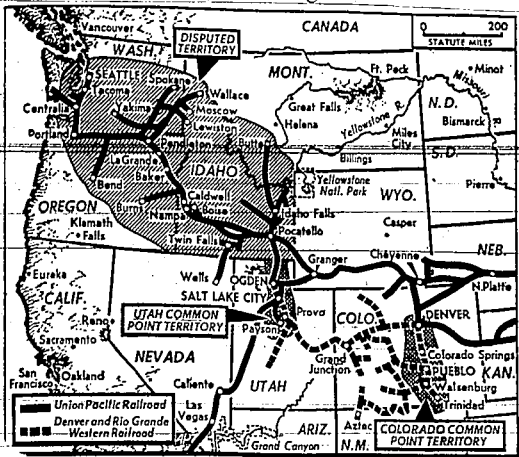

Freight and passenger rates have been held at Salt Lake City, Boise and Cheyenne and the ICC has not yet ruled on the application.

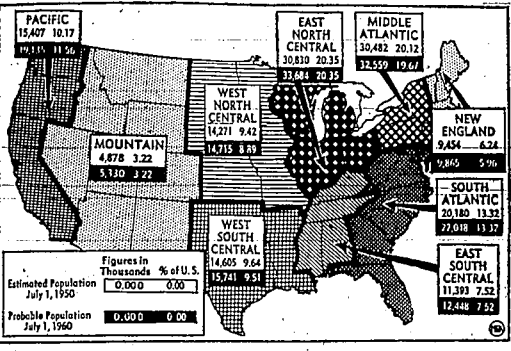

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Lack in Diet Is Factor in Bone Breaks

UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO, Moscow, May 11—The dried brook bones which cause aged persons untold suffering may be broken before they fall to their lot, it is said. The falling bone may be the cause of the fall rather than the fall being the cause of the broken bone. Calcium is often the real cause of such trouble.

"So many of us do not realize how very important it is to keep up a good body reserve of calcium to build and rebuild our bones all through life," a nutritionist for the University of Idaho, points out.

Late Discovery

"Sometimes we discover the deficiency too late. We are learning that it is much easier to keep our calcium level at a high level than it is to bring it up again once the low danger level is reached."

Miss Haberly said many people in the last few years have begun to show concern about the need for more calcium in the bodies of all age groups from toddlers to grandmothers.

She gave the high school girls as the one group most likely to fall below the minimum amount of calcium. It is probably through fear of gaining weight that the girls of this age fail to drink milk—the one best source of this important mineral.

Contrast for Boys

High school boys, on the other hand, concentrate on getting more milk to carry on athletics and other strenuous activities and sports.

Parents' worry about the next group that suffers from the lack of calcium.

Child doctors put these expectant mothers on a good milk ration. Many of them are short on calcium, Miss Haberly pointed out.

"When it is hard for them to assimilate enough calcium to meet the needs of the developing child at the same time that they keep up the demands of their own bodies."

