Summerfield's Pocatello Talk Hits Opponent

POCATELLO, May 14.—Robert L. Summerfield, Twin Falls candidate for the Democratic nomination for the four-year U. S. senate seat today welcomed the competition of Prof. Claude Burtenshaw. Here on a campaign sweep through southeast Idaho, Summerfield commented on the announcement that Burtenshaw also would seek the four-year term.

Her recovery seemed complete when she returned to her home in America in 1916 to marry Reynolds whom she had met while he was stationed with the army air force overseas.

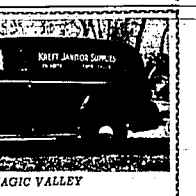

**KIMBERLY'S SCHOOL TROUBLES**

The Kimberly school board is to be commended for the statement it issued over the weekend to do so in the future. Too much tolerance in school administration has a tendency to encourage abuses.

We are glad to learn that the board held its ground and shows every indication of intention to do so in the future. Too much tolerance in school administration has a tendency to encourage abuses.

When pupils take it upon themselves to challenge regulations, harass their instructors, and intimidate their school-mates it brings about a situation calling for firm action.

And parents, if they would only stop to realize what is best for their children, would support the school authorities in any attempt to maintain discipline, instead of being overly eager to spring to the defense of those youngsters who have a tendency to be trouble-makers.

**WOLF PACKS**

In New York, student riots in New York, and financial aid, pupils all over the country to view our school disturbances lightly. The parents also have an important responsibility which they should not overlook.

As the Kimberly school board said in its statement:

"No school by itself can raise a child, performing alone what should be a cooperative effort—first from parents and secondly by churches, law enforcement officers, community or city councils, alumni and any other citizen who may have an opportunity to help."

"Indifference, amuse-tolerance, laziness and non-constructive criticism all tend to hinder the efforts of any school.

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**MORE INTEREST IN HISTORY**

A New York Times survey reports more colleges than ever requiring students to study American history, and more students taking such courses with their complete confidence.

Cheers ought to greet this trend. Part of a nation's growing up is becoming aware of its own past and how it fits into the larger world picture.

How many of us live today in a vacuum of time. We don't bother to link up with the stream of history to which we belong. If we did, we'd be more mature, more wisely humbled. History has patterns; many events and attitudes are repeated from time to time in more or less similar form. Knowing them provides the wisdom of guidance for our present behavior and understanding.

**WE OFTEN GET THE IDEA THAT EVENTS BREAKING ACROSS ARE ISOLATED. MOST OF THE TIME THEY'RE NOT, EVEN THOUGH THE CHARACTERS AND PART OF THE SETTING ARE NEW.**

For instance, this isn't the first period in U. S. history when we've been stirred up about the red menace. At the end of World War I, President Wilson's attorney general staged one of the most extreme Communist hunts the world has ever seen. We might learn a lot by digging back to see what happened as a result.

Another case: Harold Stassen has just called President Truman the worst President ever to sit in the White House. Naturally present opinion on such a statement would be sharply divided, chiefly on partisan lines.

But Mr. Truman stacked up with his predecessors? Not at all. He did it with a different kind of wisdom, one without knowing what other presidents did and how they're rated.

**OF COURSE, NOT EVEN THE MOST OBJECTIVE HISTORIANS WOULD AGREE ON WHO WAS THE WORST PRESIDENT, BUT THE POINT IS TO BRING TOGETHER ON A GENERAL GROUP WITH WHICH THE WORST WOULD BE FOUND. THERE HAVE BEEN APPRAISALS OF THAT KIND, BUT IF THE AVERAGE CITIZEN DOESN'T KNOW ABOUT THEM, HOW CAN HE MEASURE THE VALUES?**

These are merely two samples of how useful it is to know what has gone before. It helps us avoid foolish mistakes, to put events in a sensible frame, to keep calm and judge calmly.

No one should have to urge the study of history. The worth of it ought to be obvious. That isn't it partly the fault of U. S. education, for not insisting on telling the story and telling it humanly. We can also blame our high-paced, machine-paced, machine-paced current living so absorbing and dazzling that there seems little time for delving deep into our past.

**Pact Nations Shelf Plans Of Extension**

LONDON, May 16 UP.—An Anglo-Canadian plan to extend the North Atlantic pact into the economic and political fields has been shelved for the time being, sources said today at the meeting of foreign ministers of the 12 Atlantic pact nations.

The council decided against the plan because it would lead to tensions that would share Marshall plan aid but are not in the Atlantic pact.

These are western Germany, Sweden, Denmark, Norway, Greece and Turkey.

**Fire Department Structure Completed; Alarm Testing Recalls Bird Troubles**

BURLEY, May 16.—The dream of the Burley volunteer fire lobbies was realized Friday when the three fire trucks were housed in the recently completed fire station at the corner of Oakley and Thirteenth streets.

To be housed in the new building are the old fire truck, which for years served the city of Burley and still is used as an auxiliary unit for fire fighting, and the new, modern truck purchased in 1948, which has a pumping capacity of 100 gallons per minute and carries a 350-gallon booster tank.

The third fire truck to be housed in the city building is the rural truck, purchased last November by the Snake River Mutual Insurance company, and delivered to the local department to be housed and maintained here. The truck, equipped, cost approximately \$12,000, and can be used as an auxiliary unit for fighting city fires.

The new building will have stalls for repairing city equipment and apartments for the regular firemen. It will be completed within a short time. The new location offers a better place for the fire fighting equipment, since the heavy traffic of Overland avenue is avoided. The entryway is to the north, on Thirteenth street.

Friday morning, the firemen tested the fire siren from the top of the city hall, where it was installed years ago to replace the old fire bell, which sounded fire alarms in Burley's early days. Burley residents were kept on their toes for a while Friday morning while the siren was tested at its new location.

At one time, oldtimers recall that birds nested in the fire siren and caused considerable trouble, even causing a short circuit in the alarm, but screens were placed over both ends of the siren and the bird trouble was eliminated.

Otis Williams, fire chief, says the new brick building gives Burley one of the finest, most modern fire departments in the state. Glass brick is used along the east wall of the building to give privacy as well as light to the interior. The cost of the building was estimated at \$25,000, and the remodeling of the department was done by Wayne Long, local builder.

As soon as additional equipment arrives, the interior of the building will be completed, Chief Williams said.

**WASHINGTON, May 16**—The National Association of Realtors Board disputed today the Federal Reserve Board's claim that "intolerable, chaotic and exorbitant" rent increases have occurred in decontrolled areas.

In testimony prepared for the housing banking committee, Calvin R. Snyder said the only statistics of housing expenditure that E. Woods show only half the average increase in 10 decontrolled cities amounted to more than 10 per cent.

### China Reds Take Nationalist Base

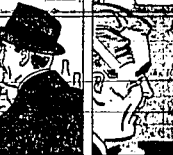
HONG KONG, May 16 (AP)—The Chinese communist news agency said today troops of red Gen. Chen
