The Press on Socialism ... A questionnaire which the Industrial News sent out to daily and weekly newspapers in the 48 states brought back 1,302 replies on socialism and its relationship to the United States.

Socialism vs. capitalism has become the biggest peace time issue in this country. The questionnaire pointed out: "And yet voters have never had an opportunity at the polls to express their attitude on this question."

Capitalism: An economic system in which capital and capitalists play the principal part; specifically, the established economic order based on private enterprise, the production, distribution and exchange of goods, the employment and reward of human labor, and the extension, organization and operation of the system itself, are entrusted to, and controlled by, private enterprise and control under competitive conditions.

8. Do you consider public ownership and operation of basic industries such as the electric industry socialistic? 1175 157
9. Do you feel that your personal liberty would be endangered if the business or profession in which you are engaged was taken over by government? 1208 43

Former Hunt Resident Opines Area Like "Lost Civilization"

"It's like coming back to a lost civilization," Akira Kikuchi, Chicago Japanese, said when he looked over the traces of the old Hunt relocation center.

Kikuchi, a resident of Seattle, Wash., when World War II broke out, was among 5000 Japanese who were relocated at Hunt. He visited the area this week while on a trip across the country in an attempt to find friends he made at the camp.

He spent two years at Hunt before he was allowed to join relatives in Illinois. After leaving Hunt he studied four years at Wharton college in Illinois and later two at Northwestern university, where he received a master's degree in journalism.

Kikuchi is employed as a proofreader for Time and Life magazine in Chicago.

He was surprised to find the area almost deserted, where once hundreds of buildings teemed with life. Only the foundations for the many barracks in the region and an occasional old barracks building remained as landmarks for Kikuchi.

He was impressed by work of veterans who now occupy the land. Farms are being tilled where once buildings were occupied by Japanese moved from Pacific coast area.

Kikuchi arrived at the camp in the spring of 1942 and left in 1944. He occupied living quarters with his parents and five brothers and sisters. An older brother and sister were living in Illinois and he received permission to join them and continue his education.

While he was at the camp he was employed at various jobs in "Twin Falls" and Jerome counties, tilling fields and working as a gardener for residents.

At the camp he had regular duties of teaching English to "the older generation."

Using the old guard house at the center's entrance for a landmark, Kikuchi pointed out foundations where the school, hospital and main administration buildings stood.

"The hospital was a busy place in those days. We averaged about one death a day," Kikuchi said.

He tried to find the location of the cemetery, but persons now living on the project could not help him.

The first thing he missed was the water towers which were torn down within the past year. He also noticed the absence of the sewage disposal plant which was purchased jointly by Hazelton and Twin Falls.

"Our chemistry students used to get a big kick out of the plant and how it functioned," Kikuchi explained.

He stopped frequently to take snapshots of remains of the camp. Several signs were still standing warning about swimming in the canal which arches through the main area.

"At least a dozen people were drowned right here. During the summer it was always full of swimmers since it was the only place to get cool. Those drowned were usually young children caught in the current."

He made several trips before stopping at a field where the barracks in which he lived had been located. Across from it was a potato cellar and irrigated farm land.

"It was used to be 'old' wild' wild' this 'strange, earth-covered building' was had for. Kikuchi was surprised when he learned 101 farm units are being occupied by veterans on the bureau of reclamation project. The rapid growth of the area-in farming seemed to amaze the well-educated Japanese.

"There are plowed fields here where we used to hunt rattlesnakes in the sagebrush for recreation. It's hard to believe all of this has happened."

He pointed out trees he had helped plant in the old barracks area.

"Seeing the remains of the relocation center," Kikuchi said.

57 Years of Railroading Ends With Retirement of Local Man

The end of 57 years of railroading came for Thomas J. Patton Monday as he retired at the age of 70. And he did his last day's work with the same thoroughness that had characterized him as a section foreman for the past 11 years at Twin Falls.

The district railroad clerk watched the rail motorcar driven by Patton as it approached the Shoshone street crossing, right on the dot at 8 p. m. as it did nearly every day. He wondered if the driver would cross the street with his usual responsible caution and chuckled when the car slowed to a full stop before crossing.