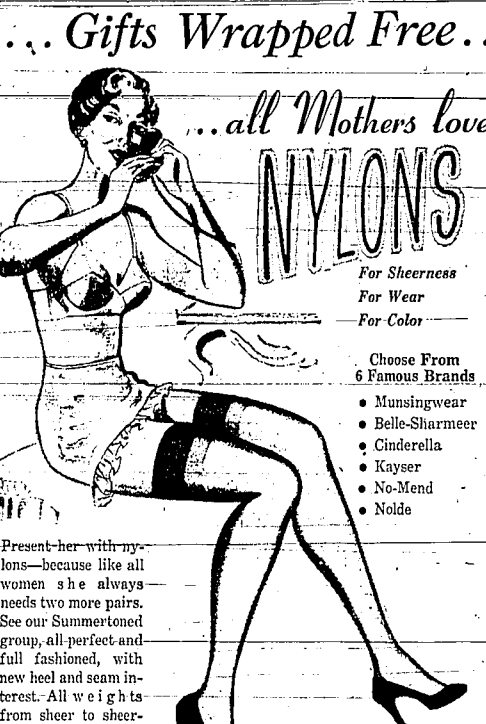

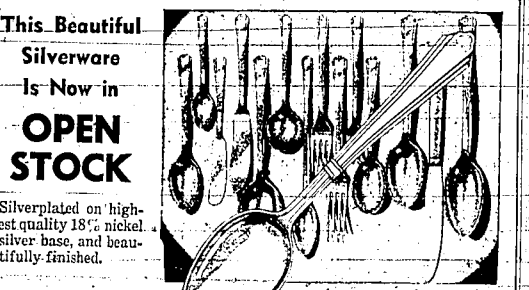

'Green River' Act Is Upheld by Tribunal

BOISE, May 11.—Constitutionality of the nationally known "green river ordinance" regulating house-to-house peddlers was upheld Wednesday by the Idaho supreme court. The court's unanimous decision, written by Justice C. J. Taylor, upholds the ordinance in its entirety in Poecello.

The appeal was taken from a declaration of invalidity by the attorney for Rowe Craft Studio of President Hill, and his agents in a suit against the city of Poecello.

The ordinance restricts the visit to private residences by peddlers, peddlers and other transient vendors of merchandise not having been requested to do so by owners or occupants.

Justice Taylor wrote the ordinance "does not violate either the state constitution or the constitution of the United States and does not impose an unconstitutional burden of interstate commerce."

Agents of the studio, the decision said, do not knock door-to-door on residences soliciting orders for enlargements of photographs.

The decision in the case is the reason for numerous highway signs along the route to Poecello, the attorney saying, "Green River ordinance enforced here."

Taxless Oleo Will Be Taxing To U. S. Food, Drug Sleuths

By DOUGLAS LARSEN (WPA). WASHINGTON, (WPA)—Under a new law, the U. S. government is forcing restaurants to identify colored margarine when they serve it. The law is being enforced for enforcement of the pure food and drug act.

Food and drug administration officials estimate it will require more than double their present \$3,000,000 budget when the federal tax comes into effect on July 1. A fleet of new-type trailer laboratories will have to roam the U. S. constantly to make one inspection a year of each of the nation's 525,000 eating places. It will mean adding 200 extra persons to the federal payroll.

All provisions of the new law will be difficult to identify. It is as "oleo" must be stamped on each individual serving, or it must be accompanied by a label or tag clearly identifying it as "oleo." But the toughest section of all to police, pure food and drug experts say, is the requirement that "no oleo which is colored oleomargarine is served (must be) displayed prominently and conspicuously in manner as to render it likely to be read and understood by the ordinary individual being served... or otherwise set forth on the menu in type or lettering not smaller than that normally used to designate a serving of such food items.

Similar exacting rules will apply to sales in grocery stores. All colored oleo must be packaged in containers of one pound or less. The word "oleomargarine" on the label must be in type or lettering as large as any other type that is on the label. And "each part of the contents of the package

(must be) contained in a wrapper which bears the word "oleomargarine" or "margarine-in type not smaller than 24-point type."

Preliminary surveys by the government lead pure food and drug officials to believe that the first few months will produce widespread violations. Studies were made of restaurants and cafes in states which have exacting oleo-serving laws. Approximately 45 per cent of those studies were found to serve margarine, and of that number,

most of them served it illegally. At the start, the problem is expected to be just as much a matter of educating cafe proprietors as it will be catching them in deliberate violations. "And our biggest trouble will probably be in the thousands of roadside restaurants and small town cafes," a pure food and drug spokesman says. Maximum penalty for the first offense is \$1,000 or a year in jail.

The law, according to pure food and drug officials, gives their area of federal authority. Up until now they haven't concerned themselves with foods or drugs which are not a part of interstate commerce. After July 1, however, even oleo which is made, sold and consumed entirely within the boundary of the same state will be under their authority.

