

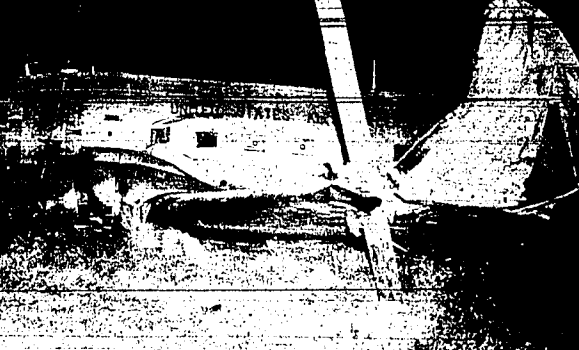

Transport Crashes in Heyburn After Landing Attempt

HEYBURN, May 17—A fully-loaded air force C-47 cargo plane crashed within the limits of this village at 1:22 a.m. today after attempting an emergency landing with one motor out of order at the Burley airport one and one-half miles away.

Only one of its crew of four sustained more than superficial injuries. Parts of the plane were virtually destroyed. The plane knocked out a 23,000-volt power line, disrupting local electric service here more than one hour.

Witnesses said the plane caught fire when it crashed, but Burley firemen were able to extinguish the blaze and save the wreckage. The crashing plane narrowly missed a garage and houses in the immediate area.

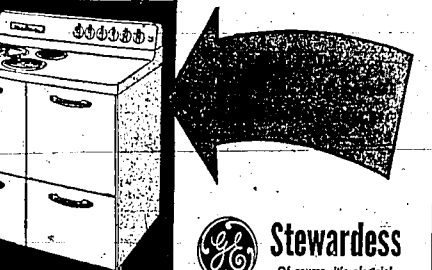

**SOCIALISM... A "DISEASE"**

Those Americans who are inclined to minimize the dangers of socialism and communism, even though they see these destructive influences gnawing at the very heart of our democracy, should listen to Sir Ernest Benn, English businessman, author and lecturer.

In a recent statement on "Rights for Robots," published by the Foundation of Economic Education in New York, the noted Englishman made these remarks:

"And while you fortunate Americans will last a little longer than the rest of us, your nation is, in fact, on an economic cancer. Most of us realize that the only way to cure this cancer is to make the rich poor, it is quite another matter to make the poor rich."

All important issues in the world today are individualism vs. collectivism. The individualist thinks of millions of single human souls, each with a spark of divine genius, and visualizes that genius applied to the solution of his own problems. His conception is infinite. He regards the politician or planner who at best regards these millions as material for social or political experiment, or at worst, cannon fodder.

"The individualist believes self-help to be twice blessed. For not only does it provide the help required, but it also gives a self-respecting satisfaction in accomplishment which can never attach to help that is received."

And he adds: "The individualist has a meaning and logic that cry for recognition... before it's too late."

### Storm Losses Of Utah Fruit Now 'Official'

HALT LAKE CITY, May 17.—Utah's north central fruit-producing counties will have a 90 to 100 per cent loss on their fruit crops as a result of blossom damage due to recent unseasonable snow and cold.

In other fruit-producing counties of Utah, the losses will range from 60 to 80 per cent, the bureau reported.

Ball Lake, Daver, Weber and Box Elder counties, the major producers of Utah's \$3,000,000 annual fruit crop, will have a 90 to 100 per cent loss on their fruit crops and apricots will run 50 to 60 per cent.

Utah county observers reported extensive damage to all fruits and the freezing temperatures even tended to freeze peaches and apples with their damage into Utah's Dixie. In county observers said the entire crop of apples has been lost and one-half of the apple crop claimed by the cold.

Bever and Grand counties also reported heavy losses.

### Court Okays Minor's Suit On Damages

SALEM, Ore., May 17.—The Oregon supreme court has upset a 50-year-old rule of law and held 4 to 3 that a minor child can sue a parent for damages.

The decision, which has its roots in a drunken celebration at the end of the war with Japan, awards \$5,000 damages for a father's responsibility for the death of his son.

Old-Resing Falls The rule that a minor child cannot sue his parent for damages was given in 1917 by the Massachusetts supreme court, Chief Justice Hall G. Lusk said. This rule, he added, has been followed generally ever since by courts over the country.

The father, George W. Parkers, the son, Billie Eugene Parkers, and the father's brother, all of Sweet Home, Ore., were killed Aug. 16, 1945, when the pickup truck, driven by the father, plunged over a 120-foot embankment into the South-Saniam river.

"Wilful Misconduct" The high court said the father and his brother were drunk, and the father was "guilty of wilful misconduct." They had celebrated V-J day on that day in a tavern.

The suit was brought by the administrator of the boy's estate, to establish liability of an insurance company. The money will go to the boy's mother, who was left with eight children.

### Vinson Drops Guess on '50 Deficit Figure

WASHINGTON, May 17.—With 45 days remaining in the 1950 fiscal year, Treasury Secretary John W. Snyder anticipated a federal deficit of at least \$5,000,000,000.

The budget bureau, in a forecast several weeks ago, placed the probable deficit at about \$4,000,000,000. Snyder told a news conference the deficit resulted from such "unforeseen circumstances" as large scale foreign aid, defense spending, and the 100-cent cotton price.

The secretary said federal fiscal policies had played a major role in averting possible depression in 1949. Snyder refused to comment on the reported United States loan to Argentina. The national advisory council, which Snyder, with the secretaries of state and commerce, is a member, is expected to approve a report of \$200,000,000 export-import bank loan to Argentina.

Snyder limited himself to saying that "the loan is under consideration."

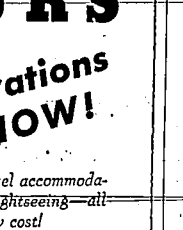
