After these payments are complete the beneficiaries will be notified in connection with those policies had in effect at the time of death. Although such policies were not in force a dividend is payable for the time the veteran did have the insurance in force, Helweg explained.

The order of payment of the dividend is first—to those beneficiaries who are receiving monthly NSLI benefits, then those who receive the insurance in a lump sum and, last, the heirs of veterans whose policies had lapsed. The VA representative added that the progress of payment of estate heirs will be slow because the heirs must be established legally before payment.

He said the VA has requested the beneficiaries and heirs who have not received payment yet do not write to the VA because a flood of such inquiries will slow the processing of claims for payment.

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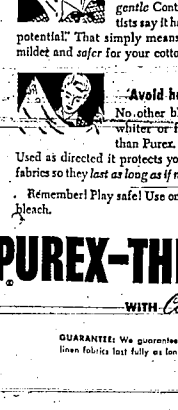