Repealing of the federal tax on colored oleo has been a long and bitter battle waged by the oleo industry against the dairy farmers. The strict provisions governing the federal tax-free sale of the product were largely the result of pressure by the dairy industry. Oleo interests are apparently satisfied by the new law, however.

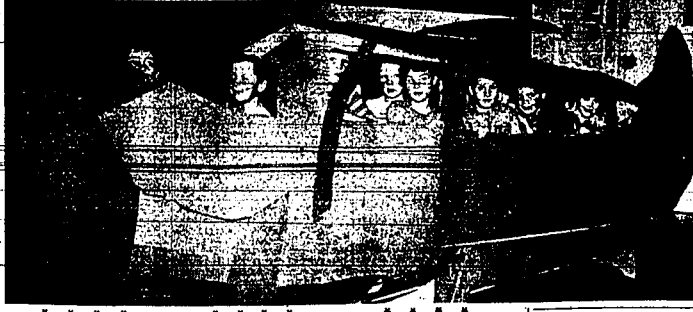
Hollister First-Graders Have "Plane" for Imaginary Jaunts

Moore said the Wallace local, largest of three in the area, met last night and "took a definite stand against any union that may attempt to raid our membership."

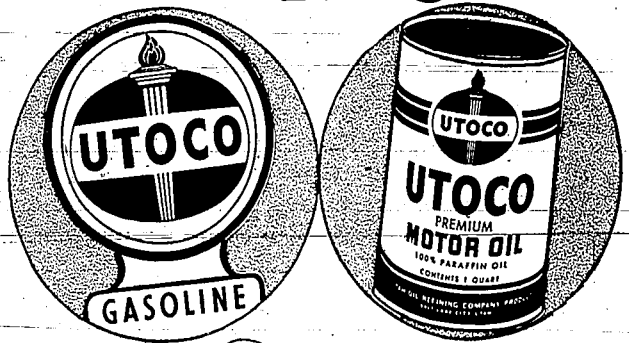

Local Lilacs Fail to Note City's Event

SPOKANE, May 11 (AP)—The slogan "Spokane is best when lilacs are in bloom" is all over town today but it looks like the city will have to use somebody else's lilacs to prove it—at least this week.

And this is the week, too, for the lilac visitors are supposed to come to be shown. Chances are they'll see flowers from their own home town.

"Spokane the lilac city"—that's another slogan—hasn't seen any lilacs this year because of the cold spring. Festival Chairman Bob Miller said merchants have been scouring neighboring towns to get fresh lilacs for their floats in Saturday's big parade.

Some floats will use artificial lilacs, others just plain purple and white paper.

A big flower show is scheduled Friday and is supposed to feature better grown lilacs. The city of Lewiston, Id., is shipping a truck load of lilacs here for that.

But luck of local lilacs hasn't interfered with plans for the parade. Miller announced today that 6,000 persons, including 60 bands, will march. He said a crowd of 200,000 is expected to line the streets for the affair.

A lilac pageant is scheduled Saturday night at the Spokane baseball park.

Farm Bureau's Militant Chief Catches Public's Eye in Fight

WASHINGTON, May 11 (AP)—Alex Kilne, the tough, fighting president of the American Farm Bureau federation, is the first farm leader in many years to zoom into real national prominence. That's mostly because of the militant leadership he has taken in his fight against the "bracketed farm plan," a natural foe for good public relations and his eloquence in tossing out new ideas in defense of free enterprise.

"Kilne probably not a personality quite like his on the national scene today. For instance, back in the depths of the depression, the bank was about to take away his worn-out Iowa farm. He was broke. His family was completely dispirited. But he talked the bank out of that. It wasn't his fault."

Then he built a swimming pool and tennis court on his place, and bought some boxing gloves and some riding horses—on credit. Kilne explains why he did these things:

"What all of us needed most was a boost in morale. I figured that some good recreation was the best remedy."