As the car drew up in front of the yard sheds, the roadmaster called the foreman into his office for one last task. And that task was to accept a platform rocker and footstool from fellow railroaders on the section.

"That's sure great," he thanked his crew, and then announced to the clerk that he would complete time-limits for the crew that evening and be ready to turn over his job to his relief in the morning. So ended Thomas Patton's railroad career. The first went to work for the

Union Pacific railroad at Bancroft as an engine watchman in 1923 at the age of 13 years. He became a fireman while still a young fellow and worked out of Pocatello. He became a section foreman at Peble in 1928 and later transferred to Rockwell, Wyo. He worked as a foreman of a ballast distributing crew and then returned to Pocatello to work in the railroad shops for two years. When the Yellowstone branch of the Union Pacific was constructed in 1928 and 1929, Patton worked as a roadway equipment operator. Then he returned to Pocatello for more work in the shops.

He came to Magic Valley Dec. 2, 1931, as a section foreman. Since that time he has been section foreman at Rupert, Shoshone and, since 1929, at Twin Falls.

Although he is through with railroading, the foreman doesn't expect to do too much sitting in his new chair. "My wife already has work cut out for me," he says, referring to the four-unit apartment house the Pattons will remodel and operate in Pocatello.

To complete its 1949-crop support program, the agriculture department is committed to buy up the support price "left-over" stocks of 1949-crop turkey meat in July. The 1950 crop—for which there will be no price support—starts moving to market in August.

Cold storage holding of 1949-crop turkey meat on May 1 stood at a near record high of 92,000,000 pounds. Unofficial forecasts of the left-over "surplus" the government will have to buy up in July range from 3,000,000 to 30,000,000 pounds.

Officials Hoped
But officials are hopeful the American consumer will get a sudden yen for turkey meat—and eat up all the stocks.

"It's a good buy right now," says Harrison J. Miller, assistant director of the department's poultry branch. "If people would compare prices of turkey now with some other meat, they'd see it's a good buy."

Turkey meat dumped in Uncle Sam's lap under the price support program in July probably will be donated to the federal-state school lunch program.

Water Switch Ideas Denied By California

LOS ANGELES, May 18 (Special) — Idaho and Oregon talk that a proposal to divert water from the Snake and Columbia rivers to California originated in this state, drew a strong denial here today.

James H. Howard, general counsel of southern Idaho's metropolitan water district, made the denial in a statement.

"Citizens of Idaho and Oregon have expressed concern," he said. "In some instances this opinion has been expressed that this proposal originates in California. This is not true."

Not Advocating Scheme — "Public water officials of Los Angeles, southern California or California are not advocating this scheme," Howard's statement continued.

"It was conceived solely by the U. S. department of interior and its reclamation bureau. So far as water sources outside the state are concerned, California's only interest is in the Colorado river.

"The people of California have built aqueduct systems and canals at their own expense to bring into the state its share of the Colorado river flow. Contracts with the federal government provide for the diversion in this way of 3,250,000 acre feet of water. It is estimated by water authorities that California's share of Colorado river water will meet its needs until probably 1990.

"California, like Idaho, finds itself on the defensive in respect to its water supply. Legislation now pending in congress would reduce California's share of Colorado river water. This legislation is advanced by Arizona interests. It would cost federal taxpayers more than \$1,000,000,000 to get the water onto Arizona lands.

Plan Endorsed — "The reclamation bureau has endorsed this county plan even though it admits that if California's water claims are correct there would be no water available for the proposed new Arizona project.

"In advancing the Snake and Columbia river diversion surveys, the reclamation bureau is considering a plan that would take water away from Idaho. This places Idaho and California in a similar position with respect to guarding their water supplies.

"It is important that the people of Idaho realize the true source of the scheme to divert water outside their state boundaries.

Sponsored by Bureau — "It is a program that originated with and is sponsored by the reclamation bureau of the department of the interior. The people of California are not parties to this proposal. Any protest which the plan should be directed toward the bureau of reclamation.

"Our only outside water supply is the Colorado river. We have no aspirant to any water belonging to Idaho, Oregon or any other state," the statement concluded.
