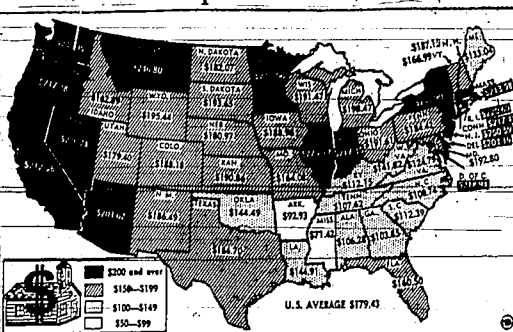

Area Mineral Deposits Will Be Explored

UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO, Moscow, May 22—A geological section of amateur and professional geologists and to the state's mining engineers to report recently found deposits of permalite, pyrite, and pumice from Dean A. W. Paley, head of the university's Idaho school of mines.

Deposits of these nonmetallic minerals will have the major attention of geologists and engineers in the field this summer for the Idaho bureau of mines and geology, explained the Idaho dean, who is also director of the state bureau.

"Field parties will start out on known deposits. In their travels they will investigate others reported by prospectors."

Area Minerals Cited

Because of the great interest in the use of lightweight aggregate minerals, such as pumice and pumice, as building materials, W. W. Blaney, professor of mining at the university, will start July 1 on a study of Idaho deposits.

He will investigate known deposits of these materials in the Rock section south of American Falls and others in the Idaho Falls and Pauline districts.

Professor Blaney also will be on the lookout for deposits of bentonite, soapstone, and a variety of other nonmetallic materials.

Earlier Field Trip

Starting out in the Garden Valley and Eldre basin sections of western Idaho early in June, Dr. Vern Fryklund, assistant professor of geology in the Idaho school of mines, will study permalite deposits. He is an authority in this field, having worked on permalite in North Carolina for the U. S. geological survey.

Principal objective of this project will be to provide information helpful in the establishment of any ceramics industry and to locate deposits carrying columbium, thorium, or uranium.

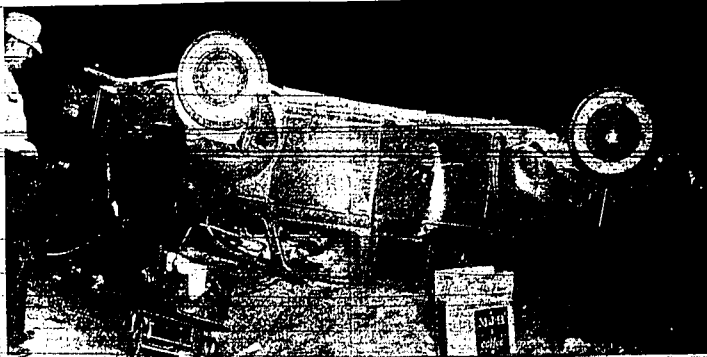