"The orthodox—church paid-off—Kilne is going to do next. Some say he's a natural for vice presidential candidate. If General Eisenhower runs, on this next Republican ticket—let's almost sure to take another term as president of the Farm Bureau. They agree he could be a senator from Iowa by saying the

muscular hands are strong of a real farmer.

Although his critics think there's a lot of actor in Kilne, they also admit he usually gives a good performance. He is an extremely effective public speaker. His confidence—another way of talking—has a powerful effect on rural audiences but he can be as polished as an ambassador before a senate committee.

His effectiveness as a farm spokesman is greatly enhanced by a broad background. He has traveled widely in Europe and around the world and has an international point of view. He has served as an official of several big insurance firms which "deposited" with farmers—and a member of the Chicago federal reserve bank board.

The job of representing 1,250,000 farm families isn't easy the way Kilne likes to do it. There is just as many Democrats in the organization as there are Republicans, but he has always tried to handle his association with the bureau in a fair manner.

For instance, after campaigning hard for the job of president, he suddenly vanished on the day that the convention was to vote. After he had won, his furious backers found him and started to tell him off. He stopped them.

"They knew who I was and what I stood for," he said. "I had said everything I wanted to say. I figured they could make up their mind about me after that without my being around."

Kilne was born in Waterbury, Neb., attended Morningglade college in Sioux City, Ia., and Iowa State college. He has two grown sons, one now running the farm, and a married daughter. His religious is Presbyterian. His big regret is that his job keeps him away from his farm and family too much.

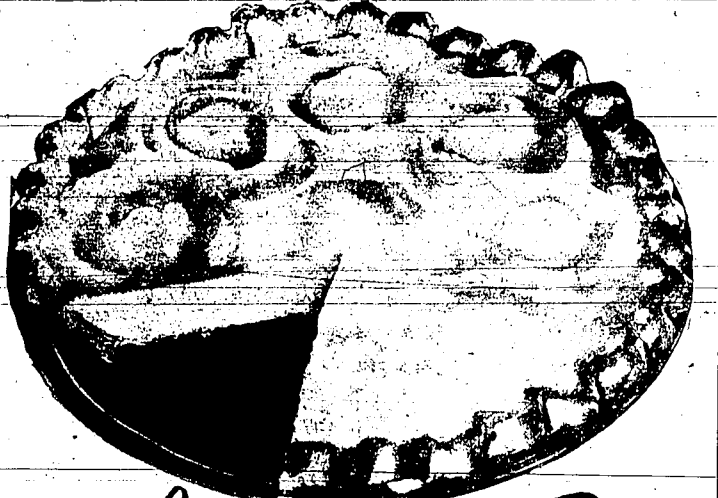

Air Force's New Boss Keeps Composure Despite Hard Job

WASHINGTON, (NEA)—Thomas Knight Finletter will take a new tradition with him into his new job as secretary of the air force—the ever-strengthening coffee pot.

Then, in 14 cases of coffee, he has his normal consumption while he's working. But it is that coffee and the picture of a nervous high pressure executive barking out orders to frightened underlings, it isn't the coffee that makes the difference.

It's a matter of record that (1) nobody has ever seen him either upset or really ruffled and (2) that nobody has ever heard him raise his voice in excitement or anger—except as a tennis match, his favorite sport. He still plays a pretty fair game—700-45-60.

Finletter's notorious composure survives despite a run of tough jobs. Practically every one he has tackled for Uncle Sam has been more than its share of major headaches. The job which led to his present assignment was heading up the President's five-man air policy commission, established in July, 1947. The idea was to produce a common sense report on the status and needs of air power for America.

The resulting report, called "Survival in the Air Age," is now considered one of the finest documents of its kind ever written. It will influence the history of American aviation for many generations, most especially in the years ahead.

Before that assignment, he served as special assistant to the secretary of state in 1944, advising on international economic affairs. In 1943 he was executive director and deputy director of the office of foreign economic coordination.

None of those tasks was easy, but he did an outstanding job on all. Between 1944 and 1947, he reamed his highly-splittable hair practice in New York, but with major office in Washington in an advisory capacity.

Not the least cause for his ready stamp of approval everyone in Washington has put on his new appointment as Finletter's assistant wife, Gretchen, the daughter of famed orchestra leader Walter Damrosch. She has a personality that Washington society will welcome with eager arms.

Finletter's appearance is deceptive. Balding, of medium height and build, he wears a solemn expression on his grey, pallid face. But his sparkling grey eyes are a give-away to a piercing sense of humor.

Finletter was the main speaker at a luncheon given in honor of the air policy commission's report. Everyone present was grimly prepared for a very scholarly address. But he bowled them over with a humorous talk, so full of side-splitting stories that most of the audience went home weak with laughter.

After his work on the commission and before his present assignment, he served as Michigan plan representative in London. On this assignment, too, he did an outstanding job.

Aside from his government work and legal practice, he has written and lectured widely, mostly in behalf of his favorite enterprise, the United World Federalists. Scholarly works on various issues and the functions of the U. S. government are also among his principal interests.

Born in Philadelphia in 1903, he is a member of one of that city's prominent families. His father and grandfather were both local judges and his mother's ancestry goes back to the early colonists.

He was educated at the Episcopal academy of Philadelphia, the University of Pennsylvania, and in Paris. During World War I he rose to the rank of captain with the 321st field artillery.

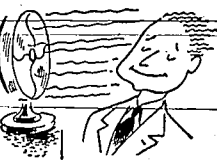

terests and occupations. Members receive a day. They appoint a medical staff which is given the privilege of practicing its professions in the hospital. In turn, each doctor assumes a responsibility to provide the best of care for every patient admitted by him.

A department of radiology is maintained in the hospital under the supervision of an experienced radiologist, an MD, who has completed special training in both diagnosis and treatment.

Operates Laboratory
The laboratory is in charge of a pathologist, also an MD, who spent several years receiving special training and has passed the National Board of Pathology. For each patient staff proceeds automatically to make a complete blood count, serological examination and an urinalysis. These procedures are important and complete knowledge of the patient's condition. Later, the laboratory may perform other tests when ordered by the attending physician.

Another responsibility of the "lab" is administration of the Twin Falls county blood bank, a community project. The processing of blood is done in the laboratory, including the equipment of these refrigerated storage, RBC determination, cross matching and bacteriological determination.

The cost to patients in processing blood in Twin Falls is in accordance with the cost in other hospitals. The Twin Falls county hospital is registered as a non-profit hospital. That means it can charge only the enough to cover the cost of the many services which render it efficient.

Nurses' Duties
Many people who visit the hospital are inclined to label any person in a uniform as a nurse. Actually, the person may be one of several grades of employees in the nursing department, or she might be in another department, altogether, such as a technician in the laboratory or X-ray department, or in the dietary department.

Various categories of nursing service employed include registered nurse, licensed practical nurse, nurse aid and orderly. The registered nurse is the top figure in the scale. She has completed at least three years of education in an accredited training school and has become registered by passing an examination given by the state board of nurse examiners to test her knowledge and fitness.

Licensed Addition
The licensed practical nurse is the newest addition to the nursing family. She has undergone at least one year of training which she has taken usually for the simple reason that she could not afford to spend three years training as a registered nurse.

Nurses' aides rank next in the scale. They are women employed as auxiliary workers on the nursing

Famed Operation by Experts in East Changing Life for Filer "Blue Baby"

FILER, May 11—After 16 years of being restricted to reading, typing, sewing and other activities requiring no exertion, Joyce Gartner, filer, is on her way to living a normal life.

On November Joyce was taken to Johns Hopkins hospital, Baltimore, where a successful operation was performed to correct the condition commonly known as "blue baby." She had the condition since birth.

Joyce was born Dec. 9, 1933, at Haxtand, Neb., and moved to Filer with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Harvey Gartner, in 1934.

Along with the extraordinary condition which prevented a sufficient flow of blood to the lungs, she also was stricken with rheumatic fever and a bad case of otitis meningitis. She couldn't walk until 3 years old and her physical action had to be severely restricted because exertion made her faint. However, in spite of the condition, she managed to complete seven years of school.

Through a woman's magazine the parents learned about an operation which might correct the restricted flow of blood to the lungs. In 1947 they took Joyce to Johns Hopkins hospital for more information and made their first trip to the hospital to have her examined.

Doctors there warned them the success of an operation of that kind could not be guaranteed, but in 1948 the Garters received word to bring their daughter for the operation.

Joyce's condition is called tetralogy fallot. It is described as including a hole in the wall between the heart chambers, pulmonary artery defect, valve defects and general enlargement of the heart.

Open 24 Hours
Certified nurses' aides who perform some of the heavier chores for the nursing department. The array of nursing personnel must be organized into three shifts so nursing care is provided around the clock with no stopping for Sunday or holidays. There must never be any shut-down in a hospital.

Seldom appreciated are the faithful maintenance men who struggle with old and inadequate equipment to keep the physical plant operating 24 hours a day—seven days a week.

Anyone passing the hospital at 3 p. m. would find all its lights blazing. There's never a moment of the day when its doors are closed. No hospital ever carries a notice, "Out to Lunch, back at 1 p. m." Whether it is New Year's eve, Thanksgiving, or even Christmas day, hospitals never close their doors or suspend their services. The staff, personnel, equipment and facilities are always available whenever they are needed.

It is the pulmonary artery near the lungs, thereby providing an increased blood supply to the lungs. Other left arm blood vessels provide a sufficient flow to the arm. However, the operation leaves 125 pulses in the left arm.

Joyce was said to continue restriction of her activities for the next six months, then gradually increase them. The swelling in her fingers has decreased noticeably and the "blue" condition is no longer a parent.

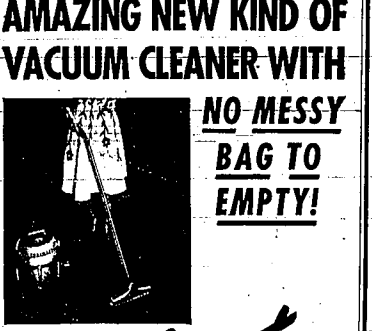

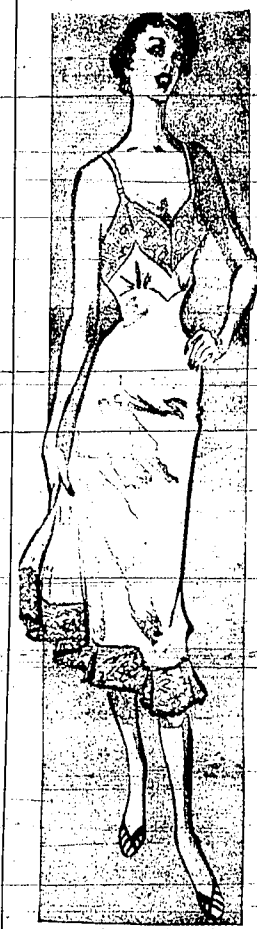

Well-Digger Dies in Agony Just Five Minutes Before Rescuers Get to Him

NEW YORK, May 11 (AP)—Well-digger Dominick Atleo died in agony Wednesday just five minutes before rescuers freed him at the bottom of a 20-foot shaft. He had been trapped there for 28 hours.

Half-blinded, the 48-year-old father of six children had fought off rats and scorpions until the last by what doctors described as a superhuman effort of will and courage.

Workmen tunneling under a Brooklyn garage reached Atleo's spot at 1:15 p. m. EST and an hour later, despite a minor cave-in, reported the still willing, moaning prisoner was 90 per cent clear.

But the last sliver of earth and stone were dug away too late.

Grey-faced with fatigue, Dr. Harold Berson emerged from the garage floor excavation and shook his head.

"He died just five minutes before I got to him," said the doctor, who had been lowered repeatedly into the collapsed well to attend the trapped contractor. "I thought he was going to make it. His courage and endurance were beyond belief."

The body was brought to the surface at 2:40 p. m.

Atleo, 27, an attractive, 37-year-old second wife, Marie, who wept and prayed at the well throughout the long vigil, went into hysterics at the end, screaming and striking out at spectators.

His son John, 26, who lowered the cigarette that touched off an explosion badly burning the entombed man, last night, bitterly accused the rescue crew of waiting too long before starting the trench that ultimately reached Atleo.

"If they'd started digging right away, he'd have been out long ago. There wouldn't have been an explosion and he'd be alive now," the dead man's son cried out.

Police Inspector Walter Florio back said "nothing more could have been done than was done."

Atleo was buried to the accompaniment of a requiem mass.

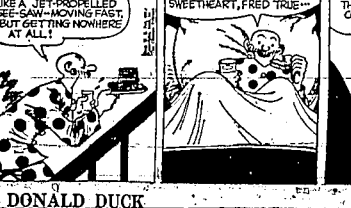

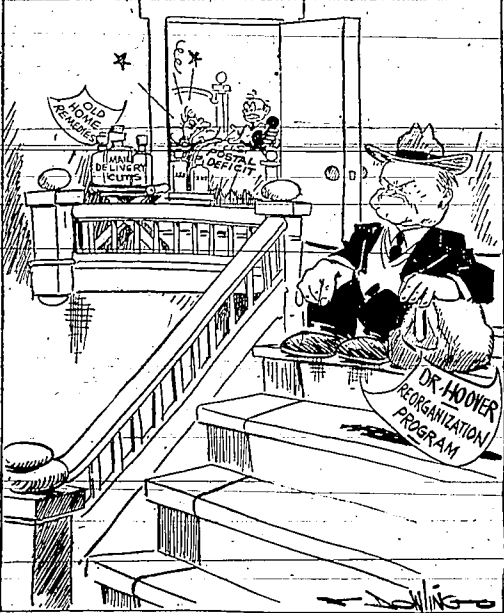

UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO, Moscow, May 11—Almost 700 southern and eastern Idaho farmers attended schools this spring on the use of the farm level for running grade lines, contour lines, profile lines, and in land leveling problems on their farms.

Owen K. Brown, extension agriculture center for the University of Idaho, said that the attendance at schools which finished in mid spring this year was the highest since 1937.

"Now that I can summarize the attendance and the comments of our farm people who came to the schools, I am more than ever convinced that they can and will use the farm level to good advantage on their farms," Brown declares.

"We had a fine attendance when the weather permitted us to get out in the field, and the night schools were often crowded."

Need Was Known
Farmers in the irrigated sections of Idaho have long expressed a need for information they could use in running better ditches to make watering easier during the crop raising season. Land leveling in such areas is often a job for which the farmers must employ high priced labor.

Knowing how to use the farm level, Brown said, will make it possible for many farmers to improve their fields when it would be financially burdensome to have the work done by outside help.

More than 150 high school juniors from all parts of Idaho will participate in the program on the college of Idaho campus.

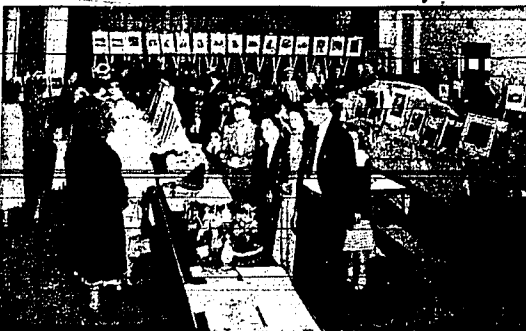
